Each day and evening is filled with music, hula and a variety of entertainment in the Pikake Room, where sitting is a treat when celebrity entertainers, including Hawaii's finest, the Na Hoku Hanohano winners, present concerts in the Pikake Room. Tired feet are guaranteed to revive and tap to the music

Search. Once all the entries were received, five finalists were selected. These are the musicians who will perform and be judged by Grammynominated and Na Hoku Award-winning slack key

guitar master, Cyril Pahinui, Luana Maitland, music director of the Grille, and John Viera, MELE Studios program coordinator. The winners receive a one month paid

contract to perform at the Grille and studio time for recording at MELE Studios.

The show takes place at the Neal Blaisdell Exhibition Hall & Arena on Ward Avenue between King Street and Kapiolani Boulevard. The best way to go – car pool with friends, catch The Bus. Visitors or residents in Waikiki can hop on the free dedicated Waikiki Trolley. The service is offered between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Sunday. Pick-up/ drop-off points are Hilton Hawaiian Village on Kalia Road, the Duke Kahanamoku statue and Aston Waikiki Beach Hotel, both on Kalakaua Avenue, the Ohana West on Kuhio Avenue and the Neal Blaisdell Center.

What originated as a modest 61-booth exhibition to help Hawaii's local businesses now attracts over 39,000 attendees. Mainland and neighbor island visitors plan trips to coincide with the three-day extravaganza – a marathon of food, music, and non-stop shopping.

Each year new vendors sell at the Festival. All of the artisans work hard to comply with the rules of the show. Living up to the Made in Hawaii promise isn't all that easy. The laws regulating products require 51% of the wholesale value of each product be manufactured, assembled, produced or fabricated of materials made in Hawaii. Meeting the criteria is tough for screen print artists who must buy t-shirts made in China or, if they are lucky, from a mainland U.S. factory. For designers, Continues on page 2.



The beaches of Waikiki will be filled with lots of activity as Waikiki's premier ocean sports festival, Duke's OceanFest returns for nine-days from August 16-24th.

Visitors will have the chance to see dozens of competitions take place near Queen's Surf as the OceanFest focuses on sports that were close to Duke's heart. There will be mutiple events to watch every day, from beach volleyball to surfing and paddle board races to a special wounded warrior canoe regatta to the always popular lifeguard competition and surfboard waterpolo match! Stands will be erected in front of the Duke Kahanamoku's statue for spectators to watch the various competitions, and the Duke's OceanFest Expo will be open daily from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. with a variety of exhbition and retail booths to browse.

Duke was one of the greatest athletes to ever come out of Hawaii. Recognized at the "Father of Surfing," he won six Olympic medals between 1912 - 1932, including three golds in swimming. Duke is fondly remembered today as the greatest waterman who ever lived, and was the first person ever inducted into both the International Swimming Hall of the Fame and International Surfing Hall of Fame.

Now in its 13th year, Duke's Oceanfest celebrates and honors not only Duke's enduring legacy but also our ocean sports heritage and the watermen and women that continue those traditions each and every day. Truly a once-in-a-lifetime experience for your guests to experience. Fortunately for us, we get to experience it once a year. If you or your guests cannot get out to Waimanalo, they can still experience the genre as the 32nd Annual Hawaiian Slack Key Guitar Festival takes over Kapiolani Park on August 17th from noon to 6 p.m. One of my favorite perfomers, Makana, once known as "The Ki Ho`alu Kid" will just be getting back to town after his worldwide adventure to headline an all-star line-up of 15 of the some of the greatest slack key musicians in the island. fabric is also a challenge since fiber plants, like cotton, are not native to Hawaii. The best they can do is order yardage, pay shipping and print fabric in the islands.

It is great to know that there is always something new at the festival, but also fun to see the "old timers" who have participated in the festival since its inception, including Sandy Vincent, owner of Sandy's Creations (Niihau shell lei and jewelry), Som' Good Things (Hawaiian sea salt seasonings), CJ Metal Creations (metal wall sculptures, lanterns and whimsical sculptures of golfers, fishermen, etc. using nuts and bolts).

