The theme of this year's festival, FEAST, highlights the essential connection between Food, Education, Agriculture, Sustainability, and Tourism—the core values that define the event and embody the spirit of Hawaii. The Festival is also launching the FEAST Summit, a premier professional development event for industry leaders and changemakers in food, education, agriculture, sustainability, and tourism. With so many exciting events and opportunities, there's truly something for everyone to enjoy at this year's event.

Experience the rich flavors, diverse cultures, and captivating stories that make Hawai'i a standout culinary destination at #HFWF25. By connecting chefs with local farmers, ranchers, and fishermen, HFWF honors the islands' rich agricultural heritage while driving \$26.5 million in visitor spending and raising more than \$5 million to support culinary education, sustainability, cultural preservation, and relief for restaurant and hospitality workers in times of need.

Founded in 2011 by acclaimed chefs Roy Yamaguchi and Alan Wong, both James Beard Award winners, HFWF is Hawaii's largest food and wine festival. The event showcases the state's agricultural abundance and culinary expertise through interactive dining highlight experiences that ingredients and chefs. For 15 years, HFWF has combined culinary mastery, cultural exchange, and industry innovation.

#HFWF25 marks this milestone and sets the table for the future of Hawai'i's culinary, agriculture, and hospitality industries. The 2025 festival will feature over 100 acclaimed chefs and culinary experts from across the U.S., along with international chefs from Canada, Japan, and New Zealand.

As part of the Hawaii Ag & Culinary Alliance, the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival — has always aimed to create lasting connections—pairing chefs with students, farmers with restaurants, and Hawaii's local economy with the global culinary world. "What began as a threeday culinary event in Waikiki in 2011 has expanded into a statewide movement that honors our chefs, supports our farmers, enhances Hawaii's food systems,

Marking its 45th anniversary, the Pacific's top film festival is set to shine this year. The event spotlights the power of film in showcasing diversity, with a focus on new cinema from Hawaii, Asia, the Pacific Islands, and beyond. The 2025 festival will showcase 71 feature films, 143 short films, five international premieres. 115 Hawaii premieres, 36 world premieres, 18 U.S. premieres, and 12 North American premieres from 44 countries. Notable features include a spotlight on local filmmakers, indigenous voices, and an environmental short film competition. As an Academy Awards®qualifying festival, HIFF's Best Short Film winners are eligible for consideration.

Founded in 1981, the Hawaii International Film Festival (HIFF) is one of the oldest and most respected film festivals in the US, with a focus on Asia-Pacific cinema. HIFF offers a stage for both local and international filmmakers to share their work and engage with audiences. As the only Academy Award®qualifying short film festival in the state, HIFF45 will showcase those 143 shorts from around the world. Highlights include a focus on local filmmaking, indigenous voices, and an environmental short film competition. The expanded lineup features a curated selection of titles eligible for Oscar consideration.

HIFF45 takes place in Honolulu from October 16-26 and October 28-30 in West O'ahu. Not to be left out, each of

If any of your guests forgot to pack a costume, there will be a Spirit Halloween store opening at the former Roger Dunn Golf Store in Ward Village, as well as locations in Aiea and Kapolei. I put together a list of everything I could find out information about on pages 4 and 5, so go out, get dressed up, have fun, and stay safe!





and has helped build Hawaii fame as a premier culinary destination," said Denise Yamaguchi, HFWF Chief Executive Officer.

That reputation was reaffirmed earlier this year when Hawaii's culinary scene was named the top food destination in the U.S. by Esquire and featured in Travel + Leisure Magazine. "Today, our mission continues to evolve —investing in education and workforce development statewide to ensure a stronger future for Hawai'i's culinary and agricultural industries," Yamaguchi added. "We're focused on building pathways and partnerships that will uplift the next generation of chefs, farmers, and hospitality professionals across our islands."

This year's lineup features 23 new chefs, including Leah Cohen, Johnny Courtney, Masa Gushiken, Alex Kim, Nini Nguyen, Dominica Rice-Cisneros, and Aarón Sánchez, alongside familiar names like Masaharu Morimoto, Jonathan Waxman, Ming Tsai, Spike Mendelsohn, Jason Peel, Andrew Le, and Robynne Maii, among others. The festival also showcases renowned winemakers, sommeliers, and mixologists, with over 150 tastemakers taking part in a variety of events — including walk-around tastings, VIP gourmet experiences, wine seminars, brunches, gala dinners, and a brand-new one-day industry conference.

What's new this year? For one, there won't be a toes-in-the-sand event at Ko Olina. Chef's Corner

HFWF Celebrity Chef Dong Choi

Dong Choi was born in Seoul, Korea and moved to Atlanta, Georgia when he was 3½ years old. His parents classic immigrant story, working tirelessly so he could thrive in America, made hard work a part of his DNA. He fell in love with cooking in college and began building a career working with award-winning chefs. He began working with chef Charles Phan in 2017, before becoming The Slanted Door Group's Executive Chef, responsible for all aspects of the restaurants. He feels incredibly fortunate to be part of the team that will shape the future of these celebrated restaurants, alongside Chef Phans family and trusted advisors.

What's your first childhood food memory?

Peeling garlic cloves over newspaper covering the kitchen table for my mom to make kimchi.

What sparked your interest in cooking?

I fell in love with the culture of cooks and chefs this group of people, that seemingly had no other aligned interests other than cooking, showed up every day to make it happen.

