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THE HŌKŪLE'A TURNS 50!

Hōkūle'a began as a dream of reviving the legacy of exploration, courage, and ingenuity that brought the first Polynesians to the archipelago of Hawai'i. It was a vision to revive the ancient art of wayfinding and reconnect the people of Hawai'i with their cultural roots. This dream was about much more than a canoe; it was about reclaiming a proud heritage that speaks to the deep relationship between Polynesian voyagers and the vast Pacific Ocean. Hōkūle'a represents the resilience of a people, the power of traditional knowledge, and the enduring spirit of exploration.

In 1973, artist Herb Kawainui Kāne, sailor and paddler Charles Tommy Holmes, and nautical anthropologist Ben Finney founded the Polynesian Voyaging Society (PVS), a nonprofit aiming to research and perpetuate traditional Polynesian voyaging methods. Its mission is to perpetuate the art and science of traditional Polynesian voyaging and the spirit of exploration through experiential educational programs that inspire students and their communities to respect and care for themselves, each other, and their natural and cultural environments. According to sources in the PVS archives, while

studying at the University of Hawaii in 1958, Ben Finney dreamed about building a canoe and sailing it to Tahiti. The route between Tahiti and Hawaii passes through three ocean currents and requires sailing slightly against the wind both ways. Could the ancient voyaging canoes perform well enough to windward to make round trips? The design and construction of a craft that would represent a voyaging canoe of many centuries ago posed several problems, including the fact the team had no examples of actual ancient voyaging canoes available as models to follow. The canoes that brought the first Hawaiians to their island home had disappeared from earth. Hawaii had had no voyaging canoes, navigators, or voyagers in more than 600 years when Herb Kāne dreamed of rebuilding a double-hulled sailing canoe similar to the ones his ancestors sailed. Still, Kāne wanted to build a full-size replica of an ancient Polynesian double-hulled voyaging canoe and try to answer the age-old question of whether Polynesian exploration and settlement were intentional or whether they found the Islands accidentally.

This dream brought together people of diverse backgrounds and professions.

Diamond Head State Park Announces Upcoming Closures

This is a heads-up that you should make note of. An ongoing construction project at Diamond Head State Monument will require full park closures in March and April. These closures are



necessary for the safety of visitors and staff while contractors stabilize loose rocks around the Kāhala Tunnel.

Access to the Park will be restricted during each closure, and no visitors will be allowed entry. A security guard will be stationed at the entry gate leading to the tunnel for the duration of each closure. Although the closures will continue through March and April, they will make an exception for Spring Break. The Park will remain open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. During the week of March 17 to 28, to accommodate the expected influx of visitors and locals wanting to hike the popular landmark on spring break, contractors will instead work in the Park between 6:30 p.m. and 2 a.m.

In addition to full park closures, there will also be a series of Partial Park Closures during this time, where the Park will close early, at 2 p.m. A complete list of the upcoming closures are listed below:



Kāne came up with the conceptual design for the canoe with Kenneth Emory, an anthropologist at the Bishop Museum. They assembled a canoe – two hulls, each 62 feet long, eight crossbeams, decking, rails, and two masts – at Kualoa Regional Park, and a replica of an ancient voyaging canoe was born. She was named Hōkūle'a, which translates to "Star of Gladness," after Arcturus, the brightest star in the northern celestial hemisphere and the fourth-brightest star in the night sky. Arcturus was a guiding star for ancient Hawaiian navigators because it appeared to pass directly overhead at the latitude of Hawaii. Hōkūle'a represents the resilience of a people, the power of traditional knowledge, and the enduring spirit of exploration. On March 8, 1975, the Hōkūle'a launched from Kualoa, making its official debut.

How close to an ancient voyaging canoe is Hōkūle'a? She is considerably smaller than the 100-foot-plus Polynesian canoes seen by early European visitors. While the design of the hulls and upper parts of the canoe were based on what's known of the traditional Polynesian canoe, the design of the sail-rig departed from conventional precedents. Hōkūle'a's consists of a sail attached to the spar and boom plus a shorter mast on which the spar, boom, and sail are raised and lowered.

The team then set out to prove that a double-hulled canoe could make long sea voyages using only sail power and navigating solely by the stars and subtle clues carried on the wind and waves using clouds and birds to help them along the way. Records show that sea trials were not without mishaps, but when correctly sailed and maintained, the craft proved stable and sea-friendly. Driven by two inverted-triangle sprit sails and steered by long steering oars, Hōkūle'a could make 10 knots or more sailing on a broad reach before strong trades. Her course speed dropped off when sailing to windward, but trials showed that in sailing full and by against brisk trades, she could easily make at least 4 or 5 knots, an adequate performance for the long voyage to Tahiti.