The newest vendors will include, from Maui; Maui Fruit Jewels, Oahu; Kahala Fresh (dried fruits, salts and baked goods) and Uncle Clay's House of Pure Aloha (ginger snacks that are being enjoyed by the crews of Hokulea). From Kauai, Mailelani's Hawaiian print bags and baggage tags and from Molokai, Tula with Molokai shell jewelry created by two sisters.

New for 2014 in the Pikake Room – DBEDT (Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism) presents New Product Showcase. Sort of a "festival within the festival" featuring vendors who haven't participated in the festival before. The showcase will include products from members of three organizations.



The HiFi (Hawaii Fashion Incubator) is an organization dedicated to promoting Hawaii fashion as art and industry. They will have a HiFi Boutique featuring apparel and accessories by six vendors, and will also present several fashion shows on stage in Pikake Room each day.

The group, INNOVATE Hawaii, a program of the High Technology Development Corporation, helps small and medium companies will feature new products from local food manufacturers.

Hawaii Cultural and Retail Association is participating for the first time with a block of booths featuring members' products as well as demonstrations throughout the festival. HCRA members are Hawaii's cultural artisans and practitioners who create both traditional and contemporary products, one preserving the stories of the past and the other creating the picture of the future. The group honors the mana, the energy that creates a balance as they develop authentic Hawaii products that help perpetuate the people, place, and culture of Hawaii.

Members consist of kumu hula, lauhala weavers, lei makers, craftsmen, lomi lomi practitioners, jewelry designers, fine artists, graphic artists, textile artists, book authors, media professionals, kahu, Hawaiian educators, organic farmers, entertainers and business leaders.

A bit of history on this mega-shopping event: In 1995, State Representative David Morihara envisioned an event that would provide a venue to showcase all the products of Hawaii, and provide an opportunity for companies to market themselves to retail buyers and consumers and test-market new products. Over the years the event has become a business incubator helping businesses test-market products at low cost to thousands of patrons.

The number of exhibitor booths grew from 61 in 1995, 100 in 1996, 150 in 1997, 170 in 1998, 209 in 1999 and nearly 284 in 2000. In 2001, the festival expanded to include booths in both the Exhibition Hall and Arena at the Neal Blaisdell Center with more than 380 booths. This year, the festival will more than 450 booths. ~ Lynn

The purpose of this concert is to encourage the singing of Hawaiian music in the old fashioned manner without microphones. These performances will truly be inspiring especially in such a majestic theatre as the Hawaii Theatre. This competition has served as the proving ground for local artists such as Holunape, Hookena, Piloha, Kuuuipo and Kanialau who are now well-known names in contemporary Hawaiian music. Tickets are \$20 to \$30 and can be purchased online at HawaiiTheatre.com or by calling the box office at 528-0506. This is an authentic Hawaiian experience not to be missed, too bad it is only for


Fortunately for your guests, the glimpse into Hawaii's local contemporary world portrayed in the plays produced at KUMU KAHUA THEATRE are "on the boards" for weeks to be enjoyed by locals and visitors. The theatre opens its 44th season with the world premiere of Shoyu on Rice a play by Scot Izuka. It's a dramedy (part comedy, part drama) set at a private Catholic high school here in Hawaii and deals with teen peer pressure and identity issues. The play is set in the mid-1980s and centers on a substitute teacher from Kansas who takes over a classroom at an all-boys high school. Many of your guests will identify with the main character as she tries to comprehend the intricacies of pidgin English. In addition to the general local culture, the teacher also must adapt to the way of her Japanese-American fiance's parents. Think of it as a local version of the play "History Boys" but not set in England, not about getting into university, and not about an eccentric teacher. Actually "Shoyu on Rice" is nothing like "History Boys" other than the fact that it gives the audience a look into the various lives of students and teachers and how rumors can be damaging at such a young age. The production opens on August 21 and runs through September 21, so there are lots of opportunities for you to recommend this to your guests. Curtain is 8 p.m. Thursday through Saturday, with 2 p.m. Sunday matinee. Tickets are \$20 and \$16 for seniors 62 and older. Now if your guests want to get as far away as possible from the beach, then I recommend ballet. Honestly! BALLET HAWAII'S Peter Pan is truly not to be missed. For several years, Ballet Hawaii has been partnering with the Washington Ballet's artistic director, Septime Webre, to bring some of his dazzling productions to Hawaii. In the past his production of "Alice in Wonderland" was praised by critics and enjoyed by both local and visitor audiences. This production of "Peter Pan" is not like any ballet your guests have seen. Yet, this may be the only ballet your guests will ever see. And if it is, so be it, as it's a fun, high-flying adventure to Neverland with Peter and the Lost Boys, Captain Hook and his pirates, and of course Wendy and her two little brothers. And guess what? Peter actually flies in the air, high up above the stage. The swashbuckling production runs Friday, August 8 and Saturday, August 9 at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday, August 10 at 2 p.m. at the Blaisdell Concert Hall. THE ACTORS' GROUP's production of Resistance! which is an historical drama about William Parker, a former slave who resisted and overturned the Fugitive Slave Act in Pennsylvania in 1851. For those of you who loved the Oscar winning film "Twelve Years a Slave" this play will give you another look into the world of slavery during the middle of the 19th century. 

