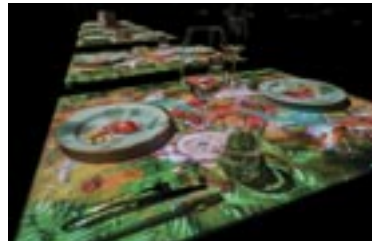

fun! Music truly is a universal language, with a magical ability to move our senses and touch the deepest parts of our hearts. It's one of the most beautiful ways to carry and celebrate our culture throughout time. Best of all, it's enjoyable for everyone—whether you're singing, dancing, or simply listening and sharing the moment.

Cyril Pahinui was, in his own right, one of Hawai'i's most talented guitarists and singers. He started the Waimānalo Kanikapila in 2007 to honor his late father. Cyril and his wife, Chelle, honored Cyril's dad by throwing a party in classic Gabby style. The thousands of fans who enjoy the free music day at the beach park are the fruits of their hard work. Musicians perform solo or with their usual bands. Then someone might say, "Hey, we are short a guitar player," and in the time it takes to tune up, someone jumps in, and a new group forms. This concert feels like a time machine to Hawai'i's music. Cyril and Chelle Pahinui started the festival to honor Gabby, keeping the backyard-style kanikapila alive with musicians who play for love and a plate lunch. "They jam and stay all day," Chelle Pahinui says. She says the musicians are very accessible for photos or music questions, with answers coming from half a dozen of their music heroes.

The Gabby Pahinui Waimānalo Kanikapila isn't like a typical concert lineup where only a few "headliners" perform — it's more of a who's-who jam session featuring Hawaiian music legends, both past and present. That said, some truly iconic names have been part of its history (either at the festival itself or the original backyard kanikapila that inspired it).

The event is inspired by the joyful gatherings from Cyril's childhood—weekends spent with music and good company at his family's home on Bell Street in Waimānalo—the festival continues to uphold that warm tradition all these years later.

In Cyril's own words, he once shared, "I started playing music from the time I could hold an ukulele, began learning slack key at age seven, and performed on stage for the first time when I was 12. I grew up with four sisters and five brothers, and we all learned music in the traditional way, by listening and watching my dad and other musicians. In those days, we didn't get music lessons, and most of the musicians I knew didn't read music. Most of the techniques were considered secret and not shared outside the family or music community. We really had to work hard to learn. My dad would slack all of his strings and hide his guitar in the closet at night because he knew we would sneak in to try and figure out his tunings once he was asleep. He could always tell when someone had been in his guitar case. That was the style in the old days; if you really wanted to learn,

you had to listen. Once I began to learn, I would get up at 4:00 in the morning and make my dad breakfast so that he would spend time with me before leaving for his job—just me, one-on-one with my dad. When he had shared something new, he would expect me to practice, and the next time I played, I could tell he was listening to see if I had mastered it. Then he would share something else. My dad and his many musician friends always encouraged [us] to participate and to add something to the music. When I was 15, my dad invited me to join The Gabby Band. One day he just asked me, "Son, would you like to earn a little money?" For me that was like receiving a Grammy—just to know that he recognized my commitment and considered me to be on his level. I also think that was the day that I knew I would continue my music"

In that spirit, the event welcomes some of the island's best musicians and thousands of fans, offering unforgettable performances and lively all-star jams by some of Hawai'i's finest musicians, all taking place in the beautiful park right next to Waimānalo Beach. Cyril's passion for keeping the festival alive shines through to this day through the extraordinary efforts of his widow, Chelle, who works tirelessly to preserve the festival and his dream—creating a uniquely local event that welcomes everyone and offers an experience unlike any other for our visitors.

Plate lunch, shave ice, and cultural booths are plentiful. The talent line-up used to be up



to a hundred names long. The list always includes dozens of Na Hoku Hanohano Award winners. Cyril used to say, "the only musicians not playing have a gig somewhere else, usually out of state." Over the years, some of the greatest names in music would show up at this event. We're talking Palani Vaughan, Sonny Chillingworth, and Peter Moon as just a few examples. These weren't just casual musicians; they were key figures in Hawaiian music, and their influence significantly contributes to the cultural importance of Kanikapila. This year, a few of the names include Pomaika'i Keawe, Alan Akaka, Eric Keawe, Henry Kaponu, Maile Lyman, Kawika Kahiapo, Jerry Santos, George Kuo, Bobby Igano, Kata Maduli, and more.