In 1975, no living Hawaiian knew the ancient techniques for ocean voyaging, as Hōkūle'a navigates without any instruments. Hence, PVS had to look far beyond our shores to find an expert. Only about half a dozen people left in the world still practice the art of traditional

navigation. The skill ancient Polynesians used was on the verge of extinction. A man named Mau Pailug, from the tiny Micronesian island Satawal, was the only one willing to share his knowledge. Even though he barely spoke English, he decided to reach beyond his own culture, sharing what had once been closely guarded knowledge, to save the art of traditional navigation from possible extinction, and agreed to guide Hōkūle'a to Tahiti. With his expertise, the Hōkūle'a successfully made the 5,500-mile round trip between Hawai'i and Tahiti in 1976 without charts or instruments. He then mentored Nainoa Thompson, who became the first Native Hawaiian since the 14th century to practice wayfinding for long-distance ocean voyaging when he replicated the 1976 voyage to Tahiti in 1980. Inspired by his kūpuna and teachers, Nainoa has dedicated his life to exploring the deeper meaning of voyaging and passing on his wayfinding knowledge to future generations. His father, Myron "Pinky" Thompson, former president of PVS, understood that voyaging is a process in which universal values guide us. He taught Nainoa always to have a plan to achieve his vision and that the same principles we used in the past are the ones we use today and will use in the future. In the early 70s, Herb Kāne brought Nainoa into the effort to build Hōkūle'a and introduced him to the dream of using stars to navigate her. Nainoa has since navigated Hōkūle'a on over a dozen voyages and has passed on his knowledge for decades.

This month, Hōkūle'a celebrates her 50 birthday, and the Polynesian Voyaging Society has invited the public to come and share in a series of events designed to celebrate and honor this legendary voyaging canoe before she sets sail to resume its Moananuiākea Voyage. (If you recall, Hōkūle'a returned home from San Diego, California, in December 2023, in

the wake of the devastating fires on Maui, with the crew wanting to bring Hōkūle'a home at a time when their home was hurting and because of the atypical El Niño weather patterns in the Pacific causing unpredictable conditions).

The celebrations will reflect on Hōkūle'a's beginnings and profound impact worldwide, inspiring cultural renewal across the Pacific. Along with the revitalization of Polynesian voyaging and navigation traditions, Hōkūle'a introduced a newfound respect and appreciation for Hawaiian culture and language in the state of Hawai'i and beyond.

You might have noticed that you've recently seen the Hōkūle'a around more than usual. In preparation for this milestone anniversary, PVS put together a statewide sail. For the past seven months, the Hōkūle'a sailed 3,000 miles across the Hawaiian Islands to visit 31 ports and 34 communities, hosting canoe tours and activities for schools and the community, raising awareness, and sharing its mission and message to all. 2024 became a year of coming home for the iconic canoe, paying attention to the youth of Hawai'i and the next generation of navigators, and getting younger people interested and more prepared to take the reins of these canoes in the future.

The festivities kick off on Saturday, March 8, to kick off the golden jubilee at the 16th Annual Kualoa Hakipu'u Canoe Festival held at Kualoa Regional Park. From 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., this free, family-friendly event will commemorate Hōkūle'a's historic launch on March 8, 1975, where the canoe was first assembled, blessed, and entered the ocean. The public is welcome to attend and encouraged to come on by.

The following Sunday, March 9, the Hōkūle'a 50th Birthday Gala will occur at the Hawai'i Convention Center from 5

p.m. to 9 p.m. This fundraiser will celebrate Hōkūle'a's incredible legacy and raise funds to support PVS's mission of preserving voyaging traditions and protecting the oceans.

The celebrations continue on Monday, March 10, with dockside canoe tours at the Hawai'i Convention Center. From 3 p.m. to 6 p.m., visitors can step aboard the canoe and hear from young crew members and navigators training for the Moananuiākea Voyage.

Finally, on Friday, March 14, the Bishop Museum will host an after-hours event honoring Hōkūle'a's 50th birthday. The museum will pay tribute to the canoe's origins and legacy with special exhibits and programming dedicated to the history of traditional Polynesian voyaging.