Fly away. That's the urge that August brings. School is out, vacation days beg to be used. But wait, we all have jobs connected to all those mainland folks who have flown away from their home, migrating to the sun and

the soothing sound of the surf in Waikiki. And it's our job - well, mostly your job - to make their vacation dreams come true. Aunty Lynn's suggestion, suspend reality whenever possible and play where you stay.

START YOUR ENGINES: The biggest fly-away is the Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor Remote-Control Biggest Little Airshow in Hawaii. Saturday and Sunday, August 16 and 17, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. One of the coolest parts is getting to drive over the bridge and onto Ford Island. Of course there is also a free shuttle from the Pearl Harbor Visitor Center.

What you can see will be amazing feats by remote-control flying aircraft – plus the real-size planes that fill the museum. On Saturday at 5 p.m. A big screen will be hung in Hangar 79 for a free showing of the new Disney film, "Planes: Fire and Rescue". Bring a mat or beach chair for the movie. Free tours of the hangar are the place to play "spot the bullet holes from the attack on Pearl Harbor - December 7, 1941 and check out the work in progress at the restoration shop – or get up close and personal with an F-14 Tomcat, F-15 Eagle, F-86s, P-40, MiG-15, F-111.

At the Red Bull tent streaming broadcasts will air (oops, couldn't resist the pun) of the 2014 Red Bull Air Race World Championship – the sky's fastest and most breathtaking sport. Check the Ford Island Runway for candy drops, hands-on modeling stations, music, food, drinks, retail and entertainment booths and exhibits, keiki rides and activities, and lots and lots of airplanes.

Local and mainland pilots from the Academy of Model Aeronautics, plus remote control flyers from Japan, will demonstrate remote-control aviation feats, flying massive, 1-to-5 scale planes. The ohh and ahh moments include: Pattern, 3-D fixed wing and helicopter aerobatic flights, South Pacific battles, and Skycam drone helicopters. Remote control aircraft will be in the air and on static display including jets, helicopters, F-22s, warbirds, B-17s, P-38s, Corsairs, OV-10s and more.

SATURDAY SOUNDS: Planning to cruise Kailua, shop a bit, eat – even have a glass of wine in the Whole Foods wine bar. Yup, actually by the glass inside the grocery store, though somehow the term "grocery store" doesn't quite fit – maybe we should say "food castle." But, back to Saturday in Kailua. The Harold K.L. Castle Foundation's free monthly

Kanikapila in Kailua happens one Saturday a month, from 4 to 5:30 p.m. on the ground floor of the parking lot behind Long's. On August 16th Mailani will sing, September 20th is Palani Vaughn, October 18th Kamaka Fernandez and November 15th features Teresa Bright. Bring a beach chair. The concerts started two years ago and are the brainchild of Kawika Kahiapo. If you haven't been. Go.

STAY GO: Sunday in the country means Hawaii Polo Club matches at Mokule'a. Take a picnic, walk the beach, eat from the food trucks, count the skydivers at half-time. It's like a trip to a neighbor island without the flight. For August, Argentina and India teams will challenge Hawaii and the games are much easier to reach than Brazil.

SAMPLE SUNDAY: Spend a morning at Na Mea at Ward Warehouse hanging out with Nake'i Awai for his Tea & Talk. He knows everyone. Two that caught my attention: August 10th Watters Martin Jr. will talk about Ming's Honolulu – great fun for anyone heir to grandma's gold or ivory jewelry. The next week Kumu Hula Joan Lindsey and April Villa will be there to chat about the late, great Lena Machado – and the list goes on. 10:30 on Sunday, be there!

