GOLF FOR GOOD

The PGA season is about to kick off and after fourteen years, the real winners of the annual tournament are charities who have already accepted over \$12 million dollars with the support of The Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Foundation.

As the largest charity event in the islands, all net proceeds from the Sony Open are dedicated to the Friends of Hawaii Charities who help over one hundred and fifty not-for-profit organizations helping low-income and vulnerable families and individuals.

Played annually on Oahu's most exclusive greens, the Sony Open gives weekend duffers the chance to swing alongside pros and celebs on the picturesque course at Waialae Country Club. Originally designed by the Territorial Hotel Co. to promote luxury travel in Hawaii, Waialae's design was envisioned by world-renowned golf architect Seth Raynor and Charles Banks. For true golf fans, several holes may look familiar as they were patterned after such famous courses as Biarritz in France and North Berwick in Scotland. The course opened for play on February 1, 1927, and its original mission has been maintained through numerous changes and improvements over the decades. Upgrades and additions over the years have included a club house, tennis courts, swimming pool, and many improvements through the years have culminated in the Waialae Country Club we know today.

This month, from January 7 through 13, Waialae Golf Club will open its course to the public and welcome 144 of the world's top golf professionals to compete for prize monies and bragging rights. Last year's winner Johnson Wagner finished at 13-under 267, sailing to victory and joining previous top winners like Vijay Singh, Ernie Els, and Paul Azinger. As one of the most international events on the PGA TOUR, the Sony Open is broadcast live around the world so even if you can't make it to events in person, tune in to the Golf Channel or Sirius XM to keep score. Tickets

Daily ticket prices continue to be very reasonable making this event a budget-friendly choice for any of your guests. General Admission tickets in advance are \$15 or \$20 at the gate and thrifty fans can save money by purchasing a season badge with week-long admission for \$50 (advance or at the gate). VIP Hospitality Packages are also available with better seating for a cost of \$150 for a Champions Club Daily Pass which includes daily admission and complimentary buffet food and beverage service. Transportation

Getting to the events is made easy with E Noa Trolley's shuttle service from multiple stops around Waikiki to Waialae Country Club for \$2 each way. Stops are every 30 minutes (7 a.m. to 7 p.m.) at Hilton Hawaiian Village Tapa Tower, Hard Rock Café, Duke Kahanamoku statue (Kuhio Beach), Waikiki Beach across from the zoo, and Waikiki Aquarium. For guests who prefer to drive, the good news is that free parking is provided with free shuttle transportation to the event from Hunakai Park (Hunakai Street) and Kahala Community Park (Thu – Sun; Pueo Street near Moa Street).

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Elvis is Back In The Building... 40 Years Later

Elvis may have left the building, but it seems safe to say that he will never leave our hearts, especially the hearts of folks who live in and love Hawaii.

In mid-January, 2013, Elvis fans are expected to arrive from the U.S. mainland, Canada to England, and Germany to Japan. The mass pilgrimage will pay homage to the 40th anniversary of Elvis' "Aloha From Hawaii" concert. Beamed live via satellite to more than 40 countries, the 1973 concert was seen live by 1.5 billion people. Television history journals say that more people saw the concert than were able to watch the first man on the moon.

The 1973 concert was held at the Honolulu

International Center, the HIC, now known as the NBC, the Neil S. Blaisdell Center. The January 14, 2013 event will be back at the NBC Arena. Tickets are on sale through Ticketmaster at \$35 each, the same price many folks paid for the 1973 concert when radio ads said, "pay what you can afford." The funds from that concert went to the Kui Lee Cancer Fund. The fund was a way for Elvis to honor the young Hawaii composer who wrote one of the singer's biggest hits, "I'll Remember You."

The only Elvis impressionists at the January 14th event will be part of the audience, not on the stage. The experience of the evening, created by Elvis Presley Enterprises, will be all the raw footage shot by NBC-TV from the original concert, turned into a multi-screen experience, accompanied by Dolby 5.1 surround sound. The difference from the original event will be the opportunity to view Elvis from a variety of camera angles at the same time. The 2013 concert will begin at 7:30 p.m.

The original concert was beamed live around the world so it didn't start until the middle of the night, which was prime time in many other countries. Parents took their children. The doors opened before midnight and the children napped in their seats until showtime when their parents shook them awake, hoping that they would someday remember the momentous night. Like the first concert, the Hawaii event is even more exclusive, a one-and-only with no repeats in L.A. or New York or Memphis.

