JEFFERSON - The Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival will return this year to the Ashtabula County Fairgrounds, 127 N. Elm Street, Jefferson.

In most recent times, the festival had been taking place at Giddings Park in Jefferson.

In its 39th year, the festival will be held Oct. 14-15, with free admission and parking.

Hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. The festival includes official souvenirs, parade, crafts, entertainment, demonstrations, contests, kids' rides/games and great food.

Returning contests include a Lego covered bridge contest, troll costume contest, scarecrow contest, baked goods contest and more.

Found on the fairgrounds will be official Covered Bridge Festival souvenirs, food vendors, the Mini Bridge, antique cars, antique engines, apple-butter making demonstrations, inside and outside crafters, historical displays, kids' activities, trackless train rides and more.

New this year is a petting zoo. The Happy Hoppers 4-H Club and the 4-H Equine Committee will have animals in the small animal barn for kids to visit with.


There will also be Jr. Bridger activities and laser tag in an inflatable house.

The festival will offer an assortment of entertainment, including inflatable laser tag, train rides and even a visit from Bigfoot himself.

Michelle Gibbs runs Laser Bounce Inflatables out of Oberlin, Ohio, and is glad to be bringing her inflatable laser tag to the Covered Bridge Festival for the first time this year.

This fun and exciting activity allows kids, adults, even whole families to head inside a giant 1000 square foot bounce house and play a game of laser tag.

"It's like stepping inside a great big balloon," Gibbs stated. "We're really excited about this; we travel all over Ohio with our inflatable laser tag."

Participants in the game each get a vest and a phaser gun, and the goal of the game is to get the most points by hitting targets on the vest. It will cost \$8 per person.

Another entertaining activity for people of all ages to enjoy is the Romick Railway train rides. Entire families can hitch a ride on this miniature model train that takes guests on a ride



Netcher Rd. Bridge is hosted by the Ashtabula County Humane Society. They will have walking tacos, crafts, baked goods, Humane Society jackets and shirts for sale. Sea Glass contest new this year at **Covered Bridge Festival**

JEFFERSON - A new competition will be featured at this year's Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival.

Marie Kuhar, contest organizer and the Ashtabula County Engineer's Office representative to the festival, said a Sea Glass category was added to the festival's art contest this year.

It's one of three categories in the festival's art contest, and entries must have an Ashtabula County covered bridge incorporated or themed, according to a copy of the rules.

Kuhar was inspired by the Ashtabula Beach Glass Festival in adding the sea glass category.

"That's a big thing downtown, so I wanted to incorporate that (sea glass) into it," she said. "I'm trying to incorporate the different things that are big in Ashtabula County with the festival, and sea glass, or beach glass, is one big thing that can be incorporated for covered bridge art as well."

She noted that entrants can use sea glass on anything in creating their work, such as canvas or a piece of weathered wood. They can even make a sculpture.

Kuhar also is highlighting the Wood Stick Covered Bridge contest this year.

"It's a really cool contest that when I was a kid going to

the Covered Bridge Festival, I enjoyed seeing those," she said.

The contest involves using such items as popsicle sticks to make a covered bridge. Entries can be modeled after an existing bridge or simply made up.

"A lot of people, when they see this, they'll remember what this contest is," she said.

Also, the baked goods contest was updated this year by dividing it into three categories: cakes, cupcakes and general baked goods.

The cakes and cupcakes categories must have an Ashtabula County covered bridge incorporated or themed while the general baked goods category can be fall themed or themed after an Ashtabula County covered bridge.

"I'm really hoping to get some new submissions, like apple pies or pumpkin pies," she said. "I hope to get a good outcome for it."

She said contests are very important to the festival.

"It brings people into the festival and lets them present their work and lets them show how much the covered bridge festival means to them and show their visions of a covered bridge," she said.

Other contests this year are: Lego Mini Covered Bridge (which Kuhar said was a big hit last year), Scarecrow, Troll Costume, Classic Car & Truck, and Quilt contests.



Touring 19 covered bridges in seven hours and 150 miles

ASHTABULA COUNTY - On a cloudy and cool day in September, my bestie and I set off to visit all of Ashtabula County's covered bridges in one day.

