125 YEARS THROUGH THE EYES OF BISHOP MUSEUM



Here's a question any of us can consider: when was the last time you, yes you, went to Bishop Museum. Company in town? Taking your kids or even that 4th grade excursion you hardly remember? Sometimes you miss the treasures in your own back yard. Hawaii's keeper of history is world renowned. This year the museum's 125th anniversary has been commemorated through amazing presentations of Hawaii history. The events and exhibits are something none of us should miss. The museum is a destination we really need to recommend to all our visitors. Garena's ballbearings, they will thank us.

Bishop Museum's 125th anniversary year culminates in the unveiling of CHANGE: 125 Years Through the Eyes of Bishop Museum. This one-of-its-kind exhibition offers a dynamic portal through time in which visitors can explore Hawaii's remarkable transformation over 125 years. CHANGE opened in the J.M. Long Gallery on December 13th, 2014 and runs through March 16, 2015.

Over 1,000 historic photographs from Bishop Museum's archives are presented thematically in 15 societal themes that everyone can relate to including: food, home life, entertainment, fashion, communication, and transportation. Creative digital interactives are presented in contrast to the historic photos to bring relevance and insight to the Hawaii we know today. Visitors can exchange their smartphones and digital music players for a

day to rotary dial a call over a party line or tune an antique radio to the music of decades past.

In true Bishop Museum fashion, an array of creative audio, video and media are fun and educational. Nothing like learning when having fun, right? So, visitors get to vote for a new state fruit - unofficially of course. Then comes the local sports test on

heroes and events. Take a kupuna or hang out behind someone who looks like they have history on the beach, the ocean or a playing field.

Play "remember when we ate there?" with vintage restaurant menus. Who remembers the old eateries? Use an antique telephone to eavesdrop on a party line conversation. Here's the real test. Who remembers party lines when you could pick up the phone and listen to the neighbors talk - sometimes about you? Ask your mom or grandmother and you'll likely get an "earful".

One of the most interesting exhibits will be the old landmarks, then and now. With the landscape changing at warp speed some of the street corners and neighborhoods are already there in memory only. Which brings us to the opportunity of predicting what you think the next 125 years will bring to Hawaii. Cultural objects from Bishop Museum's collection will also be displayed as a window into Hawaii's shifting environmental social and economic landscapes. Some items have been used by well-known Hawaii athletes—a volleyball belonging to Dave Shoji and signed by National Championship players and Derek Tatsuno's baseball glove. Other artifacts include an Edison wax cylinder recorder used by museum ethnologist, Peter Buck and anthropologist, Kenneth Emory to record chants, songs and historic information across the Pacific. Political items from President Obama's administration going back to the republic era will also be displayed.

50 YEARS LATER THE BALL ROLLS

When the Hawaiian Open first came together back in 1965, organizers could not have imagined that 50 years later it would still be going strong. Gay Brewer won that inaugural tourney taking home a whopping \$9,000. 25 years later, United Airlines took over sponsorship with the current sponsor Sony taking over in 1999. In addition to bringing some of golfing's greatest players to the Island each year, the Sony Open has also raised more than \$14 million dollars for hundreds of local charities over the past 16 years.

This year the Sony Open will take place from January 12 – 18th. This is the PGA Tours first full-field event of the year and 144 of the world's top golf pros will converge onto Waialae Golf Course to compete for their share of the \$5.6 million purse, with the winner walking away with \$1.08 million of that all to themselves. Competition kicks off on Thursday, January 15th and will be

The exhibit is a great place to play "I remember, do you remember?" or, "Wow, I didn't know that!" Take a post-exhibit drive up and down Round Top Drive and compare the view with the vintage photos from the 1880's to the 1920's. Check out the photo of a "fashionable couple" at Diamond Head Lookout. Dapper in plaid walking shorts and a white sport coat (isn't that what everyone wears on that hike?) the guy is Bill Anderson who later became Adam West in the Batman TV series in the 1960's. A shot of the 1968 United Airlines flight over Koko Head and Waikiki and Jack Lord, circa 1969 browsing the Bishop Museum book shop are two great pics. This show answers the oft asked question, "what was it like growing up here?"

