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## Pan-Pacific Festival Celebrating 40 years of Friendship

## Honoring a King



Over 2,000 colorful performers, drummers, bands, and ethnic cultural groups from around the world will march down Kalakaua Avenue in a spirited procession celebrating the 40th annual Pan-Pacific Festival.

The Pan-Pacific Festival, a celebration of cultural traditions of Hawaii and the Pacific Rim returns to mark its 40th anniversary, from June 7 to 9 at several locations.

Since its first event as the Matsuri in Hawaii Festival celebrating Hawaii's friendship with Japan, the festival has evolved to bring people together to enjoy the food, entertainment and customs of many different cultures.

The three-day festival starts with a big block party on Kalakaua. The ho'olaule'a features food, crafts and entertainment on multiple stages. The celebration continues with several performing arts showcases; the 19th annual Pan-Pacific Hula Festival with performances by halo from Hawaii and Japan; a Punahale Party headlined by Na Hoku Hanohano Award-winning musician Weldon Kekauoha performing with halau from Japan; and a special anniversary performance by Halau Na Mamo O Pu'uanahulu, led by kumu hula Sony Ching and Lopaka Igarta-DeVera.

The festival will conclude with a colorful parade of lively costumes and performances by local and national high school bands and various ethnic groups marching down Kalakaua Avenue.

The annual event was conceived to give Hawaii residents and travelers a lively, participatory introduction to traditional Japanese culture. Visiting participants from Japan were able to share their music, crafts and foods in recognition of the 150-year connection between Japan and Hawaii, which began with the arrival of the gannenmono, or first-year people, back in 1868. Backed by the then-new Meiji government, the group of 148 arrived to work on sugar plantations as part of a mission to promote diplomatic and economic ties. Fifty of the gannenmono chose to remain in Hawaii, setting the stage for Japanese migration to the islands. Today, people of Japanese ancestry are the largest ethnic group in Hawaii, at 20 percent of the population.

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The 103rd annual King Kamehameha Celebration floral parade taking place June 8 will celebrate Hawaiian marching band music with the theme "Ku'upau a Kanile'a Na Mele Kupuna—Play Without Restraint Until the Songs of Our Ancestors Resound Joyously."

The parade will start at 9 a.m. on King Street fronting 'Iolani Palace. Participants will then head down Punchbowl Street and make a left onto Ala Moana Boulevard leading toward Kalakaua Avenue in Waikiki. The

### Have a Bike? It's time to use it

Aaah, it's that wonderful weekend you all look forward to so much. You know, the one where Kalakaua closes three days in a row? Yup, it's that time again. The weekend where both the Pan-Pacific Festival and the King Kamehameha Floral Parade take over Waikiki. While it turns Waikiki into a fabulous, floral, cultural celebration all weekend long, it also turns it into a traffic nightmare, and if you live and work in Waikiki, I strongly suggest using your bike, or grabbing a Biki.

It all starts on Friday, June 7th, with the 40th anniversary of the Pan-Pacific Matsuri Ho'olaule'a. Lanes start to close at noon to set up from Seaside Avenue to Uluniu Avenue to accommodate this festive and cultural block party. All lanes close at 5:30 p.m. as over 30,000 people are expected to descend into Waikiki to enjoy multiple entertainment stages featuring cultural performances such as Japanese Taiko drums, Korean dance, Hawaiian music, hula, and more while noshing on a variety of food offered by multiple food booths. The road should open by midnight.

The next morning, it starts all over again as Kalakaua closes at 8:30 a.m. as over 1,000 marchers, 50 vehicles, 6 floats and 8 bands wind their way from 'Iolani Palace to Kapiolani Park as part of the King Kamehameha Floral Parade. One of the bands is actually bringing the daughter of my best friend from college to town from Kansas City. Lucky for me, her mom is coming too, so I may actually head down to Waikiki that weekend to watch her daughter with her, which I have so painstakingly avoided for so many years because of all the closures. One big change to note this year, the ho'olaule'a that always kicks off in the park after the Parade has been moved to 4 p.m. at Aloha Tower Marketplace until 10 p.m. Kalakaua should reopen by 1 p.m.

And, in case that's not enough festivities for you, the 40th annual Pan-Pacific Matsuri Waikiki Parade closes out the weekend on Sunday afternoon with over 2,000 marchers, 19 vehicles, 3 floats and 4 bands. Kalakaua will close at 4:15 p.m. as the parade makes its way from Saratoga to Kapiolani Park and should reopen around 7:30 p.m. Remember, people in the parade stage right there at the top of Kalakaua by DeRussy, so even trying to get to Kuhio will be a traffic nightmare. Good luck getting around that weekend, but for those of that are in Waikiki, the fun and festivities will be abundant.

parade will end about 11:30 a.m. at Monsarrat Avenue and Queen Kapiolani Park.

