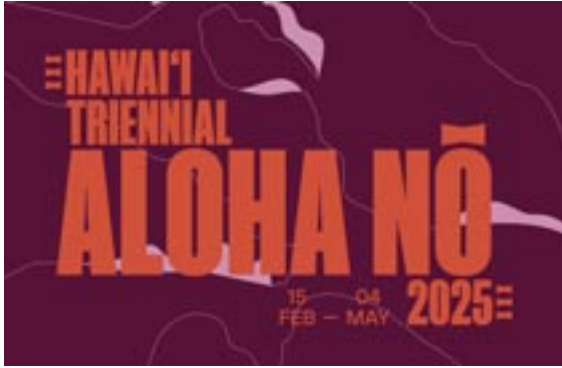

Featuring the work of nearly 50 artists and art collectives across multiple sites on three islands, Hawai'i Triennial 2025 (HT25) is the state's largest thematic exhibition of contemporary art from Hawai'i, the Pacific, and beyond. Every three years, Hawai'i Contemporary presents the Triennial across museums, galleries, and outdoor and unconventional art spaces and offers a complementary program of public engagements. Entitled ALOHA NŌ, HT25 invites visitors to reconsider their notions and preconceptions of Aloha and aims to foster dialogue about the intersection of art, culture, and place.

HT25 is a large-scale exhibition of artistic works that explores local-global dialogues through a Hawai'i-and Pacific-focused lens. Founded in 2015 as a dedicated contemporary art platform in Hawai'i, the Honolulu Biennial Foundation debuted the inaugural Honolulu Biennial in 2017. The exhibition proved to be a great success, and it, along with a successive Honolulu Biennial in 2019, welcomed a combined 200,000 guests from Hawai'i, the US, and abroad. The 2020 iteration introduced the idea of blending traditional Hawaiian culture with contemporary art practices, addressing themes like climate change, indigenous rights, and the impact of tourism on local communities. In 2020, they also announced that they would transform their signature event into a triennial. They renamed themselves Hawai'i Contemporary to reflect their aspiration to include all Hawaiian Islands in their activities.

Designed to bring global attention to the unique cultural and artistic voices of

the Pacific Islands, the Hawai'i Triennial also makes use of public spaces, allowing for a broader engagement with the local community. The Triennial also serves as a cultural gathering for artists, curators, and art lovers from around the world. Now in its fourth iteration, HT25 is the largest periodic exhibition of contemporary art in Hawai'i, involving dozens of artists, key venues, and organizational partners. It also marks the exhibition's first expansion beyond the island of O'ahu. Opening February 15, HT25 will be on display for 78 days across three islands, art spaces, and public places across O'ahu, Maui, and Hawai'i Island. Collaborating exhibition sites and/or programming include Bishop Museum, Capitol Modern (formerly Hawai'i State Art Museum; Foster Botanical Garden, Hō'ikea'kea Gallery at Leeward Community College, and the Honolulu Museum of Art.

Audiences can get a preview of HT25 on Valentine's Day at Bishop Museum's After Hours event, which features hands-on cultural workshops, kids activities, food vendors, and more. HT25 officially opens the next day, February 15, across all sites on O'ahu with a daytime event at Capitol Modern, formerly known as the Hawai'i State Art Museum, and an evening celebration at HT25 HUB at Davies Pacific Center.

"We're excited to kick off Hawai'i Triennial 2025 at Capitol Modern," said Karen Ewald, executive director of Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, which oversees Capitol Modern. "The Triennial is an integral part of our visual arts community. The exhibition

The Return of Kapaemahu debuts in Waikiki



The Return of Kapaemahu, a new free hula show at the Kuhio Hula mound every Wednesday at 6:30pm

Lei Pua 'Ala Queer Histories of Hawai'i proudly announces the first-ever hula show to share the long-hidden story of The Healer Stones of Kapaemahu – a unique monument to healing and inclusion all but unknown to the millions of visitors and residents who pass by the sacred site in Waikiki. The show brings Hawai'i's historic reverence for mähū alive in a free weekly performance on the Kūhiō Beach hula mound, steps from the stones that honor four legendary voyagers who brought the healing arts from Tahiti to Hawai'i long ago.

