I hope you will enjoy this issue and continue to participate in our language education journey together. Have a great fall everyone!

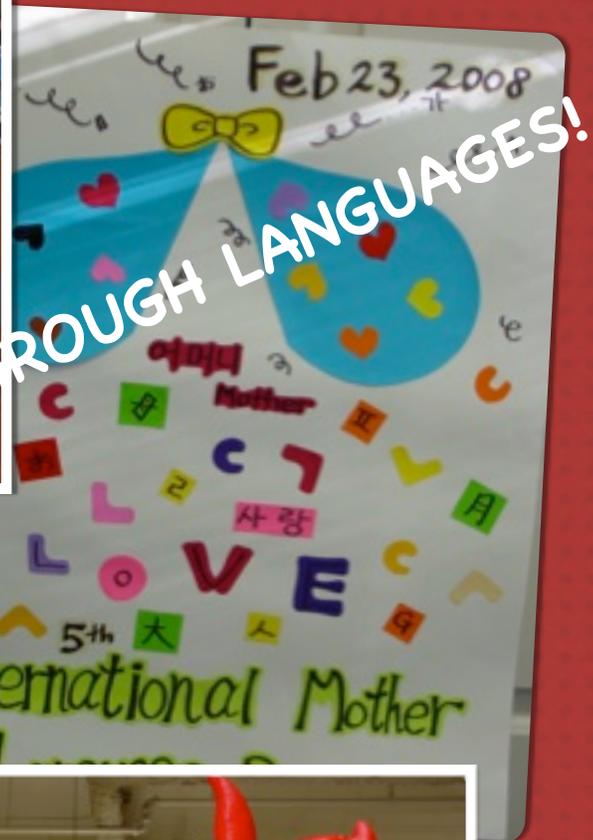

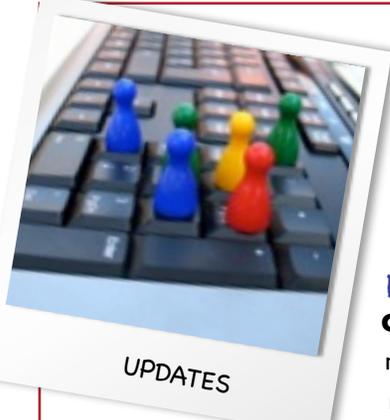

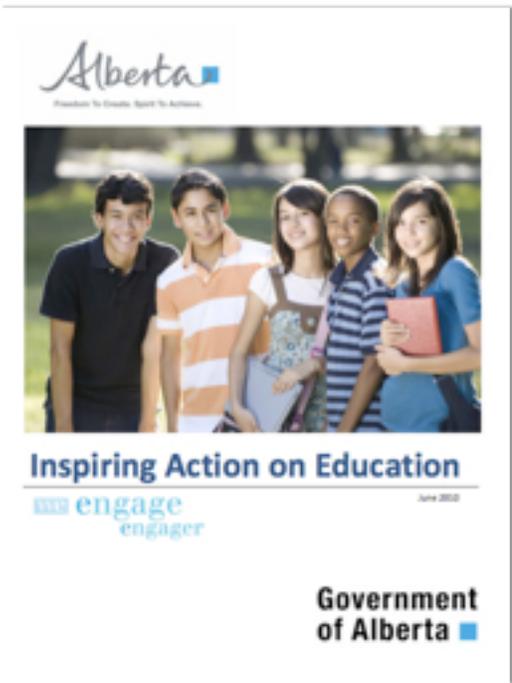

Internet Homework assignments for Heritage Language Speakers and Learners

Since the invention of the Internet in 1969, and the global deployment of the world wide web on top of the Internet around 1995, no other technology has had such a profound impact on global change. In only one generation, the world has distinguished what Rupert Murdoch called "digital natives" versus "digital immigrants." (2005) The former take modern Internet connectivity for granted, as an integral part of modern society. Anyone under 25 or 30 years of age is likely a digital native; our youth have grown up with cell phones, computers, laptops, notebooks, digital games. . . and the change is just beginning. While the digital immigrants are just becoming comfortable with distance between, and separation of, peoples being measured by time and bandwidth of modern digital communications (instead of miles, kilometers or timezones), more profound changes are emerging because of how culture and language are transcended by immediate connection of events and real-time interaction and even translation of languages. Few homes are without internet these days, but are heritage language teachers taking advantage of what the internet can offer? In addition to providing up to date information about language and culture

teaching methods and strategies and limitless other news and entertainment topics in many languages, the internet is an important tool for language use for the heritage language (HL) learner and speaker. In fact, as a flexible tool that can be accessed at any hour of any day, the internet's appeal increases with a learner's age. Whether a digital native or digital immigrant, HL instructors cannot avoid using the internet; further, by integrating HL internet use into their instruction they can become models of technology use in the HL and open innumerable doors to their students. Because some HL schools may have limited access to computers during classtime, this paper will focus on using the computer as a part of homework assignments. As such, it is designed to increase the HL learner's exposure to the HL, to teach learners about what the internet can offer them in their HL, to expose students to appropriate authentic materials, and to add novelty to and increase curiosity about the rest of the world that speaks the HL.

