## 80 Years of Aloha

## MAMo Wearable Art Show Where Hawaiian Culture Meets Contemporary Design



Royal Hawaiian Center's Sam Shenkus has been sitting on the Aloha Festivals committee since 1987, and co-chairing the event with Debbie Nakanelua-Richards since 2012.

For eight decades, Aloha Festivals has brought Hawai'i's music, hula, history, and traditions to life through a celebration honoring the people, stories, and cultural practices that make the islands unique.

In 2026, Hawai'i's longest-running cultural festival marks its 80th anniversary with the theme "80 Years of Aloha: Our Culture, Our Stories, Celebrating Our Island Home," honoring Hawaiian culture through music, hula, storytelling, and shared cultural experiences. This year's theme recognizes the Royal Court, hālau hula, parade participants, local entertainers, artisans, vendors, volunteers, and community organizations whose commitment and involvement have supported Aloha Festivals for eighty years and keep the aloha spirit alive.

Originally starting in 1946 as Aloha Week, a cultural event organized by the Jaycees Old-timers of Hawai'i to celebrate the islands' heritage, promote Hawaiian culture to visitors, and preserve Native Hawaiian traditions like music,

hula, and storytelling, it has grown into the largest Hawaiian cultural celebration in the U.S. The event was renamed Aloha Festivals in 1991. Eighty years later, this event continues to bring together residents and visitors, with major festivities on O'ahu drawing over 100,000 attendees each year. Backed by thousands of volunteers and community partnerships, it remains a lively showcase of Hawai'i's culture and a way to connect different generations through the enduring aloha spirit.

Aloha Festivals Board Director Ku'uipo Lorenzo designed this year's official commemorative ribbon. "Celebrating 80 years of Aloha Festivals is an incredible milestone, and I wanted this year's ribbon to be something truly special," said Lorenzo, Aloha Festivals board director and ribbon designer. "I created a larger, commemorative design centered around a honu to honor the festival's legacy and give people something they can proudly wear as they show their support for a community celebration that brings together thousands of residents and visitors each year."

The limited-edition ribbon features a

honu encircled by a plumeria lei, symbolizing this year's theme. The plumeria lei is an Aloha Week tradition that conveys the aloha extended to everyone who receives one. The honu was chosen to commemorate the milestone anniversary because it is admired for its longevity, with a lifespan of up to 80 years, and is regarded by many as an 'aumākua, representing wisdom, protection, perseverance, good fortune, and a deep connection to Hawai'i and its people.

The annual commemorative ribbon has become a cherished tradition for residents and visitors alike, serving as both a collectible keepsake and a way to support Hawai'i's largest Hawaiian cultural celebration. Haunani Hendrix, formerly the Director of Sales at the Hawaii Prince Hotel, has been involved with Aloha Festivals since 2000, after returning to Honolulu from Maui. She remains a dedicated Board member focused on preserving Hawai'i's traditions and remembers when selling ribbons was the primary fundraiser for high school bands, soccer teams, and other sports groups, helping them raise money for trips to the mainland. I know I remember always having one.

Haunani says her first memory of the Festivals growing was participating in making the floats - often working till the early morning hours to finish - talk about bringing a community together. She says, "When I lived on Maui, I actually brought my children to Waikiki to work on the Hilton Hawaiian Village float - we helped make the 'beak' of the nene goose that year - pasting on one black bean at a time. Back then, they invited

employees and hotel guests to participate - they always had a big pot of stew for the volunteers. It's all about the memories - and we hope to continue for at least another 80 years."

For me, I remember that my first job was helping Doug Smoyer, for those who remember that name, sell Aloha Festival T-shirts at the ho'olaule'a when I was probably about 8 years old. We never missed it. Coming to Waikiki wasn't as crazy as it is these days. If I recall, there were two ho'olaule'a back then, one downtown. I bet more than a few of you have your own memories of Aloha Festivals if you grew up here.

Available for \$10; all proceeds benefit Aloha Festivals and help fund its cultural programs and events for everyone to enjoy throughout the month.

Those events begin on Saturday, September 5, with the Royal Court Investiture and Opening Ceremony. The Royal Court will be formally introduced during a traditional ceremony at Helumoa Gardens at The Royal Hawaiian Hotel, before the festivities continue at the Royal Grove at Royal Hawaiian Center with hula, music and cultural performances. The ceremony reflects the deep connection between Aloha Festivals and Hawai'i's history, traditions and ali'i heritage.

Although not an official signature event, the Royal Court will also make a



special appearance at Waikiki Beach Walk on Friday, September 11 from 4 to 6 p.m.

