MINUTES FOR JUNE 14, 2019

I. CALL MEETING TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at approximately 10:10 a.m. by the LEPC Vice Chairman Walt Daugherty. Those in attendance introduced themselves.

IV. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Minutes from the May 10, 2019 meeting were distributed to attendees for review. Vice Chairman Daugherty asked if there were any revisions the minutes, and none were provided. A motion was made by Mike Broeker to accept the May meeting's minutes as written; the motion was seconded by Damon Shodrock. Motion was approved.

V. FINANCIAL REPORT:

John Hageman reported on the financial statement he created using a bank statement ending May 24, 2019. To summarize activity, there was one check written to William Johnston for \$2000 for Baltimore conference expenses, Fees paid to GoDaddy totaling \$453, one contribution received from Lubrizol for \$100, and two reimbursements received totaling \$205. The current balance was \$58,447.79.

John Hageman also noted: The new GoDaddy fee covers 3 years and is saving the LEPC over \$288. William Johnston's check is basically a cash advance, and any unused funds will be refunded back to the LEPC after the conference. Future expenses for next month will include \$4000 in reimbursements for 2 Baltimore conference positions.

d. Exercise Committee:

Mike Broeker, JBSA, advised that the Active Shooter exercise on June 25, 2019 has been changed to Anti-terrorism exercise at Lackland & Randolph. On June 26 there is the recovery operations part of the exercise.

STRAC is conducting SAMMC 19 Mass causality exercise on November 6, 2019.

USAA is considering having a large-scale exercise in November. Simulated impact to entire campus. No details made available.

There was a good turnout to Safe Kids 2019 on March 30, 2019 at Lowe's parking lot. Matthew Peay assisted Damon during the event. Thousands of kids and adults participated, and volunteering photos are available on website.

There are not any future community events lined up for the LEPC to participate in.

HEAT STRESS CAN BE LIFE THREATENING

KNOW THE SIGNS AND PREVENT IT

Heat Cramps

Dehydration caused by heavy sweating or not drinking enough leads to heat cramps

Symptoms:

- · Heavy sweating
- · Muscle spasms or cramps



First aid:

- Drink cool water or a sports drink with electrolytes
- · Apply cool compresses
- · Move to a cool, shaded place



Heat Exhaustion

Heat exhaustion can come on rapidly

Symptoms:

- · Heavy sweating
- · Muscle spasms or cramps
- · Nausea or vomiting
- · Dizziness or headache
- Fainting



First aid:

- Drink cool water or a sports drink with electrolytes
- · Apply cool compresses
- · Move to a cool, shaded place
- Remove PPE and loosen clothing
- Continue cooling until body temperature is below 100°
- If first aid measures don't relieve symptoms, seek emergency medical help

Heat Stroke

Heat stroke can be fatal and requires immediate medical attention

Symptoms:

- Hot dry skin or profuse sweating
- · Confusion or disorientation
- · Slurred speech
- Seizures or convulsions
- · Throbbing headache
- · Very high body temperature



First aid:

- · Call 911 immediately
- · Move the person to a cool, shaded place
- Apply cool compresses and wet the person's clothing with water and fan with a towel
- Do not give them anything to drink—it could nose a choking hazard in their altered