To begin integrating the internet into HL homework assignments requires four steps : gaining parental support, searching for appropriate websites, designing appropriate tasks, and creating classtime to report on the

assigned tasks within the classroom.

Gaining parental support

Because the internet is so accessible and offers information on such a wide array of topics, not always suitable for children or adolescents, families carefully monitor what their children are viewing. Thus it is necessary for the HL instructor and administration to work closely with parents about homework that involves internet use. It may be useful to write parents a note to introduce the series of internet homework projects. See Appendix A.

Distributing homework assignments through email may also be an effective strategy for several reasons. By sending a message to both the HL student and his/her parents everyone has equal access to the same information. Parents will know which sites their children are supposed to be visiting. Second, everyone will be free to share interesting sites in the HL with one another. you can educate all members of the family about websites in the HL. Parents and students may be able to introduce you, and other families to additional useful websites. And, of course, using email is eco-friendly and saves the use of

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paper!

Be sure to check with parents for permission and support in 1) giving internet homework assignments and, 2) in exchanging information through email.

Searching for appropriate websites

While there is no shortage of websites in most languages of the world, not all sites are appropriate to every audience. In order to find sites that will interest your students you may have to spend 3- 5 hours searching (or more). At first this may feel tedious but when you experience the surprises you find and see the excitement of your students when you direct them to these sites, you will no doubt feel that the time was well spent. Think of the time you are searching as a good investment: you are improving your searching skills in the HL; you are finding sites you do NOT want students to visit and making a list of them; you are saving good sites for future use; and your creativity is being sparked by exposure to many new sites that you never knew existed.

Use the following criteria to help you select sites for your students :

1. Is the language level of the site appropriate for

your students ?

2. Is the content appropriate for your students' age and interests?
3. Is the site easy to navigate or explore? Are there too many links?
4. Does the content fit with and complement themes you are covering in your HL classes?
5. How much time would it take for students to do an activity on the site?

Finding Useful Sites

The following ten types of websites may help both digital natives and digital immigrants get started looking for appropriate HL websites. Remember: be cautious about sending your students to a site that you have not visited yourself AND avoid giving an assignment such as find an internet site about (topic) and read it. Sites that are above the language ability of your students may be disappointing or frustrating for them. **Note :** if you type in English words in the GOOGLE search box most of the sites you find will be in English – for English speakers to learn your HL. If you type in words in your own language the sites will be in the HL. Also, you may switch to GOOGLE searches in any language by adding the suffix of a country to the search. For

example, instead of <http://www.google.com/> , I can access Japanese websites through <http://www.google.co.jp/> or Pilipinas websites through <http://www.google.com.ph/> or Ukrainian websites through <http://www.google.com.ua/> .

1. **Songs:** The internet is a rich source of music and lyrics. If you go to youtube you can look for songs that fit the themes you are studying in class.
2. **Pronunciation:** A variety of pronunciation sites also exist. They typically offer students a visual depiction of a word, its spelling and pronunciation. To see what I mean check out this site in French. Then you will know what you are looking for in your own language : <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=DJ80vZpo8XY>
3. **Games :** Many language games sites can be found by searching google using the following key words : (*your language*) *language games level (beginner,*

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intermediate, advanced)

e.g. My search for *Spanish language games beginners* yielded the following sites:

Making appropriate tasks

Now that you have found some sites that you find interesting, it is time to plan the tasks you will offer students. It may be a good idea to start with short tasks to offer encouragement and intrigue and then expand into more time-consuming and open ended tasks.

Ten sample assignments follow :

1. Ask students to go to a site and listen –watch it for 2-5 minutes. (e.g. a short song or youtube clip)
2. You could provide students with a list of

words in your HL and ask them to find their English translations.

3. Students may also enjoy translating words and phrases from English into the HL. They could even report back on the words they explored.
4. Use introductory guiding questions to help students explore some of the keys links on a website and learn how to navigate it in the HL. E.g. – - *Near the bottom right hand side of the article, you should see*

a speaker icon with the title “Ecoutez avec ReadSpeaker” beside it. Click on the icon: Do you hear the article being read aloud?