Many of us may take seeing the Hōkūle'a for granted, given she's been around for almost all of our lives, and so ver visible this past year, but don't miss these last chances to see and visit this iconic canoe, as later this month, she will resume the Moananuiākea Voyage, and if all goes right, will not return to the islands until sometime in 2028.

What began in 1973 as a scientific experiment to build a replica of a traditional voyaging canoe for a one-time sail to Tahiti, became an essential catalyst for a generation of cultural renewal and a symbol of the richness of Hawaiian culture and of a seafaring heritage which links together the peoples of Polynesia. No one could have imagined that 50-years later, Hōkūle'a would have sailed nearly 300,000 miles and completed 15 deep-sea voyages.

These voyages helped to rekindle interest in traditional Pacific Island cultures and practices, emphasizing the cultural heritage of the Hawaiian and other Polynesian peoples. The Hōkūle'a continues to bring people together from all walks of life. She is more than a

voyaging canoe—she represents the common desire shared by the people of Hawai'i, the Pacific, and the World to protect our most cherished values and places from disappearing.

I have personally been fortunate enough to go on the Hōkūle'a for a day sail. The feeling of being onboard is hard to put into words. It's magical and powerful, and there are dynamic reminders onboard of a few of the people who helped it become the iconic vessel it is today. Mau Piailug's name is carved into the back of the navigator's seat to honor his contributions. A plaque commemorates Eddie Aikau's sacrifice in 1978 after the canoe capsized. He decided to paddle his board to Lanai to get help, but he was never seen again.


I was one of the many people who paddled out to meet the Hōkūle'a in 2017 and paddling alongside her as she returned to Waikiki from her epic three-year sail around the globe was surreal. Thousands of people were in the water on boats, canoes, surfboards, SUPs, and more, while thousands more packed the shoreline for their historic return. I also just so happened to be in Seattle as the Hōkūle'a sailed in and San Diego as she stopped by the Maritime Museum as part of the 160th birthday celebration of San Diego's iconic Star of India and have seen firsthand that she brings that same excitement and celebration wherever she goes. The Hōkūle'a brings that unique mana with her wherever she goes, and the response to her sailing into Elliott Bay was no less potent than when she returned from her World Wide Voyage in Hawaii. The Hōkūle'a is not only an iconic, legendary voyaging canoe; she is inspirational and brings with her the power to connect with others. And with people like Nainoa Thompson training future celestial navigators, she will continue her explorations for generations to come.

Together, let's celebrate and honor the past 50 years of Hōkūle'a's legacy of cultural revival, environmental advocacy, and a renewed connection to the earth and ocean. Be sure to watch as she charts a course for the future as well.

entertainment and tasty dishes from Aloha Table, Aloha Steak House, Goofy, Heavenly, Nature Waikiki, ZIGU and Aloha Amigo. Tickets for this event are \$100, and proceeds support the Honolulu Festival Foundation's educational and cultural exchange programs, which is the foundation responsible for presenting the Honolulu Festival year after year.

"The Honolulu Festival is a treasured celebration of cultural exchange that reflects a shared commitment to be responsible global citizens and work together to strengthen the values and quality of life for future generations," says Ted Kubo, President of the Honolulu Festival Foundation.

The Hawai'i Convention Center will host a craft fair and special exhibits, including the Ennichi Corner with cultural activities and games for children, Hawaii's first Bon Dance of the year, and the always popular Sake and Food Fest, which will offer samplings of sake, shochu, and awamori to adults age 21 and older. In addition, the Japanese Film Festival will also provide free showings of films throughout both days on the center's third floor.

However, the Festival has made one significant change this year. For the first time in its 28-year history, the Honolulu Festival Foundation will charge a small admission fee for adults to enter the exhibition hall on the ground floor of the Hawai'i Convention Center, where the majority of cultural and music performances, arts, activities, exhibits, and the craft fair takes place. Kids under 18 are free, but adults must pay \$8 for one-day of admission or \$12 for two days if the entry is purchased in advance. Those over 65 pay \$6 for one day, and \$9 for two. Tickets are \$2 more at the door.

Kubo noted, "Our Foundation's goal is for the Honolulu Festival to be a sustainable celebration and continue presenting popular events every year that the public enjoys so much, like the Grand Parade and Nagaoka Fireworks Show. This admission fee for adults will help make that possible."

