Taking It to the Green: The 2018 Sony Open in Hawaii

Ben Hogan, American professional golfer considered one of the greatest players of all time (1912 – 1997), once said, "The most important shot in golf is the next one." This statement could not be more true than during the second week of January every year when over 140 of the world's best golfers converge at the Waialae Country Club for the annual Sony Open in Hawaii. The 2018 event will mark the 20th Anniversary of Sony's title sponsorship.

The Sony Open stands as the PGA Tour's first full-field competition of the year with pro golfers competing, this year, for a \$6,200,000 purse. The 2018 tournament champion will take home \$1,116,000 of that prize money.

Last year's winner, Justin Thomas of the United States, earned \$1,080,000 and set an all-time PGA Tour record finishing 27 under par. Within the first, second, and third rounds, Thomas shot a 59, a 64, and a 65, respectively, sending him into the final round with a seven-stroke lead. While he had started relatively slowly on Sunday, with a bogey and six pars on his first seven holes, Thomas was able to maintain his lead with a pair of birdies to finish the front nine. His long drives being key to his success, along with another birdie on the 18th hole, Thomas shot a 65 on the final day—his score of 253 standing as the lowest ever on the PGA Tour.

Thomas, 23 at the time and, as such, the youngest player on the tour to break 60, beat Justin Rose by seven strokes giving him back-to-back wins on the PGA Tour, having won the Sentry Tournament of Champions the week before. But he admitted that having a substantial margin like that was a bit daunting.

He recalled, "I was really nervous this morning. I just had a hard time getting in a comfortable mind frame. I felt like I was doing what I needed to do [early in the round]. I was making some pars, besides that bad bogey on four. But that par putt I

made on six was huge. I think if I missed that I'd start maybe worrying a little bit. . . . I just tried to stay patient." Thomas heads into the 2018 tournament ranked 3rd in the world; Rose is ranked 6th.

The Sony Open in Hawaii exists as part of the FedEX Cup Series, with Sony having stepped in as the current sponsor 20 years ago. However, the event's modern-day inception as the "Hawaiian Open" began in November of 1965. Then, in 1991, United Airlines stood as sponsor, and the name was changed from the "Hawaiian Open" to the "United Hawaiian Open." For the first five years, the event took place in the fall, and it was skipped in 1970 so as to move it to a winter slot in early February of 1971. Today, the Sony Open follows December's Sentry Tournament of Champions on the island of Maui.

Oahu's Waialae Country Club boasts one of only 40 country club courses throughout the nation to host a sanctioned PGA Tour event. During the tournament, the front and back nines are switched with players finishing at the dogleg 9th hole.

The course was designed by American golf course architect Seth Raynor, along with his assistant Charles Banks, and, upon land leased from the Bishop Estate. It was open for play on February 1, 1927. Throughout the decades, the layout would change due to the Great Depression, fire, World War II, and the redivision of land. Then, in 1992, more substantial changes were made by visionary and iconic golf course architect Desmond Muirhead of England. Now a mature, lushly landscaped, and player-friendly championship course, Waialae features wide, forgiving fairways dotted with coconut, monkey pod, and kiawe trees and Bermuda grass throughout the tees, fairways, rough, and greens.

Chinatown in Honolulu always there but it's never the same for long. From the very early times of tattoo parlors, bars and sailors on a three-day R&R leave to the Chinatown of today – filled with sophisticated art galleries and more than a dozen trendy eateries the action never

The main reason for the events and plans comes from the energy of the leaders of Chinatown, small business folks who are bringing back the fun. The "leader of the pack" is Sandy Pohl who runs the Louis Pohl Gallery, named after her famous artist husband. Her place has become a destination. Tour bus traffic is steady.

After art experiences the surrounding area offers up various bars serving creative drinks and the one-of-every-flavor restaurants with a multitude of choices, and sometimes waiting lines. Galleries in the daytime turn into jazz, Hawaiian or alternative music clubs by night. There is nothing like rocking out to a funky band after an art opening and then grabbing dinner of JJ Dolan's pizza, Lucky Belly noodles or the gastronomic delights of Senia.

Pohl is the leader of the pack when it comes to First Friday. Every month, all year, the downtown gallery walk is pure social fun. No invitations necessary. The doors of the galleries are open to

strolls in. Some serve punch and cookies, others take it up a notch with an over-21 party.