The event is free and open to the public, and supported by T-shirt sales. Be sure to grab one of their collectible T-shirts. The sales of these T-shirts have helped support the festival since day one. For those who cannot get to the beach park, you can buy the shirts online at CyrilPahinui.com.

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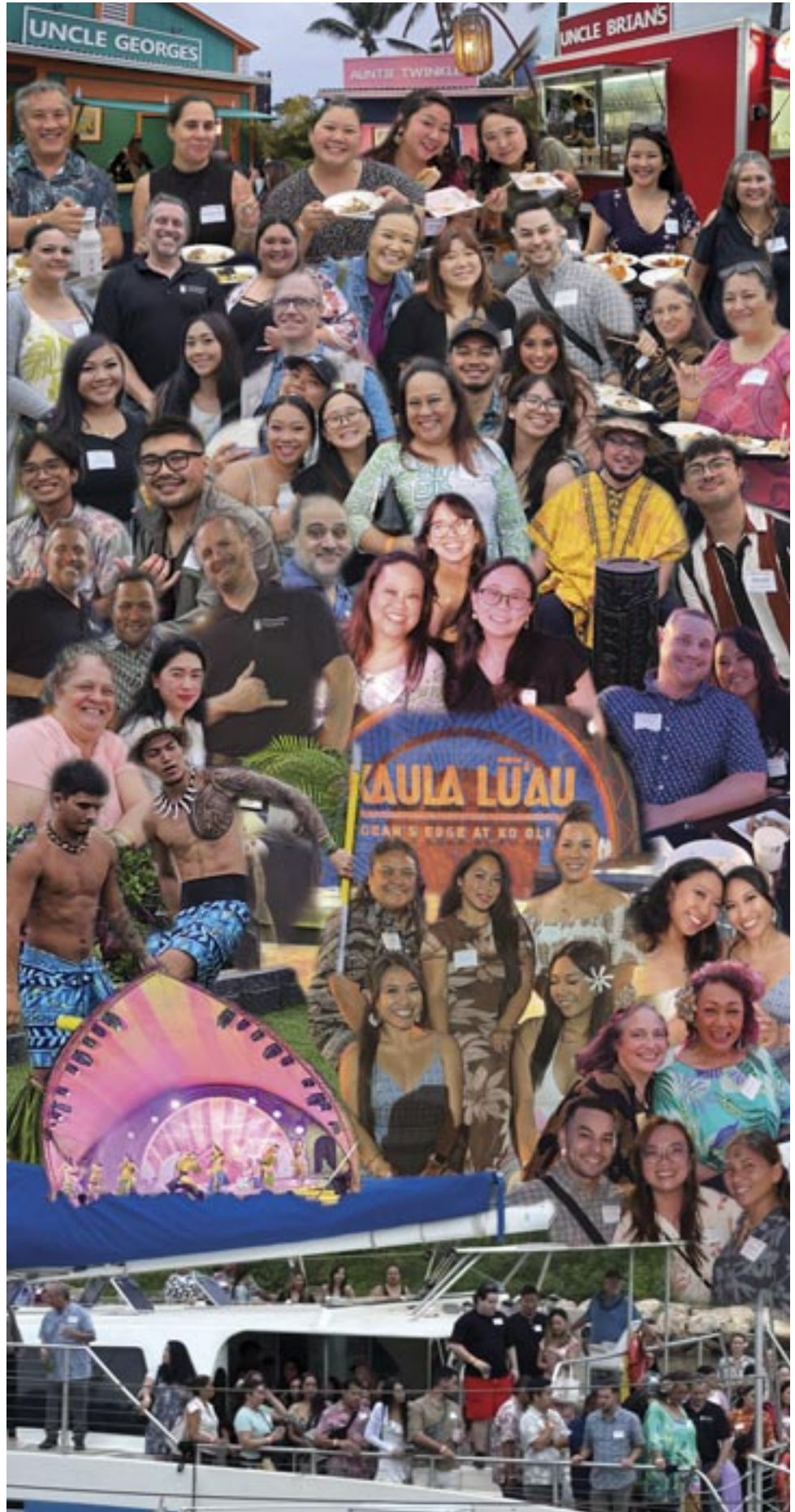

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A Sneak Peek at May Day Events

Although it's still April, I figured it might be a good idea to give you all a sneak peek of what's taking place on May 1st so you can plan accordingly.

