Adopt-a-Village Program
Support for Mayan Villages



What is “Adopt-a-Village”?

This program provides an opportunity for individuals, service clubs and other organizations to sponsor a Mayan village in Copán, Honduras, and to enjoy a long-term relationship with the community.

Why is Adopt-a-Village necessary?

Honduras is the poorest mainland nation in Central America, and the Mayan villages of Copán are among the poorest communities in the country. People survive on \$1 to \$2 per capita per day. With your support, we can improve the quality and reach of education, and improve life in your village in many other ways.

What is the role of a village sponsor?

Sponsors fund much of our work in their adopted villages. As sponsor of a village, you would:

- Provide every elementary student in the village with an annual kit of school supplies, backpack and uniform, under the terms of our Adopt-a-School program.
- Pledge to contribute at least \$1,000 each year for secondary school scholarships in the village, as needed, under the terms of our Adopt-a-Dream program.
- Provide every student in the village with health insurance, under the terms of our Student Health Fund.
- Contribute a small amount each year to sustain our Mobile Library program in the village.
- Pledge to donate \$1,000 each year to support construction and other projects in the village, as they arise.
- Have the right of first refusal (i.e. an option, without any obligation) to fund any other projects in the village, in whole or in part.

What does it cost to sponsor a village?

Much less than you might think, because money goes a long way in Honduras.

The cost of our education programs depends on the number of students in the village, which changes a little from year to year. Here are some examples:

Village Size	K-12 Students	Total Annual Cost
Smallest	18	\$744
Average	61	\$2,023
Largest	134	\$3,734

These amounts are based on the fixed annual costs per student for each education program:

Program	Annual Cost per Student
Adopt-a-School (kindergarten)	\$12
Adopt-a-School (primary)	\$20
Adopt-a-Dream (middle school)	\$180
Adopt-a-Dream (high school)	\$280
Student Health Fund (K-12)	\$2.50
Mobile Library (K-6)	\$3.00

Optional funding for construction or other projects would be in addition to the education programs. Routine construction projects typically fall between \$500 and \$5,000, but water systems and development projects can cost more than this. How much extra you contribute to these projects is entirely up to you.

What connections will I have with my village?

We encourage sponsors to develop relationships with their adopted villages. Communicating with villages via social media is becoming a popular option. Most teachers and some secondary students have basic smartphones.

At least once per year, you will receive a report from your school, letters or art from students, and photos of the school and students. When we visit schools, we deliver any letters and photos received from you. We provide a free translation service for correspondence.

If you come to Copán, we will gladly arrange for you to visit your village with an interpreter. You can also visit the world-famous Copán archaeological park, a major center of the ancient Mayan civilization.

Can I choose the village I sponsor?

Yes, we will help you select a village whose size matches your budget.

I already support a village in Adopt-a-School. Can I sponsor the same one in Adopt-a-Village?

Yes.

Do I have to make a long-term commitment?

We ask that you pledge to sponsor your village for at least three years. Of course we understand that circumstances can change, and that you might need to end your involvement in the program.

Can I do more to support my village?

We will send you details of any new projects in your village, so that you can decide if you would like to contribute funding. You might have some project ideas of your own.

How often do you visit each village?

We visit each village every three months, in order to sustain relationships, monitor progress and deal with any problems. (Visits are less frequent during the COVID-19 pandemic.) After visiting your village we send you any news from the community.

Who administers the program?

The program is managed by the International Project Alliance (IPA), a large group of Rotary clubs in northwest Washington State. Our partner in Honduras is the Rotary Club of Copán Ruinas. Since our start in 2014, we have funded many different development projects in the region.

What percentage of donations actually helps beneficiaries?

100% of every donation benefits the communities. IPA administration depends on volunteers who cover their own expenses.

Are my donations tax-deductible?

Yes, the IPA Foundation is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization registered with the U.S. Internal Revenue Service.

When and where do I need to send my donation?

We ask that you send donations within 30 days after receiving our invoice. Our education programs are invoiced in August or September.