So, what does this entry fee get you? Aside from contributing to the future of this fabulous Festival, you also gain entry into all of the Festival's entertainment performances, activities, and exhibits for free, including more than 100 vendors from around the world who will be on hand at the craft fair, and a Japanese-style Ennichi Corner that offers plenty of

hands-on games, crafts, and traditional activities for kids, the Bon Dance, and Sake and Food Fest. Additional payment will only be required if buying goods and items sold for purchase, such as the craft fair and food and drinks.

The Sake & Food Fest spreads the Japanese sake culture from Hawaii to the world. Guests can wander through the Learning Zone, where the exhibitions will share the little-known history of hard work and efforts put into making sake in Hawaii. After you learn the history of sake, you can sample a variety of Experience Zone, where you can sample the variety of sakes. Admission into the ground level of the Convention Center comes with complimentary sake and food samples for those 21 years of age and older in this area.

Admission also grants entry into the "Japan Snack Fair," which features a curated selection of approximately 82 local snacks from 17 prefectures across Japan. Take a culinary journey through Japan's diverse tastes and savor the unique flavors each region offers.

Admission also gets ticket holders into Peace Stock, a free music festival celebrating peace and music. Join Japanese singer Hitomi Shimatani on Saturday from 5:30 – 6 p.m. as she hosts a free mini-concert with a few guests, and



singer/actress Serina will perform on Sunday at 1 p.m.

The stages at Ala Moana Center and Waikiki Beach Walk will be filled with free performances from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Sunday. The performances will feature cultural music, art, and dance from Japan and countries around the Pacific Rim throughout the day. Exact show start and end times vary depending on location.

The 29th Annual Honolulu Festival will still feature other free events, including the Japanese Film Festival on the 3rd floor, the Honolulu Rainbow Ekiden Kick-off Event with Japanese girl group Fruits Zipper on March 8, and of course, the absolutely fabulous Grand Parade on Sunday, and the even more fabulous grand finale as the Nagaoka Fireworks Show light up the skies over Waikiki.

Chef's Corner

Vintage Books Chef Stephen Toyofuku

Self-trained Chef Stephen Toyofuku made waves in Seattle's vibrant culinary scene for years before returning to Hawaii to unveil a new dining experience that blends mystery, global flavors, and local heart. Tucked away behind the vintage facade of a charming bookstore, this hidden speakeasy offers an intimate space alive with excitement and whimsy. Thrilled to be home, Chef believes that food is something that brings people together, especially in Hawaii, and he wants to use the energy and sense of community to find more programs to make Hawaii more sustainable through cooking.

What is your first childhood food memory?

Helping make family breakfast on the weekends, including washing rice, whisking eggs, and using too much Morton's garlic salt on everything

When did you know you wanted to be a chef?

I had the first inklings of it in middle school, but it really took off in college. I didn't consider it a possibility until moving to Seattle in 2015, though.

How did you go around making that a reality?

I took any opportunity to cook I could. I worked craft service, did catering with our fraternity chef in college in Walla Walla, and in general just kept finding excuses and reasons to cook food.

Who would you consider your mentor?

I'd have to say my former boss and chef of the now closed Opus Co. in Seattle, Mark Schroder. Other than having a remarkable passion for food and hunger for learning, his outlook on life made working for him incredibly rewarding. He instilled the belief a restaurant should be a home for the people who make it run. A happy, fun, supportive kitchen makes magical and delicious food.

Where did you train?

I don't have any formal culinary school training. I'm self-taught on a lot of the basics, but most of my restaurant training came under Rachel Yang in Seattle, when I worked at Revel and Joule.

How is it now working back at home?

It's great. I feel like I've been ogling Hawaii's growing restaurant and ag industry from afar, and now that I'm home, I finally get to use those ingredients and play around with those ideas: Ulu Tortillas, Confited Ahi, Kohana Rum Desserts...

How would you describe your style of cooking?

I'm a local boy at heart, with that sugary, salty, umami laden Hawaii cravings. So my foods often reflects that at its base, but it's highlighted by me being a Japanophile, a lover of big Korean, Chinese, and Filipino flavors, mashed-up with the internationally inspired flavors I picked up in Seattle. I'd say it's Nerdy, Nostalgic & Whimsical.

What's the first place you went when you got home?

I think Asia Manoa for local style Chinese food.

How did you create the menu at Vintage Books?

Every dish is designed at heart for big flavors to go with cocktail vibes of the speakeasy. I design dishes around memories, stories, concepts, ingredients, cuisines that in some way connect to Hawaii, but also showcase another part of the world, as well as my personality/journey.

What's your favorite item on the menu?

