Located just north of the Town of Duncan, access to the Fairgrounds is easy. From I-10 near Lordsburg exit at NM 90 and head northwest. Coming from Phoenix, or points in-between, take US 70 also known as the Old West Highway. Driving in from Tucson? I-10 just past Willcox, north on SR 191 until it junctions with Old West Highway then east to Duncan.

All roads lead to Duncan? Well yes, these do. And once in Duncan keep your eyes open for landmarks like the Duncan High School electronic billboard coming in from Safford, the railroad tracks are on your left, next a handful of buildings and voila you are at the intersection of Main Street (State Highway 75) and Old West Highway. Town & Country Supply is on the corner, turn left – go north.

Coming in from New Mexico as you enter Duncan from the east you cross the railroad tracks, pass through commercial and residential areas and stay alert for the Bakery sign, Hilda's and then Town & Country all on your left.

The intersection of SR 75 is on your right – go north – over the bridge and through the woods to the Fairgrounds you will go. 

### **Reading Nook News**

If you are interested in authors and their works or literary information, the database, Literature Resource Center, is the perfect source of information.

The FREE database made available through the Arizona State Library, and the Greenlee County Library System has a link to this database. On the Greenlee Library site (www.greenleelibraries.org)



click on the Statewide Database link on the left side to access the Literature Resource Center.

Full-text articles from

scholarly journals and literary magazines are combined with critical essays, work and topic overviews, full-text works, biographies, and more to provide a wealth of information on authors, their works, and literary movements in this database.

In the basic search you can set different things to look up. There is a choice of looking up the author's name directly. That will bring up anything in the database linked to the author such as articles in journals and magazines about the person and overviews, full text works, biographies and other pertinent information about them.

If you are interested in more general information you can look at authors from different countries, different genders, ethnicity, occupation, genre, theme and literary movements. You can also search by birthdate or date of death and by a broader category of century.

The Literature Resource Center is easy to use and contains a wealth of information for research, term papers, master's thesis material, or just general knowledge of authors and literature.

The Greenlee Library System website also offers many links to free legal help. While your librarians can help you find materials about your legal questions, they are limited by law in what they are allowed to do for you. They are not allowed to give you their opinions about your legal situation but they can point you to information that may help. You can find those links in the center column about half way down the page.

# Duncan waterline work half completed

The installation of the new Duncan waterline along Fairgrounds Road is more that 50% complete (as of Friday April 24)! The installation crew has encountered normal problems but is forging ahead diligently nonetheless.

The Town of Duncan received a grant from the Freeport Community Foundation to purchase the materials. Duncan has partnered with Greenlee County Public Works to install the much-needed pipeline using supervised prisoner labor. The County added two storage tanks to the system to provide more water.

Then one of existing wells tested for high nitrate levels and the other periodically is pumping gypsum, although not at levels above water standards. To reduce water use, the county rented porta-potties during events. For quite some time both the County and the Town of Duncan have looked at several options to supply additional water. A third well was drilled. Unfortunately, the water from the well tested too high in minerals for potable water use. The latest attempt at solving the challenge is this installation



County is providing the engineering, trenching, and backfilling. With all these 'moving parts', work has been a little slower than anticipated.

In recent months the water supply has been limited at the County Fairgrounds. As demand has increased, such as the installation of grass on the ball field used by the Little League, the County planned and drilled a second well to supplement the water supply in the 1990's. Over the past 20 years, the County has made the system work. Often, we have had insufficient water supply that needed to be augmented for larger events at the fairgrounds. As one would expect, problems always seemed to arise just before or during a major event.

In addition, due to the extreme drought, both of our two wells were pushed to their water quality limits. By stretching our financial resources, the detailed report to assure the health and safety of the public. The engineering, which was delayed by about 7 weeks, but we have been issued an ADEQ permit.

Fairgrounds Road is closed except for local traffic for safety reasons. Besides assuring worker and motorist safety, anytime the ground is disturbed we have to work around existing gas, sewer, and communication lines. Interestingly Packer Wash provides more challenges as the water line must be below the 'scour level'. The 80-year-old wooden bridge over Packer Wash presents other concerns. Because of ground water conditions, an exposed installation is now being considered.

The new water line will provide needed water quantity and quality for the Fairground while increasing Duncan's water service area. An announcement on the completion date will be made soon.

of the new water line which will be connected to the Fairground system and also supply adequate fire protection flow for the new County Annex, another major project being planned to enhance the Fairgrounds area.

Installation of the water line comes under the preview of the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ). To get a permit, we were required to develop plans and a detailed report to as-

## Update on Clifton Splash park opening

Clifton town officials announced the town's new splash park will not open as scheduled May 2.

Town Manager John Schempf said the construction contractor has not able to obtain the cement necessary to complete the project. In the interim, the existing shower and changing building will be renovated.

"The interior is really not in very good shape and needs quite a bit of work," Schempf said.

The Freeport McMoRan Inc. Community Investment Foundation approved a pair of grants for the project — \$104,000 in 2013 and another \$55,000 in 2014.

In March, it was announced the Greenlee Spring Rampage was being postponed while waterline work was completed on Fairgrounds Road in Duncan. A new date for the Rampage has not yet been announced.
