## Bridging the Gap JANUARY 2026 report

I am happy to report to you what has happened in January at Bridging the Gap. It's been busy! Our numbers are up in some areas and the same in others. We have not seen a decline in New Mainers utilizing our services despite the ICE threat.

The requests for financial assistance have continued to grow. It is a challenge to make our resources stretch throughout a month. As the chart shows we distributed \$4,165.23 to help with recovery housing (rent), rental assistance, utilities, heating assistance and transportation. February is approaching our \$3,000/month threshold and we're only half way through the month.

BTG and Emmanuel are committed to keep the CHEF program going and, hopefully, secure the funds to do so. We are hopeful to have the Resource Program Leader position filled soon! Our team has worked diligently to keep up with tabling scheduling, answering phone calls and emails requesting help, and assisting guests.

- Unduplicated individuals served: 1,131 (same month 2025: 1,391 = 18.69% decrease)
- Percentage of individuals who are New Mainers: 39.35%
- Total New Mainers served 445 (same month 2025: 389 = 14.3% increase)

##### **RESOURCES, SUPPORT AND CENTRALIZED HELPING FUND (CHEF):**

The Resource Department handles multiple calls a day. The nature and outcome of each call is different. People might be directed to a different or additional resource; asked to call back with more information so BTG can better assess and assist; or BTG might agree to assist financially. BTG often works with other funding sources to fully meet a request that is beyond what BTG can support alone. When other agencies' funds are depleted, BTG must be even more discerning.

Number of calls/emails/walk-ins received: 100+

Number of individuals directly served: 29
