REPORTS

President's Report – Bruce Volocyk: No specific notes from the President. Members asked that Bruce pass along a big “Thank You!” to Joanne Volocyk for pulling a whole bunch of weeds from around the flying field!

Secretary – Craig Brown: Craig Brown has agreed to fill the position of Secretary. The assembled members agreed that the July 21, 2025 meeting minutes were reviewed. No changes were noted; minutes approved.

Treasurer – Jim Kaufman: Jim reported the current bank balance. Anyone with specific questions regarding club finances may contact Jim for more information.

Newsletter – Mike McTague: Mike noted that Craig should forward meeting minutes to him for inclusion in the newsletter. It was also discussed that we should try and include more pictures in future issues of the newsletter. The picnic should provide plenty of good photo ops.

Webmaster – Brian Sokol: No specific topics of note.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Field Marshal – Mike Anderson: Mike reported that 2-3 more pieces of carpet still need to be replaced to complete major repairs for this season. Bruce asked Mike to let himself or other members know if Mike would like assistance with the remaining repairs.

Proficiency/Certifications – Steve Gelman: No report from Steve.

Picnic – Steve Gelman: Final preparations for the picnic were discussed. A total of 90 RSVPs for the picnic had been received as of the meeting time. Food will be planned for 120 people. There will be a donation jar available for guest attendees (\$5/person). The Blue Max Venmo code will also be made available to accept donations. It was suggested that a volunteer staff the donation table to remind attendees to pay for their guests.

Noise – Carl Will: No noise issues noted so far this year. Bruce asked that club officers help to enforce noise regulations and be vigilant for any unusually loud planes that may result in noise complaints.

Training – Carl Will: Carl has been working with two 10-year olds. They are progressing okay but there may not be enough time yet this year for them to be able to solo. Brian Sokol has also assisted with some of the new young members.

Safety – Chris Mays: No report from Chris....

In July one of the young members had an incident with the throttle cut switch on his electric plane that resulted in the need for stitches. Carl spoke with him after the incident to remind him of the steps that need to be followed prior to flying. Carl also reinforced to the young member that he must adhere to the pattern when others are flying. The young man's father expressed appreciation for all of the care his son received from club members at the time of the injury. It was noted that all adult club members must keep watch over the younger members to ensure their safety.

Crash Report: Ed Der reported the crash of his Extreme Flight Yak. The Yak is over 10 years old and it looks like the wing root rib separated from the wing causing the crash.

Show & Tell – Mike Anderson showed his garage “hangar” on the Zoom call.

Raffle: No raffle was held due to the Zoom call.