Composed and directed by Kumu Patrick Makuakāne, well known for his innovative contemporary choreography grounded in the fundamentals of traditional hula, "The Return of Kapaemahu" will bring the legendary story alive in a unique style incorporating modern music to provide new dimensions to the story's poetic message, as relevant today as centuries past. 

There are so many great things about living in Hawaii, but whale season is definitely one of the highlights. Whale season in Hawaii typically runs from mid-December to mid-April, with the peak activity occurring between January and March. Humpback whales migrate from their feeding grounds in Alaska to the warm waters surrounding the Hawaiian Islands each winter to breed, give birth, and nurse their young in the warm waters surrounding the Hawaiian Islands. This journey is particularly remarkable due to its vast distance and the whales' reliance on specific environmental cues for navigation. The migration from Alaska to Hawaii is one of the longest migrations made by any mammal, spanning approximately 3,000 miles. Humpback whales generally leave their feeding grounds in Alaska around late fall or early winter and head toward the warmer waters of Hawaii. Although the first whale sightings of the year pop up off Maui in late September, most don't arrive in Hawaii until January or February and remain until about April or May, making February one of the best months to get out there and whale watch.

During the winter months in Hawaii, humpback whales engage in courtship behaviors, and males often compete for the attention of females. Female humpback whales give birth to a single calf every two to three years. Calves are born in the warm waters of Hawaii, where they will stay with their mothers for several months. A calf can grow rapidly, gaining up to 100 pounds per day on its mother's rich milk. The islands' sheltered waters allow for safe calving, and the warm waters are a sanctuary for the calves, especially vulnerable during their early months. This makes Hawaii one of

humpback whales' most important breeding and calving destinations. In 1992, recognizing the need to increase the protection of these endangered mammals, the federal government designated these waters a marine sanctuary to help protect the whales and their habitat in the Islands, making our waters an important part of the North Pacific Humpback Whale Sanctuary, protecting the migratory paths and calving areas of these whales.

Remember, guests can see whales from all over the island, not just from an official whale watch. Be sure to tell your guests to keep their eyes open when they are in their room, while they're on the beach, or hiking, to name a few. During the next few months, the beach catamarans turn into whale watches just by the nature of the time of year, although you won't find a guarantee onboard.

If you are looking for an official whale watch, all the usual suspects are in play, offering breathtaking views up close and personal of these magnificent creatures as they breach and spout. Many of them offer guaranteed whale sightings as part of the price. It's an easy pitch because it does not happen often. But, if for any reason, your naturalist does not find a whale during your whale watch, guests will receive a free return voucher to go out again. Please note cash refunds are not an option, so be sure to schedule your whale watch with enough time left on the island to go again if necessary.

February is usually the best month to see whales around O'ahu, so keep your eyes open to glimpse these gentle giants wherever you go. Here's a list of a few companies that can help your guests take advantage of this fantastic opportunity the whales give us each year.

The other day, I saw whales heading down the ocean-facing elevator at the Ilikai. Whale season really is one of the good things about living in Hawaii, and it would be a shame if you didn't take advantage of it.

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The Republik

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brings together local and global artists and welcomes audiences from across our Islands and around the world for meaningful exchanges and impactful experiences around contemporary art."

Inspired by the unique histories of Hawai'i as a gathering place for diverse peoples, cultures, and ideas, Hawai'i Contemporary connects communities from across our islands and the regions united by the Pacific Ocean through contemporary art. HT25 will offer dozens of free public programs throughout the exhibition, including curator- and docent-led gallery tours, artist conversations, film screenings and discussions, hands-on workshops, poetry and arts writing workshops, and performances. These programs were created in collaboration with artists, scholars, and Hawai'i-based communities to engage with audiences of all ages.

For example, in a talk with HT25 artist Kahi Ching, audiences will hear him elaborate on his art practice of 'umeke lā'au, which integrates endemic and invasive Hawaiian plants with an informal approach to traditional Japanese bonsai through a lens of Native Hawaiian culture

to create his living sculptures. Vietnamese art collective Art Labor's Jua Soundscape (Jrai communities) will be constructed using 'aho kaula, a Hawaiian lashing technique taught as a hands-on community workshop.