We went to visitAshtabulacounty.com and downloaded the Covered Bridge Trail app.

On the app, the bridges are listed in alphabetical order. She put them all in her GPS, ordered them in a way that made sense, and off we went.

First stop was West Liberty in Geneva. Crossing Cowles Creek, it is the shortest covered bridge in the country. It is adorable in its setting in one of Geneva's great neighborhoods.

Harpersfield Bridge under construction.

Next was Harpersfield. It crosses the Grand River and has been torn down to be rebuilt. Visitors can still drive to its banks. I often go to check on the progress.

Then we were on to Mechanicsville Road. Still in Geneva, it crosses the Grand River, sits next to the historic Grand River Manor and is the county's oldest, built in 1867.

Moving on to Jefferson, we hit Doyle Road, crossing the Mill Creek tributary of the Grand River, Giddings Road, refurbished in 1995 using an Ohio Department

of Transportation grant, Netcher Road, also redone by ODOT in 1999, South Denmark, bypassed in 1975, and Caine Road built in 1986 in honor of Ashtabula County's 175th birthday.

Also in this area is the Graham Road bridge. It was washed downstream by a flood in 1913. It was rebuilt from the wreckage and gently placed in Benson Family Park. It is out of use.

Our county seat of Jefferson is a wealth of bridge history. We then headed north to Ashtabula, where we saw Smolen-Gulf and Riverview. The Smolen bridge is the longest in the U.S., and Riverview is the walking bridge right under it.

Smolen is also our only bridge to have walking paths on

the bridge itself. It's a great view!

In previous years, and perhaps again in the future, the Covered Bridge Festival Committee has held a fundraiser dinner one one of these bridges. I have been to them and they are wonderful.

From Ashtabula, we headed to Conneaut. After a lunch break for about an hour, we got back on the trail.

Creek Road and Middle Road, both crossing Conneaut

Doyle Road Bridge with reinforced wood.

Creek, Root Road crossing the Ashtabula River in Conneaut, and then State Road in Kingsville, crossing Conneaut Creek again, were next on our trek.

The construction date of the Creek Road bridge is unknown, but it was renovated in 1994.

Traveling southeast, we hit Benetka Road, renovated in 1985, the Olin family bridge on Dewey Road in Plymouth Township, as well as Riverdale in Rock Creek, this time crossing the Grand River again, before heading to Windsor

Mills.

Windsor was the single longest trip, clocking in at 23 miles from 'Bula. It crosses Phelps Creek.

Then we were done!

We had seen all 19 Covered Bridges in one day! It was a great time.

When visitors of our county and locals alike make this pilgrimage, they should be sure to bring along someone they can be in a car with for seven hours. I know I did!

Erin Fenner of Ashtabula and I had a wonderful time. Her daughter Bethany joined us for lunch and the end of the trip.

Do be aware of the "no trespassing" signs seen at many sites. Please be respectful of people's private property, but also please feel free to take a path down to any of the rivers.

Both visitors centers, 5540 Lake Rd. E. GOTL, and 1850 Austinburg Rd. at Routes 45 and 90, were closed by the time we finished our journey, so collecting our Covered Bridge Trail prizes would have to wait for another day.

The only downside of the trip is driving down the dirt roads that lead to many of our bridges. Visitors need to be cognizant of these areas in our rural county and make sure to give their car a bath afterward. The drive through our beautiful county is well worth a little dust.

Caine Road bridge first of its kind in Ohio

PIERPONT TOWNSHIP - The construction of the Caine Road covered bridge began on dry land with just two carpenters and was completed with six.

Unlike most bridges, the Caine Road span in Pierpont Township was constructed on dry land and a channel was cut under the 124-foot bridge pulling the west branch of the Ashtabula River to the bridge.

Located at 4699 Caine Rd., the bridge was built in 1986 to honor Ashtabula County's 175th anniversary.

John Smolen, the former Ashtabula County engineer, was tasked with building the bridge, his second in the county. He chose the Pratt Truss design, the first time the design was used for a bridge in the state of Ohio.

