

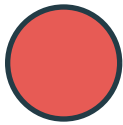


Color & Shape Discovery Hunt

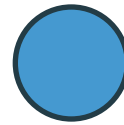
RED

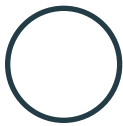

One hunt. Many ways to play.

A playful invitation to notice colors and shapes together. Choose the version that fits your child today; there is no need to finish every box.

GET READY

You need: the hunt sheet and a pencil or crayons. Allow about 10-15 minutes, or stop sooner while it is still fun.

Choose a familiar, clear space. An adult stays with the child. Point to objects instead of collecting them; avoid climbing, small loose items, and anything sharp, hot, or breakable.

AGES 2-3 | Point & name

Start with one color or shape. Show the picture and say, "Can you point to something red?" Offer two choices if helpful. Name the discovery together; an adult can mark the box.

AGES 4-5 | Find & count

Try all six boxes, one at a time. Count three objects of one color, or trace a shape in the air. Ask, "What makes this look like a triangle?" Children can draw their favorite find.

AGES 6-7 | Notice & explain

Let children lead the hunt. Ask them to label their drawing or tell you how they know a shape matches. Try the bonus: find a blue circle. If none is nearby, draw an imaginary one!

KEEP IT FLEXIBLE

A single object can match more than one box. Look for flat faces or outlines: a plate can show a circle. If no match is nearby, draw one together. Celebrate noticing and effort.

Printing in black and white? Color the labeled circles red, yellow, and blue before starting, or use familiar colored objects as examples.
