Librarian Farrah Mazhari coordinated and facilitated a panel of five interfaith leaders - a Zen Buddhist, a Christian, a Muslim, a Rabbi, a Hindu, and a Sikh - to come together to share their beliefs and discuss how the community could help in times of crisis. We were anticipating six people to show up and more than 100 people attended this event!

Librarians Karen Baluyot and Laura Mendez planned and coordinated the cutting of more than 100 leaf-shaped Ellison Dies to create a Tree of Healing. We want to extend a big thank-you to the Jacumba branch for making this possible! The tree was a collaborative public art piece. Staff encouraged community members to leave short messages of support on the tree, promoting unity and healing.

Librarians Laura Mendez and Karen Baluyot designed an informational flyer about the special events and decided to utilize the social media tag #PowayStrong. In addition, they coordinated with San Diego County Library's Collection Development department to provide a list of e-book and e-audiobook resources that would assist customers with over-

coming trauma, coping with grief, and being resilient.



Youth Services Librarian Loretta Gibson coordinated and hosted a storytime with the Poway Sheriff. The deputy read books and sang the Hokey Pokey and Slippery Fish with our storytime crowd. Poway City Council member Caylin Frank brought her young daughter to the storytime.

Technicians Paige Dillard, Suzanna Earwicker, Rene Gehr, Nicki Ortega and Aleta Davis worked hard to create and keep well stocked a display of book resources centered around grief, unity, healing, and safety for the entire community.

Assistant branch manager Dan Rivera reminded everyone on staff of steps that our own staff could take to be safe day to day and if there ever is an active shooter.

And branch manager Marisa Lowe coordinated a Public Safety presentation with the San Diego Sheriff's Department, and Librarian Karen Baluyot facilitated the presentation. The department's crime prevention specialist discussed the ways customers could protect themselves in an active shooter situation and how to be aware on a regular basis.

#### Staff Book Recommendations

Assistant Branch Manager Dan Rivera recommends, Chernobyl

Chernobyl is an HBO historical drama miniseries about the Soviet nuclear disaster of 1986. The series chronicles the mistakes and cover-ups of the meltdown and cleanup efforts. Even though the series has a "made for tv" feel, it still is gripping and shocking. The initial episodes of the series maintain the aura of confusion regarding the misinformation given about the disaster along with the mismanagement of officials. The aftermath of the physical effects upon the staff of the power plant and the emergency crew is devastating. If you are a fan of historical dramas or political in-



trigue, *Chernobyl* is a must see. Look out for this show at the library once it is released to DVD.

**Library technician II** *Nickolia Ortega* recommends two children's books this month; perfect for reading one-on-one with a little one. First is *Swatch: The Girl Who Loved Color* by Julia Denos. Follow Swatch, a young girl who aims to "tame" the colors of the world. With vibrant, imaginative illustrations and an engaging story, *Swatch: The Girl Who Loved Color* is an exciting read for ages 4-8.

*Stay, Benson!* By Thereza Rowe. Benson the dog loves to play. After his owner Flick leaves for the day, Benson escapes the yard for an adventure. Will Benson be able to get home before Flick? Filled with sharp, high contrast illustrations and die cut pages, *Stay, Benson!* is a humorous tale for ages 2-6.

#### Library Technician Paige Dillard recommends, Station Eleven By Emily St. John Mandel

First of all, I'm usually a sucker for post-apocalyptic stories. While Mandel has yet to admit thinking her work as a science fiction novel, which most apocalyptic genres coincide with, she does admit that her novel is absolutely post-apocalyptic. A flu has killed a majority of the world's population, leaving the survivors without electric technology, vehicles, and a form of government/authority. I would definitely say that falls into the post-apocalyptic genre. When asked in an interview why she chose a post-apocalyptic setting, Mandel stated "I thought of the book as a love letter written in the form of a requiem." Basically, she wanted to write a story in which it was undeniable that the survivors missed how the world used to be, and made the reader become more aware of the extraordinary, every day. But goodness, this novel is so much more than just that.

Mandel takes us on a past to present roller coaster that follows characters Jeevan, Arthur Leander, Kirsten Raymonde, and the Traveling Symphony, as well as occasionally touching on the lives and thoughts of Miranda and Clark. We meet Jeevan at the time of death of the actor Arthur Leander, who Kirsten worked with when she was a young child actress. The Traveling Symphony is a group that travels from town to town of survivors and puts on Shakespearean plays. When Kirsten discovers the disappearance of two close friends, she and the symphony decide to find them. But, what is a great post-apocalyptic novel without a crazy cult? The Traveling Symphony finds themselves hunted down by a deranged man who is known only as The Prophet and his violent followers. Kristin and the rest of the symphony, now on the run, set their sights on a place called the Museum of Civilization, hoping to find their friends and refuge. But, where does "Station Eleven" come into play? Well, I recommend that you read the novel and discover this secret for yourself. It truly is worth the read.

Because this novel follows the lives of many characters, it is at some points challenging to remember who is who. This isn't a novel to read lightly or an audiobook to only half-listen to unless you enjoy missing crucial details and getting character histories mixed up. Also, with every ending to a chapter, it's not easy to predict what character you'll be following next or whether you're going to be pre-apocalypse, present apocalypse, or post-apocalypse. Due to this jumping around, some readers may feel frustrated or find it annoying. Personally, I reveled in it. I also greatly enjoy following multiple characters and discovering any connections between them. Let me just say, *Mandel* did not disappoint. If you enjoy post-apocalyptic novels; novels with an extensive list of characters who are fun to relate with and try to connect to each other throughout the story; novels with an evil cult, suspense, and an air of mystery, then this is a novel for you.