The Pratt Truss design was introduced in 1844 and was used in hundreds of bridges until the World War II. It was designed by Pratt and his father,

Caleb Pratt, a pair of American engineers, several years after William Howe patented his famous Howe truss design. Its most interesting feature was its ability to span great distances using simple construction methods. It was regularly used to span anchor points up to 250 feet apart and most commonly used in railroad bridge construction.

The design is a structural system with horizontal, vertical and diagonal members that can carry loads with relatively long spans compared to beams. It's mainly used as bridge structure carrying traffic and dead load and distributing it to its supports. It's characterized by

its diagonal members, which are inclined with the same angles. This pattern of diagonal and vertical truss members allows loads to be evenly distributed across the truss.

Smolen later used the design for the Giddings Road and Smolen-Gulf bridges. The latter is the nation's longest covered bridge.

Smolen had said he chose the design because it provided a

good balance of efficiency, cost and strength. Though future bridges were to be constructed with prefabricated laminated timber, the Caine Road bridge was constructed on site, with the exception of the roof trusses.

Construction on the span began with a crib on which the bridge was to be built. A floor was then constructed before the north, then the south walls. Cranes later raised the walls, beginning with the south wall.

The heavy trusses were built off site and were moved into

place with cranes.

Oak shingles cut by members of the Ashtabula County Antique Engine Club and treated with antifreeze were used as the original roof. Those shingles failed and were replaced with modern materials in the mid-1990s

The Covered Bridge Festival Committee donated \$5,000 to the county engineer for the replacement project.

The bridge, which cost the county \$150,000, was dedicated Oct. 12, 1986, at the Covered Bridge Festival.

The southern wall of a pond on the south side of Caine Road is the bank of the Ashtabula River's old channel, which was routed under the bridge once construction was completed.

JEFFERSON - If you come to the Covered Bridge Festival, you may find yourself shaking hands with Abraham Lincoln. Or at least a gentleman that looks a whole lot like him.

John King of Ashtabula has been portraying President Abraham Lincoln since the 1980s when he first donned a borrowed hat and coat and entertained his third-grade students with a short lesson on the sixteenth president.

"I grew a beard for the first time in 1983 or '84, and a gentleman who would do parades as Lincoln said I looked like Lincoln and ought to do it also," King said previously.

The gentleman told King he could borrow his hat and coat, and so for Lincoln's birthday that year, that is what he did.

In 2009, King was doing a program at the Country Club retirement center and met a couple there portraying President Garfield and his wife, Lucretia R. Garfield. They invited King to join their group of historical re-enactors called We Made History. His first program with the group was at a "Dinner With the Presidents" in Mentor, OH. The group now has five presidents and three first ladies.


King's wife Marian often joins him as Lincoln's wife, Mary Todd Lincoln.

They both will take part in the Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival, appearing at the Log Cabin from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

King has spent hours researching Abraham Lincoln's life

over the years and continues to do so. To develop the program that he shares, he uses information from a presentation he attended by Jim

Getty, a renowned Lincoln actor and historian from Gettysburg. He has also read numerous books on the subject and is always on the lookout for more books about Lincoln that he

"I am constantly learning more about Lincoln, his life, education, political skills, family in Springfield, Il., and the White House, his generals and the Civil War," King said. "I want to share what a brilliant man he was, his love for his family, his country, how he was able to save the Union." He also likes to share little known facts about Lincoln. For example, he is the only president to have a patent for an invention. It is also interesting to know that it was during Lincoln's administration that "In God We Trust" was first put on a two-cent coin.

Over the years, King has attended many events as the sixteenth president. He has appeared at Civil War reenactments, parades, school programs, quilt shows, historical groups, churches, club meetings, lodges and special dinners with the President at restaurants. At each event, King reaches out to teach people about one of our greatest presidents.

"I just share what I have read as though I am talking with a friend," he said.

Though he is now older than Lincoln was when the president was assassinated, King still manages to "make his hair look younger" and pass for Lincoln, even when he is not in costume.