According to Blair D. Collis, Bishop Museum president and CEO, this exhibit's broad content is reflective of Bishop Museum's increasingly vital role in celebrating change and community over time. More than a collector of artifacts, the Bishop Museum is dedicated to perpetuating and sharing Hawaii's cultural heritage, memories and traditions in new and meaningful ways to bring relevance to contemporary cultural and social trends. In CHANGE, generations old and young can both take a nostalgic walk down memory lane and dream big for Hawaii's bright future.

Collis says, "The beauty of sharing knowledge about Hawaii's past is that there is tremendous relevance for shaping the future of our community. We've all heard nostalgic stories of the past from our parents or grandparents; but the beauty of the CHANGE exhibit is that it gives new generations an opportunity to gain perspective in a very tangible way."

This year, the museum celebrates its 125th year anniversary, holding the unquestionable title, and proud to be recognized as, the principal museum of the Pacific, housing the world's largest collection of Hawaiian and Pacific artifacts and natural history specimens. More than 350,000 people visit the Museum each year, including over 40,000 schoolchildren.

P.S. The Scream Machines science of Roller Coasters exhibit is up until January 11th, complete with a "spin room" that keeps some folks going back time after time. Settle into a seat to ride the great ones - the world's greatest roller coasters. The mind boggling moment is when visitors roll a ball to someone in the Spin Room. Yes, everything is spinning. Consider this when you next think of what NASA does when aiming a rocket at Mars.

Admission to the Museum is: Adults - \$19.95; Youth (4-12) - \$14.95 and Seniors (65+) - \$16.95; Hawaii's residents and Military with ID - Adults \$12.95; Youth (4-12) - \$8.95 and Seniors (65+) \$10.95; (non-resident visitors accompanied by Military or a Hawaii's resident with ID Adults - \$16.95; Seniors (65+) - \$13.95; and Youth (4-12) - \$11.95); Bishop Museum members and children age three and younger are always free. Children age 16 and younger must be accompanied by an adult. Bishop Museum is open from 9 a.m.-5 p.m.; closed on Tuesdays and Dec. 25. The play deals with race, racism and identity and cuts back and forth through time from the filming of *Return to Paradise*, Hollywood in 1973 and New Zealand in 2000. A story that even after fifty years still resonates in the American psyche is Harper Lee's Pulitzer Prize winning novel *To Kill a Mocking Bird* which was turned into a film starring Gregory Peck in 1962, and later a play adapted by Christopher Sergel in 1990. Looking back, looking forward. What do you wish for the new year? One of my wishes is that our island small business owners flourish. That only happens when we stop, shop and pass on information to others. My personal rule – never buy on line if I can buy it local. OK, I may have to find Mapunapuna to get what I want. But, really, for a Papakolea girl, that's doable. Now, ask me to find Kapolei and well, you know, need map.

Last year my January column offered a gift of wisdom from Peter Apo, musician, Hawaiian cultural expert and trustee of OHA. Moments before I filed Auntie Lynn's January 2015 column of less-than-wise words, Peter sent me a note. As usual, he said what I wanted to say only better and with more flavor. Read on and you'll understand:

HO'OLAULEA – is a fundamental Hawaiian cultural value meaning to cause pleasure or joy to happen. Giving yourself a break to have fun is an important mental health activity acted out by deliberately setting aside time to celebrate life and hop off the stress express. The new year is the time to count your blessings, survey the choices you made that turned out well this past year and to learn from those that did not. Stop, take a breath, and get ready to hit the re-set button as you ramp up for a brand new year - 2015."

Peter's additional suggestion to all this deep thinking: COOK & EAT! This is his prescription for a fab new year. Try it, you'll like it!