In addition to the big event, Elvis will be honored in more than one place. On January 13th the Legends in Concert show will donate a percentage of every ticket to the restoration fund for the USS Arizona Memorial.

January 12th Elvis fans will have a special visit to the WWII Valor in the Pacific National Monument and the USS Arizona Memorial. On the 12th and 13th there will be special Elvis exhibits in the Pearl Harbor Visitor Center, followed by a 6-month display on the fund-raising efforts led by Elvis toward the building of the USS Arizona Memorial. The Pacific Historic Parks organization has designed special merchandise and an Elvis Tribute shirt with all sales going directly to the Memorial restoration fund.

Hawaii Facts about The King include his first visit to Hawaii 1957. He performed three concerts. Two performances were at the original Aloha Stadium and the third at Schofield Barracks, exclusively for military families. He stayed at Hilton Hawaiian Village. On his second trip, Elvis

filmed "Blue Hawaii" and performed at Block Arena, raising over \$60,000 for the building of the USS Arizona Memorial. In 1962 he was back to film "Girls! Girls! Girls!", adding the filming of "Paradise, Hawaiian Style" on another trip. Elvis may have been partly responsible for the continuous stream of stars visiting Hawaii. Between 1957 and 1977 he logged seven stays at the Hilton Hawaiian Village Resort for concerts, filming and even a quiet vacation with his family.

Talk to aunts, parents and grand parents and they will talk about what they think was the "greatest concert" of their lives. They'll wax poetic about the pre-concert when newspaper columnist Eddie Sherman stood on stage like a carnival barker, waving one of many vinyl, long play record albums and shouting, "if you'll give \$50 for this album I'll have Col. Parker deliver it personally!" the goal for the fund-raising was \$25,000 and the final total raised was \$75,000.

Memories include watching Elvis perform on a ramp into the audience, where he only had to take a few steps to drape a scarf around the neck of a fan. Family members had their arms out to catch the fan in case she fainted from the thrill of it all. They remember Elvis talking to the audience like they were his old friends, and finally, Elvis twirling his white satin cape round and round and finally flinging it into the crowd. The lucky fan who caught the prize eventually gave it to a younger fan, possibly a relative, who donated it back to the Elvis Museum at Graceland.

Tom Moffatt, former radio show host and Hawaii's top concert and event promoter, was always on call with Col. Parker, the man who guided Elvis gracefully through fame. Tom, then a KPOI Radio disc jockey, says, "When Elvis arrived I was there with a microphone. I was one lucky guy!" Tom remembers the day of the round-the-world show. He says the Col. called and said, "you have to come down and interview my robot." Sure enough, says Tom, there was a robot on the concourse of the HIC. Tom held out his microphone and began to ask questions about that evening's concert, pretending he didn't see the long microphone chord that went behind a pillar. "I was sure the Col. was hiding back there, answering questions, but I never let on." Tom's best memory is the press conference where Elvis and the Col. announced the 1973 concert. Tom says, "Elvis asked me an amazing question. He said this might be the biggest thing he had ever done, and then he asked me what I thought of it."

Fans and newbies are invited to answer the question for themselves, forty years later, on January 14, 2013 at the NBC Arena. ~ Lynn Cook

PCC's Moanikeala Hula Festival

For one night only, Polynesian Cultural Center brings traditional Hawaiian hula to the forefront at the 23rd Annual Moanikeala Hula Festival honoring PCC's first kumu hula Auntie Sally Moanikeala Wood Naluai by showcasing and preserving the art of hula.

Auntie Sally trained generations of young Polynesians in the art of hula from the Center's opening in 1963 until her retirement in 1980. As a former student of famed kumu hula Loalia Montgomery, Auntie Sally went on to teach both kahiko and auana styles of hula and helped to bring about a renaissance of Hawaiian culture by training female dancers to join what was originally a male performance art.

Today Auntie Sally's legacy lives on through this festival created and maintained in part by one of her own nieces and intended to promote Hawaiian culture and traditions. In recent years, the Moanikeala Hula Festival has evolved from what used to be a keiki hula competition into a ho'ike (exhibition) of hula mastery including adult and keiki performers and forgoing cash prizes. Each halau will now receive a ho'okupu (gift) in appreciation for their performance and for sharing their talents.