Next up are the Second Saturday events where the sidewalks filled with artists painting, drawing and selling their wares. Beginning Saturday, January 6, the Louis Pohl Gallery will begin

offering two or three hours of no-talent-necessary art experiences. Each class begins promptly at 1:30 p.m. The time is flexible for creating. The classes are usually three hours. All materials and an expert teacher are included in the \$10 fee - money that goes directly to the funding of new arts center, hopefully coming on line in the next few months. The center will have space for many classes on any given day. The artist-volunteers who are creating the place are dedicated to bringing "fun" to Chinatown.

The first month of the "every Saturday" events will feature, on January 6th, noted artist Noreen Watanabe. She says "no talent necessary" just walk in the door, participate and walk out with a masterpiece. Her inspiration, and yours, will be Vincent Van Gogh's famous "Sunflowers". After a "test run" with the chalk each newly trained artist will take chalk in hand and create something

light hearted comedies. Some of your guests may want to go British with the famed Sherlock Holmes and his hounds sniffing the wrong scent or they may want to witness naked middle-aged Yorkshire women posing for leukemia. Yes, it's funny, I promise. Your other guests may want something more kama'aina, so there's a musical about two local women and their financial woes, plus a play about a local dude who has to deal with crazy family and friends, a haunted past and a handsome stranger. And we all know that handsome strangers always make things better!

Ok, let's start with those two-babes and their money problems. TAG HAWAI'I (THE ACTORS' GROUP) opens on January 5th with a locally written musical experience called MONEY TALKS: But What the Hell is it Saying? It's a two-women stand-up comedy musical based on the true story of two women artists in Hawai'i who channel their financial woes into a musical. The title of the production is from the senior artist in the duo, Marcia Zina Mager's book about the financial living situation in Hawai'i that became a best seller in Germany, Austria and Switzerland. The junior artist is Lucie Lynch, a song writer/musician who was inspired by Marcia's book while living in Germany. The two met in Hawai'i and this Ted-Talk like musical is about their journey making it. Fortunately for your guests the show is in English. Lyrics from the libretto include lines like "What's my worth and am I given it at birth?" The show takes the audience on a journey about everyone's fear and beliefs about money and how it shapes our lives. The production is imaginative, funny and most importantly locally written. Our next stop is **KUMU KAHUA THEATRE**, which you all should know by now is Hawai'is theatre for locally written plays set in Hawai'i or about some aspect of the Hawaiian experience. The new play *Living Room* written by William Kahale makes its world premiere on January 18th and runs through February 17th. This moving comedy focuses on the life of a local man who is wrestling with a troubled past and not really sure what's in store for him in the future. It's not until a stranger enters his life that things seem to turn around for him. The production runs Thursdays, Fridays, & Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sundays 2 p.m. Tickets are \$25 (\$20 for seniors). kumukahua.org. As I've written in the past, if your guests are truly

looking to experience something local, this is the theatre to learn about what it's like to live in Hawai'i though the voices of our talented playwrights.

One of the most talented playwrights of the late twentieth century and early twenty-first century is Ken Ludwig. Some of your guest may be familiar with his play Moon Over Buffalo which starred Carol Burnett, the musical Crazy for You with won the Tony Award for Best Musical in 1992 or perhaps his first Broadway play Lend Me a Tenor in 1989. Ken is renowned for his light theatrical comedies. In recent years he has adapted several books into the plays, most recently Agatha Christies' Murder on the Orient Express and Arthur Conan Doyle's most famous book about Sherlock Holmes The Hound of the Baskervilles. Ken's comedic spin on the book, entitled Baskerville: A Sherlock Holmes Mystery, runs from January 11th to 28th at MANOA VALLEY THEATRE. The classic story is now a hilarious adventure with Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson trying to solve a murder in what might be considered a theatrical escape room of mind boggling clues with 5 actors playing more than 40 different characters in silly accents and costumes. For those of you not familar, the tale is about the curse of the Baskerville family and the death of Sir Charles Baskerville, who was found dead on the grounds of his Devonshire estate and the investigation by Sherlock to solve the mystery before the curse takes Sir Charles' nephew and heir Sir Henry Baskerville. I won't tell you what happens but Sherlock does solve it in the end. No surprise here, but the route he takes to get there is hilarious. inspired by a painting that sold for \$39.9 million.

Of course visitors are welcome to come in and watch the "artists" as they create. But Pohl says the classes are all "no experience necessary." She also invites concierge to experience a class and spend some time in Chinatown. They can call Pohl to sign up for a visit.

Pohl has been working with the Mayor's office for some time – assisting with HPD officers in their quest to make Chinatown user friendly, cleaning up the park by the Hawaii Theatre, inviting artists and musicians to participate in the various Chinatown celebrations and supporting Arts at Marks Garage as they beautify the area with a new mural

On Saturday, January 13th, the artist Sushen will lead students through some fun activities ending with the creation of a personal "joy" book filled with notes, comments, affirmations and the discovery, she says, "of your authentic voice."