The Honolulu Museum of Art has been a participating venue since the Triennial debuted. This year the museum hosts the work of eight Hawai'i Triennial artists whose practices are formed out of Indigenous heritages and strong matrilineal connections. Seven new artworks and a recently produced film contemplate the notion of womanhood as a journey of vulnerability and resiliency, tenderness and strength.

After a nearly year-long process of research and collaboration, the curators of HT25 arrived at the title and theme of ALOHA NŌ. "Aloha is a Hawaiian philosophy and way of life," their release explains. "Aloha is an action that embodies a profound love and truth-telling, a practice that has been kept and cared for by the people of Hawai'i for generations. By collapsing two seemingly opposite meanings, "no" in English with "nō," an intensifier, in 'ōlelo Hawaiian, ALOHA NŌ seeks to reclaim Aloha as an active cultural practice and situate it as a transformative power collectively

enacted through contemporary art. HT25 will challenge commonly held notions of Aloha and reframe it as a way of life, an action that embodies profound love and truth-telling, and a beloved practice that has been kept and cared for by the people of Hawai'i for generations."

While specific to Hawaiian and Pacific environments, ALOHA NŌ resonates across other cultures and geographies, especially sovereign lands with similar histories and struggles against colonial occupation and capitalist violence.

"This past year was profoundly painful for so many of us — locally, nationally, and globally," said Noelle M.K.Y. Kahanu, one of the three HT25 curators. "As we thought about the role of contemporary art and the Hawai'i Triennial, we kept returning to the notion of Aloha as a means of conversing about healing, solidarity, and shared humanity. ALOHA NŌ allows us to process grief, emerge whole, and be ready to love anew."

"Through the framing of ALOHA NŌ, the next iteration of the Hawai'i Triennial will explore universal themes through the cultural specificity of place," said Rosina Potter, executive director of Hawai'i Contemporary. "We are energized by the collaborative work of the exhibition and inspired by the connections and partnerships we've forged across our local and Pacific communities." ALOHA NŌ is a call to know, an invitation to form new understandings of love as acts of care, resistance, solidarity, and transformation.

The undercurrent of these programs is rooted in healing through community engagement, bringing people together to create, learn, and conversely, as a reminder that we are not alone in a world increasingly strained by wars and climate crises. These gatherings aim to foster mutual understanding, offering a space to collectively rebuild from the fragmentation and destruction that permeate both metaphorical and literal landscapes.

"Since its inception, Hawai'i Contemporary has been envisioned as a platform of discourse, sharing of ideas, and learning," said Rosina Potter, executive director of Hawai'i Contemporary. "We're thrilled that, on the occasion of Hawai'i Triennial 2025, we can offer rich and diverse public programs that invite us to be present and share our Aloha through conversation, listening, and doing. The Return of Kapaemahu

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"Hula Groovy." It's rooted in classical hula, but there's a groove to the soundtrack, a pulse that gives the show something fresh and different.

But what is the story of the Healer Stones of Kapaemahu? Now is the perfect time to read the story yourself.

Long ago, four extraordinary individuals voyaged across the ocean from their home in Tahiti to Hawaii. They settled at Ulukou in Waikiki. The visitors were tall and deep in voice yet gentle and soft-spoken. They were not male or female. They were mähū—a mixture of both in mind, heart, and spirit. Indeed, the leader of the group was named Kapaemahu.

The gods favored the four visitors with skills in the science of healing. Kapuni possessed great spiritual power, Kinohi was all-seeing, Kahaloa could heal from afar, and Kapaemahu healed by laying on hands. They bequeathed their healing wisdom to the people of these islands. When the healers had completed their work, the people wished to express gratitude for their wondrous cures by creating a monument in their honor.

One moonless night, they gathered at Kaimuki, an area famous for its bell rock. They moved four great boulders all the way to Waikiki. As the sun rose, the healers began to transfer their powers to the stones, placing idols of mähū under each one. The ceremonies lasted a full moon. Then, knowing that their healing power was safe in the stones, the mähū vanished. The stones remained a sacred site for centuries. But, as the tides of time passed, everything changed. The stones of Kapaemahu were forgotten, even buried under a bowling alley.