Back in the 1920s in Honolulu, life in Hawai'i was beginning to change. More visitors arrived, new influences emerged, and the city grew busier. Amidst these changes, people started wondering—how can we preserve what makes Hawai'i Hawai'i? One person contemplating this was writer Don Blanding. He adored the islands—the colors, music, and especially the lei. To him, a lei was more than just flowers; it was a way to say “welcome,” “I love you,” or even “goodbye”—without words. One day, he came up with a simple idea: what if there was a special day just for the lei? This idea reached his co-worker, Grace Tower Warren, who was passionate about preserving Hawaiian traditions. She loved the concept and added her touch, creating the phrase: “May Day is Lei Day in Hawai'i.” Together, they came up with the idea of honoring the tradition of the lei, which they thought was in decline, and a new tradition was born.

Lei Day was first observed on May 1, 1928. Participants wore beautiful flower leis made from plumeria and pikake. The event featured music, hula, laughter, and a strong community spirit. It was an informal celebration filled with joy and aloha. The festival also had a lei competition, where leis were judged on the proper use of flowers and colors representing the islands.

Ever since this inaugural lei competition in 1928, May Day in Hawai'i has been synonymous with Lei Day. It is our unique and special way to celebrate our shared traditions, as memorialized in song, and everyone took a moment to honor their culture.

Today, May Day celebrations in Hawai'i blend traditional Hawaiian symbols with modern pageantry. This year, as you plan to celebrate this special day, we're giving you advance notice of some events taking place on the 1st.

The **98th Annual Lei Day** kicks off as Mayor Blangiardi, the Honolulu Department of Parks and Recreation, and the Lei Court welcome everyone to take part in the 98th Annual Lei Day Celebration at Kapi'olani Park near the Bandstand from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. This free celebration perpetuates Hawaiian culture and one of the most recognized symbols of aloha – the lei. Nearing 100 years of celebration,

this tradition showcases the skill and artistry of Hawai'i's lei makers, while featuring performances from local entertainers, hula hālau, as well as food, craft, and lei vendors. The event is sponsored by Hawai'i Tourism Authority and the support of Kilohana by CNHA.

Be sure to visit the Lei Contest Exhibit, which features some of the world's most exquisite, handcrafted leis in a variety of materials, colors, and styles. Those wishing to enter fresh flower leis in the contest must submit them between 7:30 a.m. and 9 a.m. at the Lei Receiving Booth on the day of the event. The public can view the exhibit from 1 p.m. to 4:45 p.m., after the lei judging and the official opening by the Lei Court. The celebration also includes the sweet sounds of the Hawaiian Steel Guitar, as performers in the Lei Exhibit area play area, along with lei-making activities (while flowers and supplies last) from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Music has always been as big of a part of Lei Day as the lei themselves. In 1977, the iconic annual concert began at the Waikīkī Shell. COVID threw a wrench in

things before the concert was reimaged at the Bishop Museum. But this year, **Beneath the Hawaiian Skies** brings the music back to the Waikiki Shell. On Friday, May 1, 2026, starting at 7 p.m., the Tom Moffatt Waikiki Shell will host a special evening filled with beautiful Hawaiian music and hula dancing. Celebrate May Day with fantastic performances by KUmZ, the musical group led by Kumu Hula Karl Veto Baker & Michael Lanakila Casupang. The name comes from a modern slang term for “Kumu,” which their students used to address them, and the group was named Group of the Year at the Na Hoku Hanohano Awards. The all-star group will be joined by Ikaika Blackburn, Natalie Ai & Iolani Kamau'u, Mālie Lyman, and Hālau I Ka Wēkiu, all of whom are past Merrie Monarch winners. Attendees are encouraged to ‘wear a lei, make a lei, and give a lei,’ continuing a timeless May Day tradition of mele, hula, and the spirit of aloha. Doors open at 5:30 p.m., and the concert begins at 7 p.m. Tickets range from \$30 to \$50. For more information or to buy tickets, visit maydayinwaikiki.com.