On Saturday, September 19, Kalākaua Avenue will come alive for the 72nd Annual Waikīkī Ho'ōlaule'a, Hawai'i's largest annual block party. From local cuisine and island-made crafts to live entertainment and hula hālau, the event brings together thousands of residents and visitors for an evening celebrating the many cultures, traditions, and talents that capture the energy, diversity, and community spirit of the islands.

The festivities conclude Saturday, September 26, with the 78th Annual Floral Parade, presented by 'Alohilani Resort. Beginning at Ala Moana Park and traveling along Kalākaua Avenue to Kapi'olani Park, the colorful procession will feature beautifully decorated floral floats, pā'ū horseback riders, hālau hula, marching bands, and other participants showcasing Hawai'i's enduring spirit of aloha.

Haunani reminisced about that as well. "When I was at the Hawaii Prince Hotel, we sponsored the reviewing stand - the first one everyone encounters as they cross the Ala Wai Bridge and officially enter Waikiki," she said. "Over the years, we had judges at our stand for the bands and equestrian units. Bands queued up and started their songs; the pa'u riders acknowledged the officials as they went by, with narration. For years, Jeff Apaka was our anchor announcer before he passed away. I included a photo below of him running from the reviewing stand for an impromptu song and hula on the parade route. This year, our announcers will be Olena Heu, in her 11th year of hosting, who will be joined by Paula Akana."

"The other photo I included shows a Prince employee, Ekin Lindsey, riding in a pa'u unit. As their unit went by, the PBX operators sent an alert to the departments, and employees came down to cheer and wish her well." Lindsey still works at the Prince at 100 Sails.

When asked about some of her favorite memories, Sam Shenkus, VP and Director of Marketing, who has been involved with the Board since 1987 and has co-chaired it for the past 14 years, talked about the formal Royal Ball they used to hold at the Hilton Hawaiian Village Coral Ballroom. She loved how the Royal Court would dress up in elegant monarchical attire while the guests dressed up, enjoyed a lovely dinner, and danced the night away. "One year, she said, our signature performer was Ed Kenney, and he sang to his wife, Beverly Noa, as she shared a magical performance to honor the Royal Court." For those who don't remember them, Ed Kenney Jr. and Beverly Noa were among the most dynamic and admired artistic duos of mid-century Waikīkī, blending world-class vocal talent with Bev's mesmerizing hula. After Ed's successful

run on Broadway in "Flower Drum Song" and Beverly earned her reputation as the leading island dancer of her time, they became the iconic headliners during Hawai'i's golden age of tourism and resort entertainment. We lost them both in 2018 and 2017, respectively. I think most of you are probably more familiar with their son, Chef Ed Kenney, known for his restaurants Town, Mud Hen Water, Mahina & Suns and Kaimuki Superette and his multiple James Beard nominations, garnering him 6 semifinalist nods over the years, or from his hosting duties of the Emmy Award-winning national PBS television series Family Ingredients.

Aloha Festivals is a celebration of Hawai'i itself—its people, traditions, stories, and unique sense of community. These memories show the impression it has made on locals over the years. Its 80th anniversary offers an opportunity to honor the generations who have helped preserve and perpetuate the islands' traditions while looking toward the future and perhaps creating more special memories. The 2026 Aloha Festivals invite everyone to join them to celebrate the culture, people, and stories that make Hawai'i home.

creativity, and connection to Hawai'i.

MAMo—short for the Maoli Arts Movement, began in Honolulu in 2006 to honor Native Hawaiian artists, cultural experts, and traditions. The idea behind wearable art is that Hawaiian art is not just for galleries. It can be worn, carried, and included in daily life. The movement has helped artists find new ways to express Hawaiian culture, especially through wearable art. The show is about storytelling as much as it is about fashion.

Over the years, MAMo has brought together many Native Hawaiian and Hawai'i-based artists and designers. Their work shows how traditional knowledge can inspire modern art while keeping a strong connection to the land, family roots, identity, and place.

Designs are inspired by traditional Hawaiian art styles and cultural practices, such as kapa, weaving, lauhala, featherwork, lei, tattoos, decorations, tools, weapons, and patterns or images from nature. This forms an artistic language that connects old knowledge with modern fashion.

The show is designed to challenge the usual idea of a fashion show. MAMo is not just about following trends. It highlights the sources of inspiration and the meaning behind the art. Designers continue to push the boundaries of wearable art, creating collections that honor cultural traditions while exploring new materials, shapes, and styles.

Don't miss the 19th Annual MAMo Wearable Art Show, a special event by the PA'I Foundation that celebrates the art, creativity, and fashion of Native Hawaiians. As Hawai'i's leading Indigenous wearable art event, MAMo features Kanaka Maoli designers and artists whose work honors ancestral wisdom and explores new ideas in modern fashion. Every piece on the runway is more than just clothing. It is a true expression of 'ike kūpuna (ancestral

knowledge), mo'okū'auhau (genealogy), aloha 'āina (our strong connection to the land), and the living traditions that keep Native Hawaiian identity alive.