Who would you consider your mentor?

I've been fortunate to learn from world-class chefs, but Chef Charles Phan taught me lessons that went beyond the kitchen—about serving the community and prioritizing loved ones. They are the ones who help you achieve more than you could ever alone. As a mentor, he shaped how I see our industry today: it's more than just food.

When did you join The Slanted Door Group?

I opened Rice & Bones in 2017, a UC Berkeley lunch spot that Chef dedicated to the Dept. of Architecture, where he studied. We adopted the Slanted Door approach—strict sourcing and a top-tier buildout, while keeping prices student-friendly. In my view, it was the best food served on a college campus. It was also my first role managing both the kitchen & front of house.

Describe your journey with them.

After Rice & Bones, I cycled through all of the Slanted Door Group restaurants, immersing myself in operations and company culture, then opening our second location in San Ramon, CA, before being promoted to Executive Chef.

How was it working with Charles Phan?

Chef Charles was hands-on with every single detail. We spoke daily, about operations, food, life, and everything in between, and I felt truly honored to have his trust and confidence.

What's the greatest lesson he taught you?

Of all the lessons I learned, what I admired most about him was how he made time for the people who mattered. Despite his celebrity and constant demands, he remained present—and it's still astonishing to hear how many lives he touched.

Share one of your favorite memories of him.

I'll never forget the look on his face when we finally got the banh mi bread just right, FINALLY. That expression will stay with me forever. And in October 2024, during an R&D trip to Vietnam, we created memories I'll cherish forever.

Describe your style of cooking?

Seasonal, bold flavors, exacting and techniquedriven, but, not rigid, with respect to traditions of a time and a place. The Slanted Door is about the tradition of Vietnam cuisine through the lens of California cooking and local ingredients.

What do you have planned for HFWF?

Chef Charles loved Abalone claypot rice, so we are doing a dish he loved to both cook and eat.

What's on your must-do list while in Hawaii?

Swim in the ocean and EAT as many lunch plates as possible!!! Charles and I would always find time for a breakfast of the best, most ripe papaya we could find with a side of loco moco.

Is there anything you want to share

I love golf. I'm left-handed but golf right-handed. I never have enough time to play as much as I want. I have always dreamed of playing in Hawaii.

What's next for you?

My beautiful daughter is 9 and I'm trying to master the never-ending juggle of being there for her and my amazing wife while also being available for my team. A lesson Charles is still trying to teach me.

Cháo: Chicken Rice Porridge

This is the breakfast of champions, Vietnamese style! Cháo, called congee in English, is one of the simplest recipes in the Asian repertoire. The amount of time you simmer the rice determines the final texture. From Charles Phan's Vietnamese Home Cooking Cookbook.



Ingredients:

1 (3 pound) whole chicken 6 whole scallions Fresh ginger - thumb-sized piece, crushed 1 Tbsp. kosher salt, plus more to taste

Garnish: Finely chopped scallions, white & light green parts only
Finely chopped fresh cilantro

- 1 cup jasmine rice
- 3 quarts chicken stock
- 1 (2- by 1-inch) piece fresh ginger peeled and cut into inch-thick coins Freshly ground black pepper

Coarsely chopped roasted peanuts Chinese Doughnuts sliced (optional) Fried shallots

Recipe: Bring a large pot of water to a boil. Add chicken, scallions, ginger, & salt and boil for 15 minutes. Turn off heat, cover, and let stand for 15 minutes. If your chicken is larger than 3 pounds, let stand 10 minutes longer. When it's done, remove the chicken and submerge in an ice-water bath. This stops the cooking and gives the meat a firmer texture. Let stand 20 minutes until it's cool enough to handle, then remove and pat dry. Pull the meat from the bones, discarding the bones & skin. Shred the meat with your fingers. You should have about 4 cups. Reserve 2 cups of the chicken cooking water & strain. Rinse rice under cold running water. In a large pot, combine the rice, stock, ginger, and the 2 cups reserved chicken cooking water. Bring to a boil over high heat, lower to a simmer, then cook uncovered for 1 hour. The rice will have broken down & have a porridge-like consistency. Season to taste with salt. Put the scallions, cilantro, peanuts, fried shallots, & doughnut slices in separate bowls. Ladle the porridge into warmed bowls & top with an equal amount of the chicken and a pinch of pepper. Pass the garnishes at the table.



Now, you can easily book all your tours through a single platform on the Shangri La website, making the smoother and straightforward. Plus, with the new Saturday partnership with Bishop Museum, you'll have even more options and greater availability for your bookings.

As part of the Doris Duke Foundation, Shangri La doesn't make a profit from the tour program. For over twenty years, all net proceeds have directly supported the arts at HoMA and now at the Bishop Museum, helping to sustain two of Hawai'i's's most important cultural institutions and investing in local communities.

Every 75-minute Shangri La tour includes round-trip shuttle service from the Bishop Museum or HoMA, plus a semi-guided tour of the galleries and grounds led by tour staff, and same-day admission to the host institution.

Residents get a special rate of \$20 for Thursday and Friday tours hosted by HoMA, and \$25 for Saturday tours hosted by Bishop Museum. For non-residents, the general admission cost is \$45 at both institutions. Although some prices have increased to match similar cultural experiences, HoMA is maintaining its kama'āina rates for its ongoing tours to encourage local participation, supported by Shangri La staff.