"When I am in everyday clothing someone will come up to me and say 'did anyone ever tell you you look like Lincoln?' I tell them, 'I have been accused and found guilty!" King said.

HARPERSFIELD TOWNSHIP - Work is getting closer to being completed on the Harpersfield Coverage Bridge, but it won't be done in time for the Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival.

"Obviously, not having the Harpersfield Covered Bridge open during the festival will certainly be unwelcome to some, but I'm so very excited to see this work underway so that we can continue to preserve this tremendous asset that we have in our county," he said.

He noted that people can enjoy the many other covered bridges during the festival, which takes place Oct. 14-15.

"Our covered bridges bring in many visitors locally and from afar and the opportunity to continue to showcase them

he said. "While the Harpersfield Bridge will not be complete quite yet for all to enjoy they can take in many of our other fantastic bridges and also take a peek from afar of the work that continues on this bridge."

As part of the work, the bridge will get all new piers and steel I beams, and the original trusses for the sidewalls will be used again.

The 2-span wooden truss covered bridge spanning the Grand River, County Road 154, at Harpersfield was put on the National Register of Historic Places on Nov. 3, 1975.

According to Ashtabula County Metroparks, the bridge was constructed in 1868, a steel span was added in 1913 and the





Built in 1872, the Jefferson Depot contains railroad memorabilia and features the original ladies waiting room and restrooms complete with wall-hung flush tanks.

Outside, there is an 1888 House, Colonial Herb Garden, early General Store, 1872 Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railroad Station and 1918 Caboose, the 1848 Church in the Wildwood and Church Barn, the 1838 One-room Schoolhouse, Hohn's General Store and early century pharmacy, and the 1885 Sheffield Post Office.

The Depot acquired one of its newest original buildings (a one-room schoolhouse from Austinburg Township) in 2009. Rehabilitation of the building is ongoing.

The museum is open 1-4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday during the festival.

bridge was renovated in 1991-92.

"Ā flood in 1913 washed away the land at the north end of the bridge, and the steel span was subsequently attached," Metroparks notes. "The bridge features a walkway, added during its renovation in 1991-92. The bridge also features an Ashtabula County MetroPark at its north end, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The bridge's WGCB number is 35-04-19, and it is located approximately 3.4 mi (5.4 km) south of Geneva."

The information from Metroparks also notes the double-span Howe truss bridge is one of currently 16 drivable covered bridges in the county. At 228 feet, it's the third longest covered bridge in Ohio.

The bridge's nomination form for the National Register lists different information than that listed by Metroparks regarding its date of origin. "It is said that this bridge was built in 1873 by a carpenter by the name of Potter," the nomination form states.

It also lists some of the other developments that took place around the bridge.

"This area was the site of a grist and saw mill and the mill stream enters the Grand River at the dam which is Just to the east of the bridge," the nomination form states. "A waterworks which generated electricity was built here in 1901. The road became part of the state highway system in the early 1930's and was known as SR 534. The state relocated the highway to the east and the bridge reverted to the county highway system in I962."

Windsor Mills Bridge is a favorite among the community

WINDSOR - Take a trip down to the southwest corner of Ashtabula County to check out one of the most loved covered bridges: the Windsor Mills Bridge.


The Windsor Mills Bridge is known by a few names: the Warner Hollow Bridge and the Wiswell Road Bridge.

This particular covered bridge is located in Windsor, at 7696 Warner Hollow Rd., and is one of the oldest remaining bridges in Ashtabula County.

According to Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival Director Ginger Whitehead, this bridge is one of the favorites in the community.

"The Wiswell Road (aka Windsor Mills or Warner Hollow) Bridge is considered to be one of our most beautiful bridges by many people," she explained. "It's listed in the National Register of Historic Places and is in a very historic area with Camp Whitewood being just south of the bridge, which was built on the site of old Indian fortifications...The historic Windsor quarries, Skinner's Mill and the Christ Church Episcopal Church and Historical Society Museum [are] just to the north of it."

The historic location and the gorgeous country setting make the Windsor Mills Covered Bridge a must see for all festival

goers.