Streets will begin to close in Downtown Honolulu at 7:30 a.m., with closures coinciding with the parade's progress.

The event will honor parade Grand Marshals Aaron David Mahi and John Riggle, both of whom have been instrumental in keeping Hawaii's marching band legacy alive.

Riggle taught high school band at Kamehameha Schools from 1977 until retiring in 2009. While there, Riggle developed the school's Warrior Marching Band and Color Guard into one of the most successful programs in the United States. He returned to the school as temporary band director from 2012-13, leading students to the 2013 Presidential Inaugural Parade for President Barack Obama, before completing two years as band director at Kailua High School. Riggle currently serves as managing director for Na Koa Ali'i - Hawai'i All State Marching Band.

For 24 years, from 1981 until 2005, Mahi served as bandmaster of the Royal Hawaiian Band, the only American band founded by royalty and the only full-time municipal band in the nation. In addition to performing regularly Fridays at the bandstand on the 'Iolani Palace grounds and Sundays at the Kapiolani Park Bandstand, the band appears at schools and parades across the islands. Under Mahi's direction, the RHB performed at New York City's Carnegie Hall in 1988 and traveled internationally for performances.

Mahi also served as conductor of the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra from 1988 through 1995.

Hawaii's marching band history began in 1836 with the Royal Hawaiian Band, created by King Kamehameha III, and originally known as the King's Band, performing for state occasions, funerals and parades. The band accompanied Hawaiian monarchs on trips to the outer islands, bringing music to remote destinations including Kalaupapa on Molokai,



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# arts with aloha



This June I've decided to focus on the word "ARTS" and "ALOHA" to share my love of the cultural and arts scene in Honolulu and the name sake of this column.

The first thing that comes to mind when I think "ARTS" of course is **ARTS AT MARK'S GARAGE**. The artist-run, non-profit was founded in 2001 by the Hawai'i Craftsmen and Hawai'i Arts Alliance as part of the renaissance of Chinatown. For your guests looking for something a little edgier to do while in Honolulu, this is the place to find a variety of multidisciplinary art exhibits and hundreds of theatrical performances, in addition to lectures, screenings and special workshops. This really is a fun place to visit. I ended up here last year to see a dynamic production of *The Taming of the Shrew* by a touring British acting company. I know, most of your guests probably don't want to see Shakespeare while in Hawai'i, but I came across the production while drinking shots of tequila at The Dragon Upstairs with a guy whose girlfriend was in the show. So, all I have to say is send your guests to Chinatown, have them drink some tequila and book a show.

My first recommendation is *B is for Body* by the Convergence Dance Theatre on Friday, June 14th at 7 p.m. & 9 p.m. This movement-based show explores all the things our bodies can do and what they mean through a selection of vignettes that push the physical boundaries of the normal body. The show premiered at this year's O'ahu Fringe Festival and it's back with some new twists and turns. Tickets are \$20 and can be purchased on Eventbrite.com. I would suggest stretching a little before seeing the show at ARTS at Mark's Garage.

Another recommendation I have is the Hawai'i premiere of the play *Indecent* that runs at ARTS beginning June 21st. The play, which was a 2017 Tony nominee for Best Play, was written by Pulitzer Prize winner Paula Vogel and tells the true story of the first Broadway play ever that featured a same-sex kiss in 1923. This led to the arrest of the entire Yiddish theatre troupe for obscenity. This play tells the story surrounding this controversial incident through music and dance. Oh, and I'm not going to tell you if it was a girl-on-girl or a boy-on-boy kiss. If you really want to know, you'll have to see the show! Tickets are \$15-\$25 on Eventbrite.com and the production runs June 21, 22, 27, 28 & 29 at 7:30 p.m. and June 23 & 30 at 2 p.m. The exhibits, workshops and theatrical productions are always changing at the ARTS at Mark's

Garage, so please visit the website at [artsatmarks.com](http://artsatmarks.com) regularly to see what's in store that might be of interest to some of your more adventurous guests.

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

where those suffering from Hansen's Disease were kept in seclusion.

The band's first leader was an African-American man known only as Oliver. Heinrich (Henry) Berger, born in Prussia, became the band's fifth conductor in 1872, whose musical setting of the "Hymn of Kamehameha I" eventually became the Hawaiian, and now state anthem, "Hawai'i Pono'i." For his contributions to the band and Hawaiian music, Berger is recognized as the "Father of Hawaiian Music."

Today, the Royal Hawaiian Band is an agency of the City and County of Honolulu and performs and marches in more than 300 concerts and parades annually including city, state and military functions.