OR, beside the title of the article, you should see an envelope icon with the title “Envoyez par mail”. Click on that icon and email the article to yourself: Did you receive the article in your inbox?

5. Go to a specified website. Are there any photos? If so, what do they

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show? (e.g. <http://www.metrofrance.com> or <http://www.publimetro.com.mx/> or <http://www.metronews.it/> or <http://www.metro.se/> or <http://www.publimetro.cl/> or <http://www.metronieuws.nl/>.

6. After students have had a chance to explore a website and know where to find information, homework assignments could consist of written summaries or reviews of articles.
7. Students may be asked read anything on a given site for 10 minutes. After this type of free reading they might be asked to report on what they chose. E.g. . I liked _____ because.....
8. Students could be asked to read information on a website for a class discussion on current events.
9. Go to a newspaper site and ask students to report on sports scores, team names or sport interests. Remember that the news changes daily so they will have to report the date of their search. And the HL instructor may have to check for news daily to

confirm the accuracy of the homework.

10. Send students to a website link to listen to a song in the HL (perhaps on youtube). At the same time you can send the lyrics to the song with some words missing, a type of close activity. The students' task is to listen to the song and fill in the blanks. It is just as important that they do the task (which may take listening to the song several times and thereby developing a liking for the song) as it is to fill in the blanks with the correct spelling. Some students may even wish to replicate this activity on their own or transcribe the lyrics of one of their favorite songs in the HL and send it to peers to listen to and/or complete.

Following up on the assigned tasks within the classroom

Students should always have an opportunity to report on homework assigned, or else they may not do it in the future. The best time to do so is at the beginning of the class. Provide a structure and time limit for reporting.

Final words

HL programs can offer students both growth in their HL as well as increased intercultural competence and human understanding.

One final reason

More and more people are empowered by rapid and diverse perspectives on everything from natural disasters to political upheaval, as the control of media evaporates. HL programs can offer students both growth in their HL as well as increased world knowledge and intercultural competence and human understanding. Some research (Pollman, 2009) argues that wealthy children have more access to intercultural capital through travel, language lessons and discussions with well travelled parents and suggests that much of the responsibility for developing this competence lies with the teacher.

Multilingual globally astute HL instructors can provide such intercultural competence through internet homework assignments.

The internet provides a wide range of 'information' – from entertainment to news to recipes. How you use it is limited only by your own creativity. Young people are on the internet daily; why not have them doing so in

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the HL! Since new websites are regularly added to the internet, you may even spark more communication between students and/or generations in the HL than you had anticipated.

NOTE: Youtube and other websites are not always permanent, so you may find that

some of the sites recommended in this article are not accessible. Apologies in advance.

LISTENING-SPEAKING COMPREHENSION SAMPLE PRACTICE AND EVALUATION TOOLS

As we were completing our pedagogical conversation on unit and lesson planning with our colleagues at the Edmonton Korean Language School, we came to focus on ideas around listening and speaking comprehension activities. Here some simple tips we shared in our meeting that you can use for your own classes. Feel free to duplicate and use.

AUDIO PAL

I use this very friendly and easy website to create simple audio files that I send to my students or post on my blogs or wikis.

- The website is: www.audiopal.com
- You can create simple and quick audio files up to one-minute in length. You can say a lot in one minute.
- Send the file to your preferred e-mail.
- Receive the link and play it or post the code on your blogs or website (you can come to IHLA's session on technology to learn how to do that!)
- Ask your students to record their own files and send them to you. The process is very simple. I add below a visual explanation on how it looks and works. Very simple and nice tool - no downloading, no sign-up and no heavy audio files!

Speaking Practice Rubrics

One of our key goals in a language classroom is to get our students to speak as much as possible. Speaking fluency is a main goal especially in beginning levels of language learning. To encourage your students to improve their fluency skills, use these sample rubrics for practice and brief but regular evaluations. Show the rubrics to your students in advance and make sure they have examples of what you will be looking for in each task. Ask students to use the rubric on their own for audio files they created in Audio Pal (see previous page). Then compare notes. These are only ideas. You can use more specific elements of the speaking practice task you are working on. You can use the following tips to create your own or modify the one below.

- Decide on three key elements you will be looking for during the speaking practice activity (we have five examples below)
- List them in the rubric and give students examples. You can use AudioPal files for good and bad examples to refer to.
- Give the complete rubric to students in advance and ensure they will know exactly what you will want to focus on each time.
- Use the rubric (invite students to use it as well on their own recorded files and then compare)
- If you really want your students to improve, use different rubrics for the same spoken practice and then combine one final task where you ask students to do their best on all elements of the rubrics.
- Keep the rubrics for gathered evidence of learning and progress. Use them to celebrate successes!
