

Tonight's Saxophone Quartet

Eric Goluszka is a performer in a wide variety of genres, ranging from traditional and modern classical, to jazz, salsa, and an assortment of popular styles. Eric has been a featured soloist with the Buffalo Grove Symphonic Band and the Wheaton Municipal Band, including a performance at the 2017 Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic. He has performed extensively throughout the Midwest United States, Canada, Southern France, Sicily, and Thailand, both as a soloist and as a member of the Chicago Saxophone Quartet, the New Edmonton Wind Sinfonia, Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, and Orquesta Energia Salsa Band. In 2003, Eric received a Bachelor of Music degree with a performance emphasis from the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Alberta, and later received a Master of Music degree from DePaul University.

Vinnie Inendino has been a band director at Schaumburg High School since 2011, where he co-directs four curricular concert bands as well as the marching band and pep band. He is also responsible for directing the top extracurricular jazz ensemble and musical pit orchestra and serves as music department chair. Vinnie previously taught at Clinton Rosette Middle School in DeKalb and served as assistant marching band instructor at DeKalb High School and John Hersey High School. Vinnie received a Bachelor of Music degree in Music Education (magna cum laude) from Northwestern University in 2009. He holds a Master of Education degree in Educational Administration and Leadership from the University of Illinois and a Master of Music degree in Music Education from the University of Michigan.

Bryan Polacek is an active performer and educator in the Chicago area. As an orchestral player, he has performed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. He was a Gold Medalist at the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition and has recordings on the Innova and Capstone labels. As a teacher, his students have won prizes at every major chamber music competition. In 2022, the high school ensemble he coaches, **Incendio Saxophone Trio**, were chosen to be featured performers on the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic.

Adam Hawthorne has had nearly a decade of music teaching experience, having worked as a band director at both the junior high and high school levels and currently teaches privately in the greater Chicagoland area. As a soloist, Adam has performed with the Northern Illinois University Philharmonic as a two time winner of the NIU Concerto Competition, and was one of 40 saxophonists selected to compete in the inaugural International Saxophone Symposium and Competition in 2012. As a chamber musician, Adam performed with the Scion Saxophone Quartet at the NASA Region V Conference in 2013. Adam received his bachelor's degree in Music Education from the University of Illinois, and earned a master's degree in Saxophone Performance from Northern Illinois University.

The Star-Spangled Banner



Francis Scott Key, a Maryland-born attorney with a thriving practice in Washington, D.C., watched the bombardment of Fort McHenry (during the War of 1812) from a ship anchored in Baltimore's harbor.

Key wrote the lyrics to the initial verse of "The Star-Spangled Banner" on the back side of a letter while watching the large American flag waving over the fort that morning. Back in Baltimore, he continued working until he had completed four verses (only one of which is commonly known today).

By November 1814, Key's lyrics had appeared in print for the first time under the name "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Ironically, the melody Key assigned to accompany the lyrics of "The Star-Spangled Banner" was a pre-existing popular English drinking song called "To Anacreon in Heaven."

During the 2^{nd} half of tonight's concert, we will perform a dramatic and distinctive setting of our national anthem that was arranged by John Williams for the pre-game ceremonies of the 2004 Rose Bowl.





William Schultz

Tonight we honor the esteemed career of William Schultz, Fire Chief of the Wheaton Fire Department, as he begins his retirement on July 1st.

Schultz's extensive career in serving the public began as a firefighter for the Country Club Hills Fire Protection District in 1988. In 1991, he became a firefighter/paramedic with the Hazel Crest Department of Fire, Rescue and Inspectional Services, where he was promoted to lieutenant/paramedic and served as inspectional service coordinator.



In 2003, Wheaton hired Schultz as a battalion chief. He was promoted to deputy fire chief and then fire chief in 2013. He assumed additional responsibilities as director of building and code enforcement in 2019. "Having worked with Bill for the past 19 years, I am thankful for his dedication to keeping our community safe," said Wheaton City Manager Michael Dzugan.
