O'Halleran hears Greenlee hot topics

CLIFTON — When it comes to “health care for all,” U.S. Rep. Tom O'Halleran, D-Ariz., won't vote in the affirmative until someone can explain how the program will be funded.

That was one of his messages during a town hall in Clifton last Thursday.

“We have 30 million people without health care, and we have a gap when it comes to poverty. We have to find a way to close that gap and provide choice, but I'm not on the bill because they can't tell me how much it will cost or what it will cost into the future,” he said.

O'Halleran said mental health care and substance abuse treatment must also be part of the discussion when it comes to health care, as well as how to get more physicians working in the rural parts of the country.

One of the ways to expand health-care options, he said, is making broadband available throughout the country — not just in major metropolitan areas

Rep. O'Halleran comments in Duncan:

[In response to a question about needing a border wall. . .] *Please understand, not everything you see on tv or read online tells the full story. . . . My goal is to preserve the rights and protections guaranteed to all; this means rural voters are just as important as urban voters.*

“There are a lot of members of Congress who want true immigration reform, not just quick fixes.

I regularly meet with a group of 10 Democrats and 10 Republicans; we work together to find solutions that will resonate with everyone on the floor.

The water rights issues that are affecting ranchers and farmers like Mr. Kaylor and Mrs. Tyler need further review and must include all the voices that deserve to be heard.

I will send my field team here to Greenlee County for further research, I'll have them stay here for as long as it takes to gather the facts we have not yet seen in Washington.

Rep. O'Halleran comments in Clifton:

One day is not enough, and we will be back. Your hospitality has been great.

Anyone in my district who has a problem with any federal agency should avail themselves of the resources we offer. We stand ready to help.

When told about the struggles the Town of Clifton has encountered with the USDA regarding the failed wastewater treatment plant and possible solutions, O'Halleran stated that he would appreciate seeing the paper trail, the facts so (as a member of one of the USDA subcommittees) he can pinpoint a solution and stop the foot dragging.

Housing also falls under the USDA Rural program. I will make sure my team gets boots on the ground to see what can be done to alleviate this problem.

Making movies in Arizona

The Inaugural Arizona Film Expo at TenWest, hosted by Caribou Moving Pictures and Arizona Film Expo, will be held in Tucson Oct. 15.

Vendors, actors, producers, directors, agencies, production companies, equipment rental companies, makeup artists, hair stylists, special effects, artists, advertising agencies of AZ, this is an all-hands-on-deck event for our chance to come together to change the dialogue from "There's no reason to make movies in Arizona." to "We're here and we're making movies; come work with us!"

In 1912, actor/director Romaine Fielding arrived in Prescott and set up the western branch of the Lubin Film Company and shot nine movies that year, before moving to Tucson. The following year, Augustus Thomas filmed Arizona (the first of three movies with this title) in Arizona.

Since then, over 5,000 films and television shows

have been made in our state. As the only state to serve as a significant satellite for film production for more than 50 years, Arizona was colloquially known as "Hollywood's Back Lot" and enjoyed a heyday of production, from westerns to science fiction, documentaries to cooking shows, tourism to local access programs.

The Arizona film industry flourished. Robert Shelton claimed that Old Tucson Studios was the second biggest tourism draw besides the Grand Canyon, with the likes of John Wayne, Ben Johnson and Gary Clarke frequently being seen there.

From 2006 to 2010, Arizona offered tax incentives to the film industry and over \$110 million was brought in to the state during that time.

In 2010, the tax incentives went away. And so did the film industry. Since that time, only \$11 million in film industry revenue has come our way.

The reason for the creation of the Arizona Film Expo is to remind the world that we're still here and we're still making movies.

Greenlee County Census 2020 update

And because the 2020 census will determine how more than \$675 billion in federal funding will be shared to schools, on transportation and health care, the stakes are very high. Some states and districts may gain or

lose U.S. congressional seats.

