Honolulu City Lights

Honolulu City Lights first began back in 1985, when former Mayor Frank Fasi created a free event that included a 50-foot Norfolk Pine installed on the main lawn decorated with wooden white doves and gold balls and illuminated by flood lights, a decorated tree display in the courtyard, a holiday concert and displays of light on the trees and buildings from downtown to the civic center. Music and a drum roll and the lights went on. That was it. But, from that humble one-tree beginning, the festival of lights has grown into Hawaii's premier holiday celebration. But how did the celebration get to where it is today? Here's a quick look at the evolution of Hawaii's favorite holiday light extravaganza.

The first official tree lighting ceremony was held on Thursday, December 12, 1985. After the success of the event that first year, more businesses decided to put light displays on their buildings, and a public wreath contest and display were added to the holiday celebration. So in 1986, the "Corridor of Lights" was born.

The following year, in 1987, officials decided to name the month-long event the name we use to this day... Honolulu City Lights, and the giant tree was decorated with strings of colored lights.

Random trivia fact... Did you know a traffic signal control box was used to change the colors of the lights on the tree back then? People could hear the box clicking from green to yellow to red but no one cared. They were just happy that the big tree would change colors.

The following year in 1988, the City decided to step it up a notch, and hired Owen Ho as the event's designer, who is still there to this day. He had ornaments especially hand made for the tree. We're talking individual ornaments the size of most people's Christmas trees. Plus, the first of many large outdoor displays were built and added to the scene.

The event's popularity continued to grow and organizers were on a roll to ensure that Honolulu City Lights stood out from any other holiday display on the mainland and become one of the most unique city holiday displays in the world. But how best to do that? According to Ho, it was through one internally known gesture. Before there was the Shaka emoji – there was the Shaka Santa. In an old interview published in MidWeek, Ho was quoted as saying, "Frank Fasi's political symbol was the shaka sign, so we created the

It's Whale Season Again!

Winter in Hawaii means long sleeve T-shirts, a pair of Ugg's sometimes, and my favorite annual visitor, the whales. Although the first whale of the season was actually spotted on Oahu back in September, happily breaching off of the Waianae Coast, he must have been lost as there hasn't been any sightings since then that have been mentioned. However, all of that is about to change as guaranteed whale sighting tours begin this month. Atlantis starts their guaranteed sighting on December 17th, with Star of Honolulu beginning theirs on December 23rd. The guarantees continue through the first week of April, so there should be plenty of time to see these majestic creatures.

The whales return to Hawaii each year after feeding in the cold waters of Alaska all summer long. They migrate to our warm, shallow waters in Hawaii, which are ideal for mating and birthing, which is why these peaceful mammals return year after year. Weighing in at a massive 25 to 40 tons, humpbacks can grow up to 50 feet long. They are easy to identify by distinctive gray or black coloring and a white underbelly and underside of their pectoral fins and fluke (tail). This white pattern on the bottom of the fluke is unique to each humpback and can be used to identify individuals just like a fingerprint. These markings can often be spotted when they breach. Though the whales get close enough to be spotted from shore, the best way to see their playful jumps and tail flaps is out in the water alongside them. Luckily for our guests, there are plenty of chances for great photo ops on a wide range of sails. Some boats even lower a microphone into the water for a rare chance to hear the famous whale song of the humpbacks. They are so plentiful in Hawaiian waters the next few months, one doesn't even need to go on whale watch to see them (although that is the only way to guarantee a sighting), as many of the beach cats often see them during their booze cruises.

Around April, they start to return to the cool, plankton-rich ocean off the coast of Alaska to stuff

themselves before they have to trek south again. Humpbacks live between forty and sixty years so it's almost like visiting with old friends when they come back to visit us each winter. Currently, humpback whales are among the list of endangered animals under watch by NOAA and it's no surprise that their annual visit is a highly anticipated time in the islands.

For a total package, some of your major tour operators, like Star of Honolulu, Atlantis and Hawaii Nautical offer whale watch tours lasting around two and half hours that include food, entertainment, and as many whales as the boat can find. For the water-wary, these larger boats may be less intimidating as well as offering a smoother ride and a few more comforts of home. For those seeking a bit more excitement, finding a whale watch on a smaller boat or an inflatable can get really exciting, but you definitely know you're on a boat, and may not be for all of your guests.