SEEING BACK: Two iconic treasures in Waikiki are presenting two shows looking back. The Halekulani House Without a Key offers the early 1900's *Photographs of Hawaii – Where Tradewinds Blow*, featuring the work of Caroline Haskins Gurrey and A.R. Gurrey, Jr.; a portal into the 1900's in Hawaii. The exhibit, open free of charge, will run through August 31, 2014 and is located along its promenade, next to House Without a Key

The second exhibition, in the Coronet Lounge at the Royal Hawaiian, is a mouth-watering essay of feasting in the islands from 1920's to 1960's. Matson Navigation Company menus and artwork from the posh parties of the past as well as the opening night of the Royal Hawaiian. The exhibit will be on display until July 31, 2015 at no charge.

SENTIMENTAL JOURNEY: A conversation with Lezlee and Henry always leads to a game of who did this, who wrote that — kind of Twenty Questions, Hawaiian style. Who wrote Honolulu City Lights? Who sang NightBird? Who holds the record for most people at a concert at the Waikiki Shell? I toss back, who played the courtyard of the Blaisdell Hotel on Fort Street when it was still a street? So, Henry Kapono and friends are gathering on August 23rd at the Waikiki Shell to take us Back in the Day. Oh, the answers are: Keola Beamer, Kalapana, Cecilio & Kapono, and Olomana. See you there!


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









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Slack Key masters at play

Prepare for a marathon of slack key, cha-lang-a-lang and the joy of backyard Hawaiian style music. Saturday, August 9th is Gabby Pahinui Waimanalo Kanikapila. From 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. you can enjoy the music of nearly every Hawaiian musician you every wanted to hear, and it's all free.

The 7th Annual Fest will happen at Waimanalo Beach Park, only a few short blocks from Gabby's home. The day includes hula, lomi lomi massage, food booths with stew and rice and shave ice, cultural demonstrations, community organization displays and the sound that Gabby built.

Reading musician, filmmaker and Hawaiian treasure Eddie Kamae's biography, "Hawaiian Son," makes it clear that Gabby Pahinui's musical legacy with the Sons of Hawaii evolved from his friendship with fellow musicians.

Kamae's account of sitting down with Gabby for "an hour" in Waimanalo — and staying for days — offers up a close view of Gabby's magic. It could be beautiful, but it took stamina.

There are volumes of stories about Gabby. He was loved, and his fellow musicians recognize his legacy. Listen carefully to Iz' 1993 "Facing Future" CD and you'll hear the late, great IZ say, "Kay, dis one's for Gabby."

Gabby left us earlier than he should have – born in 1921, he died on Oct. 13, 1980 at age 59. Lucky for us all, three of Gabby's sons, Bla, Martin and Cyril have grown the Pahanui tradition — followed by many other musicians who were also inspired by hearing Gabby.

Cyril and his wife, Chelle, knew that everyone who loves Hawaiian music should know the joy of sitting on the grass at Waimanalo, hearing music played at the source. Seven years ago they invited a few musicians to play at the park. This year, 150 musicians will participate, often playing with a created-on-the-spot group – maybe an hour old – so that everyone gets their chance to play. Go early, stay late. Check gabbypahinui.com for the line-up.

For more great slack key, spend Sunday, August 17th from noon to 6 p.m., at Kapiolani Park as Milton Lau presents his 32nd Annual Hawaiian Slack Key Guitar Festival. Park benches or lowback chairs are the way to relax and enjoy the day with added attractions of crafters, food booths, a guitar and ukulele exhibit and a drawing for a coveted Taylor guitar.

Lau says it is hard to believe this is the 32nd year. He started the festival at Ala Moana Park, moved it to Kapiolani and then created six more festivals in Hawaii, two in Japan, three in Europe (Stockholm, Sweden, Amsterdam, Holland and Zurich). Makana will headline the festival, plus Maunalua, Brother Noland, Kawika Kahiapo, and more. Got to slackkeyfestival.com. ~ Lynn Cook



Chef's Corner

Celebrity Pastry Chef Johnny Iuzzini

ohnny Iuzzini has been named Outstanding Pastry Chef by the James Beard Foundation, one of the "10 Most Influential Pastry Chefs in America" by Forbes, "Best New Pastry Chef" by New York Magazine, and named one of the "Top Ten Pastry Chefs in America" two years in a row by Pastry Arts and Design. He has authored several cookbooks and was the Head Judge on Bravo's Top Chef Just Desserts and... he is coming to Hawaii next month for the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival!

