James Curnow

American composer James Curnow received a Bachelor of Music degree from Wayne State University and a Master of Music from Michigan State University. He has taught in all areas and levels of instrumental music including the Interlochen Summer Arts Camp, Michigan, the Brevard Music Center, South Carolina, the Bergen, Norway Music Conservatory and the Sydney, Australia Conservatory of Music in band conducting and composer-in-residence.



He has received numerous awards for teaching and composition: the Outstanding Educator of America, the Citation of Excellence from the National Bandmasters Association, the North American Brass Band Presidents Award, the Volkwein Composition Award (two times), the American Bandmasters Association Ostwald Award (two times), the International Competition for Original Compositions for Band and the Coup de Vents Composition Competition of Le Havre, France. He was named Composer of the Year by the Kentucky Music Teachers Association and the National Music Teachers Association. He has most recently received the Alumni Arts Achievement Award from Wayne State University and has received annual ASCAP standard awards since 1979. Curnow has been commissioned to write over four hundred works for concert band, brass band, orchestra, choir and various vocal and instrumental ensembles. His published works now number well over eight hundred. He has over 500 recording credits of his works for various medium. As a conductor, composer and clinician, Curnow has traveled throughout the United States, Canada, Australia, Japan and Europe where his music has received wide acclaim.



Curnow currently resides in Lexington, North
Carolina with his wife Margaret and is a full time
composer of commissions world-wide and
publishes with Hal Leonard Publishing
Corporation/Curnow Music Press, Inc. He also
serves as Composer-in-Residence Emeritus for
Asbury University in Wilmore, Kentucky and served
as the editor of all music publications for The
Salvation Army in Atlanta, Georgia for 31 years.

This Week in Music History



June 13, 1854 - The first U.S. patent for an accordion was issued to Anthony Faas of Philadelphia after Faas made two improvements one to the keyboard and another to enhance the sound.

June 14, 1946 - Nat King Cole records "The Christmas Song" for the first time

June 17, 1967 - Barbra Streisand puts on "A Happening in Central Park" concert for audience of 135,000





June 16, 1980 - Musical comedy film
"The Blues Brothers", starring Dan
Aykroyd and John Belushi, and directed
by John Landis, premieres in Chicago

June 14, 2002 - Mick Jagger became a Sir when he was knighted in the Queen's Birthday Honours. It was claimed that the Queen avoided personally giving Jagger his knighthood because she thought he was an inappropriate candidate for the honor.





Recognized as one of the world's leading low brass performers, teachers, scholars, and authors, Douglas Yeo is lecturer of trombone at Wheaton College (Illinois). He was bass trombonist of the Boston Symphony from 1985-2012 and before coming to Boston, he was a member of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, a free-lance musician in New York City where he was a member of the Goldman Band, and a high school band director.

From 2012-2016 he served as Professor of Trombone at Arizona State University and has also been on the faculties of New England Conservatory of Music, Boston University, and the Peabody Institute of Johns Hopkins University. A graduate of Wheaton College—where he studied trombone with Edward Kleinhammer of the Chicago Symphony—and New York University, he has given trombone masterclasses and performances on five continents and has held residencies around the world including the International Trombone Festival (seven times), the Banff Center (Canada), the Hamamatsu International Wind Instrument Academy and Festival (eight times) and the Nagoya Trombone Festival (Japan), the International Trombone and Tuba Festival (Beijing), and the Dutch Bass Trombone Open (Holland). In the summers of 1974 and 1975, he was a member of the Wheaton Municipal Band and played a solo with the band each year.

In 2014, Douglas Yeo was the recipient of the International Trombone Association's highest honor, the *ITA Award*, given to him "in recognition of his distinguished career and in acknowledgement of his impact on the world of trombone performance." Yeo's website, yeodoug.com, was the first website on the Internet devoted to the trombone and continues to be one of the most influential websites of its kind. His blog, thelasttrombone.com, was launched in 2016.

Douglas Yeo is an International YAMAHA Performing artist and has worked closely with YAMAHA in the design of the YAMAHA 822-G bass trombone and mouthpiece that he plays.
