A Luther Sermon Quote: But if you say, 'unless I get something through the brotherhood, of what use is it?' the answer is: You serve the congregation and other people as love does, and you will have your reward without any seeking or desiring it'. But if love's service and reward seem mean to you that is a sign that your brotherhood is not of the right spirit. Love serves freely and therefore God gives to her freely all His riches. For as much as all things must be done in love, if they are to be well-pleasing unto God, the brotherhood must also be in love. Yet what is done in love can by its nature not seek its own, rather it seeks the benefit of others, and especially the congregation. (Day by Day We Magnify Thee, From the sermon on the Sacrament of the Body of Christ, 1519, p. 370.)

DOING THE UNEXPECTED

"Love your enemies." Luke 6:27

Have you ever been on the giving or receiving end of something unexpected? If so, or even if not, the outcome can be quite amazing.

People we might view as "enemies" certainly don't expect us to do the kinds of things Jesus instructs us to do – turn the other cheek, forgive, and give. Yet such undeserved loving actions can produce amazing results.

- First, we recognize this is the kind of love God has shown to us in Jesus.
- Then, because we have received this love from God, we also recognize it is Jesus who empowers us to love others, even our enemies, in this way.

The Apostle Paul says it well. *"For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that*

those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again." 2 Corinthians 5:14-15
