Outdoor Learning at Henryk Sienkiewicz

For some time, the grade 2 students have been observing the environment and learning to describe changes in the weather and seasons. In early October, the children went on a fieldtrip to the University Botanic Garden to see the beauty of nature. It was a very warm and sunny day, perfect for a walk in a serene setting. How the Edmonton Slovak School moved online

Slovak Heritage School transitioned online in September 2020 as a result of the pandemic. We introduced a flexible program to meet the needs of our students and their families. Firstly, we introduced a synchronous



online program taught by an experienced teacher of the Slovak language from Bratislava, Slovakia. The online classes run every Sunday, and since the virtual world does not have any boundaries, we co-joined classes with a Slovak school in Montreal. We even received registrations from two students from Ireland and two students from Toronto. Yep. Our small school is connecting nationally and transnationally!



We also introduced an online asynchronous learning program for kids. Our students can participate in online activities at their own pace and time. Students can submit their work ideally within a week, or even later, any time before the end of the course. The children will receive two Jánošík (famous Slovak historical figure) electronic coins for each submitted activity.



The kids will have to collect the following amount of coins to receive the Certificate:

- Children ages 3 – 5 10 Jánošík coins
- Children ages 6 – 815 Jánošík coins
- Children ages 9 – 11 20 Jánošík coins
- Children ages 12- 1830 Jánošík coins

The activities within the asynchronous program vary. For example, children love our online series [“Stories with Grandma Zuzana,”](#) which we make available on YouTube. Our babka Zuzana is the grandma of two of our students. Babka Zuzka comes from Slovakia and lives in town Nitra. Children listen to her stories and answer babka Zuzka’s questions at the end of each video. Online teaching of Slovak has been fun so far 😊

The Filipino Canadian Saranay Association of Alberta lead the Legislative Assembly of Alberta in singing Canada's National anthem before the House proceedings on Monday, November 16, 2020 at 1:30 p.m. The warm invitation was extended to the group by the Alberta House Speaker, Honorable Nathan Cooper. Saranay is honoured to represent the Filipino community before the Assembly, and for the rare opportunity to perform the anthem in both English and Filipino languages. This is believed to be the first time that "O Canada" will be sung in both English and the Filipino language in the Alberta Legislature Chamber. Due to COVID-19 guidelines, a smaller than usual ensemble represented the full Saranay Rondalla and Choral group experience. The presentation was represented by youth, adult, seniors performed by singer, Sharmaine Pagtakhan and five Rondalla 14-string instrumentalists including Simeon Butch Ylagan (Music director -guitar), Mike Lopez (Rondalla pioneer- Sr. Banduria), Gemikalyn Isla (youth Octavina), Zaidrian Isla (youth Banduria) and Thelma Araja (Music director- Sr. Octavina). They were accompanied by Saranay administrators, Dr. Josephine Pallard and Grace Alarcon-Isla, who were seated in the Speaker's Gallery.



Mother Language Day

This year Mother Language Day is going online. While it is sad that we cannot all be together, we can still be together virtually! We will be asking schools to create a small video of a performance and bringing them together to create a memorable keepsake that can be enjoyed for many years and can be used for school promotion.

This year's them is Creation Myths and Legends. It is an excellent theme which allows us to learn more about each other. Schools are asked to create a virtual performance about some aspect of how something got created in their heritage language country. This could be the story of the flag or country name, the legend of a mythical animal or even how children are named.

Schools are allowed to submit as many submissions as they like; however, there is still a 7 page limit per school. Schools with multiple submissions will have the students work reduced in size. IHLA at Conferences

IHLA has been active this year spreading the word about IHLA all around the world.

On October 12, 2019 IHLA representatives were in Washington, DC as keynote speakers at the 2019 Community-based Heritage Languages School Conference. We shared our insights about language learning in Alberta and told of how our organization has survived and thrived for over the past 40 years!

IHLA attended many interesting talks on a variety of topics that were applicable to the Canadian context as well. These included information about setting up email servers for promotion of schools using services such as Mailchimp, the Global Seal of Biliteracy, and differentiated instruction in heritage language schools.

The global seal of biliteracy is an area which may be of interest to heritage language schools in Alberta. Students are able to sign up for specific administered tests which can then be used to prove biliteracy in English and another language. Students can examine their literacy skills in over 100 different languages. More information can be found at <https://theglobalseal.com>.

Other topics included a workshop by Maria Carreira about how to make classes more responsive to students' needs. She said that student work could be differentiated according to the content, the process, the pacing, or the product that students are expected to do. With the diversity that students are expected to achieve in a heritage language school,

she also listed instructional methods which could support teachers in ensuring that students get the information that they need in a lesson. These methods included exit cards, checks for understanding, agendas, flexible grouping, and centres. Understanding how to use these teaching methods in the classroom supports students in learning the material that they need.

FHSS Symposium: COVID-19 and Equity: Adjustments, adaptations, or total game changer? Athabasca University. October 6-7, 2020

During this digital event, Dr. Nina Paulovicova and Dr. Trudie Aberdeen spoke to participants about current research that IHLA is conducting about heritage language schools' responses to the COVID-19 pandemic. She was able to inform conference attendees about how our schools were thriving despite the many challenges that they face. We look forward to learning more about this research

The Coalition of Community-based Heritage Language Schools Annual Conference, American University. October 9-10, 2020

Members of IHLA found out that while COVID-19 has closed many doors, it has opened a few windows. One positive event that has happened as a result of the pandemic is that the annual conference of the Coalition of Community-based Schools was moved online. As a result, IHLA was able to offer two presentations and

was able to pay the conference fee for IHLA schools interested in attending.

IHLA's first shared presentation was titled "**Engaging city, state, and national organizations; consulates and embassies; and boards of education.**" This presentation shared by Trey Calvin of the Centre for Applied Linguistics and Professor Marta McCabe as well as IHLA's very own Nina and Trudie! They discussed different ways that individual heritage language schools could make connections with bigger institutions. Participants were able to draft a letter introducing their school.

IHLA's second presentation was "**Hiring, training, and retaining effective teachers at community-based heritage language schools in the USA and Canada.**" This presentation was offered by Renate Ludanyi, Sigrid Hass-Belluz, and Trudie Aberdeen. Participants were treated to a lively discussion about the realities of finding excellent teachers. They also looked at the processes that schools need to follow. After that they learned about non-monetary rewards that could be offered to teachers to encourage them to stay.

40th German Language Schools (GLSC) Professional Development Conference. German Consulate General. November 13-15, 2020

On October 14, 2020, IHLA and Móðurmál (Iceland) partnered together to share our knowledge and expertise about developing

plurilingual students. The workshop titled "Critical pedagogy: Creating identity texts" was shared with German heritage language teachers all across North America. Teachers learned why they should engage plurilingual education with their students and how they might promote pluralism through meaningful activities.

Móðurmál's Heritage Language Education Conference. Reykjavik, Iceland. November 20-21, 2020

IHLA was honoured to be able to share about our organization with our sister umbrella organization, Móðurmál. IHLA partnered with them in 2017 and we have never looked back!