The stones have since been recovered, but their history is still being suppressed, and the fact that the healers were mähū has been erased from the story of Kapaemahu. It's a great loss, a deep shame, for only when you understand the true history of these stones shall you behold their living power.

~ The telling of this mo'olelo is based on the handwritten manuscript of a story conveyed by James Aalapuna Harbottle Boyd, a colonel of the Hawaiian Kingdom and confidante of Queen Liliuokalani, to Thomas Thrum, publisher of the Hawaiian Almanac, and published in 1907.



The Return of Kapaemahu hula show is unique in that the four legendary stones it tells the story of are located just a few feet away from the hula mound. After the show, visitors can stroll over and feel the mana for themselves. These legendary boulders have been in the same spot for centuries, but only now is their full story available to everyone.

Kumu Patrick, who last year became the first Native Hawaiian recipient of the prestigious MacArthur Foundation Genius Award, is joined by a cast of Kānaka Maoli hula performers that spans generations, dance styles, and identities.

Inspired by Kapaemahu, the Oscar-shortlisted animated short film by Dean Hamer, Joe Wilson, and Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu, *The Return of Kapaemahu* is a production of Lei Pua 'Ala *Queer Histories of Hawai'i*, a new multi-dimensional project to illuminate and honor more expansive histories of gender and sexual diversity across the multicultural landscape of the islands.

"Through our work on Kapaemahu over the past ten years, we've seen how empowering it can be for people who have been marginalized and erased for so long to finally be able to see themselves reflected and valued in the life and culture of their community," said Lei Pua' Ala co-director Wilson.

"This extraordinary production by Kumu Patrick is a great example of visitor entertainment that's enjoyable, culturally meaningful, educational, and impactful. And because it is free to the public, it is a wonderful addition to the resurgence of Hawaiian cultural programs now helping to reshape the visitor experience in Waikiki," added co-director Hamer.

The free, one-hour show premiered last month, and will be performed every Wednesday from 6:30 - 7:30 p.m. throughout 2025.

Margotto Hawaii Executive Chef Shiori Okuya

Prior to moving to Hawaii, Shiori Okuya worked as the Sous Chef at Margotto e Baciare, in Tokyo for about five years. Trained in upscale Japanese omakase, she also has a mastery in French, Italian and Chinese culinary styles. Okuya started in her new role as Executive Chef in June, taking the reigns from Yohei Yagishita, who returned to Japan for personal reasons, and will work under the guidance of Group Executive Chef Kenta Kayama. Her influence on the menu is already noticeable.

What is your first childhood food memory?
Family gatherings to enjoy sukiyaki together.

What attracted you to the culinary field?
When I helped my mom with cooking, I tried to copy her, but the taste was completely different. I started wondering why and wanted to learn how to make it taste as good as hers, so I began studying.

What was your first job in the industry?

Tell us about one dish that you remember and why you remember it.
Cauliflower Soup. I was so happy because it was the first dish I made that was added to the restaurant's menu.

Where did you get your training?
Various restaurants in Nagoya, Kyoto, and Tokyo. Italian, Japanese cuisine, French, kushikatsu (deep-fried skewers), and other types of cuisine.

Favorite ingredient you like to work with?
Citrus fruits. It's a versatile ingredient that can be used in everything from appetizers to desserts, depending on how it's prepared.

How would you describe your cooking style?
Japanese, Italian, and French cuisine.

How did you get involved with truffles?
I was drawn to the concept of Margotto in Tokyo, which focuses on truffles without being tied to a specific cuisine. The style feels fresh and innovative. What I value the most is the aroma. I

always strive to create dishes that not only highlight the fragrance of high-quality truffles but also elevate it to the next level.

What plans do you have for the menu?
The menu with a focus on Hawaiian ingredients while also keeping Japan's seasonal changes in mind. In addition to our signature dishes, I plan to continuously introduce new items each month featuring the next level.

Had you visited the islands before moving here last year?
Yes, I had come to Oahu before as a traveler.

Now that you're in Hawaii, what do you like best about it?
The calm atmosphere and pleasant climate make it a perfect place to refresh the mind.

What do you do on your days off?
I practice yoga. I love it very much.