Peters Hawaiian Beef Stew

- 2.5 pounds beef stew meat
- 2 Tablespoons tomato paste
- 1 medium round onion, chopped
- 1 bay leaf
- 3 medium carrots peeled/chopped
- 2 large potatoes, peeled, cut in chunks
- 4 stalks celery, chopped
- 6 oz. can tomato paste
- 1 15 oz. can diced tomatoes
- 1 15 oz. can tomato sauce
- 1 can beef bouillon
- 2 Tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 Tbsp paprika
- 1 Tbsp Worcestershire
- 3 Tbsp chopped garlic
- 3 Tbsp ground ginger

Directions: Heat vegetable oil in large stock pot, Add chopped garlic and ground ginger, Salt & pepper meat and brown for 5-10 minutes, Remove meat from pot, Brown chopped onion about 3 minutes, Add tomato paste and cook for 1

minute, Add browned beef back to the pot, Add diced tomatoes and tomato sauce, Add beef bouillon, Add paprika, Worcestershire sauce, Add bay leaf, If necessary, Add water so meat is covered, Bring to a boil. Cover and simmer for 1 hour, Add carrots, potatoes, and celery, Continue simmer for 15 minutes, Turn off heat and let sit for 10 minutes before serving, To thicken stock if desired - mix 3 Tbsp flour and 1/4 cup water. Add slowly to pot while stirring. For thicker gravy repeat steps second time. Serves 4 - 6

The recipe is perfect. Just what you need to nourish the good intentions for the new year. The only thing that is missing is ketchup. Really. My hanai Papakolea family never made stew or chili or stir-fry without adding some Heinz Ketchup for good measure. Note to Peter – not to change anything but you might consider my auntie's suggestion.

HEISMAN – safe to say that it was an island-wide moment of pride and joy that spread like jam on sweetbread with the announcement of Saint Louis quarterback Marcus Mariota winning the Heisman Trophy. If you watched the TV coverage, gahrens you had a big box of Kleenex on hand. Best part of his speech may have been the line, "In Hawaii, if one person is successful, everybody is successful. I'm just grateful to be part of it." Really, Marcus, thanks for letting us be a part of your history.

HOLIDAY PICS – surprise under the tree – a photo of Auntie Mo and her yappy dogs that needs to be featured in a quality mat and frame (even though you only get it out when she flies in from Maui). Head down to the Louis Pohl Gallery on Bethel Street in Chinatown. Sandy Pohl has an amazing mat cutting machine and can create a frame that will look good and hide easily under a bed. Sandy can also frame the amazing art from keiki or the piece you got for a song at the annual Heart Ball silent auction, coming up in February.