Chef's Corner

Favorite Son Executive Chef Justus Keliehor

A family man with five keiki, Chef Justus Keliehor is originally from the East Coast. His culinary journey began early at his uncle's restaurant in Maine, where he learned the importance of hard work washing dishes. Sixteen years ago, he moved from the Rocky Mountains in Colorado to O'ahu, immersing himself in Hawaii's diverse kitchens and discovering the islands' rich local flavors and ingredients. Throughout his career, he has led the culinary teams at Basalt Waikiki, Hideout at The Laylow, and the Ritz-Carlton Turtle Bay. He loves to hike, go to the beach, or golf when he's off duty.

What is your first childhood food memory?

I loved staying at my grandmother's house. She'd always make the biggest, fluffiest Belgian waffles!

When did you know you wanted to be a chef?

Probably once I moved up from washing dishes and started cooking full-time.

Where did you get your training?

I attended the Culinary Institute of the Pacific at Kapiolani Community College.

Who would you consider your mentor?

Chef Keith Kong, whom I worked with at Basalt, is someone I credit with my leadership style.

Describe your style of cooking.

My cooking is influenced by local flavors and ingredients, but growing up in Colorado, I tend to favor Midwest American styles and blend those together.

Where do you find your culinary inspiration?

For me, it's about discovering and working with new products, as well as being able to teach my team and help them grow.

I hear you really, really, love pork. Why?

I worked with an amazing couple who ran a local hog farm, the Shinsato's. Watching their care and farming style really opened my eyes. And it's delicious.

What first brought you to Hawaii 16 years ago?

I came with a few friends looking for a change of pace from the cold and mountains.

How was the transition?

It was a lot of hard work at first, since I had never been here before, but luckily I found the right job and met the right people.

What do you miss most about the mainland?

I do miss the snow, but not the cold that comes with it. That, and taking long road trips.

What did you take from your previous jobs?

I've learned many valuable lessons. In my early cooking jobs, it was all about the food and technique. Later, during my time at Basalt and The Laylow, I learned about leadership and running a business.

What do you plan to do to the menu?

We're aiming to align with the name Favorite Son which is a nod to the famous Watermen of Waikiki and Hawaii and to adopt a more island/local style.

What's your favorite dish on the menu?

When we put our new menu out it will definitely be the Bubu Arare Crusted Ahi Sandwich.

What do you plan to do first over there?

I'll be looking to get the menu right at Favorite Son and creating a space where locals and visitors alike can come and enjoy food that is both familiar and exciting!

What are you most excited about there?

The potential of the restaurant and hotel really excites me. We have a great team, and we're preparing to accomplish great things!

What one thing about working as a chef that people would be surprised to learn?

I'd say it becomes less about the food at a certain point and more about being a great leader.

What do you like to do when not working?

Spend time with my kids.

Do you cook anything at home that you don't cook at work?

It's definitely a lot easier to do home cooking with a big family, but I also love to grill and smoke meats.

What's your favorite restaurant to go to?

Depends on the occasion, but there's a ton of good izakayas here & I always love Miro Kaimuki.

Directions: Season the fish with Kosher Salt and Togarashi, then crust with Bubu Arare, a Japanese Rice Cracker. In a nonstick pan on high heat quickly sear the 2 larger sides of fish, leaving the middle still raw. Toast the brioche bun and then spread the avocado puree on the inside of both buns.

To make the avocado puree: place the avocados, lime, Sriracha, Kosher Salt & Garlic in the processor and blend until smooth. On the bottom bun place the dressed arugula and slice tomatoes. Place the seared ahi on the arugula and then place the top bun, enjoy!
