Per Capita ~

One of the strengths of the Presbyterian Church (USA) is that we are a connectional denomination. To be connectional means many things, not the least of which is that we join together with Presbyterians across the US to support one another in ministry and mission. Congregations work together on ministries which are too big for any one congregation.

In short, we work together to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ on many levels and in many places. The connectional ministry of the Presbyterian Church is paid largely by per capita (for each person). The per capita is a financial assessment based on church membership which every congregation is responsible to pay. Our tradition is to include it as a line item in the budget. However, many congregations ask (never require) their members to pay their personal share in addition to their pledge. For 2020 each church member is assessed \$41.14, which totals \$3,414.62 for our church. If you are able to pay your own per capita, it will have a positive impact on our cash flow.