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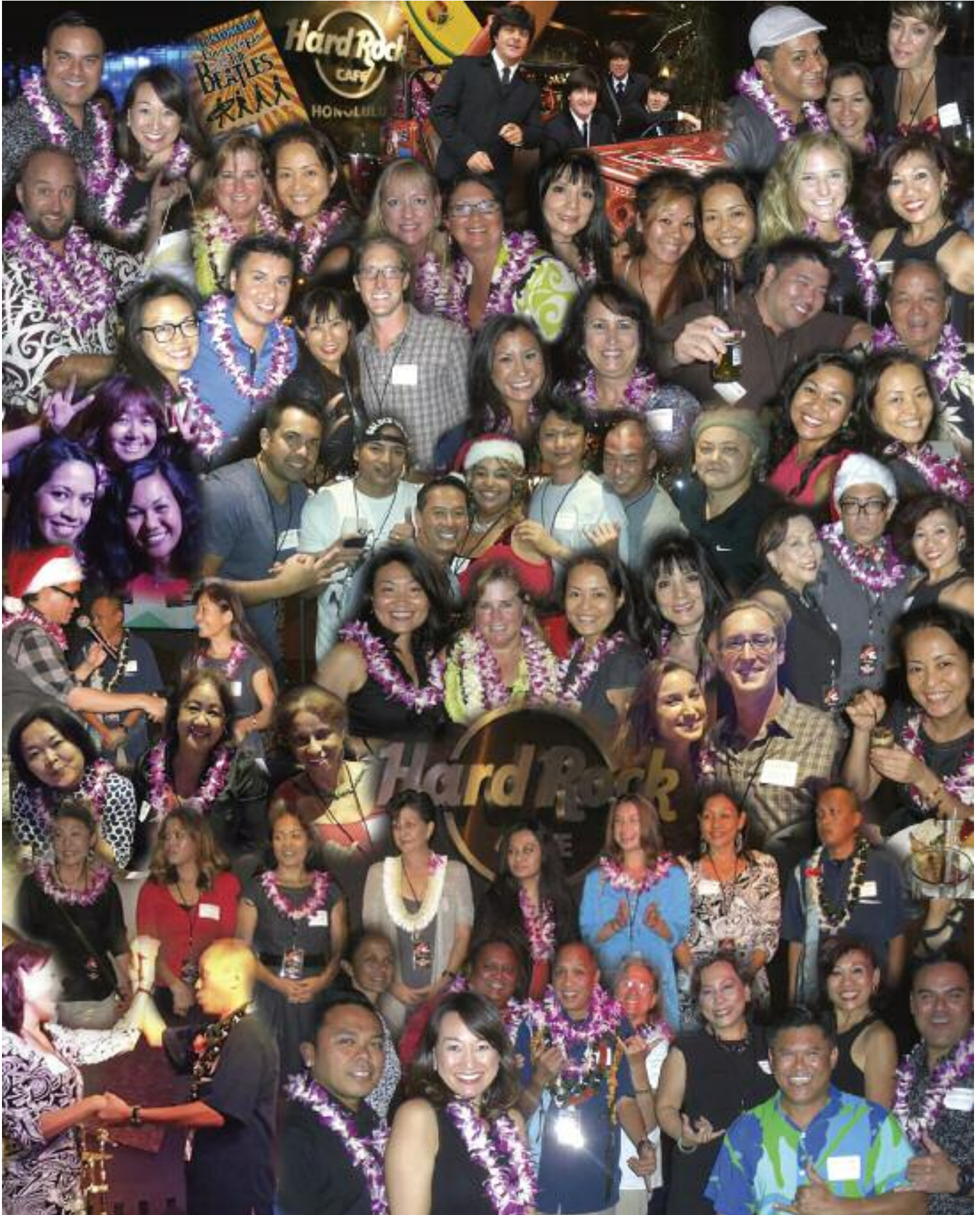
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14th Annual Mahalo Party

Azure's Chef de Cuisine Shaymus Alwin

This East Coast native came to Hawaii on a whim, fell in love with the place and now calls it home. As part of the opening crew of Azure Restaurant back in 2009, he has been at the restaurant since day one, and rose thru the ranks to Chef de Cuisine. He previously worked at The Bistro at Century Center, Chai's Island Bistro and studied under the renown chef Thomas Keller at The French Laundry.

What was your first job in the culinary industry?

My first job was a dishwasher at Seascapes restaurant in Cape Porpoise, Maine.

Who would you consider your mentor and why?

My mom because of her work ethic and because she was one of the first people to get me cooking in the kitchen. She'd be working multiple jobs but we always got a hot home cooked meal to have for dinner and packed home lunch to go to school with.

How would you describe your food philosophy?

Just staying true to the product and letting the quality shine with good local ingredients and not overwhelming it with sauces and overkill.

What's your favorite dish to cook at home?

Homemade pasta and I usually pair it up with some kind of seafood.

What's your favorite ingredient to cook with?

Lobster. Because growing my dad was a lobster man and so I grew up on it and a lobster roll is like a comfort food for me that makes me happy and makes others happy too.

What is the strangest food you have ever tried?

Balut. I was glad I tried it but it's certainly not one of my favorites.

