

Important Archaeological Collection Perishes in 9/11 Collapse of Tower 1

The Five Points Project, a major new view of that 19th century New York City area and the immigrants who lived there, was an extensive archaeological project supervised by Dr. Rebecca Yamin. The site artifacts were stored in the second basement of Tower 1 awaiting transfer to a permanent repository. Nothing remains of the collection except 18 artifacts that had been loaned to the Archdiocese of New York for an exhibit. They are now on display at New York Unearthed in New York City. A movie on the Five Points area and its immigrants, starring Liam Neeson, Daniel Day-Lews and others is coming soon. Wonder of Martin Scorcese was savvy enough to use this new information in his film?

Sylvester Manor Archaeology Continues

The 4th public "Show and Tell" Open House interpreting the 2002 findings, both archaeological and documentary, was held July 20th at the Manor. The area of the cobbled surface excavated in 2000, after Dr. Kenneth Kvamme's geophysical testing around the ca.1735 current Manor house, was further tested in 2001, which extended the previously found features.

The 2002 excavations sought to connect these building features with the cobbled surface. It is now believed to be part of the 17th century landscape and may have served as the centerpiece of a complex of buildings that included the original Manor house. This type of cobble-paved surface was typical for wealthy homes of the period. It has a 'diaper' (diamond shaped) design in raised cobbles, which was used in Johnson Hall in up-state New York, in Dutch court yards along the Hudson River, and in European houses of distinction. This year's excavations also revealed a Native American occupation that pre-dated the Sylvester arrival at the site.

He was also one of the founders of the Rocky Point Historical Society, and has been supportive of the County's historical and archaeological heritage ... qualities which the Golden Trowel gratefully acknowledges.

New York Archaeological Activities

Colgate University continues to excavate sites each summer on Oneida land with the help of Oneida youth....a visit by Sen. Hillary Clinton highlights the underwater mapping project of the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum.....SUNY Buffalo has resumed archaeological investigation at Old Fort Niagara with volunteers and undergrad and graduate students.....

the SUNY New Paltz field school found the stockade fence of the Dutch settlement of Wiltwyck (Kingston) burned by Native Americans in 1661; they also excavated at the Matthewis Person House, a 17th c. double Dutch stone house, being restored as a county museum....the Rogers Island Visitors Center displays artifacts excavated by David Starbuck's on-going field schools around Ft. Edward.....

Schenectady Community College professors and students are excavating the 1670 Mabee Farm, which will be developed as a historic site by the Schenectady Historical Society.....a 1757 Ft. Ticonderoga storehouse continues to be excavated to underpin reconstruction as an education center.....one of the more dramatic recent finds in downtown Albany was 18th c. wood vats believed to have been a rum distillery; local philanthropists are funding their conservation.....

Ft. Montgomery in Bear Mt. State Park has been redesigned for better interpretation; areas to be disturbed were excavated by State archaeologists and artifacts from the site are on exhibit.....the Ganondagan Seneca longhouse museum will soon be linked with a nearby 300 year old Seneca fort site through a grant from the National Recreational Trails Program; State archaeologists are testing to preclude disturbance of archaeological remains.....

the proposed path of the new Second Ave. subway in Manhattan is being assessed by Historical Perspectives, Inc. for archaeological resources prior to construction.....State archaeologists are excavating the site of a 19th c. Albany Almshouse; more than 200 bodies have been found, which will be re-interred after study.....

SUNY Plattsburgh anthropologists have been excavating the 1830-90 Clintonville Bloomery Forge site for 5 seasons.....Bard College and the Town of New Hyde Park are testing "New Guinea," a settlement of c. 60 freed and fugitive slaves hidden in the woods since 1799; it will be preserved and interpreted for the future. "Vinland Map" Studies Back in the News

SCAA member Dr. Garman Harbottle of Brookhaven National Laboratory and colleagues at the Smithsonian Institution and University of Arizona Accelerator Mass Spectrometer carbon 14 dated the \$20M map to AD 1434, supporting its purported age. Other scientists disagree over the age of the ink used, whether it is of Medieval or recent age.
