Never Caught: the Washingtons' Relentless Pursuit of their Runaway Slave, Ona Judge Call no: B Judge

I'm recommending *Never Caught: the Washingtons' Relentless Pursuit of their Runaway Slave*, Ona Judge by Erica Armstrong Dunbar. This book covers a sad but fascinating piece of American History that I - and you-- might not be aware of: the escape of President George Washington's most valued slaves and the pursuit, which was illegal at times, to bring her back. <u>Ona Judge</u> (a.k.a. Oney) was a personal attendant to Martha Washington. During the first seven years of George Washington's presidential term, Oney attended to all Martha's personal needs, bathing her, preparing her for fetes, etc. Since Oney was usually in at-

tendance at social engagements, she was seen by many important people in Washington's social circles. Consequently, her face was widely recognizable which later made it difficult for her to remain anonymous as a fugitive slave. This book, based on two newspaper interviews that Judge did later in life and other research by the author, reveals the many ways the Washingtons' tried to capture her, and also, more telling, the presidential family's efforts to circumvent the Philadelphia gradual abolition law and the 1793 Fugitive Slave Act, which Washington had himself signed, by transporting his slaves back and forth between Mt. Vernon and Philadelphia.

The Scribe of Siena by Melodie Winawer (adult historical fiction)

Beatrice Trovato is an accomplished neurosurgeon in New York and plans to visit Ben, her historian brother in Siena, Italy. He has recently made an important research discovery and knows that his sister will also be intrigued by what he has found. However, Ben dies before Beatrice's visit. Instead of a joyful reunion, she must now undertake the grim task of settling her brother's estate. When she arrives at Ben's home, she begins to find clues about what Ben's discovery might be - all he hinted at was that it was to do with why the Black Death seemed to hit Siena especially hard in the 14th century, weakening the city and leading to the eventual rise of her rival commune, Florence. She also finds that one of Ben's rival scholars is aggressively trying to find out what Ben's discovery might be. As Beatrice tries to put the different clues together to figure out what Ben has discovered, she comes across a fresco with her face on one of the figures in the painting. She suddenly finds herself in the year 1347, inexplicably drawn back in time as a result of the painting and she must now find a way to survive in 14th century Siena. She meets and falls in love with the artist who painted her, Gabriele Accorsi, and with her knowledge of what Siena is facing with the arrival of the Black Death, she must save herself and Gabriele, and uncover the truth behind a sinister plot to destroy Siena.

The story follows the lives of the Song sisters and the boys they love, written from the point of view of the middle sister, Lara Jean Song. Lara Jean writes love letters to all her crushes, but she never thought her letters would get mailed. When they are, her life is turned upside down, but maybe in the end that isn't such a bad thing. I enjoyed getting to know all of Lara Jean's crushes and rooting for the one I thought she should end up with. November 2 6-9 PM

There will be a Mariachi band led parade around the library block to start the event, held in the library courtyard.

Come and celebrate the tradition of honoring our ancestors. Learn why this indigenous Mesoamerican tradition was proclaimed by the UNESCO as a "Cultural Heritage of Humanity" (2003).

As the indigenous cultures are assured that the dead would be insulted by mourning or sadness, Dia de los Muertos celebrates the lives of the deceased with food, drink, parties, and activities the dead enjoyed in life. Dia de los Muertos recognizes death as a natural part of the human experience, a continuum with birth, childhood, and growing up to become a contributing member of the community. On Dia de los Muertos, the dead are also a part of the community, awakened from their eternal sleep to share celebrations with their loved ones.

We will be traveling to time with the evolution of the celebration and learn about the "Procession de las Catrinas" (procession of the fancy skeletons and the art of Guadalupe Posada.