The bridge itself was originally built in 1867 and spans 120 feet across the Phelps Creek from more than 30 feet above the gorge. The Windsor Mills Bridge is a single-span Town truss design, made of white pine with handmade iron pins, and sits atop cut stone abutments with some distinctive center supports, using three different kinds of masonry.

"It has unique piers with one being made of creek stones and another being made of sandstone from the nearby quarry," Whitehead explained. "The original abutments [are] of carefully laid field stones, which have been strengthened with concrete in later years."

The Windsor Mills Covered Bridge was completely closed to the public in the 1980s, but after renovations between 2002 and 2004, the bridge was refurbished and reopened to traffic finally in 2004.

This beautiful covered bridge is a scenic spot for people to visit and admire the historic area and drive across the beloved bridge.

"[It's] definitely worth the trip to view," Whitehead stated.







Covered Bridge Festival to welcome iconic cars

JEFFERSON - The Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival Board is returning to its roots in its 39th year with a return to the Ashtabula County Fairgrounds.

"And, this particular year, we're going back to the fairgrounds for the first time in eight years," Victor continued. "We're trying to get back to our roots and they did have a car show back in the beginning.'

The show will begin with registration beginning at 9 a.m. and lasting until approximately 5 p.m.

"They can come in and register that morning at 9 a.m.," Victor said. "We'll have a judge that goes through until about 2 p.m. for the Best in Show. At the same time, all of the attendees will be given a ballot when they come in and they can pick their favorite participant for a People's Choice award."

The Ashtabula County Antique Engine Club brings some of its machines, and will be there in full force.

Each entrant into the show will receive a gift.

"Everyone that comes in will be given a dash plaque with a bridge on it," Victor said. "Each year, we feature a different bridge. This year will be the Olin Bridge, which is celebrating 150 years this year."

Visitors to the car show will feel as if they've gone back

"We have two special cars coming this year," Victor said. "We have a DeLorean and a tribute car to K.I.T.T. of the show 'Knight Rider.' It lights up, talks and all that cool stuff. I think that's drawing a lot of people's interest."

The cars will be a callback to the childhood of Generation X. "I'm very excited," Victor said. "We've seen DeLoreans,

but how many people are able to sit inside one or watch the doors go up?"

"A whole generation knows the significance of K.I.T.T.," Victor continued. "How many people in the younger genera-

Riverdale Covered Bridge is a peaceful setting

ROCK CREEK - Ashtabula County is blessed with a wide variety of covered bridges to explore, and some of the most beautiful are set in the country.

The Riverdale Covered Bridge is located in Rock Creek, at 3349 Riverdale Rd., down a quiet country road in an idyllic


Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival Director Ginger Whitehead explained the appeal of the bridge to the community.

"Riverdale Road Bridge is another of our historic treasures [in Ashtabula County]," Whitehead stated, "It also sits in a very quiet, beautiful country setting."

That gorgeous rural setting is what draws festival goers to this bridge each year during the Covered Bridge Festival.

The Riverdale Covered Bridge is a single-span, town truss lattice bridge that sits high above that Grand River.

Originally built is 1874, it has seen some much-needed


renovations of the years.

A steel center support was added underneath the bridge in 1945, and the floor was completely rebuilt in 1981 and gluelaminated wood girders were added at the same time.

In 1987, the road at the east end was washed out by flooding, and required a new concrete abutment for added support.



3. Caine Road Covered Bridge

This bridge was built in 1986 in honor of Ashtabula County's 175th anniversary. It was the first Pratt Truss bridge built in Ohio and is one of only five in the state. It has a clearance of 15 feet.



4. Graham Road Covered Bridge

The Graham Road bridge was built in 1913 from remnants of a bridge washed downstream in a flood. It is currently by-passed, so travel by vehicle across it is not possible. It sits on property belonging to Ashtabula County Metroparks.



Middle Road Bridge was constructed in 1868 and reconstructed in 1984. It is 136 feet long and has a clearance of 11 feet. The bridge is east of State Route 7 and south of South Ridge Road.

7. State Road Covered Bridge

The State Road bridge was built in 1983 as the first "new" covered bridge constructed in the county. It has a Town Lattice design and clearance of 16 feet, 2 inches.