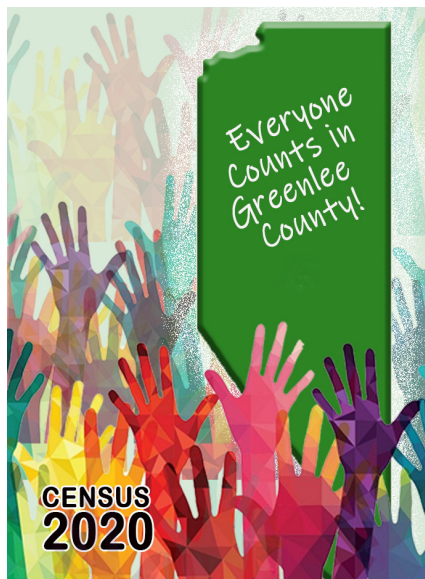
Undercounting will certainly affect state shared revenues and diminish power associated with a higher population count for the next decade.

Count may be short

According to the Urban Institute: "Nationwide, the decennial census could fail to count anywhere from 900,000 to 4 million people, with blacks, Hispanics and children younger than 5 most vulnerable to being overlooked, according to recent estimates."

An accurate count of those who live in Greenlee County means the difference between our county being able to sustain current levels of service to the public and meeting increased demand by increases in the population expected over the next decade.

We share all this simply to encourage you to participate in the census. Your survey can be taken online, via mail or on your phone. If you have questions or concerns seek answers don't guess. The next decade of funding depends on an accurate count.

But in the Verde Lee neighborhood outside Clifton, firefighters marshalled their troops to save homes, and they succeeded.

Clifton, Duncan, Virden and Morenci Fire units converged on the isolated neighborhood and began saving lives and saving homes.

It was truly a large-scale operation where disparate units — Sheriff's Office, Greenlee Public Works, Clifton Police Department, Greenlee Ambulance, and all of the fire departments in this area — worked together as one to prevent further damage, minimize danger and in the end they each earned a huge **thank you** from the community.

Out in the country nobody likes to see black smoke on the horizon, it always means trouble. And on Saturday, May 25 that black smoke led to a house fire in Verde Lee, the home was consumed. The heat from that

For a short time the fire spread into the native grasses, trees and weeds. But fortune was also with these first responders, the wind was rather light, so by pouring water on neighboring homes, structures and vegetation what could have been a major disaster was averted.

Thank you to each neighbor, every law enforcement officer, all members of the four fire departments that came to rescue this neighborhood.

Nation needs minerals

From the National Mining Association

Technologies are advancing and changing more quickly today than at any other point in history. From the way we communicate on a daily basis to the way we conduct business, none of today's modern technologies would be possible without mining. Minerals and metals that are found here in the U.S. – \$6.2 trillion worth of resources – are the backbone of technologies used in healthcare, consumer electronics, defense and manufacturing.

Without minerals like copper and titanium, electric vehicles would not exist. Our cell phones require 90mg of silver and 36mg of gold, two minerals that can be mined in the U.S. Every modern-day technology relies on minerals.

To allow continued technological innovations, we need an efficient mine permitting process that will help industries access mineral resources in a timeframe that reflects the current pace of change. Currently, it can take anywhere from seven to 10 years to obtain a permit to begin a mining project, forcing key sectors to become increasingly reliant on foreign producers for minerals we can produce domestically. This dependence on foreign materials puts critical supply chains at risk.

Recognizing need for changes

Some in Congress recognize the need to make a change. Senate Energy and Natural Resources Chairman Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska), along with Sen. Joe Manchin (D-WV), reintroduced a bill to support increased domestic mining. In the House, Rep. Mark Amodei (R-Nev.) introduced the “National Strategic and Critical Minerals Production Act,” a proposal that would create efficiencies in our outdated mine permitting systems.

Furthermore, American voters are in support of reforms such as these, with sixty-three percent saying that the U.S. should be doing more to encourage the use of domestically-mined minerals and decrease reliance on foreign-imported minerals in a recent poll.

While we are encouraged by Sen. Murkowski, Sen. Manchin, and Rep. Amodei's work, we need your help. Call on decisionmakers to support these bills so that the U.S. is able to drive innovation and compete in the global marketplace.

NATURE OF WORK

Conduct research to gather data on Greenlee County, Clifton and Duncan statistics or demographics for internal and external use. Assist in researching and compiling data for special projects. Perform other duties as assigned.