Over the years, the MAMo runway has featured a wide range of Hawai'i-based artists and designers, such as Maile Andrade, Marques Marzan, Ari South, Manaola, Micah Kamohoali'i, Kehaulani Nielson, and Kanoelani Davis. Their work shows the variety of contemporary Hawaiian design and the many ways cultural knowledge can be turned into wearable art. This year, MAMo is thrilled to showcase works by the Kākou Collective by Kea Peters, Kahui Palaka, Laha'ole Designs, Ma'awe Collab by Kawika Lum-Nelmida, Marques Marzan & Maile Andrade, Moses Goods & Nani'olu Medeiros, Nai'a Designs and more. Manaola will begin the show with a special program.

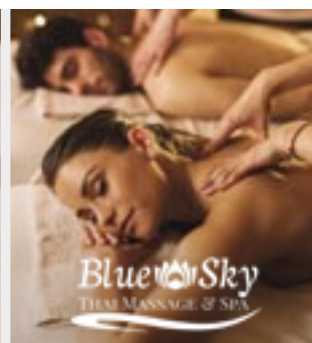
MAMo will honor Nola Nahulu and Linda Nahulu of Bete Mu'u this year, whose classic designs truly represent Hawaiian elegance. Their years of dedication to fashion have helped preserve and elevate Hawaiian style, inspiring generations with clothing that shows the beauty, culture, and spirit of Hawai'i. As MAMo celebrates 20 years, they take a moment to recognize their

important contributions to the Native Hawaiian fashion community and their lasting legacy.

MAMo returns to the Hilton Hawaiian Village Tapa Ballroom on September 11 from 7 to 9 p.m. Get ready for another celebration of creativity rooted in Hawaii, where the runway becomes a gallery and wearable art is a powerful expression of Hawaiian culture. ## Chef's Corner

### Celebrity Chef Sheldon Simeon

Sheldon Simeon has built his career around one guiding principle: food is family. His family instilled a deep love of cooking in him, and he worked his way up from a Walt Disney World internship to taking home two Fan Favorite Awards from *Top Chef* and earning two James Beard Award nominations. Everything he does comes back to 'ohana, and he shares that philosophy in his new cookbook, *Ohana Style*, and as Hawaiian Airlines' featured chef. He wants to keep finding ways to share Hawai'i's food and stories with more people while creating opportunities for the next generation here at home.

#### What is your first childhood food memory?

Standing at the stove stirring a big pot of saimin for my family. Food was always at the center of our house. My parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles were constantly cooking, and as kids, we were expected to help however we could.

#### What made you realize you want to be a chef?

I thought I'd be an architect. My brother went to culinary school and his experience made me think I might enjoy it too. I grew up in a family of amazing cooks. Whenever there was a gathering, our house was the one doing the cooking. Once I enrolled, I realized I loved it and I was pretty good at it. That's when it became a real passion.

#### What was your first job in the industry?

I worked at the Living Seas restaurant at EPCOT in Florida, doing everything from working the fry station to peeling vegetables. When I moved to Maui, I started at Aloha Mixed Plate as a prep cook and dishwasher, and worked my way up.

#### How did growing up in Hawaii shape you?

I was born and raised in Hilo, but Maui is where I became a chef, built my career and raised my family. Moving here introduced me to traditions, ingredients, and dishes that were totally specific to Maui, such as Lahaina fried soup. Maui taught me the importance of listening to the community and understanding the stories behind the food before putting my interpretation on it.

#### Who would you consider your mentor?

First, my parents and all the aunts and uncles I watched cook growing up. Professionally, Chef Mark Ellman was important to me. He believed in me, gave me opportunities and showed me how a chef could celebrate Hawai'i's ingredients & cultures while still creating something personal. He always encouraged me to be myself.



#### Ingredients:

2-inch piece fresh ginger, peeled  
2 scallions, trimmed  
½ pound skinless sushi-grade kanpachi fillet  
2 tablespoons shoyu  
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice

2 teaspoons chili crisp or Nori

#### Salsa Macha

2 tablespoons peanut oil or other neutral oil  
2 teaspoons toasted sesame oil  
Flaky salt, such as Maldon  
Cilantro or microgreens for garnish