8. Creek Road Covered Bridge

The Creek Road Covered Bridge was renovated in 1994. Its construction date is unknown. It sits 25 feet above Conneaut Creek and features Town Lattice design. It has a clearance of 9-feet, 3-inches. Creek Road runs east of Keefus Road, south off Route 20, in Conneaut.


10. Olin Covered Bridge



11. Smolen-Gulf Covered Bridge



14. The Liberty Covered Bridge

Dedicated in 2011, the Liberty Covered Bridge carries West Liberty Street across Cowles Creek in Geneva. At 18 feet, it has been called the shortest covered bridge in the United States. It was built with the help of students at the Ashtabula County Joint Vocational School.



15. Harpersfield Covered Bridge

The Harpersfield Bridge built in 1868 is 228 feet long. It has a clearance of 12 feet and is built with Howe Truss construction. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Note: The bridge is under construction.


18. Windsor Covered Bridge



Mitch and Melissa to play Covered Bridge Festival

JEFFERSON - Mitch Larson and Melissa Harvey simply love music. They love how a crowd reacts to music. They love the challenge of playing a wide variety of songs.

"It's all about the music," Larson said. "It's the challenge of doing different songs for folks and getting involved with the crowd. We love playing for people. When the crowd is having a good time, we feed off of each other. It's always cool to see other musicians in the crowd, too. We might ask them on stage to play with us."

The pair, known as the Melissa and Mitch Acoustic Duo, will share that love of music at the Ashtabula County Covered Bridge Festival on Sunday, Oct. 15, from 3 to 5 p.m.

Though slated to play as a duo, only Larson will attend the festival as Harvey is unable to attend.

"I can't do some of the songs that she does, though I try," Larson said. "I play some different songs. It's difficult because she's got a great voice and we do the harmonies and stuff. I do OK, too. We have a good time playing together, but we also have a good time playing alone, too."

The duo, which is from Andover, is quite familiar with playing for crowds in Ashtabula County.

"We've done a few events, like the Walk for Life, at the fairgrounds," Larson said. "We've been doing the Wine and Walleye Festival and we've done Relay for Life, Lake Fest at Pymatuning Lake, Music in the Park in Andover, lots of wineries, some weddings and private parties."

Instead of performing from a pre-selected list of songs, the duo likes to take feedback from the crowd and perform the songs that are in demand.

"We'll play anything from Conway Twitty to Pearl Jam," Larson said. "We'll do John Denver, Jim Croce, Neail Young, Hank Williams Jr., Johnny Cash, Merle Haggard and much more. We ask people what they want to hear. Sometimes we do well and sometimes we learn new songs."

Larson likes to gauge the crowd and tries to play selections it might like.

"I like to see who is there," Larson said. "I get a look at the crowd and see the age group and see what's going on there. We never have an established set list, but there's a good number of songs that we know. Our job is to entertain folks so they stick around for the festival. We like to interact with the crowd. It can get people going."



JEFFERSON TOWNSHIP - When most people think about covered bridges in Ashtabula County, they think of 19th Century constructions, but the Netcher Road Covered Bridge is as pretty as any in the county and it was built in the fare-gone year of 1999.

The covered bridge crosses Mill Creek a short distance from South Denmark Road in Jefferson Township. The bridge was dedicated Aug. 29, 1999.

Designed by John Smolen with architectural design by Jefferson architect Beverly Cowles, the neo-Victorian bridge cost \$819,050. It was funded with a Federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act grant.

Smolen chose the Haupt truss with arches for the bridge design. Richter Construction of Columbus won the bid to construct the bridge, the trusses of which were fabricated in Ripley, W.Va.

The bridge, one of the newest and one of currently 16 drivable covered bridges in the county, is a single span constructed of timber arches with inverted Haupt walls. It is located about two miles east of Jefferson. The bridge is 110 feet long, 22 feet wide and 14 feet, 6 inches tall.

Southern pine was used for the arches, walls, floor and roof;

The bridge was stained red and trimmed in cream. The architectural highlights of the bridge include domes with copper roofs at each end.