Keep in mind that seeing them from the air is pretty cool as well. Once the height of whale season is underway, those helicopter tours can get great views, as do the people that go parasailing, especially those that go parasailing in Hawaii Kai, as the whales seem to traverse the waters between China Walls and Diamond Head quite frequently. Timing is everything however, so a whale sighting while up in the air is not guaranteed by any means, but a few of your guests will likely hit the jackpot.

Whale season starts slow as far as sightings go. Although the season officially starts this month, the best viewing around Oahu tends to be in January and February. Whatever mode your guests choose get out and see our annual cetacean tourists, just encourage them to go. They are simply an amazing sight to behold. It's easy to take these creatures for granted, but their visit is a rare treat and a great excuse to relax and watch the water for a while. 

Hanaiakamalama, the Hawaiian name for the Palace, was built in 1847 and became the summer retreat for Queen Emma from 1857 to 1885 with husband King Kamehameha IV and son Prince Albert Edward. For those of your guests not able to attend the Christmas Tea, the palace is open Monday through Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. General admission is \$10, senior/military with ID is \$8 and children 5 to 17 is \$1. Guided tours are offered at 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 1 p.m., 2 p.m. Monday through Saturday. For groups that have more than 10 people, please call one-week prior to visiting to schedule a Palace tour 595-3167 or visit daughtersofhawaii.org.

The residence of Mary Dominis, the mother-in-law of Queen Lili'uokalani, is the setting for BALLET HAWAII'S annual Nutcracker Ballet at the Blaidell Concert Hall with the Hawai'i Symphony Orchestra. This Hawai'i themed Nutcracker, which first debuted last year, is set in the Kingdom of Hawai'i circa 1858. The tale of Uncle Drosselmeyer and the little girl named Marie remains the same as in the original ballet but the setting is now Washington Place, which today is the official residence for the Governor of Hawai'i. The extravagant production with costumes designed by Anne Namba will give your guests a glimpse into the monarchy period. The toy soldiers will be dressed as the Royal Guard and the waltz of

the snowflakes will take place on the slopes of Mauna Kea.

In the Second Act the Hawai'i influences continue with The Flowers becoming Crown, Hibiscus and Plumeria among other Hawaiian touches. New York City Ballet principal dancers Megan Fairchild will return at the Sugar Plum Fairy, and Joaquin DeLuz will be the Cavalier. There will be four performances: Friday, December 15th at 7:30 p.m., Saturday, December 16th at 2 p.m. & 7:30 p.m. and Sunday, December 17th at 2 p.m. Tickets available by phone at 745-3000 at the Blaisdell Box Office (open Monday – Saturday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.) or online at ticketmaster.com.

There is a special opening night preperformance dinner on the 15th at 5 p.m. at Chef Chai on Kapi'olani Blvd. The four-course dinner paired with wine created by Chef Chai Chaowasaree is \$200 per person and includes VIP seating and parking at the Blaisdell Concert Hall. It wouldn't be the holidays without IOLANI PALACE'S annual Holiday Evening Tours in celebration of the birthday of Queen Kapi'olani, the wife of King David Kalakaua would built the Palace in 1882 to enhance the prestige of Hawai'i overseas and to mark Hawai'i's status as a modern nation. These special evening tours will occur on Friday, December 29th and Saturday, December 30th from 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. with the last tickets issued at 8:45 p.m. Since lines are general long for this once a year event, pre-sale reserved tickets are \$30 per person (this means you don't have to wait in the ticket line). Shaka Santa. We did it with the intention that when Frank finally retired, we would cut off the hand and have Santa waving. It was such an icon for the city that then-Mayor Jeremy Harris said not to take the shaka off." Weighing 2 tons, and standing 21-feet high, sculptor Kurt Nelson brought Ho's design to life. The Shaka Santa was the first of the large displays to debut and is now an integral part of the display and has sat on the outdoor fountain every year since 1989.

In the years following Shaka Santa's addition, the Snow Family, Mrs. Claus, the alphabet blocks, gnomes, bears, and Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer were added to the festive atmosphere and the "corridor of lights" was extended from downtown to Thomas Square. But, organizers weren't done yet. In 1991, they introduced the Public Workers' Electric Light Parade — which quickly became one of the most popular elements of the festival. Entire families came down to Honolulu Hale to see the decorated city work vehicles (refuse truck, cherry picker, ambulance, fire truck, vector truck) bring Christmas delight to the crowds.

