

Witnesses, Saints, and Neighbors

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us..." (Hebrews 12:1)

In early versions of the Bible, the word "witnesses" was translated as "saints." All Saints Day was established to remember all the "saints" who have passed to the next life, but their "witness" helps Christians to "persevere in the race marked out for us." The original author of Hebrews was not establishing a special day in the church year, but it became a key verse as the church established "All Saints Day." "All Hallowed Eve," or Halloween, is the making sacred or hallowed of the saints and martyrs in the early church in preparation for All Saints Day. Vigils the night before are common for church holidays such as Christmas, Easter, and Thanksgiving.

There are many theories on the origins of Halloween. Like many Christian holidays, their historical roots are cloudy, with the intentions of the church and parallel pagan festivities. One theory is that Halloween and All Saints Day came from a Celtic harvest festival, specifically from the Irish. The Celtic festival referenced is Samhain, which is celebrated at the end of the harvest with the transition to "darker days." The Gaelic version of Samhain is the word "November." Samhain was a time to commune with their ancestors as part of the festival. Irish literature includes mythology that it was a great gathering and feast that included opening ancient burial mounds as portals to the Otherworld. (Do you now understand the skeletons, demons, and devil imagery?) The literature includes huge bonfires and sacrifices. Expanded oral history suggested the souls were released and visited their homes looking for hospitality, thus the "Trick or Treat" tradition.

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World Communion Sunday October 5th

On Sunday, October 5, we will join Christians around the world in celebrating World Communion Sunday. This special day reminds us that the table of Christ is wide enough to welcome all people, uniting us as one body across nations, cultures, and traditions.

As we share the bread and cup, we remember that the peace of Christ is not only a gift but also a calling. We are invited to be active peacemakers—building God's household of love and justice here in our community and across the globe.

As part of this celebration, we will receive the Peace & Global Witness Offering. This offering supports ministries of reconciliation and peacebuilding both locally and worldwide, helping the church live out its witness in tangible ways. A portion of what we give stays here in our community, while the rest joins with gifts from congregations everywhere to make an even greater impact.

Together, our giving and our prayers become part of God's work of healing and hope for the world. May this World Communion Sunday remind us that in Christ, we are never alone, but always bound together in love.

The combined customs of the church (celebrating the Saints) and pagan (scary costumes, and Trick or Treat) were brought to North America in the 19th century.

All Saints Day has now become a Sunday to remember the church members who have passed in the preceding year. In some traditions (predominantly Catholic), it incorporates recognized Saints. It is not a huge event in the life of the church. In contrast, "All Hallowed Eve," or Halloween, has become the second-largest holiday in America, with 70% of the population participating in some form. It is the fourth-highest revenue-generating holiday with \$7 billion in revenue, following Christmas, Thanksgiving, and Valentine's Day.

This short summary of Halloween and All Saints Day is to encourage us to share our church with others. Yes, we at the First Presbyterian Church will have an "All Saints Sunday" on November 2. We are also planning Trunk or Treat on October 31st. It is a wonderful time for kids of all ages. But it is so much more. Trunk or Treat is an excellent opportunity to meet our neighbors. I hope you will come and contribute to the hospitality for which the First Presbyterian Church is known. Let's greet and welcome our neighbors!


Organizations received funding through this

Infant (0 to 12 months)
Softcover books, cardboard books, rattles, bibs, stacking blocks, farm animal sets, clip-on toys for strollers or cribs, crib mirrors, bath toys, stuffed animals, balls, busy boxes, light-up toys, musical toys, Oball toys. Other toys that are labeled as suggested for infants. Be aware of choking hazards.

Toddler (1 to 3)

Softcover books, cardboard books, stacking blocks, farm animal sets, small toys that clip on strollers, bath toys, stuffed animals, balls, busy boxes, musical toys, colorful pillowcases, fun socks, chunky crayons, coloring books, flashcards, plastic cars, puppets, soft dolls. Other toys that are labeled as suggested for children under 3. Be aware of choking hazards.

Preschool (3 to 5)

Crayons, coloring books, grab-n-go activity kits, reading books, stickers, sticker workbooks, activity books, matchbox cars, NERF or rubber balls, stuffed animals, flashcards, fun socks, small action figures, small dolls, travel size games, Silly Putty, simple puzzles, card games (Go Fish, Old Maid, Memory), colorful pillowcases, dress up items, farm animal sets, dinosaurs. Other toys that are labeled as suggested for Preschoolers.