When did you decide you wanted to be a chef? I've never had a job Do you have favorite flavor combination? I love strawberry and outside the kitchen since age 15. Funny though, I only ended up in the kitchen, washing pots because that was the only job available. All my friends already got all the caddie jobs at the country club.

What sparked your passion about working in a kitchen? I am one of those people that if I feel I can't be great at something I quit and try something else. I played every sport for 1 season in middle and high school. Cooking was the only thing I could see progress daily and that excited me. Even peeling 10 lbs of apples just a little faster then the day before was enough to motivate me

You've worked with some of the top names in the industry. Who would you consider your mentor and why? I have many mentors, Brad Goulden, Francois Payard, Daniel Boulud, Thomas Haas and Jean Georges Vongerichten. In a way they have all contributed to my growth, my vision, my culinary voice and my progress in the industry. I learned about tradition, professionalism, pride and above all respect and humility.

What drew you to pastry? I started out in the savory side of the kitchen, even competing at age 16, but I have a soft spot for animals and found it difficult at a young age to kill and butcher animals. My mother was a veterinarian and wildlife rehabilitator. I grew up nursing juvenile and injured animals back to health and rereleasing them. When I had to kill or butcher an animal it brought me to tears. Pastry was an amazing outlet for me to express my creative spirit as well as that I didn't have to kill anything.

Over the years you have achieved some amazing accolades and awards. What do they mean to you? I am very proud of my accomplishments yet I try to always think of them as stepping stones. I try to remember how hard I have worked and the people who have helped me along the way. I also keep in mind that I have had amazing teams by my side helping me to achieve these great

What are you doing these days? I am traveling the world as much as possible, finishing my second cookbook, coming out September 30 called Sugar Rush. I am also consulting on different projects, doing more TV, both judging and competing. My main goal and reason why I left Jean George is because I have always wanted to build a chocolate factory. This is my ambition.

verbena as well as dark chocolate and peppermint.

What's the strangest thing you've ever tried to create in a kitchen?Hmm... I don't see things as strange, I see them as a successes (delicious) or a failures (not delicious). I have many hits, and just as many misses over the years.

You were the head judge on Top Chef Desserts. How was that? It was a extraordinary experience. I also contributed to the design of challenges. It was the first show to really shed light on the skill sets of a pastry chef. I have recently competed and won on Iron Chef America. I also competed on a new episode of Cutthroat Kitchen All Stars airing later this year and am a judge on a new show called King of Cones on the Food Network.

Compare cooking on a competition show versus cooking on a line? Very different. It is much easier to cook in your home kitchen where you are comfortable with the equipment you are using, you know where everything is, menus are usually set and no cameras in your face. For all the opposite reasons TV is much much harder

I've read you're a workaholic. Are you afraid you'll burn out? I used to be, I still work very hard and spend a lot of time traveling and devoted to my charitable causes but I now have more balance in my life and definitely have taken back some of my life for myself.

What do you think is the next big trend? Hmm, in my opinion, media creates trends and then they complain about it. Chefs don't create trends. We cook what we enjoy and hopefully what our clientele enjoys.

What do you have planned for the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival? I have never been to Hawaii so I want to explore the islands on a motorcycle. I want to scuba dive and visit local cacao and coffee plantations. I'm an outside person, an adrenaline junkie, so anything to get my heart rate up will be on the list.

What's always in your fridge? Chocolate, San Pellegrino sodas, Parmesan cheese, jams.

What do you think you would you be doing if you weren't a chef? That's a good question, one I ask myself often lately. I think something mechanical, working with my hands, maybe welding or creating custom motorcycles.

What's next for you? I plan on building and opening a bean to bar chocolate factory and coffee roaster under one roof.