Visitors that day will be able to watch Hawaiian tradition and dance come to life in addition to the normal PCC experience. The artistry these dancers present is captivating and offer visitors an opportunity to see some of the best in motion.

The fest takes place January 19 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at PCC's Pacific Theater featuring dancers of all ages from halau hula around Hawaii and Japan as they don their finest colorful costumes and take the stage backed by live musicians. Tickets are \$10 for adults and \$6 for keiki (ages 5 – 15). Seats are reserved on a first-come basis so make sure to get your guests' early. It seems almost everything this January in Honolulu arts and cultural scene comes in THREES.

The month begins with three flight attendants (in this case stewardesses) sharing a flat (and a man) in Paris, then it continues with three major institutions celebrating Hawaiian music all on one night, and the month ends with three Okinawan sisters figuring out life. They say everything happens in threes so this is a good month to triple your guests' fun.

There is no better way than to triple you guests' fun then sending them to the **Two Museums and a Royal Palace Hawaiian Music Festival** on Friday, January 18th from 5 to 9 p.m. For a second time, **BISHOP MUSEUM, HONOLULU MUSEUM OF ART** and **IOLANI PALACE** are teaming together for an evening museum crawl featuring some of Hawai'i's most talented entertainers such as Paula Fuga, Maunaloa and many more. This is a great opportunity for your guests to not only be exposed to great contemporary Hawaiian music but also be able to visit all three museums for just \$19.95. No reservations required and tickets can be purchased at each any of the venues. Children 17 and under are free. It's also free for members of the three institutions. Most of your guests are only here on O'ahu for a few days and visiting all three museums, let alone one, is challenging enough, not to mention expensive. This museum crawl will give you a chance to learn more about Hawai'i and explore Hawaiian music over the course of one evening. Free shuttle buses transport event goers between the three venues, which will be open until 10 p.m. Admission includes entry into both museums and the Palace, which would normally cost \$47.95 for adults. Guests can start their night at any of the three venues, where they will receive wristbands that allow entry to the free shuttles and each location. Visitors can see the full schedule at BishopMuseum.org, HonoluluMuseum.org or IolaniPalace.org. Sponsored by the Hawai'i Tourism Authority, the event is the second installment of a four-event program that is the beginning of an essential partnership between the three institutions and the Hawaiian Tourism Authority to bring Hawaiian culture and heritage to life for visitors. This strategic collaboration will continue to showcase Hawai'i's rich history and art, and will foster a greater appreciation and understanding of how Native Hawaiian traditions permeate society here in Hawai'i today. The Two Museums and a Royal Palace events are making cultural learning more accessible and fun for people who normally wouldn't step foot into a museum.

And for those of you who do step into the **BISHOP MUSEUM** this month, there is a breathtaking fashion display that is on par with exhibits you would experience at the Costume Institute at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Entitled **HI Fashion: The Legacy of Alfred Shaheen**, the compelling exhibit tells the story of how a Honolulu-based designer elevated the aloha shirt to the world of high fashion and made aloha wear

a clothing trend that is still present today. The exhibit is the largest collection of Shaheen designs ever shown with over 200 pieces, including aloha shirts and the famous Hawaiian Bombshell Dress. Your guests will get lost in the textiles from the 1950s and 1960s and may never want to leave. The exhibit ends on February 4th so make sure you send your guests down there because there is nothing more exciting than aloha print on a sexy silhouette.

At any given moment one is up in the air, one is overseas and one is home, that is until the new Boeing jet is introduced and all of a sudden all three are under one roof for a weekend of chaos! Another delightful treat on the theatrical scene is always the productions at **KUMU KAHUA THEATRE** and this month's production is charming. It's the world premiere of playwright Daniel Akiyama's drama **A Cage of Fireflies** about three elderly sisters who were sent as children to be raised in Okinawa then returned to work and live in Honolulu. Two of the sisters confine themselves to a small apartment in Honolulu enacting the rituals of daily life while the third sister runs the family orchid farm. As with any family, long-hidden hopes and regrets surface and the sisters discover what is both selfish and selfless in their love for each other. For your guests who are not from Hawaii, this play offers an intimate look into the lives of women here in Hawaii that goes beyond the stereotype of the hula girl or auntie in a muumuu. The show opens January 24 and runs Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sunday at 2 p.m. through February 23. Tickets are \$20 and can be purchased by calling 536-4441.

