

Burbank Airport Expansion Update



An initiative signed by about 7,500 Burbank voters that would have placed a ballot measure before the voters to authorize a terminal expansion project limited to 200,000 sq. ft. was recently rejected by the Burbank City Council on a technicality.

Instead, the Council promised to place on the ballot any future terminal expansion project agreed upon between the City and the Airport Authority. Presumably, it would be based on the City's current proposal of 365,000 sq. ft. and 14 gates with expansion dependent upon approval of a curfew and growth controls.

Burbank activists are anxiously awaiting the latest reincarnation of a terminal expansion project. They will continue to press forward for a terminal project no greater than 200,000 sq. ft. until sought after growth controls are achieved, and the results of the controls are evaluated.

More voters signed to support the 200,000 sq. ft. terminal plan than voted in the last Burbank election. The Burbank community uproar over the way the Council rejected the voter initiative, and a recent rebuff from the FAA on their terminal plan has set the Burbank City Council scrambling for a terminal plan that's more "marketable" to the Burbank community. Some time ago Burbank submitted their so-called "Framework Agreement," the 14 gate, 365,000 sq. ft. terminal proposal, to the FAA for evaluation, including a permanent ban on jet departures to the east. The City is fearful that reopening the east runway to jet takeoffs will subject a wider area of Burbank to jet noise. Glendale is concerned that easterly takeoffs will reopen flight patterns over Glendale.

The FAA requires that any airport growth controls must be justified through a formal study process that was legislated by Congress in 1990. However, no airport use restrictions have ever been approved at major airports as a result of the process.

Billboard Business

The Vista Metropolitan
Company has removed seven
small billboards, which they
own, from the Chandler
Boulevard median where it
intersects with Laurel Canyon
and with Whitsett Avenue. The
removal of these billboards is a
belated success resulting from
the negotiations the Valley
Village Homeowners
Association entered into with
three billboard companies two
years ago.

Nine larger billboards remain in the median. The Association was not able to implement agreements with Eller Media and Outdoor Systems. They had agreed to remove nine billboards from the median in exchange for enlarging two of their billboards in the southern part of Valley Village. However, nearby residents opposed the enlargement required in the agreement, and Councilman Mike Feuer withdrew his support of zone variance needed for the deal to be implemented. With relocation blocked, the VVHA made a second attempt at repealing the compensation requirements for billboard removal in the State code.

There is some good news: the FAA said it would not support closing the east runway to future jet takeoffs. That's really got Burbank and Glendale residents concerned about future jet noise. So, after 22 years of airport controversy, are we any closer to major airport expansion? No. The people of Burbank are now tuned into the controversy, and finally understand the potential impact and consequences of creating a mini LAX in Burbank. They are now our allies and supporters of a restricted growth airport.

We are urging Councilman Joel Wachs to continue his leadership role in opposing the proposed expansion, and to make sure the City of Los Angeles gets involved now, in the new discussions and decision making about the size of terminal expansion. We have suggested he push the 200,000 sq. ft. terminal concept, with a curfew and caps on growth, similar to the proposal supported by 7,500 Burbank voters.

Next issue, we'll be talking about, and examining the continuing slanted coverage of the airport issue by the Los Angeles Times.

Neighborhood Empowerment

Get Involved

On June 8, 1999, Los Angeles voters made their voice heard. They overwhelmingly approved a new Los Angeles City Charter, the first in 70 years. At the heart of the charter is a groundbreaking and promising plan to create a citywide system of independent Neighborhood Councils. By empowering the people of Los Angeles, Neighborhood Councils have the potential to affect citywide decision-making in unprecedented ways and improve the quality of life. The Department of Neighborhood Empowerment (DONE) has been formed to created these councils and to offer education, training and support to Councils once they are established. DONE has until December 2000 to develop and present a plan to the Mayor and City Council that creates a system of citywide Neighborhood Councils



DONE is conducting 16 public workshops across the city to provide a forum for your ideas and your questions to help create the shape of Neighborhood Councils in the City of Los Angeles. Join us and discuss:

- What should be the criteria for recognizing a Neighborhood Council?
- How should communities determine their boundaries?
- What are your expectations from the City to ensure that your Neighborhood Council is successful?

After these meetings your input will be used to shape the Neighborhood Council Plan that will be submitted to the Mayor and the Los Angeles City Council for their approval.

The DONE meeting and workshop in our area will be Wednesday, June 28, 2000 from 6:30 to 8:30pm at CBS Studios, 4024 Radford Ave., Studio City (parking entrance off Colfax Avenue). Refreshments will be served

Enhancement, Not This Year

Chandler Boulevard

Last year the City of Los Angeles was awarded a \$77,000 Federal Transportation Grant to landscape the edges of the Chandler Boulevard median. When combined with local matching funds, the total amount available for the project, \$96,250, will only be enough to landscape the very western portion of the median west of Coldwater Canyon in Sherman Oaks. The landscaping of the median in Valley Village will have to be funded by future grant awards or by the MTA.



It All Happens At City Hall

A Motion by L.A. City Councilman Joel Wachs

The Valley Village Specific Plan was adopted by the City Council in 1993 in order to curtail adverse impacts created by commercial and multiple residential uses in a traditionally single family zoned neighborhood. Such impacts have been excessive traffic, crowded parking on adjoining residential streets, inappropriate and undesirable commercial uses that are incompatible with the surrounding area, and commercial and residential developments built to a scale that are incompatible with the adjoining residential neighborhoods.

To curtail such negative impacts, the plan prohibits certain commercial uses, restricts the height of any building near single family zoned neighborhoods, restricts the use of balconies and rooftop recreations areas, prohibits any new off-site or roof top signs, provides landscape standards for new development, and guarantees street improvements for any new project to be at standards as set up in the municipal code.

Members of the Valley Village community have indicated that further protections are necessary, including: language to provide more parking for multiple family and commercial projects, further restrictions on signage, building design standards, utility under grounding, prohibitions of certain commercial users, additional provisions for landscape improvements, and restrictions on the location and camouflaging of satellite dishes and cellular telecommunications facilities in Valley Village.

I therefore move, that the Planning Department consult with representatives of the Valley Village community, and the Council Offices representing Valley Village, to address the above mentioned concerns, and, with the assistance of the City Attorney, amend the Valley Village Specific Plan accordingly.




Valley Leaders Meet

In response to our requests, Senator Alarcon introduced S.B. 1912 to repeal the compensation requirements.

Lori Dinkin and Marc
Woersching met with
representatives of the billboard
companies and the Metropolitan
Transit Authority at Senator
Alarcon's office to explore
alternative sites for billboard
relocation in or adjacent to Valley
Village. It was agreed that the
billboard companies would look
into this. A second meeting with
the billboard companies and the
MTA is scheduled in the near
future.

Laurel Canyon Plaza

The shopping area at the corner of Laurel Canyon Boulevard and Riverside Drive is now fully rented. Most of the shops are appropriate to our neighborhood and have not created any kind of disturbance for residents. An attractive sign has been added, listing the shops. The management company has requested a one hour extension in the hours of operation.