Then, on Saturday, January 20th, Dr. Elaine Imoto will shed her medical coat and bring out the boxes and bins of beads. As the president of the local bead society, Imoto let the members know they can't buy more beads until they find artistic homes for the boxes and bottles full waiting to be discovered. She calls them "orphan beads" saying, "we easily have six months of projects until we use up the beads we have." The most popular design is called a memory bracelet. Colors, textures and unique shapes often bring out treasured thoughts.

Dads, husbands, boyfriends, et al, are likely to jump into the line on Saturday, January 27th. Cardmaking Class makes a statement. Magazines are de-constructed. Wild animals, oceans, racecars and beauty shots all combine. Recycle at its most creative level can be followed by a quick walk to Murphy's or JJ Dolans for a cold brew and pizza. Choices of food flavors, styles and ethnic tastes fill the streets of Chinatown. Art fun is available for \$10; the rest of a downtown adventure is by personal choice.

Quickly becoming a dining destination in its own right, Chinatown's culinary scene is growing faster than most of us can keep up. New to the scene? Bethel Union in the former Brasserie Du Vin space run by the folks at JJ Dolans that offers simple Italian-inpired dishes, many with an Asian twist. bethelunion.com. Encore Saloon bills itself as a tequila-and mezcal-focused bar serving Mexican-inspired food. Run by Danny Kaaialii, one of the brains behind the former Salt on Waialae and owner of Cocina, the now-closed Mexican fast-casual eatery in Kaka'ako. encoresaloon.com. The afore-mentioned Senia is still getting rave reviews for former Vintage Cave chef Chris Kajioka and his partner Anthony Rush. They take humble ingredients and elevate them to a level rarely seen in Honolulu restaurants. restaurantsenia.com. And let's not forget, the Pig and The Lady, Fête, Grondin French-Latin Kitchen, Livestock Tayern, PAI Honolulu and more to name

Concierge of the Year

After nearly 1000 votes, a mere 45 votes separated first from last. That's how good this years candidates were. They might have been too good in some cases, because it certainly divided the votes. For example, one of the few things I do when digging through all the nominations you guys send in, is make sure that I only select one candidate from each property, otherwise, the votes are divided. A perfect example of this is Fabrice and Vanessa. When we first selected Fabrice's nomination he worked at The Modern, then, after we had already profiled Vanessa of the Halekulani, Fabrice moved hotels to join her. I knew at that point they would both be in trouble as their votes were sure to be divided, and they were. The same happened a bit with Crystal, Jenifer, Stephen and Nozomi. We had 5 or 6 members of the Concierge Association of Hawaii up for the honor. Then you look at Michael. He has worked for a couple different places over the past few years, and his votes reflected his time with different companies. But he now works for Hilton Grand Vacations Club and we had two candidates from that one as well, which also broke up votes. The result of all these similarities was that it really made it difficult for people to choose and the votes reflected that giving us the closest race ever.

We've had close races between a few candidates before. We actually had a tie in 2005 when Amélia Soon of the Hilton Hawaiian Village tied with Leo Bautista of the Waikiki Beach Marriott and in 2011 Ritsuko Kukono just slightly edged out Flora La Montagne of the Kahala with one or two votes, but those close calls were only within the top vote getters. There's usually about a 400-500 vote difference between the top and the bottom of the list. 

Chef's Corner

Eating House 1849 by Roy Yamaguchi Executive Chef Jason Peel

Jason Peel began his career as a line cook at Roy Yamaguchi's flagship Roy's Restaurant in Hawaii Kai nearly two decades ago. Since then, he has worked his way through the ranks before he was named Executive Chef or Roy's Waikiki and traveled with Chef Roy to food festivals around the world. After leaving the kitchen for a few years to become a culinary instructor at KCC, Chef Jason has returned to the Roy's family to take over the kitchen at Eating House 1849 by Roy Yamaguchi at the International Market Place. roysrestaurant.com.

What is your first childhood food memory? Grandma's pork & squash soup.

When did you decide you wanted to be a chef? I was inspired by watching Japanese Iron Chef Hiroyuki Sakai on the original Iron Chef reruns.

What was your first job in the industry? Rich Miano's Bikini Beach Bar & Grill.

Who would you consider your mentor and why? Ian Russo (former executive chef at Michel's at the Colony Surf). He was my first real chef who taught me the foundation of French cooking.

How would you describe your style of cooking? Depends on what's available and inspires me that day.