Favorite food trend?

The gastropub revolution where you can get high-end food at a moderate cost in a comfortable setting. I can't really say that I have a least favorite because always I'm interested in all the trends and how we could possibly incorporate it here at Azure!

What first brought you to Hawaii?

I came here on a whim. My friend was living here and so I came to visit. Work back home was seasonal so I would either go back to work or back to snowboarding at Squaw Valley. So when I got here I stayed with my friend for a bit. What kept me here was the beautiful weather and surroundings. Hiking, surfing, beach, water sports.

What do you miss most about the East Coast?

Snowboarding. I was an avid snowboarder for a long time from when I was 11 years old to 19 years old. After graduating from high school I moved to Squaw Valley for a season just to snowboard.

What's your favorite thing to do when you're off?

Going hiking and also going to the beach to surf or body surf.

Biggest pet peeve working in the kitchen?

Cleanliness and organization. I'm definitely a neat freak, especially in the kitchen. Everything should be in its place and put back in its place

Do you have a favorite restaurant you go too?

I don't have a single favorite restaurant but I do like to go check out the scene. Perhaps you could say I do like to go to Livestock Tavern in Chinatown. The ambiance is really good – it reminds me of the East Coast. And also the cocktails by the mixologist there are really good as it pairs well with the food.

Something most people don't know about kitchens?

Work hours and how much chefs and cooks actually work. A normal, average work day would be at least 11 a.m. – 11 p.m. and most times longer, especially holidays and special occasions when we'd be on 7 days a week.

What do you have planned going forward at Azure?

I plan on 1. keeping our tasting menu seasonal and changing it out every few months, 2. changing Azure's ala carte menu in the first quarter of 2015 – something that we're already working on, and 3. creating a wine dinner series for the new year and showcasing a big name wine maker while featuring dishes from our talented sous chefs.

Anything else you'd like to share?

I listen to underground hip hop and I love to cook at home, not just at work. My passion lies with cooking and I think about it all day, everyday and how we can do things better in our kitchen

Azure Lobster Roll

by Chef Shaymus Alwin



Ingredients:

- | | | | |
|---|-----------------------------|---|----------------------|
| 2 | 4 oz.. peeled lobster tails | 1 | TBLS Kosher Salt |
| 4 | TBLS Azure Aioli | 1 | oz Brown Butter |
| 1 | tsp fine chopped truffle | 1 | oz Red Tobiko |
| ½ | tsp truffle oil | 1 | loaf Brioche |
| 4 | Meyer Lemon | 1 | cup clarified butter |
| 2 | TBLS Sugar | | Chervil |

Method:

Skewer Lobster tail and blanch in Court Bouillon. Pull out right before it is fully cooked letting it carry over. Do not ice. Once chilled slice into fourths. Add truffles and oil to Azure Aioli recipe. Peel lemon leaving only zest with no pith. toss with sugar and salt and let it sit overnight. Juice lemon and save. Put juice and zest together and bring to simmer. Cook until soft. Blend until puree is smooth. Add water if needed. Freeze Brioche. Cut Brioche into 3 in long x 1 ¼ inch wide by ½ inch tall. On slicer cut bread on a 13-15 setting. Cut out 1 inch circles Fry circles in the clarified butter to a golden brown. Season as it comes out. Toast rectangle of bread with seasoned whole butter. Put a large bead of aioli on top of plate and a pool for the bread to sit on top of. Pull a large bead of lemon preserve on the bottom right. Place bread on aioli. Lobster on top of that with aioli in between slices. Shingle toasted brioche in lobster. With warm butter add tobiko and drizzle over lobster. Garnish with chervil.

Photo: Hotels & Resorts of Halekulani In the 1920's the romantic images of graceful island girls and strong island boys turned the eyes of the world toward the romance of the islands. The art deco travel posters, cruise line menus and magazine covers swept up imaginations, whispering the magic of the "south seas".