Green. Look around and that's what we see. All it takes is a bit of "winter" rain and our island glows like a neon sign. Grass glows as if it had florescent bulbs hidden under its' roots. Park across Kapiolani

Park and walk, that is if your 2013 resolution involved moving around outdoors (also known as the 'e' word, exercise) it's the perfect time of year.

On a day with cool wind, no rain and the sun ducking in and out of clouds, there was an invitation from Helen Nakano. If her name sounds familiar, you may have read about her in the newspaper or in *Hana Hou*, Hawaiian Airlines magazine. She created the new Hanafuda, Hawaiian Style card game. It's in stores and gift shops and you can find it for sure at the Louis Pohl Gallery. If you remember the game rules from small-kid days you'll be on it. If not, the instructions are excellent. Call the Pohl Gallery for the January/February schedule of Hanafuda lessons, free and fun. The lesson may put you ahead of your kids and grand kids electronic game skills that seem to kick in and then they kick – well, you know what.

But back to the sunny day in Manoa. Our pal, Helen, is one of the movers and shakers behind the Malama Manoa programs. She connects people and shares her enthusiasm for Manoa and for the Manoa Heritage Center. One of the most knowledgeable guides for the center, David Lee, was available to lead our special tour group and the experience left me with the desire to start a shuttle service for my friends. No one should miss this historic treasure right in the center of the valley!

TIME TRAVEL – Manoa has some vintage homes and many homes that reflect the architecture of the turn of the century. It is a lovely place for a quiet drive, imagining days of travel by ship, tea in the garden with guests arriving by horse-drawn carriage.



The tour you really need to experience actually puts your feet on the path to that garden. Reading the web site I was surprised to learn the following: "The historic home, Kualii, tells the fascinating story of a kama'aina family in Hawai'i. Built in

1911 by Charles Montague Cooke, Jr. and his wife Lila Lefferts Cooke, and named for a great O'ahu chief, the home and gardens evoke the graciousness of Hawai'i's past. The Tudor-style residence was designed by Honolulu architects Emory and Webb and was built with stone quarried on the site. For nearly a century, Kualii has been a grand residence and significant Manoa Valley landmark." It is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places, but is still a private residence, and not yet open for tours."

"For hundreds, perhaps nearly a thousand years, Kuka'o'o Heiau has watched over Manoa Valley. Said to have been originally built by the Menehune, this heiau reflects the long and dynamic history of the Hawaiian Islands. Historical evidence suggests that the heiau eventually became an agricultural temple of the mapele class, dedicated to the rites and rituals surrounding food productivity. Restored in 1993, Kuka'o'o Heiau survives as the last intact Hawaiian temple in the greater ahupua'a of Waikiki and remains an extraordinary link to the past." The Manoa Heritage Center is a non-profit organization founded in 1996, with a mission to promote the thoughtful stewardship of the natural and cultural heritage of Hawaii.

Guide David Lee mentioned that tours skirt the outside of the heiau but do not enter. "Of course, when credentialed kumu hula visit they are invited to share their protocol in chant and dance." Walking through the gardens Lee pointed out the details of the stone work. When the heiau was restored every stone had a place. None were without a home and no additional stones were needed.

Tours for adults are by reservation only. Organize a couple of friends, as many as 20, and call 988-1287 for a time and day. Cost is only \$7. Seniors and military are \$4 and children with adults free. You'll want to know all this because it is a gem of a place to send friends, visitors and guests. Because of the residential neighborhood, car-pool. Only five cars fit in the curving driveway.

TAKE TIME – No resolutions is my 2013 resolution. I did, however, start a list of "things to do." It isn't a list for "when I have time" because, let's face it, we never have spare time. We do, however, have choices on how to use minutes and hours. It may take a month to compile my list. I may be able to check a few things off and then add more. Watching whales on Navatek, check! Walking Magic Island. Spending a Thursday evening listening to the Keawe Ohana's baritone, Gary Aiko, sing with the band on the third floor lanai of the Waikiki Marriott. Finding treasures at a Goodwill store as a warm-up to shopping the White Elephant Tent and standing in the malasada line at the Punahou Carnival. See you there!

