A Message from Suffolk County Archaeological Association's President -James E. Truex-


The Suffolk County Archaeological Association has survived for another year---which, in this world of uncertainty and rapid change is no small accomplishment. As usual, we are in debt, but not overwhelmingly. Through the months of 1982, Volume Five of our Readings in Long Island Archaeology and Ethnohistory has enjoyed a modest sale, along with the others in the series. In fact, some of the early volumes are now in short supply. The problem is, how to find the wherewithal to reprint. We hope that the volumes have been of use in the research activities of students, instructors and practitioners of archaeology on Long Island and elsewhere. Volume VI, <u>The Shinnecock</u> <u>Indians</u> with Gaynell Levine and Dr. Harvey Lauden as co-editors and contributors including Red Thundercloud, Dr. Oldfield Hayes and Dr. John Strong is under preparation.

We have continued our efforts to promote the conservation of cultural resource sites on Long Island, sending messages of approval and occasional disapproval - to Sentors, Congressman, Supervisors etc.. It may be wishful thinking, in reviewing the events of this past year one seems to detect an increasing concern at the local level for historic and prehistoric preservation.

The 1982 Golden Trowel Award went to Dr. Roger G. Gerry, whose appointment of an archaeologist to assist the Roslyn Landmarks Society is a landmark in itself. The Annual Long Island History Conference, at which the presentation was made, also saw the unveiling of our first effort at a comprehensive slide show on the Indians of Prehistoric Long Island, It was one small step in our plan for a full-blown program of public education. As with so much that we attempt, we are hampered by a lack of members able to spare time from their regular activities.

In the area of fund-raising our record over the past year has been unspectacular. The "No's" have been most sympathetic. In some instances we detect a glimmer of hope for the future. We shall presevere in '83.

I would urge our less active members most earnestly to consider as one of their New Year's reolutions more frequent attendance at our monthly meetings, which take place in the dining room of the Hoyt Farm in Commack. (CONTINUED ON PAGE 3)



Christopher Vagts has resigned as Suffolk County Historian after a seven year tenure to the post.

The Friends for Long Island Heritage has been authorized by the Suffolk County legislature to develop intrepretive support programs and landmark preservation in Suffolk County.
