## Reference Library

Free E-books on a variety of topics are available to Greenlee County library patrons through a database known as Gale Virtual Reference Library. The link to free databases can be found on the library webpage ([www.greenleelibraries.org](http://www.greenleelibraries.org)).

Once you have clicked on the GVRL link, choose from the subjects of Art, Biography, Business, Education, Environment, General Reference, History, Information and Publishing, Law, Library Science, Literature, Medicine, Multicultural Studies, Nation and World, Religion, Science, Social Science and Technology and then choose a book from within that subject. You can also search by topic from the search box on the page.

When a book cover appears, simply roll your mouse over the cover shown to get a description of the e-book. You can also use the View All link to browse every book in the category.

If the book description is of interest, click on the cover to get to the Table of Contents. From this page you can click on chapters, access bibliography information, see illustrations and go to the book's alphabetical index.

The site allows you to save, print and download sections (called articles) from the book. You can read the book online but cannot download or print an entire book at one time. There is also a Listen Button which will actually read the article to you.

If a citation is needed, the site offers a Citation Tools link with a variety of formats available. Emailing the article to yourself or someone else is also possible. Articles can also be translated into another language if needed.

While you are visiting the Greenlee Library webpage, take a look at the online catalogs found there for the Clifton and Duncan libraries. Click on the Clifton or Duncan links on the page and find the ONLINE CATALOG link. Do a search for your book or author before coming to the library by using the online library's catalog. But remember, if the library does not have that book on the shelves, your librarian can still get the book for you from another library in the state by using the Inter Library Loan system (ILL) and it is still FREE!

union. It takes a deposit inventory of roughly \$20 million to \$25 million, plus a loan portfolio of \$15 million to \$20 million to cost-justify such an investment.

To the average consumer these figures may seem high, but with low interest rates, profit margins are tight. Once one adds up the cost of location, personnel, security, advertising, etc. the return on the investment ratio comes into play.

Rest assured an active outreach campaign to attract a new banking institution is underway, but it is not a fast process, alternatives such as enhanced ATM's, a banking kiosk, etc. are also being discussed. # The legacy of Consul General Rodriguez

Mexico has one of the most influential diplomatic and consular networks in the world, with about 150 offices worldwide and a network of about 50 consulates in the U.S.

Phoenix is perhaps the most strategic consular post for Mexico due to national security reasons: Most of the political stability of the U.S-Mexico relationship depends on the correct management of the Arizonan-Sonoran desert region, which is a gateway for trade and investment but also presents a myriad of governance issues: illegal trafficking of people, drugs and arms as well as other organized crime activities such as money laundering and kidnapping.

Mexico has progressively overcome the stereotype of an undeveloped country and has taken leadership in the new international system, only thanks to a generational transformation in the government

elite of our southern neighbor. Now we see that Mexican officials graduate from American or European universities, speak more than two languages, have at least a master's degree, if not a PhD, and are very cosmopolitan.

That broad world-view has enabled this generation of Mexican public servants, such as Consul General Robert Rodriguez Hernandez, to be able to live, work and deliver results in any continent always keeping in mind the Mexican national interest.

Mexico might have governance problems being a democracy in transition. But we all must recognize two major changes.

First, Mexico is no longer the backyard of the United States as several pundits used to believe, but the front yard.

This is thanks to the rapidly increasing levels of interdependence between the two countries. Sec-

# NM Council of Governments to go nonprofit

The Southwest New Mexico Council of Governments held its annual board meeting [June 23] at Silver City's City Hall Annex, voting to push once again to become a nonprofit organization.

SWNMCOG Executive Director Priscilla Lucero told the board that the organization applied for 501(c)3 nonprofit status last year through the Internal Revenue Service, but was denied because of language in its bylaws and articles of incorporation — which were combined, a practice rejected by the IRS.

Lucero told the *Daily Press* that the organization is now technically a governmental entity, relying solely on state and federal funds to operate, but by acquiring nonprofit status, it will be able to search for funding elsewhere. She said its budget each year is usually about \$300,000.

"We have consistent dollars that come in every year for us, and that's from state appropriation, [New Mexico] Department of Transportation and the Mortgage Finance Authority and Economic Development administration," she said.

State legislative appropriations, however, are the one source that is dwindling each year, according to Lucero, so going nonprofit is smart.

Although the IRS gave SWNMCOG notice last week that it was approved for 501(c)3 nonprofit status, the board still had to approve the move on [June 23].

"We're able to put everything into play for the new year, meeting all the requirements for all the funding sources," she said.

The board heard from Lucero about the regional water plans and her upcoming presentations on

## TMR in 4 districts of Gila forest

From the Silver City Sun-News

SILVER CITY — The Travel Management Rule will go into effect across four districts of the Gila National Forest July 1.

The TMR is mandated across all national forests and prohibits motor vehicle use off designated routes and roads. The four districts where TMR will begin are Quemado, Reserve, Wilderness and Black Range.