Ocean House Executive Chef Aurelio Garcia

Kicking off his career initially as a dishwasher, Chef Aurelio Garcia has been the executive chef for Sam Choy's BLC for years and appeared as Sam's sous chef on Iron Chef America. He brings his 34 years of experience to Ocean House to maintain their high standards and bring even more local products to their menu already known for their slow roasted prime rib and fresh seafood.

When did you decide you wanted to be a chef?

In 1991, after I have worked in the kitchen as a dishwasher and cook for twelve years.

What was your first job in the industry?

I was a dishwasher at Orson's.

Who's would you consider your mentor and why?

Chef Greg Paulson. He is a very hard working chef. I was inspired and very fortunate that I got to work with him side by side. He trusted me as his assistant in doing food shows, cooking competitions and cooking with him in the restaurant.

Please describe your food philosophy. Fresh food as possible it can be and make the right preparation.

What's your favorite thing to do when you're not working? Watch sports on TV, Food Network, cleaning the yard.

What's your favorite dish to cook at home?

Steamed fish with finely sliced ginger, vinegar or kalamansi juice, chopped green onion, diced tomato and salt.

What's always in your fridge? Milk, fish, vegetables, and fruits.

What's your favorite midnight snack? Fruits.

What brought you to Hawaii? My mom was born in Kauai. She went back in the Philippines when she was a one-year old and the whole family came back to Hawaii after forty-five years to have a better life.

What's your favorite thing about working in a kitchen? When I have a very busy day, staff are giving high fives at the end of the shift.

You've worked for Sam Choy for years and got to sous for him on Iron Chef. How was it? It was a great experience

What is the strangest food you have ever tried? Thoughts? Balut (boiled chick in the egg). It's delicious but I did not get used to eating it. Imagine eating a whole chick.

Favorite food trend?

Fresh local grown foods.

Biggest pet peeve working in the kitchen? When I misplace my marking pen or small wares.

What's something that most people don't know about restaurants/kitchens?

The load of work.

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33RD ANNUAL PRO BOWL

Football fans can ramp up for Super Bowl weekend with the return of the all-star Pro Bowl live at Aloha Stadium on January 27. With a promise to “bring it” this year and put on a competitive game, the NFL is staging the Pro Bowl back in its true home again this year pitting top players from top players chosen from teams comprising the American Football Conference (AFC) against the best players of the National Football Conference (NFC).

The inaugural “Pro All-Star Game” was played in January 1939 at Wrigley Field in Los Angeles and has undergone numerous format changes since its inception. Despite being canceled in 1943 due to the war, the now-dubbed Pro Bowl was revived in 1951 by the then National Football League (NFL). Since the merger between the American Football and National Football Leagues in 1970, coaches of each Pro Bowl team are the head coaches that lost in each AFC and NFC championship game and players are voted in by coaches, other players, and the fans. Uniforms are a big different with the players hailing from various teams around the country. Each player dons his own team’s helmet, matched with blue and white jerseys for the NFC and red and white jerseys for the AFC. Hawaii hosted this fierce match-up from 1980 through 2009, when the game was moved for a year to Miami in 2010. After just a year’s hiatus, Pro Bowl returned to Aloha Stadium in 2011 and we’re delighted to be continuing the tradition.

Your guests can start the tailgate early at the Official NFL Pro Bowl Saturday Night Party hosted at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel on Saturday, January 26. Events kick off at 6 p.m. with local cuisine, specialty drinks, live entertainment, and of course a performance by the Pro Bowl Cheerleaders. Tickets are \$199 from Ticketmaster.

Tickets for the tailgate party beforehand and the Pro Bowl are already on sale (ticketmaster.com) for \$45 to \$130 but I’m sure you all know that there are always a few websites still willing to give up a pair of prime tickets for a little extra money so you may want to check around. For a large seating chart or any other information about Aloha Stadium, visit alohastadium.hawaii.gov. Remind guests that the stadium does permit bags subject to search at entry, but they do not allow coolers, cans, bottles, umbrellas, or any outside food or beverages. As always with events at the Stadium, be sure to warn guests headed that way about the traffic both before and after so they don’t get trapped if they’re not going to the game. For guests looking to have a less stressful game day, a hired car or limo is the only way to travel and will save them worrying about traffic, navigating, and choosing a designated driver.

Last year’s game was the most watched all-star game of the season, drawing a record 12.5 million viewers and this year if you can’t make the trek out to the stadium, stay home or settle in at a local sports pub and tune in to NBC at 2 p.m. to watch the game live.