**Method:** Place a large plate or platter in the fridge to chill. **1.** Fill a small bowl with ice and water. **2.** Julienne the ginger into thin matchstick-like pieces and place in the ice water. **3.** Cut the scallions crosswise into 2-inch sections, then julienne into thin matchstick-like pieces and place in the ice water. Let soak for 5 minutes while you prepare the fish. **4.** Using a very sharp knife and cutting in a sweeping motion (rather than sawing), cut the fish into ¼-inch slices. **5.** Arrange the slices on the chilled plate, overlapping them very slightly, then return the plate to the fridge while you prepare the dressing. In a small bowl, whisk together the shoyu, lemon juice, and chili crisp. Set the dressing aside. **6.** Drain and pat dry the ginger and scallion. **7.** Remove the sashimi plate from the fridge. Top the sashimi with the ginger and scallion matchsticks so you get a few pieces of each with each slice of fish (you may not use all of it). **8.** Heat the peanut oil with the sesame oil over medium-high heat until it begins to smoke, about 2 minutes. Carefully drizzle the hot oil over the sashimi pieces, then use a spoon to drizzle the shoyu-chili dressing over the top. **9.** Sprinkle each slice of sashimi with flaky salt, then garnish with cilantro. Serve immediately.

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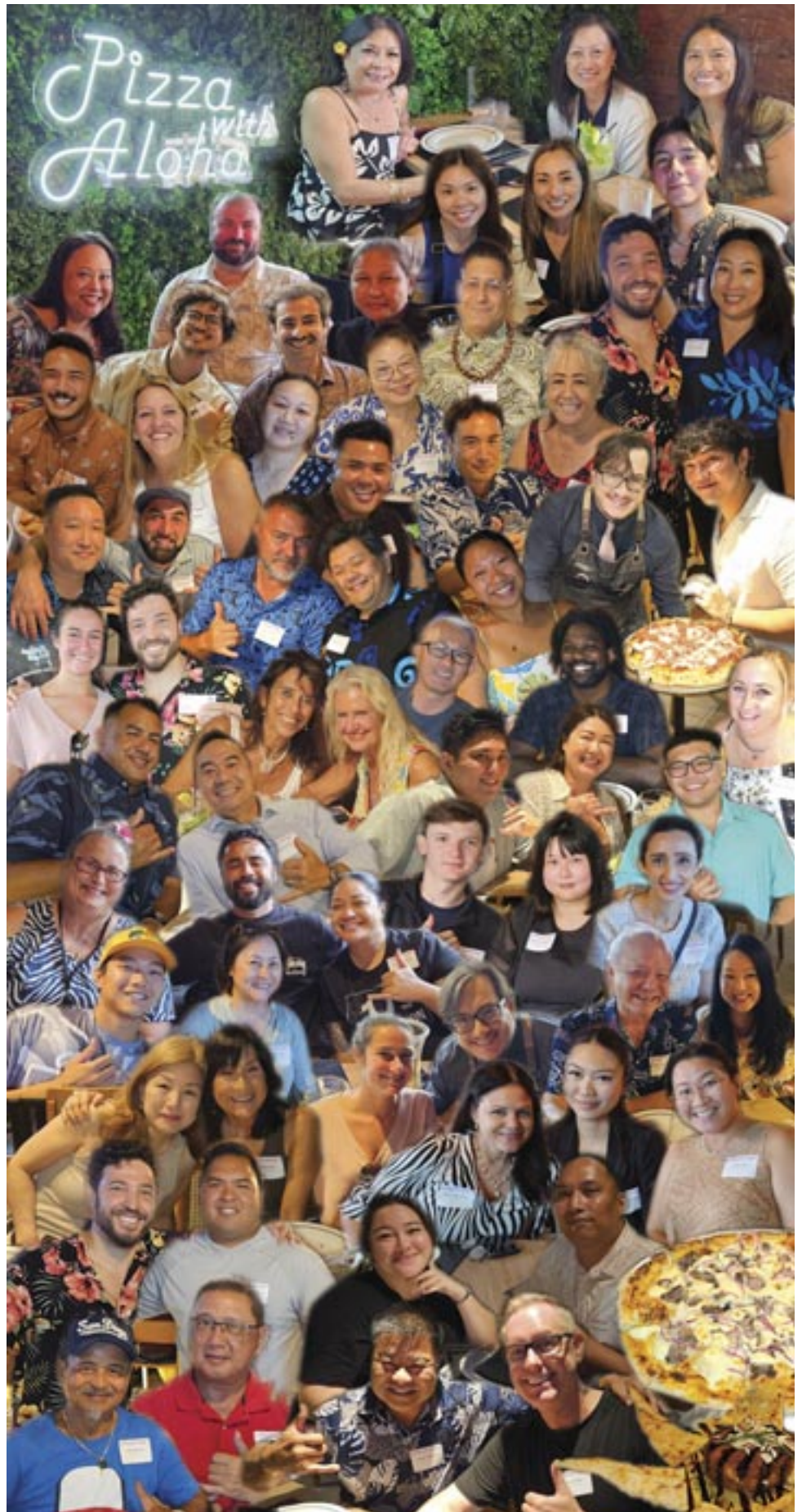