Name your favorite restaurant in town you like to go to when not working?
Pho TO Chau Restaurant

What's new at the restaurant?
We've introduced our new affordable, wine bar concept. Margotto Wine Bar, an eight-seat counter at the entrance of the restaurant, opened in July. The bar offers caviar, cheese, prosciutto with breadsticks, pate, wagyu tartare, pasta, truffle fries, foie gras risotto and curry rice, paired with wine by the glass or bottle. With the goal to make Shiori's cuisine more accessible to people seeking some light bites for a pau hana session or a late-night snack to conclude their evening, the wine bar dishes range in price from \$12 to \$200.

Punahou Carnival 2025

The annual funfest returns February 7-8

It's that time of year again. The campus at the corner of Punahou and Wilder fills up with big white, blue, and yellow tents, excitement, and rides that turn the stomach of any sane adult and thrill the heart of anyone under 20. It is the annual Punahou School Carnival.



Hundreds of volunteer parents and an entire campus of kids have been working since last summer to make money for the school and fun for everyone. Bring your umbrella. The Carnival is known for being rained on.

Those delectable malasadas, hot from the fryer, begin with 4,000 pounds of sugar to make some of the most mouth-watering malasadas you'll ever taste. They absolutely rival Leonards. Thousands of these "donut-like" delights are scooped out of the boiling oil, rolled in the secret sugar, put into brown paper bags, and served to you piping hot. Be prepared; the lines can be endless. The trick is to take friends to stand in the "3-only" line. Three friends, that's 9 of the sweet-hot treats. If you're like most, plan on more than one trip.

Fresh malasadas, mango chutney, local food favorites, kiddie games, rides, an Art Gallery with an online jewelry sale, a Silent Auction, and White Elephant treasures continue to be staples of the event. The Carnival will also feature a variety of family-friendly kiddie rides from E.K. Fernandez and Punahou's games.

The Art Gallery is a highlight of the Punahou Carnival. Planned by the Junior Class of 2026, this year's Carnival theme is "Pā'ina Paniolo: A Country Carnival." Sales from each art piece will support Punahou Carnival's fundraising efforts for student financial aid, with proceeds evenly shared between the artists and Punahou.

This year, the Punahou Carnival will take place on February 7th and 8th, from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m., on the campus of Honolulu's noted private school. Expect thrilling rides, classic carnival games, and mouth-watering treats—all set against the backdrop of a country paradise.

Entrance is free, but all the rides and games require scrip that is available to

be purchased throughout the Carnival. The bargains are fantastic. The Carnival Art Gallery features the art of some of Hawaii's top-selling artists. 50% of all sales benefit the school. Tons of gifts can be found at the White Elephant tent, and the plant sale is always a huge hit.

The Variety Show, starring the entire senior class, showcases the student's talent and is always quite entertaining. Arrive by cab or bus. Parking is difficult at best.

Aside from those malasadas, steamed corn that melts on the cob, homemade Portuguese Bean Soup, teri beef sticks, and lunch or dinner at the Hawaiian Plate pavilion, where you can find some of the best local grinds and performances by local artists, are also on the "don't miss" list.

Beyond the malasadas, shoppers flock to the Carnival to restock their jars of the prized Lilikoi Butter and Mango Chutney. The chutney is iconic, with many considering the mango chutney sold at the Punahou Carnival to be the best chutney in the world. The chutney is so popular, it usually sells out in a few hours, or at most by the end of the first day. Want to be sure to grab a few jars? Your best bet is to get in line about an hour before the 'official' Friday opening of 11 a.m. The jars are packed in boxes of six, making it easy for your guests to take them home as the ultimate gift from the islands.

Admission to the Punahou Carnival is free, but scrip is needed to buy things throughout the day. Purchase scrip throughout the Carnival grounds with credit or debit cards, and cash payments will be accepted at the Dillingham Hall Box Office. Street parking is available, as is paid parking at neighboring community institutions. The student-run package booth, open until Carnival closes, is a good spot to check in the heavy stuff, and hopefully that umbrella.

Proceeds from the event will support Punahou School's need-based financial aid program, benefiting nearly 700 students. For more information, head to punahoucarnival.com.