By now the majority of the festival was set, but every few years, the event gets a facelift. In 1995, they began lighting the front of Honolulu Hale to add onto the "corridor of lights." After 9/11 happened, a giant, lighted American flag was installed on the front lawn by the big tree and all the outdoor display figures wore red, white and blue ribbons in order to show Patriotic Pride. Over the next decade, more outdoor displays were added, including the Bear Band and the Lanakila train, and new ornaments were created every 3 years for the big tree.

In 2000, a limited edition commemorative ornament was created in honor of the event and to raise funds to help keep the Honolulu City Lights celebration free to the public. Yearly renditions of these ornaments have been made every since, and

are now sold in sets around different themes. This year's ornament celebrates the theme, "It's a Zoo Out There," featuring The Honolulu Zoo. The "Deck the Halls" ornament focuses on the decoration of the 50-foot City Christmas tree by Santa's friends from the Honolulu Zoo. Santa then takes off for the zoo in his sleigh pulled by a zebra, lion, hippo and elephant.

The other ornament,
"Holoholo Honolulu
Zoo," features many
more zoo animals who
are helping Santa
decorate their tree.
Everyone is dressed
up in their best bow tie
including the longnecked giraffe who sports
three bow ties.

Past themes include the North Shore, Surfing Santa, and Celebrating our heroes in a patriotic set created last year in honor of Pearl Harbor. All ornaments made since 2000 can also be purchased

on the Friends website at honolulucitylights.org.

Ornaments can be purchased purchased for \$18 at all Oahu branches of First Hawaiian Bank or any Oahu Macy's store. This year, for the first time due to the zoo theme, the ornaments can also be purchased at the Honolulu Zoo Gift Shop. Macy's Ala Moana Center will also sell previous year ornaments if you are so inclined. The ornaments are made from highly polished brass that is electroplated first with nickel and then with 24K gold, for a hard, durable finish.

This year, opening night festivities take place on Saturday, December 2nd. Food, souvenir booths and keiki rides open at 4 p.m., and Mayor Kirk Caldwell's tree lighting ceremony begins on the steps of Honolulu Hale at 6 p.m. At the same time, the Electric Light Parade begins at Aala Park and makes its way down King Street towards Honolulu Hale in time for Polynesian Voyaging Society president and master navigator Nainoa Thompson to ceremoniously illuminate the holiday tree at 6:30 p.m., triggering the corridor of lights and displays down King and Punchbowl streets.

While there, be sure to check out the city employee decorated tree exhibit and Santa's Gingerbread House and Enchanted Forest Display in the Courtyard. There will also be a Wreath Display in Lane Gallery. At 7:30 p.m., kids can take free photos with Santa in the Mission Memorial Auditorium until around 9 p.m., while outside, a special holiday concert begins. This years concert features 2017 Na Hoku Hanohano Male Vocalist of the Year Josh Tatofi and musical entertainment by the Kamehameha Elementary Schools Chorus, Kupaoa and Mark Yamanaka, and Mailani Makainai. Festivities go on until 11 p.m.

King Street will remain closed until 8:30 p.m. so fans and families can visit the floats. At 9 p.m., the street will open and motorists will be able to drive slowly in the mauka, mountain-side lane so they can see the lights and the festivities.

Honolulu City Lights is one of those "only in Hawaii" moments, albeit a month long, that we can share with all our visitors and families. Downtown Honolulu is a halfway point for those working in and visiting Waikiki. Bishop Square is a forest of lights. Take a slow drive down Beretania, past multiple light displays. Turn left on Bishop Street and drive by Bishop Square, then turn left again on King Street and pass Iolani Palace, lighted as it was for Queen Lili'uokalani then take the slow lane past Honolulu Hale and make the loop again.

For those that can't make the festivities, The opening night festivities, including the tree lighting ceremony, parade, and concert, will be cablecast LIVE on Saturday, December 2, at 6 p.m. on 'Olelo Channel 49. For a complete schedule of events, go to honolulucitylights.org.





