- 3. In the Spirit let us travel, open to each other's pain, let our loves and fears unravel, celebrate the space we gain: there's a place for deepest dreaming, there's a time for heart to care, in the Spirit's lively scheming there is always room to spare.

God of peace, whose spirit of peace can quiet our spirits of confusion and despair, reassure us today...

Forgiving God, whose call to repentance promises grace upon grace, place your mercy in our souls today...

You who heal the sick and liberate the imprisoned, who bring justice in the midst of oppression and strength in the midst of weakness, pour out your spirit of power upon us today.

Open our hearts to new faithfulness, redirect our waywardness, and hold us gently in your goodness.

We confess our need to you, and we turn to you with hearts filled with hope, remembering the promises you have made to us.

May your name be glorified in us and through us. We ask it through Christ Jesus, your only begotten son, he who is our Lord and our Saviour, our brother and our friend. **Amen.**

SCRIPTURE - Mark 1:29-39 / NRSV

²⁹ As soon as they left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. ³⁰ Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. ³¹ He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

³² That evening, at sunset, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. ³³ And the whole city was gathered around the door. ³⁴ And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

³⁵ In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. ³⁶ And Simon and his companions hunted for him. ³⁷ When they found him, they said to him, "Everyone is searching for you." ³⁸ He answered, "Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do." ³⁹ And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.

This is the Word of God for the People of God. Thanks be to God!

LISTEN - *Today's sermon was shared by P. Bob Hardman.* You are invited to meditate on the scripture:

- Imagine that Jesus comes to your side, takes your hand, and lifts you up. What would you like to share with him?
- We read that "all who were sick or possessed with demons" were brought to Jesus. Jesus then "cured them." Who and what would you like to bring before Jesus for healing and restoration today? Spend some time talking with Jesus.
- P. Bob invited us to consider that into the brokenness of the world, God's good news and kingdom break forth. How do you see this happening today? Spend some time lifting up these sightings of God's grace and presence.
- We are called to be healers and reconcilers, just like Jesus. Pray for awareness and courage to do so this coming week. If you are not ready to pray for awareness and courage, pray for openness to God working in you.

PRAYERS of the PEOPLE – Spend time in prayer. What did you hear for yourself through today's scripture and reflection? Talk to God about it. Then lift up the joys and concerns that are in your heart. You might write them down, speak them aloud, or pray them in silence.