At the time of its construction, the Netcher Road Covered Bridge was the newest in the county and the first to be built since the State Road Covered Bridge was built in 1983.

The current bridge replaced an older iron bridge over Mill Creek. That bridge had, in turn, replaced a covered bridge, however no records for that older covered bridge exist. The old iron bridge was closed in 1997.

The road had to be realigned and the intersection with South Denmark Road had to be moved north to accommodate the bridge. Crews also took out a sharp curve by the old bridge as well as straightening and raising the roadway, as residents had found it difficult to navigate the old road and bridge, especially during the winter.

As was customary when the area was first settled, the roadways tended to run alongside the rivers and streams in the area until they came to a place where the water was shallow and the current was slow to allow for fording the river.

Covered bridges were then built at the sites of these old fords and ferries. It wasn't until the advent of the automobile

that these sharp turns in the road became a problem.

When work on the Netcher Road Covered Bridge Began in 1998, the Jefferson Township trustees expressed some concern over the road's closure.

However, work proceeded quickly, with bridge sections that were constructed in West Virginia being brought in to Jefferson Township, where they were assembled. The trusses were hoisted into place in June, with finishing work wrapping up a few weeks later.

Over 100 spectators showed up to witness the bridge's dedication on Aug. 29, 1999.

The Netcher Road Covered Bridge is located at 1544 Netcher Rd. in Jefferson Township.







Spellacy Bridge has ties to Ashtabula County

LOUDONVILLE - Lovers of covered bridges may want to take a drive down to Spellacy Bridge in Holmes County.

Ashtabula County's own John Smolen and the Smolen Engineering firm are the designers of the bridge.

Smolen, a principal engineer at Smolen Engineering and a former Ashtabula County engineer, is responsible for designing the longest (Smolen-Gulf Bridge) and shortest (Liberty Bridge) covered bridges in the United States, as well as more than 200 bridges located in 20 Ohio counties.

The Spellacy Bridge carries traffic across the Mohican River in Loudonville on Wally Road.

Besides the residents of the area, the bridge "is equal-

ly important for the many tourism-based campgrounds and canoeing facilities in and around the Loudonville and Mohican area that rely on that road to bring people to the area," according to reporting from The

Bargain Hunter.

The Spellacy Bridge is 300 feet long, with a width of 24 feet, according to reporting from the Bargain Hunter. Smolen said the bridge has sidewalks on either side of it.

"That was a pretty big project for us." Smolen said.

"They wanted the interior to be illuminated," Grippi said. He said the inside of the bridge will light up with colorchanging LED lights.

Spellacy Bridge opened for traffic in early September.

Grippi called the bridge "another masterpiece" by Smolen.

"He truly is the Johnny Appleseed of covered bridges," Grippi said. The bridge is located at 16325 County Highway 23, Loudonville.

It was originally named Dewey Road Bridge, then renamed after Naomi (Olin) Bottorf and her husband Frank. When it was refurbished in 1981, the redo was courtesy of friends and family, along with Mr. John Smolen, of Smolen Engineering and the Smolen-Gulf Bridge and past Ashtabula County engineer.

Olin's is one of Ashtabula County's 10 antique bridges and one of the 10 that are of lattice construction. The bridge was redone again in 1993, adding louver windows. Visitors and locals found the slats to be distracting, so they were removed shortly thereafter.

Julie (nee Bottorf) Grandbouche is the bridge's current primary caregiver, with the assistance of her 89-year-old Uncle Barry (Bottorf). They have been the bridge's guardians since 2003. The bridge is named after Grandma Olin, who was born in the house to its North in 1900.

Upon her death in 2003, Grandbouche and Bottorf opened a museum at the site. It is filled with a great many treasures, most of which came from Grandma Naomi.

The Olin Bridge crosses the Ashtabula River, named

Erie and Iroquois communities that made their lives on its banks. It translates to "River of Many Fish."

O n e summer day, there were three cars lined up to take advantage of the bridge's piece of na-




Be aware of the "no trespassing signs." The family welcomes visitors, but prefers they stay on public lands.


