Looking ahead, council discussed annual meeting and how we’re positioned for the Feb. 1 meeting. May need nominations from the floor.


Council also voted to recommend adoption of the budget to the congregation at annual meeting.

## Lutheran Services in Iowa Shares Megan's Story\*

Six years after journey through foster care to eventually find a loving and permanent home with the Johnson\* family, Megan is thriving, confidently sharing her story, and living proof of what is possible when a young person is given stability, encouragement, and someone who believes in them

Megan says, "I entered foster care at just 17 days old. From the very beginning, my life was shaped by change, uncertainty, and trauma. Though I was adopted at age five, the years that followed were filled with strict rules and isolation. By age ten, I was told I was "too much" and was sent away, carrying unhealed wounds I wasn't able to explain yet. I then moved through various treatment facilities and foster placements. While those years were difficult, they also became a turning point. For the first time, I began to see my own potential. I discovered things I loved, committed myself to school, and watched my grades improve. Education became the one constant in my life, something I could rely on no matter where I was living.

At fourteen, I entered high school and moved into a foster home with people I barely knew. I arrived guarded and afraid to hope, but slowly, I began to open up. I joined cheer, choir, and theater, finding confidence and belonging through school. Despite everything I'd been through, school never gave up on me, and I refused to give up on myself.

When I was fifteen, I began searching for a permanent home. After countless interviews, visits, and conversations, I met a family in April 2020. In the middle of an incredibly uncertain time, they took a chance on me, and changed my life. What started as a weekend visit turned into the place I finally called home.

They believed in my dream of becoming a teacher. When I nervously asked if I could take college courses during high school, they didn't hesitate. Their belief in me made all the difference. Six years later, I am still student teaching at a local elementary school, a dream made possible because someone said, "Yes, *you can do this.*"

College wasn't easy. There were tears, late-night phone calls, and moments when I feared losing the home I had waited so long to find. But I never lost their support. Hearing the words "*We are proud of you*" reminded me how far I had come and gave me the strength to keep going.

To foster youth and foster families alike: don't give up. Fight for yourself. Let your voice be heard. Be who you are - the right family will love you for it.

And to my mom and dad: thank you for giving me the chance to be myself and helping me discover who I am. You gave me the opportunity of a lifetime, and I couldn't have done this without you.