Chef's Corner

Chef & Owner of REAL a gastropub & BREW'd Troy Terorotura

Chef Terorotua, who is of Tahitian and American descent moved to Hawaii in 1997 after a chance meeting with Sam Choy to become the corporate chef of his growing restaurant chain. He helped in thedevelopment and opening of five restaurants and traveled exclusively with Choy for years. After he left he became the beer buyer for Whole Foods and is credited for started the craft beer culture here in Hawaii. Soon thereafter, he opened REAL a gastropub, Hawaii's first beer-centric pub to rave reviews.

When did you decide you wanted to be a chef?

High School. I affirmed that in the future as careers were evolving that people would always need to eat and there would be many options in this ever-changing industry.

What was your first job in the industry?

I worked at a Raw Bar during high school, working my way up from a dishwasher to the lead line cook and shucking more oysters than I care to remember.

Who would you consider your mentor and why?

I have had mentors in many aspects of my life. I try to learn something from everyone and take these nuggets of wisdom and adapt them into my life. The one that keeps me moving forward has been to stay true to myself and not what others believe you should be.

You came to Hawaii with Sam Choy. How and when?

I started with Sam in 1997 when I was hired as his corporate chef. I had just returned to Florida from living in Tahiti and the weekend I returned Sam was a guest chef at the restaurant I had been working. By the end of the weekend, I had been offered the opportunity to move to Hawaii. I changed the addresses on my boxes and the rest is history.

Any stories from the famous chefs you've worked with?

Working with Sam, I had the privilege and honor to meet and work alongside many renowned and upcoming chefs. The biggest thing you can do is keep your eyes and ears open and learn from what you see and hear. Take these work ethics and stories and strive to implement these into your life personally and professionally.

I heard REAL has closed. Tell me that's not true!

The flagship location at Ward closed on September 30, due to the gentrification of the area. We knew that REAL needed to remain a part of the craft beer movement of Hawaii and will be opening a new location at Keauhou Lane in Kakaako in 2018.

Let's talk about beer. Where's this fascination from?

Beer has always been a part of the kitchen culture. When you can drink an ice cold beer after a long hot night in the kitchen, it's always a great moment or can be life changing. I have always loved to travel, explore new places and try new experiences that were not

available in Hawaii and drink locally produced beers during these travels.

What drove you to kick-start the craft beer culture here and launch a gastropub?

When Whole Foods Market opened in Kahala, I had the opportunity to become the beer buyer and LOVED it! I was able to build a world class beer selection that was not seen in Hawaii before and found that the guests really loved the selection as well. That was the nucleus for REAL. Hawaii had always been slightly behind the mainland in new trend and concepts, so a gastropub or a different version of the beer bar had never been done and that really set the spark ablaze.

How often are you in one of your kitchens cooking?

Not as much as I would like. There are so many aspects of the day that need to be addressed that it does take you away from where you would like to be.

How much of the menus are your influence?

I have always had my hands in the menu as I really love the development of creating. I love to take styles I've learned and new methods and tweak them into something. I still constantly come up with new ideas and pass them along to my kitchen team and work to build these into menu selections. I will never stop trying to create something for our guests to enjoy.

Is this every man's dream.. to open their own beer hall and has it been everything you expected it will be? Of course every man has probably thought that this would be Utopia, but having worked in the industry for several decades I was aware that this would be a labor of love and hard as hell. It is a 365/24/7 life. This is not the lifestyle for many people. But I love and hate it and would not have it any other way. You have to be slightly off tilt to be in this industry anyway.

What's next for you? (Aside from reopening of course)

I really have several new things that I wish to learn much more about and look forward to diving into them feet first. I love to read about many subjects, but getting my hands dirty and diving into something is the best way to learn.

Q. What do you like to do most on your days off? Relax and spend time with Lisa and our pets.



Root Beer Braised Short Ribs

Ingredients Serves 4

12 lb Short Ribs

½ gallon water

6 cans Maui Brewing Co.

Root Beer

1 cup Brown Sugar

6 Tbsp Kosher Salt

3 Tbsp Vanilla Extract

Marinate overnight. Sear Short ribs well on all sides.

One ribs are marinated and seared, place them in a braising pan or large hotel pan and add:

2 Onions – Med Dice

3 cups Red Wine

2 ½ cups Ketchup

3 cloves Garlic – chopped

3 Carrots – Med Dice

6 cups Water

6 cups Maui Brewing Company Root Beer

Directions







Q. How long have you been with Hilton Grand?