I would have to say the vegan Tomato Salad. Local Hau'ula Farm Tomatoes, Pineapple Vinegar, Coconut X.O., and curry leaves. It's a great showcase for what Vintage Books is about, local foods, flavors, and ingredients with a twist.

What's your favorite item to make and why?

I love making Ramen. Ramen is full of boundless possibilities and on top of that BROTH IS LIFE!

Favorite restaurant you like to go to when you're off?

Haven't had much time to explore yet, but my partner and I try to get to Yi Xin Cafe in Market City regularly for a Whole Dungeness Crab (Singapore Chili Style), and some Ung Choy with Shrimp Paste. There's nothing like cleaning dirty fingers with a side bowl of white rice.

Butter Mochi w/Fenugreek topped w/Coconut Whip & Toasted Coconut**For the mochi:**

5 eggs
1/2 cup butter *plus a few Tbls to grease pan*
1 box mochiko flour
3 cups sugar
2 1/2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp fenugreek powder
14.5 oz. evaporated milk (*Carnation makes a can this size, or substitute a 12-oz. can*)
13.5 oz. coconut milk (*I use Chaokoh*)
1 1/2 tsp vanilla paste or 1 tsp vanilla extract
Parchment paper

Directions: Bring the eggs to room temperature. Butter a 8x12-inch or 9x13-inch brownie pan or glass casserole dish, then line it with parchment paper. Mix mochiko, sugar, baking powder and fenugreek powder. Melt butter over low heat, try to keep it from coming to a bubble. Mix evaporated milk, coconut milk, eggs and vanilla, then whisk together until even. Next, slowly stir the dry mix into the wet and whisk until smooth. Stir in melted butter until smooth. Bake at 350° for 1 1/2 to 2 hours, rotating the pan every 20-25 minutes. Start checking after 1 1/2 hours, and adjust bake time based on what it looks like. The top should be golden brown, and if you use a cake tester or a toothpick, it should come out relatively clean, not with sticky goo on it. To serve, top squares of mochi with coconut whip and sprinkle with lots of toasted coconut flakes. Enjoy!

For the coconut whip:

1 cup coconut cream
(or coconut milk, if that's all that's available)

1 cup whipping cream
2 Tbls sugar (*add more to taste*)
1 tsp vanilla extract

Directions: Store canned coconut cream or milk in the fridge overnight. When ready, scoop out the thick separated top as the main part to fill your cup. (*I prechill my whipping bowl and whisk in the freezer an hour before making the cream.*) Whisk all ingredients together until desired texture. Place in the fridge until ready to use.

For the toasted coconut flakes: Toast about 2 cups of coconut flakes in the oven at 350° F until browned, about 5-8 minutes, then toss with about 2 tablespoons sugar.

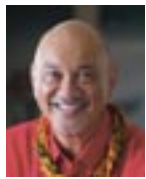

Sea Life Park launches new Shark Snorkel

As Sea Life Park continues to celebrate its 60th anniversary, it has launched a new animal encounter to enhance guests' experience at the iconic destination. The Shark Snorkel encounter launched in January and allows guests to interact with whitetip reef sharks up close.

At the Park's Hawaiian Reef habitat, guests will see whitetip reef sharks and other tropical fish, including the eyestripe surgeon, ringtail surgeon, yellowfin surgeon, yellow tang, and more. The exhibit holds approximately 40,000 gallons of seawater that come directly from the ocean through a specialized flow-through system. There are five sharks in this encounter. All were born at Sea Life Park, and their ages range from 9 to 11. White tip reef sharks can reach 6 feet in length--the sharks in the encounter are still growing and are not yet full size.

After a safety briefing and being fitted for a life jacket, guests will walk into the shallow end with a member from Sea Life

Park's Reef Life animal care team where they will put on their snorkeling gear to begin swimming in the deeper section of the habitat with the sharks and have an opportunity to feed and observe the other reef fish. The

care team will share various interesting facts during the experience and insights into what they're looking at once they begin snorkeling. Staff members are present in the water for the duration of the program and can answer questions as they arise.

Whitetip reef sharks are generally not aggressive or territorial. The sharks at the Park are used to being around humans, ensuring a safe experience. During the encounter, all guests should closely follow instructions from the care team. The program is 30 minutes long and includes 20 minutes in the water. This interaction is open to ages four and up and costs \$199.99 per guest, which includes one-day admission to the Park. For more information, head to their website at sealifeparkhawaii.com.