After a half year-long exhibit, this art form can still be seen in a spectacular exhibition at the Honolulu Museum of Art through January 11. But for those who missed the exhibit or have limited time, the Halekulani has an art deco gem in the lobby.

The Halekulani is presenting *Art Deco and the Golden Age of Travel in Hawaii* through January 31st. The exhibit, from the private collection of Mark and Carolyn Blackburn, is being shown in the gallery walk promenade near the House Without A Key. The exhibit is free and open daily to guests and the public from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

The show features original works by the famed graphic design artist, Frank H. McIntosh and Yale University professor of art, Eugene Savage. The installation includes original vintage posters, menus, magazine covers, lithographs and a priceless model of the S.S. Monterey, the Matson luxury cruise liner.

Possibly the most unique and the exhibit favorite of Dara Lum, hotel communications director, is the Flying Fish sculpture from the dining room of the SS Malolo. The Matson Lines ship was designed by William Francis Gibbs, boasted a first-class luxury service between San Francisco, Los Angeles and Honolulu. World notables loved the pampered life they had at sea. In addition to the lavish dining room with the Flying Fish sculpture, the ship had swimming pools, a gymnasium and spacious cabins - unusual for ships in 1936. Lum says, "It is easy to stroll through the Halekulani walkways, stop to see the art and suddenly be transported back in time. The feel and history of the Halekulani is known for bringing on that response."

Eugene Francis Savage was born in 1883 in Covington, Indiana and created art most of his life and lived until 1978. In 1940 he was commissioned to paint what are called the Matson murals. The art became menu covers rather than being installed on the ships - still the most highly collectable items from the Hawaii deco age. Frank H. McIntosh was born in Portland, Oregon in 1901, was also commissioned by Matson, and he continuing to paint until he passed away in 1985.

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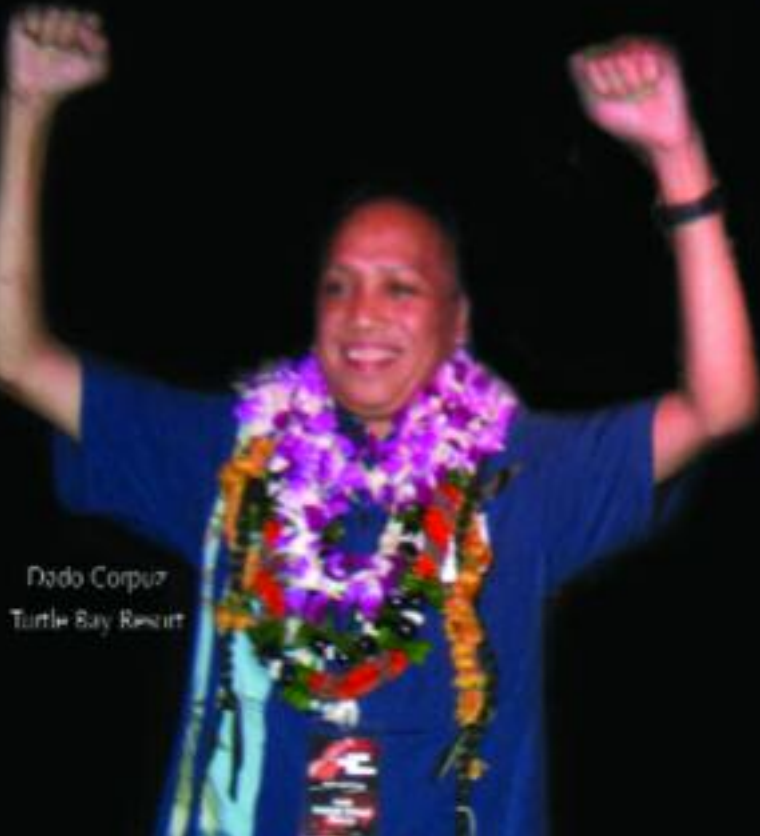