After you became Executive Chef at Roy's Restaurants, you left to go teach at KCC. Why? I always wanted to teach. My parents are teachers. I love Hawaii and want to help the next generation succeed.

What drew you back to Roy's?

A phone call from Roy Yamaguchi. I wanted to help Roy and also help a former student who's a sous chef. I want to see him fulfill his dream of becoming an executive chef which is important to me as an educator. I'm still involved with KCC to this day.

You were named Exec. Chef for the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival. What does that job entail? Coordinating all of the food events with chefs from around the world.

Favorite part of the Hawaii Food & Wine Fest?

The attention it brings to Hawaii with all of the great chefs that participate from all over the world. And, it supports Hawaii's farmers, ranchers and fishermen as well as the community colleges and its students.

What's the most exotic place you traveled too for a festival and name a dish that stood out.

Abu Dhabi. One of my favorite dishes was handcut noodles made by women divers being cut on the floor of an uni restaurant they owned in Jeju, Korea. Jeju is known for its women divers that collect sea urchins and abalone in the rough waters of Korea.

Biggest pet peeve about working in a kitchen? Punctuality and doing your job.

What ingredients are always in your fridge? Butter, kewpie mayo, garlic, soy sauce, lemon, vinegar, chiles and fresh herbs in the garden.

Favorite restaurant you like to go to? Senia.

What do you like to do on your days off? Hang out with the family and my dog.

Garlic Ahi Salad



Local Kale Nalo Farms Baby Kale Red Radish, Julienne Red Onion, Julienne Ewa Onion, Thin Cut Rings All-Purpose Flour Salt (to taste) Pepper (to taste) Sashimi Grade Ahi. Seared and

Directions: Dust onion with all-purpose flour, salt and pepper and fry at 325° degrees until crispy. Drain on paper towel. Sprinkle salt and pepper on the ahi and sear in butter on all sides until desired doneness. Chill ahi until cold and slice to desired thickness.

Black Sesame Dressing

Ingredients

cup rice vinegar Tbs sugar Tbs sesame oil Clove garlic 2 ½ Tbs vegetable oil TT black pepper Tsp sesame powder 2 T bs Tamari soy

Directions: Blend all ingredients, except soy, with a pinch of Xanthum Gum. Whisk in soy.

White Sesame Dressing

1 tsp ground black 1 cup Kewpie mayo sesame 1 Tbs sesame oil ½ cup rice vinegar 1 Tbs white soy To taste black pepper 1 Tbs yuzu To taste salt

Directions:

Whisk all ingredients.

Garlic Ahi Sauce

Ingredients

cup onion, small dice 2 Tbs vegetable oil 2 6

clove garlic Tbs sesame oil cup sake cup mirin

Tbs sambal 1/4 cup rice vinegar 1 ½ Tsp fish sauce

To taste pepper

clove raw garlic, minced

1 ½ oz Karo

Slurry, to thicken if needed

To taste salt

Sauté onion in sesame oil and vegetable oil until lightly sweated. Add garlic and cook for 5-10 minutes just before it starts to brown. Add sake and mirin and reduce by 3/4. Add Karo, sambal, rice vinegar, fish sauce, pepper. Slurry to thicken if needed, add raw garlic and salt to taste.

Decorate plate with white sesame dressing. Arrange sliced ahi on plate leaving room for the salad. Toss kale, baby kale, red radish and red onion with black sesame dressing and place next to ahi. Top ahi with garlic sauce and crispy onions.







The course plays to a par 70 for the SONY Open with yardage of 7,020 from championship tees. It includes both left and right doglegs, and, thanks to its well-planned layout, it can challenge the lowhandicap player while not penalizing the high-handicap player. Nestled in the quiet neighborhood of Waialae-Kahala, the course includes the signature 8th hole, which is bordered along its full 186 yards by the Pacific Ocean, and the signature 16th hole, featuring a massive "W" made from 4 coconut palms.

From green to green, golf enthusiasts can walk right alongside their favorite players—a tangibility unlike that of any professional golfing event in the world. The event reaches over 560 million homes throughout over 220 countries via multiple national and international broadcast networks.

Every year, the Sony Open contributes an estimated \$100 million toward the State of Hawaii, but it is also exists as the primary fundraising event for Friends of Hawaii Charities. Since 1999, the Sony Open has partnered with The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation to distribute \$17,000,000 to over 350 Hawaii not-for-profit organizations.




MOBILE DEVICE POLICY

(Revised January 2016)

- Data use is not permitted when players are in position to compete (i.e., when QUIET PLEASE paddles are raised).