TMR will not occur on the Glenwood and Silver City Ranger Districts in 2016. These districts are working to complete resource surveys and obtain concurrence

from the State Historic Preservation Office before TMR will go into effect. The motor vehicle use map is the legal document displaying the roads, trails, and areas open to motor vehicle use on the forest. The MVUM is free of charge and will be available at Gila National Forest offices.

"The Travel Management decision for the Gila National Forest is a change in use of the forest as cross-country travel will no longer be allowed. Time and education will be needed as the process moves forward," said Gila Forest



## Changes in overtime rule

The Labor Department has updates the overtime regulation to reflect the original intent of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), and to simplify and modernize the rules so they're easier for workers and businesses to understand and apply.

The changes will go into effect this Dec. 1.

# **Work on US 60 to continue thru summer**

## **Blasting closures remain on Tuesdays, Thursdays**

Steep, rugged terrain and high winds have added challenges for crews working to create room for an additional lane on US 60 between Globe and Superior. Because of that, the project will continue through the summer, including twice-weekly closures for blasting work.

Crews have about 25,000 cubic yards of rocks and dirt – about 2,000 truckloads – to remove to complete the project between mileposts 227 east of Superior to milepost 235 west of Miami. In addition to creating a passing lane, the Arizona Department of Transportation project is widening the shoulders in Devil's Canyon (mileposts 233-234), making improvements to the bridge at Waterfall Canyon (milepost 229) and improving drainage (milepost 242) west of Miami.

Drivers who rely on US 60 should continue to plan ahead for closures from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. There will be no blasting-related closures in the area on June 30 or July 5 to accommodate holiday traffic.



After crews blast away rock in one area to make room for the climbing lane, they must maneuver heavy equipment up steep, narrow roads to prepare for the next blast. This spring, two periods of “red flag” conditions – high winds and low humidity that increase the danger of sparking a fire – have delayed work for about two weeks.

During the closures, drivers should consider taking state routes 77 and 177 between Superior and Globe, a route of about 68 miles. Motorists headed to the White Mountains region, including Show Low and Springerville, can take State Route 87 through Payson and travel east on State Route 260.

Meanwhile, US 60 will be restricted to one lane through the work zone from 9 p.m. Sunday, June 19, to 4 a.m. Monday, June 20, and also from 8 a.m.



# Kiplinger ranks AZ No. 2 for '16 job growth

## Extracted from Kiplinger

"The Grand Canyon State is in for a real pick-up this year, as its housing and construction sectors appear to have finally turned a corner. The state's sunny climate and low taxes will continue to lure retirees as well as young folks.

"The low cost of living will draw tech entrepreneurs away from pricey Silicon Valley. Population growth will keep construction humming.

"Home Depot plans to add about 800 new jobs

in Tempe at an online customer support center, and Northern Trust Co. will hire about 1,000 new employees by 2018 at a new Tempe operating center.

"The state's largest private employer, Banner Health, is building a \$400 million hospital expansion in Tucson. In Phoenix, Farmers Insurance will significantly expand its operations, eventually adding 1,000 employees.

"Cenlar, a loan service provider, will create 600 jobs, also in Phoenix."

## Economy poised for continued growth

Arizona is garnering national attention for job gains. While there's always more work to be done, earlier this year, Arizona finally gained back all of the jobs lost during the Great Recession. (*Phoenix Business Journal* 03/24/16)

More recently, Kiplinger magazine ranked Arizona as the state with the second-fastest projected job growth rate in the country for 2016 at 3.2 percent. (See article above.) Our state was bested only by Idaho whose projected job growth rate is 3.5 percent. Neighboring state Utah came in third with a projected growth rate of 3.1 percent, and Colorado and California were tied for the ninth and tenth spots at 2.7 percent. (Kiplinger 06/16)

In June, *Forbes* also recognized the Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale area as the "City Winning the Battle for Information Jobs" outside of San Francisco and Silicon Valley. Growth in information employment here was 7.51 percent for 2015 while that workforce grew 39.29 percent from 2010-2015. (*Forbes* 06/06/16)

California-based medical technology company Dexcom just announced plans to open a manufacturing plant in Mesa projected to bring approximately 500 jobs. Arizona beat out other West Coast markets considered for the facility, including Texas, Utah and Colorado according to Dexcom CEO, Kevin Sayer. (*Phoenix Business Journal* 06/15/16)

In April, the co-founders of start-up Tuft and Needle penned and essay stating why they recommend building a start-up in Phoenix over Silicon



Valley. (*Thought Catalogue* 04/19/16)

In May, Arizona was ranked the 6th-best state in the country for business by *Chief Executive Magazine*'s annual "Best & Worst States for Business" survey, representing a three-spot climb from last year's report. (*Chief Executive Magazine* 05/11/16)

Most importantly, these ranking and statistics are accompanied by the arrival of more jobs for Arizonans.

Kiplinger pointed to several companies bringing more jobs to Arizona, including:
