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GENERAL INFORMATION

1. The livestock competitions of the Colorado River Fair shall be open to residents of the State of California's 54th District Agricultural Association (that portion of Riverside County east of the Coachella branch of the All American Canal) and students of the Palo Verde Unified School District.
2. **Primary 4-H livestock exhibitors**
 - Must be 5 years old as of December 31, 2018.
 - Exhibitors under 9 years of age on or before December 31, 2018 may not exhibit/compete in large animal (beef, sheep, swine, goats, and veal) divisions.
3. **Junior, Intermediate, and Senior 4-H livestock exhibitors**
 - Must be at least 9 years of age on or before December 31, 2018.
 - May compete/exhibit until the end of the calendar year in which they reach 19 years of age.
4. **FFA exhibitors** may compete/exhibit until the end of the calendar year following the year of graduation from high school.
5. **Independent exhibitors**
 - Must be at least 9 years old by January 1, 2019 to compete in large animal (beef, sheep, swine, goats, and market veal) divisions.
 - May compete/exhibit through December 31st of the year they turn 19 years of age.
 - Must comply with the same rules/regulations as 4-H and FFA exhibitors.
 - Must have an adult supervisor who is qualified to provide safe and useful training concerning the exhibit to the exhibitor.
6. Entries may be made only in those divisions and classes appearing in this handbook. Fair management reserves the right to refuse exhibits entered in violation of local and state rules. A copy of the State Rules may be obtained from the fair office 591 N Olive Lake Blvd., Blythe, CA, 92225.
7. The CEO of the Colorado River Fair 54th DAA has the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences.
8. The fair will take reasonable precautions to insure the safety of exhibits but the 54th DAA assumes no responsibility for loss, theft or damage which may occur from any cause. Upon this condition only are entries accepted into the fair.

Entry Requirements

1. For 2019 only, **all livestock exhibitors must** complete the online ethics training required by the California Division of Food and Agriculture.
2. Livestock entries must be made on the Livestock Entry Form for large animals or the Small Stock form for small animal exhibits/competitions. The forms can be found on the last page of this handbook, at the fair office or online at www.coloradoriverfair.com.

3. **Livestock entry forms may be turned into the fair office from Monday, 1/07/2019 until Monday, January 28, 2019.**

4. The entry form **MUST** contain (legibly):
 - Exhibitor's first and last name.
 - Exhibitor's contact information (address and phone number).
 - Exhibitors date of birth.
 - Exhibitors club or organization.
 - The division and class number for each exhibit/competition being entered. Incorrect division or class numbers may lead to disqualification of the exhibit.
 - Any other information which may be requested on the form (e.g. ear tag, band number, etc.)
 - Signature of parent or legal guardian for independent exhibitors.
 - Signature of leader or teacher for 4-H and FFA exhibitors.

5. Submission of a completed entry form shall be deemed acceptance of all rules, both local and State. Acceptance includes permission to use your name, photograph and entry in publicizing the Fair.

6. Any entry which is, in the opinion of fair management, a safety hazard may be disqualified.

4-H & FFA

The Junior Department is for young people who want to enter exhibits at Fairs. There are a number of organizations who want competition for their members beyond their own organization. The Fair can do this by establishing divisions and classes for groups such as FFA and 4-H and others. The Fair will provide the opportunity for young people to exhibit who are not members of an organization.

The Fair can do this in several ways. They can let the young person compete in the appropriate class in direct competition with an organization member. If there are enough “independent juniors” to form a class they can form separate classes for these independent juniors. In a livestock class the independent exhibitor must meet the age and ownership requirements if they are in direct competition with members of an organization.

Livestock exhibitors are limited to residents of the 54th District Agricultural Association and students of the Palo Verde Unified School District.

Eligibility and Age Requirement:

FFA Members: FFA members may participate as a member until the end of the calendar year of graduation from High School. (For example, a graduate this year is eligible until December 31st of this year). However students enrolled in a National or State

Master’s program may continue to participate until the end of the year following year of graduation from High School with the approval of the Board of Directors.

4-H Members: Primary members must be 5 years old or in Kindergarten as of January 1, 2018 to exhibit at fair. Primary membership ends when members qualify as junior members. Exhibitors who are under 9 years of age of January 1, 2019 are not eligible to compete in large animal competitions at California Fairs. Juniors must 9 years by December 31, 2018. Juniors in third grade must furnish a copy of their birth certificate to the Fair Office prior to January 15, 2019. Senior may continue to participate until the end of the calendar year of graduation from High School.

Independent Junior Livestock Exhibitors:

Independent Junior Livestock Exhibitors must enter open classes unless one is not available. Age requirement for Independent Junior Exhibitors are as follows.

They must be at least 9 years of age on or before December 31, 2018 and may compete through December 31st of the year they turn 19. If in the 3rd grade they must furnish a copy of their birth certificate to the Fair Office prior to January 18, 2019. Independent Junior Livestock Exhibitors must comply with all entry requirement required for 4-H and FFA exhibitors and must have an adult supervisor who is qualified to provide safe and useful training concerning the exhibit to the exhibitor.

GENERAL STATEMENT

Fair Management may provide separate divisions and classes as desired for FFA, 4-H youth programs, or other recognized junior farm groups. Divisions which apply exclusively to the Junior Department have been provided on the following pages.

4-H YOUTH DIVISION

4-H Youth programs are non-formal voluntary education programs under the supervision of the Cooperative Extension Service of the University of California and the United States Department of Agriculture. They are part of extension teaching. The projects exhibited at the fairs by members of these groups are the result of their efforts under the supervision of volunteer adults.

FFA

The FFA is a national organization of students enrolled in High School Agriculture Education classes. The unit is the chapter in each High School offering Agricultural Education, under the supervision of the Agriculture Teacher who is always the local chapter advisor. The State Unit includes all chapters in the State, under the supervision of the Department of Education, as represented by the Bureau of Agricultural Education, with its headquarters at the State Education Building, Sacramento, California. The National Unit is the group of Associations in each State and Puerto Rico, under the supervision of the Agricultural Education Division of the U.S. Office of Future Farmers. Projects in Livestock, Poultry, Fruit or Crops are part of the practical education of the Agricultural Education student who owns it. Participation in fairs and livestock shows is recognized as having educational value as well as stimulation for better results and finer project, under the supervision of the Qualified Chapter Advisor and with the cooperation of Fair Management.

DANISH SYSTEM OF JUDGING

The Danish System of Judging is based upon established standards of quality for each type of produce. In this

system each exhibit is judged according to how well it meets the standard rather than how it compares with other exhibits.

STATE AND LOCAL RULES

State Rules and Health Regulations apply to all Junior Department entries EXCEPT WHERE SUPERCEDED BY LOCAL RULES.

County, District and State Fairs cannot legally carry liability insurance covering Junior Exhibitors and/or their exhibits. **Liability insurance is the responsibility and at the discretion of the Junior Exhibitor. Therefore, it is suggested that Junior Exhibitors consider taking out a liability policy covering themselves and their exhibits.**

The California Department of Agriculture assists and encourages youth to get involved in the educational process by conducting local, regional and national livestock shows that are judged according to contemporary standards of excellence.

The Fair Management has the right to limit entries to facilities available and/or cancel any division or class in which there are not enough entries. The decision of the Fair Management under this rule is only applicable to the Chief Executive Officer, whose decision is final. Adequate competition exists when there are at least five (5) entries in a class. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion must come from a class of five (5) or more entries. When competition does not exist, the fair may combine classes for meaningful value if appropriate for learning. (Rule waived for 2013 Fair with the exception of small animal.)

All market classes are to be determined after weigh-in, classes are to be determined by weight only. Only one

(1) weigh-in allowed, except for protests, which must be re-weighed immediately. No wet animals will be allowed on the scales and no animals overly fatigued or stressed will be weighed.

In Market Large Animal Classes the TOP END WEIGHTS OF SHEEP (150 lbs.), BEEF (1325 lbs.), SWINE (270 lbs.), GOATS (110 lbs.), VEAL have been opened up and animals exceeding these former weights are allowed to show and sell if meeting standards, however, the aforementioned weights represent Auction Maximum Weights

Animals not meeting weight requirements may stay for Showmanship Classes. **Minimum Weights; BEEF (1000 lbs.), SWINE (210 lbs.), LAMBS (100 lbs.), GOATS (60 lbs), VEAL 250 lbs).**

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK RULES

In addition to the above stated rules, the Junior Livestock entries will be governed by the following :

1. Market Classes to begin at 9:00 AM Thursday, March 14, 2019. Grand Champion Judging will be held on Thursday, March 14, 2019 at 6:30 PM. Showmanship Classes to begin at 9:00 AM on Friday, March 15, 2019 and Round Robin Showmanship to begin Friday, March 15, 2019 at 6:00 PM. Luncheon will be held starting at 10:30 AM Saturday, March 16, 2019 and Auction to begin at 12:30 PM on Saturday, March 17, 2019. Sunday Awards March 17, 2019 at 1:00 PM. **(Barn will close at 5:00 PM)**
2. **Each animal must be owned by the exhibitor at least 60 days prior to the fair with the exception of Market Beef and Horse, which are 120 days and Rabbit and Poultry, which are both 30 days. The same ownership applies to Independent Junior Exhibitors.**

OWNERSHIP DEADLINES ARE:

Beef - November 3, 2018
Sheep, Swine, Goats, Veal Calves – January 6, 2019
Poultry, Rabbits – February 1, 2019

TAGGING DATES:

Animals must be tagged by this date.

NOVEMBER 10, 2018 - Beef

JANUARY 5, 2019 – Sheep, Swine, Goat, Veal Calves.

FEBRUARY 1, 2019 – Rabbit/Poultry

All animals coming to the Fair must have been tagged, tattooed, branded or identified by Project Leader/Club Leader, or for an Independent Exhibitor, the Livestock Superintendent. This includes Rabbits. A list of Rabbit Tattoos and Poultry leg numbers will be accepted on or before ownership deadline. All other animals must be tagged by required tagging date with official fair tag.

3. **Pen Set Up** Participation is required of all livestock exhibitors: 12 & over only February at 6:PM.
Stall Board Set-up 11 & under March 1, 2019 at 6:00 PM.
Pen Tear down: All ages March 18, 2019 6:00 PM
4. All exhibitors will be responsible for their own equipment and care of animals. Animals must be fed at Fair between 7:00 AM and 8:00 AM and between 5:00 PM and 6:00 PM each day. **On Sunday animals must be fed at 4:00 PM. Barn will close at 5:00 pm. EXHIBITORS WILL RETURN TO GROUNDS ON MONDAY TO CLEAN THEIR PENS AND REMOVE ANY AND ALL OF THE EQUIPMENT.**
5. Barn awards will be given to the group that does the best job of keeping their portion of the barn and surrounding area clean over the entire period of the Fair. Areas will be judged daily. Possible 100 points per club per day. Judging will be done by the Fair Ambassadors with guidance from the Livestock Superintendent.
6. Feed for the entire run of the Fair MUST be brought in at Weigh-in. Each exhibitor will be responsible for their own bedding unless provided by the Junior Livestock Boosters.
7. All animal are to arrive at the Fairgrounds show ready.

8. No washing of animals allowed on the grounds except with the permission of the Livestock Superintendent. NO PRESSURIZED OR MECHANICAL WASHING DEVICES MAY BE USED. No Electrical Devices in Barn. Battery operated may be used with the approval of the Livestock Superintendent. Parent or Club Leaders MAY NOT do grooming, handling, and pen cleaning. Exhibitors face disqualification if this should happen. However fellow members may and are encouraged to help each other at all times. In the event of an emergency where the animal or person is in physical danger the Livestock Superintendents, their assistants, or the project leaders may handle the animal until the emergency is resolved. **In this instance,** the Livestock Superintendent must be contacted immediately. He/she will direct how the emergency is handled. The Fair CEO will decide if the animal is fit to show once the emergency is past.

9. Danish System of Judging will be used for Showmanship and Round Robin.

10. There will be awards for Junior Boy and Girl (grades 4-8) and Senior Boy and Girl (grades 9-12) for outstanding citizenship based on the following criteria:

- a. Cleanliness of pen and animals
- b. Courtesy toward fellow exhibitors and the general public during the entire fair
- c. Neatness of person during the entire fair
- d. Cooperation and courtesy towards the Livestock Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent.

11. Weigh-in will be according to the following schedule:

BEEF – 5:00 pm 7:00 pm Tuesday, March 12, 2019
SWINE, LAMB, GOAT, VEAL 12:00 noon to 6:00 PM Wednesday, March 13, 2019.

Beef will not be weighed in without presentation of Brand Inspection papers. Tack must be unloaded in designated area. Weigh-in line will not be held up for tack unloading.

REQUIRED DRESS FOR WEIGH-IN:

Lace-up shoes, long pants, no shorts, and no muscle shirts. No open-toes shoes may be worn in the unloading area or barn.

12. Animals not meeting requirement may stay for Showmanship Classes. All animals not qualified for Junior Livestock Auction MUST be removed from the fairgrounds AFTER Showmanship classes by 6:00 PM on Friday, March 15, 2019. Underweight animals that stay on the grounds and fail to participate in Showmanship will be subject to a daily boarding fee of \$10.00 per day.

13. Protested 43-weights are allowed only according to the following procedure;

- a. Re-weights must be requested at the time the animal is weighed and are for UNDERWEIGHT ANIMALS ONLY
- b. Animals will step off the scale
- c. The scale will be rebalanced
- d. The animal will immediately be put back on the scale and re-weighed.
- e. At no time can the animal leave the holding area.

All Market classes are to be determined after weigh-in. Classes are determined by weight only. Only one (1) weigh-in is allowed, except for protests, which must be re-weighed immediately. No wet animals will be allowed on scales and no animals overly fatigued or stressed will be weighed.

14. Exhibitors with more than one large market animal may weigh only one animal. If the animal is underweight or disqualified by the Livestock Superintendent(s) the exhibitor may pay a \$10.00 substitution fee and change animals if it is done prior to 8:00 PM, on the day that specie is to weigh in. (Tuesday, 3/12 for Beef and Wednesday, 3/13 for all other livestock).

15. Back up animals may not be brought to the Fair or loaded at the Fair for processing. Please make alternate arrangements.

16. EXHIBITORS MAY EXHIBIT IN ONLY ONE LARGE AND ONE SMALL SINGLE MARKET CLASS.

17. State Rules for Sheep Tail Docking will apply

18. All Steer Exhibitors MUST use a neck rope.

19. Exhibitors will report any prescribed medication administered to an animal prior to the Fair to the Fair Veterinarian at Weigh-in. Any medication administered during the Fair MUST be done with the PRIOR APPROVAL of the Livestock Superintendent and the Fair Veterinarian.

Exhibitors will submit their animals to a urinalysis or drug screening at the discretion of the Livestock Superintendent.

Exhibitors with animals being screened will be allowed to sell at the discretion of the Livestock Booster Committee. Animal must be quarantined until test results are returned. Exhibitor must care for the quarantined animal and expenses will be the responsibility of the exhibitor unless the test results prove negative, and then expenses become the responsibility of the Contingency Fund. If tests are positive, the exhibitor will forfeit all auction proceeds.

20 Pregnant animals are not eligible for Market Classes. Upon verification by the Fair Veterinarian, the animal will be dropped from any entered Market Classes. Un-altered male animals are not eligible for Market Classes.

21. **With the Exception of Pig Water** devices which must remain in pens until 12 noon on Monday, tack will be released from 8:00 AM to Noon and from 4:00 PM to 5:00 PM on Sunday. Small animals will be released at 4:00 PM on Sunday. A small animal release must be signed by the Livestock Superintendent. The 54th DAA will not be held responsible for the injury or death of any animal or the loss or damage of any tack or property. **SELF**

PICK UP OF LARGE ANIMALS will be from 5:30 PM to 6:30 PM on Sunday and from 8:00 AM to 10:00 AM on Monday.

22. **DISPUTES:** The CEO of the 54th DAA shall make the final decision of all controversies and that decision shall be final.

23. **Livestock Superintendent:** While they have many responsibilities, one of the most primary is the safety of the exhibitors and their animals. Should a situation arise which endangers an exhibitor or animal, the Livestock Superintendent may add rules to protect the safety of any or all animals or exhibitors. Those rules must be approved by the CEO as soon as physically possible but shall be in effect until that is possible.

24. **Ineligible/Disqualified – Regulations**

The CEO of the 54th DAA Colorado River Fair, with the best interest of the Fair in mind, shall reserve the right to declare ineligible for competition and/or disqualify any entry from the Junior Livestock Auction that is unsightly, unhealthy, injured, lame, unsound, unable to move on animal's free will, endangers public safety, violates local rules or the Fair's Code of Practice or has been entered in violation of these rules and regulations, at any time.

