Keep Orangeburg County Beautiful (KOCB) was awarded \$8,625.00 for the 2024 PalmettoPride / Keep South Carolina Beautiful (KSCB) Grant. The Grant provided funds for heavy duty grabbers, educational and promotional Items to use at programs and events, rolling carts to use during litter clean-ups, heavy duty bag holders for Volunteers that pick-up trash on a regular basis, and more.

The PalmettoPride / KSCB Grant enables KOCB to participate in community events, programs, and school events to educate and spread the word about recycling, putting litter where it belongs, and to educate on reduce, reuse, and recycle.

Keep Orangeburg County Beautiful and Orangeburg County Litter Control hosts a clean-up in the spring and fall each year. These are usually a part of the Great American Cleanup (GAC). We provide all needed supplies and ask for the # of bags picked up, area litter was picked up and other results from the clean-up. We report this data to PalmettoPride and Keep America Beautiful, and that is how we continue to receive clean-up supplies.

We are asking citizens to choose a location where they live, work, play, or attend church, and plan a clean-up. KOCB or Code Enforcement will supply everything needed for an individual, family, or group cleanup. We just ask for your clean-up results in return and some pictures shared on social media. Please call or email to register your family, group, or individual ASAP. Let's all work together to Keep Orangeburg County Beautiful.

Biggest Achievement of 2023

Brookdale Elementary School - the first in Orangeburg County working to become a Certified Green Step School.

The students are encouraged to compost at home and at school. These lessons are "life" skills that are used at school and at home. SC DHEC estimates that 40% of the waste in landfills currently is food. Much of the food waste could be used in making compost. Decreasing the amount of materials being put in the dumpster decreases the number of times a dumpster is emptied. Schools are charged by the number of times the dumpsters are emptied.

Biggest Achievement of 2024

Orangeburg Soil and Water Conservation District (district) sponsored the Progressive Agriculture Foundation (PAF) Safety Day at Brookdale-Elementary School on October 10, 2024. PAF Safety Day provides hands-on stations teaching children ages 4-13 about safety and health in rural communities. Students learned about fire safety, sun safety, first aid (students made their own kit), how to live with disabilities, and the dangers that can be found on a farm.

At the Sun Safety station, the students learned when to add more sunscreen or find shade. They also made bracelets from sun sensitive UV beads. The Fire Safety station had a smoke house that provided the students with the opportunity to experience what their home may be like if it was on fire and what a fireman does to protect the community. Everyone escaped safely from the smoke-filled room. The students learned how to scout the yard for hazards before mowing the lawn and the safest place to be when the lawn is mowed at the Lawn Ranger station. Clemson Extension taught about the amount of sugar in a soft drink and the importance of choosing a healthy alternative. Choosing refreshments wisely is important.





Other Notable Accomplishments



The district advocated for the celebration of America's 250th Anniversary by partnering with the 250th Commission, Lieutenant Governor Evette, PalmettoPride, Keep SC Beautiful, and Keep Orangeburg County Beautiful. A cleanup at Eutaw Springs Revolutionary War Battle site was held on October 24th as just the start of improving Orangeburg County. The cleanup netted a total of 360 pounds (22 bags) of litter and a tire. A second cleanup will take place on January 20, 2025, MLK Day. Come be a part of something revolutionary!



South Carolina Soil and Water Conservation Districts - 2024 Impact

State FY25 District Funding



For every \$1 of state appropriated funds to Districts, \$3.35 on average is leveraged to implement conservation programs in South Carolina.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts assist with United States Department of Agriculture - Natural Resources Conservation Service Farm Bill Programs which brought more than <u>\$81 million</u> to South Carolina's private lands for conservation implementation impacting nearly <u>200,000 South Carolina acres</u> in federal FY24.

<u>More than 56,000 students</u> were reached by conservation district youth-oriented programs such as school gardening, seed libraries, SC Envirothon, Arbor Day and Earth Day events, stormwater education, scholarships, and conservation related contests.

<u>More than 1.8 million adults</u> were educated on conservation topics including but not limited to Farm Bill Programs, pollinator promotion, stormwater mitigation, invasive species control, prescribed fire, water quality and conservation, habitat restoration, and land easements.

<u>More than 10,000 acres</u> statewide were impacted by conservation rental equipment available through conservation districts (no-till drills, prescribed fire equipment, hog traps, etc.).

SC Envirothon State Champions from Spartanburg Day School represented South Carolina at the international 2024 NCF-Envirothon Competition competing against teams from the US, Canada, China, and Singapore.

Programs involving land easements, habitat restoration, invasive species removal, water conservation, watershed improvement, litter removal, and conservation education are just a handful of the vast conservation topics implemented statewide by South Carolina Soil and Water Conservation Districts.