These are sometimes also called Mexican wedding cookies or Russian tea cakes. I was introduced to them as a kid but never made one until my externship while at the Culinary Institute. You would expect the cookies to be supersweet from being rolled in confectioners' sugar, but the rich, roasted nut flavor balances everything and is what seals the deal for me. I like how they break down when you eat them; the texture is just perfect—part crunchy, part chewy. You can taste each element separately, but they have great synergy together. makes about 2 dozen cookies.

- cup whole almonds, toasted (see page 142) (70 g)
- cup walnut pieces, toasted (see page 142) (60 g)
- tablespoons (¾ stick) cold unsalted butter, diced (84 g)
- dough begins to clump together. Add the nuts and mix

6 tablespoons granulated sugar (72 g) 1 tablespoon brandy or whiskey (15 g)

¹/₄ cups all-purpose flour, sifted (156 g)

About 1 cup confectioners' sugar, for

- •Bake until light golden brown, 18 to 20 minutes.

½ teaspoon kosher salt (2 g)

rolling, sifted

- Put the confectioners' sugar in a large bowl. Let the cookies cool on the pan for about 5 minutes and then toss them in confectioners' sugar until coated. Shakeoff the excess and transfer them to a rack to cool completely
- · Store the cookies at room temperature in an airtight container for up to 5 days.

- Preheat the oven to 350°F. Line a baking sheet with a silicone baking mat or parchment paper.
- Put the almonds and walnuts into a food processor and pulse until finely chopped but not powdery.
- Put the butter and granulated sugar into a standing mixer bowl and toss with your fingers until the butter is coated. Attach the bowl and paddle to the mixerand beat the butter and sugar on medium-low speed until a thick paste forms with no visible butter lumps.
- Add the brandy and, with the mixer on low, add the flour and salt, a little at a time, occasionally scraping down the bowl with a rubber spatula; mix just until the





On Saturday, August 23rd the 30th Annual Ka Himeni 'Ana Music Competition will honor the singing tradition and the man who kept it alive, the late Richard M. Towill.

Unamplified music is nearly a foreign phrase to recent generations. Richard Towill remembered it from his "small-kid" days on Kauai. The neighbors would all pile into an open touring car and ride around the neighborhood singing what they called nahenahe music — no boom box, no microphone, only sweet voices and a guitar or two, serenading the holiday season.

Graduated from Punahou School, MIT and the U.S. Airforce, Towill returned to Hawaii and joined his dad at the R.M. Towill Corporation in Honolulu. They engineered massive projects including Honolulu Airport's Reef Runway. Young Towill always missed the nahenahe music of his youth so thirty years ago he created a contest to bring it back to mainstream. He called it Ka Himeni Ana.

The goal of the contest was to encourage more Hawaiian music. The rules were simple. Two to five singing members in a group, at least half playing unamplified guitars, ukulele or bass. The exception is a small amplifier for a steel guitar. The winners receive a cash award and a gig at the Kana Ka Pila Grille at the Outrigger Reef on the Beach in Waikiki.

The concert is now organized by son Rick Towill, with his wife Crystal and the Hawaiian Music Hall of Fame. Thanks to the young Towill's what will also be amplified is the sense of smell. White ginger blossoms have been the concert's signature flower for thirty years. On the morning of the shot, over 500 stalks of white ginger are harvested from the valley behind the Towill home. The stalks fill containers across the stage and become a farewell gift to audience members after the show.

The list of judges reads like who's who in Hawaiian music, often creating a nervous moment or two for the entrants. Nina Keali'iwahamana, award winning star of Hawaii Calls and the Monarch Room of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel, Nola Nahulu, music educator, choral director and winner of the first Ka Himeni contest, and Haunani Apoliona, OHA trustee and performer with Jerry Santos, and Aaron Mahi, musician and a 20+ year veteran bandleader of the Royal Hawaiian Band.

Musician, Na Hoku award winning recording artist, kumu hula and cultural specialist Manu Boyd emcees the show, making it a bit like listening in on a very local conversation. "Just saying...." punctuates every intro, giving the audience an insider look at Hawaii's world of music plus a running commentary on the Aloha attire fashions of the singing groups. He gets the biggest laughs when he asks, "who are you wearing."

Boyd won the contest in 1986. Other winners; Alea with Kale Hannas,1998; Holunape, 2004; and Waikiki regulars, Doug Tolentino, Jeff AuHoy and the entire Ho'opi'i family.


