Staff Sergeant Kristin Bowers



Clarinetist Staff Sergeant Kristin Bowers, of Downers Grove, began her service in "The President's Own" United States Marine Band in May of 2017.

Staff Sqt. Bowers started musical training on clarinet at age 10. After graduating in 2002 from Downers Grove North High School, she attended Indiana University in Bloomington where she earned a Bachelor's degree in Clarinet Performance in 2006 and studied with Howard Klug.

In 2008, she earned a Master's degree in Clarinet Performance from Northwestern University in Evanston, and studied with Steve Cohen of Northwestern and Lawrie Bloom of the Chicago Symphony.

Prior to joining "The President's Own," Staff Sgt. Bowers performed with the South Bend Symphony in Indiana and served as principal clarinet in the United States Air Force Band in Washington, D.C., from 2011-17.

Staff Sgt. Bowers performs with the Marine Band and Marine Chamber Orchestra at the White House, in the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area, and across the country during the band's annual concert tour.

Staff Sqt. Bowers was a member of the Wheaton Municipal Band for two seasons, 2009 and 2010.

The Wheaton Municipal Band

Founded in 1930 with only 19 musicians, the Wheaton Municipal Band, with the financial support of the City of Wheaton, Illinois, has grown into one of the finest organizations of its type in existence today. The dynamic leadership and vision of Music Director Bruce Moss, coupled with the tremendous support from the City of Wheaton, the Municipal Band Commission, the Board of Directors and the Friends of the Wheaton Municipal Band, has brought the band national and international recognition. The band has often been featured in newspapers and magazines, including the Chicago Tribune, the Daily Herald, and the Instrumentalist. The ensemble has also been highlighted in several television programs, including "Two on Two", produced by WBBM-TV, and several cable vision programs.

The band was featured with the U.S. Marine Band, The Blossom Festival Band, and the Allentown (Pa.) Band in a documentary on the life of John Philip Sousa. "If You Knew Sousa" was produced by WGBH-TV in Boston, for the PBS series, The American Experience," and has been distributed internationally.

In December 2012, the band performed at the prestigious Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago. The high honor of being invited to perform at the Midwest Clinic followed a rigorous application and audition process. The band was selected once again in 2017, becoming the first band of its kind to be selected twice to perform. In addition, the band has performed at the Petrillo Music Shell in Chicago's Grant Park and at the national convention of the American School Band Director's Association. Prominent guests performing with the ensemble have included members of the Chicago, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Toledo, and Honolulu symphony orchestras as well as conductors and soloists from the Washington, D.C. military bands and major universities throughout the country.

The Wheaton Municipal Band performs a series of Thursday night concerts for thousands each summer in Wheaton's beautiful downtown Memorial Park. These band concerts have become treasured events for families in communities reaching throughout the Chicago suburbs.

Dr. Tony Payne, Associate Professor of Music, Director of Arts Events
Management at the Wheaton College
Conservatory of Music, General
Manager of the Wheaton College Artist
Series, is also the founder of several
global and experiential learning
programs.

As General Manager of the Artist Series for nearly 40 years, he has brought some of the world's greatest artists to the campus. He holds degrees in music composition from Wheaton College, Bowling Green State University, and a Doctor of Music degree in composition from Northwestern University School of Music.

Tony Payne has taught many courses during his long tenure at the Conservatory and served the Chapel Program as organist and pianist as well. As a lifelong contributor to Christian worship, he has composed and published over 100 psalms, hymns and spiritual songs. He is also a songwriter on a wide array of themes.

Dr. Payne has played the piano since elementary school and synthesizers since graduate school during Bowling Green State University days. Since middle school days, Tony Payne was fascinated by the organ and organ playing was never far from his mind or his professional activity. He has a special love for theater, pipe and digital organs, the American Gospel song, and the music of composer Emma Lou Diemer. He considers it an unusual privilege to be performing with the Wheaton Municipal Band and its renowned conductor, Dr. Bruce Moss.

The Edman Schantz Organ

Wheaton College has a wide range of organs for practice and performance, including the spectacular Casavant organ in Edman Chapel, which Dr. Payne helped to bring to inception. Comprising 50 stops and 70 ranks, four manuals and pedal, mechanical key action with electric stop action, plus double consoles, the organ is the largest of its type in the metropolitan area, and singular among colleges and universities across the nation. Dr. Payne will be playing the electric four manual console on the chapel floor.