25. **MISBEHAVIOR – CODE OF ETHICS**

Each exhibitor is required to have a signed Code of Ethics Statement on file in the Fair Office prior to participation in the Junior Livestock Show and/or Auction. **Any exhibitor who does not participate in the manner stated in the Code of Ethics or who misbehaves in a manner that shows blatant disregard for the other participants or their animals or blatant disrespect for leaders, advisor or Livestock Superintendent may be penalized by the CEO of the 54th DAA.**

26. The sale of a project is a privilege and the CEO may revoke this privilege if the exhibitor is in violation of the rules of conduct whether stated or implied.

27. VARIANCE GRANTED FOR HORSE PROJECT. The Department of Food and Agriculture has granted a variance to the 54th DAA for Horse project members for the 2019 Fair Horse Show. In accordance with that variance, members of the same immediate family (siblings) may share the ownership and responsibilities of a single horse for their horse project. (Variance retained for future years).

28. Market animals only may sell at Fair, no breeding animals of any specie. Rabbit and Poultry may only sell qualified meat pens.

29. Livestock Exhibitors, from Tuesday through Sunday while in Barn and grooming areas, must wear long pants or jeans. No pajamas or tank tops are allowed. Exhibitors must wear closed toed heeled shoes. No rubber boots unless steel toed.

30. Uniform (both Showmanship and Breed Class) for Primary Members will be white shirt, white pants, belt, white or green hat, scarf or tie and closed toed shoes.

54th District Agricultural Association
Regulations for Replacement Animals for
Fair in the case of the death of a project
animal.

1. Replacement animals for fair shall be limited to large animals.
2. No replacement animal allowed under the ruling regarding the death of a project animal shall be eligible to win Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion.
3. No replacement shall be allowed for a deceased animal that is deemed by the Veterinarian to be unlikely to have made weight by fair time. This shall be based on the carcass weight at the time of death and the average weight per day gain for that specie.

4. No replacement shall be allowed unless the deceased animal has been autopsied by a Veterinarian at the cost of the project member or the Veterinarian deems that there would be no useful purpose served in the animal being autopsied and that the animal's death could not be attributed to lack of care or any abusive action on the part of the owner. The Veterinarian must state a cause of death. The autopsy, if required, shall include any tests or toxin screens deemed necessary by the Veterinarian to establish cause of death. The replacement animal may be purchased with the approval of the CEO of the Colorado River Fair, prior to all necessary test results being completed but may not show or sell unless cause of death has been deemed not to have been caused by, or was the result of, anything the project member has or has not done to that animal. Should the tests show, or the Veterinarian suspect animal abuse, the case shall be turned over to the proper authorities for investigation of possible prosecution.

5. The time limit for the replacement of deceased lamb, goat, pig, or veal shall be no less than thirty (30) days from the first day of fair. The owner must contact the CEO of the Fairgrounds within twenty-four (24) hours of the death of the animal and with his approval shall have seven (7) days from the date of death of the project animal to replace it. Any animal that dies less than thirty days from the first day of fair may not be replaced.

6. Replacement animals may not have been shown in any fair or livestock show. Replacement animals must be purchased from a producer or from a local member with a tagged back up animal (back up animals preferred). A bill of sale must be presented to the Fair immediately after purchase. The animal may be tagged or recorded in the case of a tagged back up animal.

7. The replacement animal must be deemed safe to show by the Livestock Superintendent prior to weigh in. The project member must demonstrate his or her ability to control the animal.

8. The replacement animal must be of the same specie as the animal that dies.
9. The replacement program shall be void if the project member has another specie of large animal that has been tagged for fair (i.e.: two specie tagged, goat and lamb, two projects.) The project member must show the other specie.
10. The replacement program shall be void if the project member has a backup animal of the same specie as the animal that dies.

In the case of the death of a project animal less than thirty days prior to fair the project member may, if the regulations in item 4 are complied with and the CEO of the Fairgrounds notified within 24 hours of the death of that animal, buy and show a replacement animal in Showmanship only. That animal shall be tagged prior to show and the project member must demonstrate the ability to show that animal safely as stated in item 8. In this case the animal must be removed from the fairgrounds after showmanship and will not be allowed to sell at auction.

