

Staff and Friends Book Recommendations

Branch Manager Marisa Lowe recommends... Evvie Drake Starts Over by Linda Holmes Call no: F Holmes



In a sleepy small town in Maine, Evvie Drake has her car loaded up and suitcases packed. She's finally gotten up the courage to leave her unkind husband after years of unhappiness. But then, as she's driving away from their home, her phone rings. Her husband, who is a well-liked doctor in town, has been in an accident and it appears he's not going to make it.

Now, Evvie must figure out how to grieve for the small town's local hero, although she is a widow who doesn't feel much grief.

With that shocking start, Evvie Drake Starts Over gives way to highly human romance by new author Linda Holmes. The novel is full of imperfect characters, witty banter and lots of quirky baseball refer-

ences. Holmes is a pop culture correspondent for National Public Radio.

One recommendation that Evie's best friend, Andy, offers to help her move forward is that she get a new roommate. He's got just the right person in mind too: his own childhood friend, recently retired professional baseball player Dean Tenney. Tenney, is a down and out major league pitcher, who's had a series of professional setbacks – called 'the Yips' – and is looking to take a big break out of the limelight.


Tenney decides to move into an apartment at the back of Evie's house, and the two make a deal: Dean won't ask about Evvie's late husband, and Evvie won't ask about Dean's baseball. But as every good romance lover knows... rules have a way of being broken.

I enjoyed the human dynamic between these two characters, learning more about baseball and the fun, flirty banter. The 10 Thousand Doors of January by Alix E. Harrow

While growing up under the watchful eye of her wealthy guardian and collector of exotic artifacts, Mr. Locke, seven-year-old January Scaller finds a mysterious door. Then she finds an even more mysterious book. When she opens the book, we are introduced to multiple narratives from other worlds and timelines. January discovers that doors and books can lead to adventure, enlightenment, and secrets. Unfortunately for January, men like Locke would prefer that little girls not be so inquisitive. As January grows from a child into a woman, she begins to realize she is merely an exotic object in Mr. Locke's collection and Mr. Locke is not what he seems.



Fans of descriptive historical fiction, strong female characters and multiple narratives will devour this stunning portal fantasy set in 19th century Eastern United States. The main story is deftly interwoven with overlapping narratives from fantastical worlds. A mysterious scholar from one of these worlds interjects chapters throughout January's narrative reminding us that words both spoken and written are the real magic.

Harrow uses her extensive knowledge of American history and culture to thread a subtle commentary on sexism, racism and xeno-phobia throughout January's experiences. Those who want to keep the borders between worlds open and those who want to close them forever creates a constant tension between the characters. How January reflects on and reacts to this tension adds a layer of depth to an already compelling story.

If you are looking for a great family book to read, Wishtree by Katherine Applegate may be the book for you. This is a great book for a child, an adult or for you both to read together. This book has a Lexile score of 590L and is geared towards grades 4th thru 8th. Wishtree is a children's book that addresses discrimination in an age appropriate and hopeful way. What really makes Wishtree memorable is its captivating characters. There is Red, the giant 200-year-old neighborhood tree that has wishes hung from his branches every year and has seen a lot in his years but feels he needs to start doing something more. Bongo, is Red's best friend who happens to be a crow with a penchant for mischief and loves Red dearly. Throughout the book we are introduce to the many friends that use Red for shelter, who both love each other and annoy each other.

This includes a family of skunks (named after wonderfully smelling things) and a family of opossums who are scared of everything. Red has seen many families live in the house next door but he is especially fascinated by his new neighbor, Samar, a 10 year-old girl. When something horrible happens to Samar and her family, Red decides to become active in making Samar's wish come true. This is a great book for children to read while focusing on their distance learning this year.

If you enjoy this book, the author has many other award winning titles. Katherine Applegate is the author of The One and Only Ivan, winner of the 2013 Newbery Medal. Her novel Crenshaw spent over twenty weeks on the New York Times children's best-seller list, and her first middle-grade stand-alone novel, the award-winning Home of the Brave, continues to be included on state reading lists, summer reading lists, and class reading lists. More than a century ago, the Sentience Wars tore the galaxy apart and nearly ended intelligent space-faring life. In the aftermath a contest of hope was established to bring all the planets in the Universe together in the spirit of peace, unity and understanding so once every century, the great galactic civilizations gather for the Metagalactic Grand Prix—part gladiatorial contest, part beauty pageant, part remembrance and part concert extravaganza.

This year, Humankind has discovered the vast universe and so for the first time Earth and its inhabitants have been invited to participate but there is a little catch... any new species who is invited ... well, they will have to compete. And if they fail? Sudden extermination for their entire species. This isn't a battle that can be fought with weapons and strategy, mankind must sing for its survival.

Chosen by Metagalactic Grand Prix to represent Earth is a 70s one-hit-wonder glam rock band called Decibel Jones and the Absolute Zeros. Now the fate of the world rests on the shoulders of Decibel Jones and the Absolute Zeroes who haven't rocked in a long time. Can the Absolute Zeros rock the

greatest stage in the galaxy?

This was a fun, fast and light read that will leave you feeling optimistic and happy. Filled with a weird but hilarious cast of characters, far off places, adventure and of course glitter. Library Technician III Sandi Gonzaga recommends... Akin by Emma Donoghue Call Number: F Donoghue

"He and the boy were quite alien to each other, he decided. Yet in an odd way, akin."

This title draws you in with a delightfully thought-provoking, multi-layered, family drama! The characters are unfiltered and raw and writer Ms. Donoghue has a talent for delving into the nitty gritty of relationships and what it really means to be family.

Seventy-nine-year-old widowed chemistry teacher Noah is about to embark on a journey to Nice; a place he hasn't seen since his childhood, and where he is hoping to find answers to a

family secret held in a handful of old photos passed down from his mother. Two days before his departure, he receives an unexpected call requesting help to care for his 11-year-old great nephew, Michael. Instead of cancelling the trip, Noah begrudgingly agrees to temporarily assume responsibility for Michael and brings him along to France.

Michael has endured more adversity and misfortune than any 11-year-old should; his father is dead and his mother is in prison and Michael can, in turn, be defiant, endearing, foul mouthed, and downright exhausting. Noah's attempts to bridge the communication gap and try to earn a bit of the boy's respects are also touching, but it is difficult as they are both skeptical of one another. Their banter, disagreements, and various insecurities make the story alternately hilarious and heart wrenching.

An added bonus? Noah's deceased wife's thoughts speak to Noah in his mind. He could hear his late wife's 'reactions' and 'thoughts' to several situations which I found hilarious and touching. It added a layer of emotion and feeling that strengthened Noah's character; showing him as being strong yet vulnerable.

The icing on the cake is the French city of Nice. The Carnival, the museums, the food, the back history — all of it adds another dimension to this already absorbing tale. I literally couldn't put this book down because I was invested in Noah and Michael's ongoing relationship and where it was headed, as well as the mystery of Noah's past. Both story lines have the potential to change the course of both Noah and Michael's future and you'll find yourself rooting for the unlikely pair as they grudgingly get to know one another and realize that, in the end, they are "akin." Hello to the Poway community!




