






Brice Stump to speak at March dinner

The Kendal T. Jones Lecture Series returns in 2023 with a guest lecturer who needs no introduction among local history buffs: Brice Stump, an award-winning journalist, author, and photographer who has devoted decades to chronicling and preserving the history and folklore of the Delmarva Peninsula.

In addition to writing for newspapers such as the Daily Times and the Salisbury Independent, Stump is the author of a number of books including It Happened in Dorchester (1969), Somerset County: A Pictorial History (1985), Unforgettable Treasures: People, Places and Culture of the Eastern Shore (2000), and Working Skipjacks of Deal Island (2016).

He will present a lecture about "Grave Tales and Incredible Tombstones" of the Eastern Shore at the Laurel Historical Society's annual spring dinner, scheduled for March 18, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. at St. Philip's Church. Additional details to be announced.

The popular event yielded a profit of \$5,000. Plans are underway for its highly anticipated return in 2023.



















IN MEMORIAM

Daniel Risdon Twilley (1953 – 2022)

We are saddened by the news of the sudden death, on December 24, of society member and supporter Dan Twilley, of Sykesville, MD, last living descendent of Emanuel Twilley, builder of our 1878 Hitchens Homestead and its adjacent mill. It was only a few months ago that Dan presented us with the Twilley family vintage canoe, in which he and his Dad's life-long best friend and classmate, Paul Robinson, paddled all over Laurel Pond. His father's recollections of growing up in Laurel have been published in our society newsletters. Our condolences go out to his wife, Michele.

Dan was born in Baltimore on April 3, 1953, to John Emanuel Twilley and June Moog Twilley. He is preceded in death by his parents, his Aunt Francis "Dee" Moog Venema, and his cousin and best friend Charles Venema. His career in insulating and environmental engineering took him from Salisbury to places such as Florida, Los Angeles, and the Panama Canal, where he was the third generation of his family to work on the canal. In recent



years, Dan had enjoyed following the society's progress in the restoration of his great-grandfather's home.

THREE BITTEN BY A DOG.

Ran Amuck in Laurel Streets, but Was Finally Shot.

LAUREL, Del., Dec. 14.—A dog belonging to Victor Wright ran a muck here last night creating much excitement and alarm. Three persons were bitten.

Ira H. Melvin, the last victim, shot the dog, but it is not known whether he killed it or not. It limped away yelping. Mr. Melvin's wounds were cauterized. The dog was not believed to be mad.

LAUREL, Del., Jan. 29.—It has been more than one month since an oyster boat has been able to come up the Laurel river, and some people have almost forgotten the taste of an oyster.

Dr. William S. Hitch, who is critically ill from an attack of paralysis, was for a number of years a practicing physician in Wilmington.

Henry Fluers, aged 62 years, who moved from here to Princess Anne ten years ago, is dead.

Chicken raisers complain that dogs are killing their fouls and several dogs have been shot.

William J. Crocket fell on the ice and broke his knee cap and is now in the Peninsula Hospital.

A range light has been placed on the site of Benoni Light, off Oxford which was made useless by the ice.

Influenza in Laurel

Epidemic Interferes With Operation of the Postoffice.

LAUREL, Del., Jan. 29.—Local route No. 1 is without mail service, owing to the serious illness with influenza of Charles S. Workman, the carrier, and the inability of the postal authorities to secure a substitute. John A. Adams, carrier on route No. 6, is also sick, but a substitute has been secured for his route. There has not been a day since the appearance of the influenza last autumn when some one conected with the local postoffice has not been sick with the malady.

There are still about 70 cases of the disease here, but physicians say the epidemic is subsiding.

New WPA Job Started

The WPA has started a new land drainage project near Laurel. The project, for which \$11,327.50 in Federal funds is provided, is resulting in the employment of 73 men. The propect is divided into three sections, Wright C. Dizer, publicity director of the WPA said. The first is the enlarging of the Rossakatum ditch; the second the deepening of Gum Branch, and the third consists of enlarging Holly Branch west of Laurel.