The decision of the CEO shall be final as to the acceptability of the replacement animal. Any challenge to the decision of the CEO shall go to the Deceased Animal Committee. There shall be no other recourse. Deceased Animal Committee consists of the two members of the Board of Directors assigned to the Livestock Committee and the Livestock Superintendent. In an emergency, if a member of the Committee cannot be reached a substitute Board Member may be selected.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK AUCTION

The sale shall be limited to one of the following: One market beef, swine, lamb, goat, veal calf, rabbit meat pen, poultry meat pen, or turkey exhibit per exhibitor. Sale is further limited to only 4-H and FFA and Independent Livestock Exhibitors. 4-H, FFA or Independent exhibitors will be assumed by entry to be

selling. IF NOT, must declare his/her intent NOT to sell by 4:00 PM on Thursday, **March 14, 2019**.

Livestock (Market animals only) exhibitors, will be allowed to sell at the Livestock Auction if they meet the following requirements: (A) Exhibitors selling animals must have participated in a 4-H or FFA program and have been approved by the Leader of same as to having completed the program, have completed all requirements of Fair and are approved to Show at Fair **OR**, if Independent Livestock Exhibitor, shall demonstrate to the Board of Directors their knowledge and completion of their project and have completed all requirements of Fair and are approved by the CEO to Show at the Fair. (B) Limited to a single entry. (C) **ALL** Exhibitors selling at auction must turn in a completed record book.

The sale will be held at 12:30 PM on Saturday, March 16, 2019.

Four percent (4%) shrink will be used for the sale.

Livestock (large or small) Exhibitors **MUST** participate in Showmanship in order to sell at the Auction.

Exhibitors must be in the official 4-H, FFA or Independent Exhibitor uniform during the Junior Livestock Auction. Anyone out of uniform will be excused and not allowed to sell.

Those 4-H, FFA and Independent members selling their animals or projects at the Junior Livestock Auction must turn in an addressed, stamped Thank You note. **THANK YOU NOTES MUST BE TURNED IN TO THE LIVESTOCK OFFICE BY 10:00 AM SUNDAY, MARCH 18, 2018**. No ribbons, awards or checks will be issued if not turned in. NAME OF SELLER AND RETURN ADDRESS MUST BE ON ENVELOPE.

Five percent (5%) will be withheld from the seller's proceeds for the Junior Livestock Contingency Fund. The Fund is under the control of the Colorado River Fair's Livestock Boosters Association, and the Board of Directors of the Colorado River Fair has final approval

before any funds are expended. The fund covers losses of animals during Fair, at current market value and improvement of 4-H and FFA related areas.

An exhibitor fee will also be charged for **ALL** animals selling at the Auction. This fee is \$25.00 for rabbits and poultry, \$50.00 for swine, sheep, veal and goats and \$85.00 for beef. Exhibitor fees will help off-set the cost of Judges and Awards as well as annual 4-H, FFA and Independent Junior Livestock Exhibitor expenses paid by the fairgrounds. Swine must also pay a .45% of gross sale fee to the National Pork Council. Lambs must pay ½ cent per pound and .30 cents per head to the National Lamb Council.

It is the policy of the Livestock Boosters and the Board of Directors of the Colorado River Fair that dollars raised as a result of donating back animals for re-auction must be for a scholarship fund available to 4-H and FFA members only and/or other pre-approved 4-H and FFA Junior Livestock related activities and to the Colorado River Fair Foundation. Money raised will help with the cost of day to day operations of the Fair.

All donated back animals will be auctioned only after completion of the printed sale list. If any animal is donated back, the original buyer may not avail themselves of base, slaughter or self pick-up options.

The Scholarship Fund will be maintained by the Livestock Boosters and administered by the Board of Directors of the Colorado River Fair.

ALL CHAMPIONS AND RESERVE CHAMPIONS must sell at auction unless: (a) the exhibitor is not qualified to sell in which case the Judge shall choose a "Sale Champion". Or (b) the exhibitor has a large animal AND a small animal Champion in which case the exhibitor may choose to sell either the Small Animal Champion or the large animal.

Only those animals which are judged to be Group 1 and Group 2 animals may sell.

NO "For Sale" signs may be placed in the pens or barn area.

Animals shall not be painted with any substance. No foreign material of any sort shall be placed on any part of their bodies at any time, while on the Fairgrounds, including glitter or any type of spray paint.

All market animals must show in order to sell in the Junior Livestock Auction.

AND THE SPECIE THEY REPRESENT as prescribed by the Colorado River Fair.
