John 20:16 4-1-18

WHEN JESUS CALLS YOUR NAME

"Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means teacher). "" John 20:16

There are few things more compelling than when someone calls our name. We each know this from personal experience.

Mary experienced this too. In fact, as Jesus personally addressed Mary there were some additional things that became part of her experience. Mary:

- Recognized Jesus as the living Lord
- Was filled with Joy
- Was compelled to witness

The same three things become our experience as Jesus calls us by name at different points in each of our lives.

Third Sunday of Easter

Luke 24:36b-48 4-15-18

Jesus said, "Peace Be With You."

- C. Jesus directs the work of the church in the preaching of forgiveness and the absolution
- D. Jesus here gives his disciples a great missionary task

A Luther Sermon Quotation: [A comment from one of his student's notes in 1531, on the subject of absolution from the gospel reading for the day. See esp. v. 47] Absolution is nothing else than the preaching and proclamation of the forgiveness of sins, which Christ here commands us both to preach and to hear. But because it is necessary to preserve such preaching in the church, absolution too should be retained. For there is only this difference between the two. While through preaching the Gospel we publish this forgiveness everywhere and tell it to all in general, in absolution we tell it specifically to one or more desiring it (Plass, What Luther Says, p. 3)

A SONG FOR THE AGES – AND FOR ALL AGES

A Psalm of David

23 The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

2 He makes me to lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside the still waters.

3 He restores my soul; He leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake.

Fifth Sunday of Easter

Acts 8:26-40 4-29-18

YOU'LL BE SURPRISED!

At his Ascension Jesus told his disciples, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." In the story of Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch found in our First Lesson, we see the witness to Christ doing just that, growing beyond Jerusalem and Judea into the wider Roman world.

There are some surprises in this story, surprises that can instruct us:

- Surprise #1 Where and to whom God shows up
- Surprise #2 Who God used to share the Gospel
- Surprise #3 What God called Philip to do

As disciples of Christ in today's world, we can expect God to surprise us in the same way.
