

Volume VI is currently in preparation "The Shinnecock Indians" co-edited by Gay S Levine and Dr. Harvey Lauden, Professor at C.W. Post University, Dept. of Sociology and Anthropology. Contributors include Red Thunder Cloud, Dr. Rose Oldfield Hayes, Dr. John Strong and others. This publication was made possible by grants from the Suffolk County Office of Cultural Affairs and the Phillips Foundation. \*\*\*\*\*Special Note: For this year and the next several, taxpayers who do not itemize their tax returns will still be able to claim a deduction for charitable contributions. For this year and the next, non-itemizing taxpayers can deduct 25 percent of the first \$100 from their gross income, up to a maximum deduction of \$25.00 each year. In 1984, the 25 percent limitation will apply to the first \$300 of charitable contributions, with a maximum deduction of \$75. The limit rises to 50 percent in 1985 with no maximum, and by 1986 it will increase to 100 percent, again with no maximum amount.