The colorful parade is just one event marking the 147th Annual King Kamehameha Day holiday with festivities across the islands in honor of Hawaii's first king. On Oahu, the celebration begins with a lei-draping ceremony at the King Kamehameha statue in downtown Honolulu from 2 to 4 p.m. June 7, fronting Ali'iolani Hale.

The following day, the public is invited to enjoy live music, food, craft sales and more at the King Kamehameha Celebration Ho'olaule'a at Hawaii Pacific University at Aloha Tower from 4 to 10 p.m. Admission is free.

Paiea Kamehameha, also known as Kamehameha the Great was born between 1748 and 1761 in North Kohala, Hawaii Island. His birth date is a mystery because his childhood was spent in seclusion with foster parents who trained him in warfare and prepared him for his role as the warrior king who unified the islands in 1810. Hawaiians believed that he fulfilled a prophecy of the birth of a male who would vanquish all other chiefs to become Hawaii's greatest monarch. During his peaceful rule he established trade with foreign countries, and promoted agriculture and industry. He died in 1819.

## Nobu Honolulu's Executive Chef Jennifer Chow

So many of the chefs we interview come here from the mainland. Some fall in love the place, and some don't really fit no matter how hard they try and end up heading back. How cool is it that in this case, it's a story of a local girl who has excelled in her field and gets to return home to run famed chef Nobu Matsuhisa's legendary Japanese-fusion restaurant and sushi bar at Ward Village. Read on to learn more about this friendly, driven, talented, Hawaii girl.

### What is your first childhood food memory?

My first childhood food memory is having dinner as a family every night. We all helped set the table and prepare dinner then sat down together most every night. It solidified my love for food and how it can bring people together.

### When did you want to become a Chef?

I can't say that I set out to be a Chef; however, being in a kitchen was always where I felt most comfortable. I have met so many talented and motivated people in the kitchen, who, in turn, inspired me to pursue my culinary passion.

### Who would you consider your mentor and why?

I have so many. One of the first Chefs I worked with in Vegas really changed the way I looked at food and the industry, plus, his passion, pride and excitement about food is contagious, which invigorated my interest even more. As I have grown in the kitchen, specifically at Nobu, Chef Chris Chan Yai Ching at Nobu Caesars always pushed me to keep exploring new challenges and continues to be positive influence in my career today.

### What was your first job in the industry?

I was a dishwasher in high school, and my first real kitchen job was prep cook.

### Tell us how you went from there to being the Executive Chef of Nobu Honolulu.

The only way I know how to get anything in life is hard work and dedication. I started working in Las Vegas kitchens in 2004. In 2013, the year Nobu Caesars Palace opened, a friend who was a bartender there (now the bar manager there) told me about an opening. I started at Nobu Caesars as a line cook and worked in that

position until 2017, then came to Nobu Honolulu as Sous Chef and became Executive Chef in 2018.

### What's the best thing about working for Nobu?

The best thing is that we are a growing company. This creates many opportunities to continue learning, explore new destinations, foods and influences, and keep growing as a chef.

### What's your favorite dish on the menu?

Our oven roasted Umami Sea Bass (recipe below). It is an unassuming dish that is packed with flavor and a dish that you won't find anywhere else.

### Are you from Hawaii? Did this job bring you back here?

Yes!! I was born and raised in Kailua. Being back home is amazing. I get to do what I love for a great company and be surrounded by my family and friends.

### Name your favorite restaurant in town when you're not working?

My Mom's house! After being away for so long, I missed some good home cooking.

### It seems like most chefs have tattoos, is it a chef thing?

I think the restaurant industry was one of the first to accept visible tattoos, which could be one of the reasons many chefs have tattoos. It is also another form of creative expression, which could be part of it!

### What do you like to do most on your days off?

If I'm lucky I like to hit the beach, just to relax and recharge. And I always try to hang out with family and friends.



## Umami Sea Bass

### Marinade for Sea Bass

- Onions
- Carrots
- Celery
- Leek Tops
- Garlic
- Ginger
- Dried Chilli
- Konbu
- Vegetable Scraps

### Directions:

- Roughly blend all vegetables in a robo coupe or food processor to a small dice. Combine with 10% salt by weight.
- Marinate Sea Bass for 4 hours.
- Remove excess marinade and place on a non-stick pan. Roast in a 450 degree oven for approximately 15-20 minutes for a 6 oz. fillet.
- We serve it with a salad of thinly sliced Maui onions and chives dressed with yuzu juice and aji Amarillo. Also a lemon wedge for additional citrus and a hajikiami (pickled young ginger) as a palate cleanser.
