

## Support Local - Eat Local

When the pandemic first struck, forcing restaurants to close down, the Hawai'i



Agricultural Foundation (HAF) decided to expand its popular Localicious® Hawai'i campaign to incorporate one designed to support all Hawaii restaurants since every single one had been affected by the pandemic. The new initiative – Food-A-Go-Go – was a campaign that asked customers to consider takeout, delivery, or curbside pickup as an alternative means of providing meals for their families to help out local restaurants that had to close in-room dining. Since then, HAF has turned Localicious into a yearlong public awareness campaign promoting businesses that support Hawai'i's agricultural and fishing industries and subsidizes ag education. Trina Nakamura, HAF's Director of Development and Marketing, said "In 2022, HAF will shift its Localicious campaign back to restaurants, hotels, and businesses that support local agriculture. With the strain between residents and visitors growing, the Localicious platform will target visitors and ask them to support Localicious businesses that will, in turn, help our local agricultural and fishing industries."

But that left a void for what Localicious had been known for – the month-long campaign where restaurants created a special dish using only locally sourced ingredients that raised funds for the Foundation. Never a campaign to sit on its laurels, Food-A-Go-Go Week is now the latest arm of the Localicious movement and is the most extensive restaurant and local producer campaign in the State of Hawai'i.

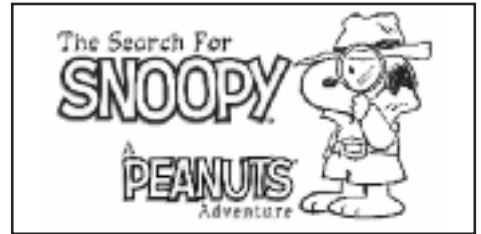
The #FoodAGoGoWeek Campaign will run from March 23 - April 6. This year is a bit different because the restaurants aren't donating proceeds from one specific dish to HAF. Instead, restaurants and other businesses are becoming

members of this initiative, by making a long-term commitment to HAF. Every

member must meet the minimum requirement of having at least one locally grown, caught, or raised product prominently featured as the main ingredient in their product or menu item. In turn, this campaign celebrates and supports those members who have dedicated themselves to supporting HAF's goals. Hotels are now welcome to participate as well as Localicious wants to help every qualified business position themselves as industry leaders that promote local agriculture. They will do their part to direct business to brands that support their goals.

What are those goals? It's four-fold. To support local businesses that buy from our local farmers, ranchers, and fishermen. To create an opportunity for visitors to contribute to our local economy. Help create more demand for our local ag and fishing industries and provide credible information to the public on how they can help Hawaii in its efforts to support local ag and diversify our economy.

So, let's all do our part and make sure to eat out at restaurants supporting Localicious March 23 - April 6th. Restaurants will be offering special discounts or set courses that week on dishes made from ingredients sourced locally and by doing so, you will not only get a delicious meal, but help the Hawaii Ag Foundation raise awareness about this vital industry. To promote the campaign, they will be holding a special #FoodAGoGoWeek Instagram contest. One winner will be selected daily to win a gift card from participating Food-A-Go-Go Week businesses. 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# SHEN YUN RETURNS



Shen Yun is coming back to Honolulu's Blaisdell Concert Hall with an all-new production created for 2022. After a two-year hiatus due to the pandemic, Shen Yun is bringing their message of hope, light, and renewal back to the islands for the 12th time.

In 2006, a group of elite Chinese artists from around the world came together in New York and decided to bring back the lost world of China's traditional, divinely inspired culture and share it with the world. Together, they created Shen Yun Performing Arts.

From the Yellow Emperor of antiquity to the splendor of the Tang Dynasty to the exquisite elegance of the Qing, the lineage of Chinese civilization goes back 5,000 years. It is a story brimming with heroes real and imagined, their legacy preserved in tales of courage and sacrifice, integrity and loyalty, compassion, and virtue.

China's ancient name, "The Land of the Divine," tells of a world where deities and mortals together walked the Earth. Music, medicine, calligraphy, clothing, language, and much more were said to have been brought down from above. Buddhist, Taoist, and other disciplines were at the heart of society. Emperors sought to follow the Way of Heaven, and daily life was replete with rituals connecting the human and the divine.

Shen Yun features classical Chinese dance, with a live orchestra blending Chinese and western musical instruments. The show takes you on a journey to magnificent eras in Chinese history. Ancient stories and legends, ethnic and folk traditions, villains, and heroes will come to life on stage through dance, live music, and stunning digital backdrops in an explosion of color and

sound.

The art form known as classical Chinese dance is at the heart of each Shen Yun performance. With its flips and gentle elegance, it is one of the world's most athletic and expressive art forms. Classical Chinese dance dates back thousands of years and has been constantly refined, generation after generation, eventually developing into the vast and distinctly Chinese dance form they perform today.

There are several other characteristics that define a Shen Yun performance:

**Traditional ethnic and folk dances.** With their vivid costumes, distinct rhythms, and unique dance styles, these dances whisk you up to the Himalayas or across the boundless Mongolian plains.

**Story dances.** A narrator briefly introduces each story where mini-dramas vividly depict cherished stories from the past.

**Music.** The Shen Yun Orchestra combines classical Western and Eastern instruments. Ancient Chinese instruments such as the erhu and the delicate pipa lead the melody on top of a full orchestra of Western strings, percussion, woodwinds, and brass.

**Song.** Ancient Chinese theater and early European opera shared the same style of operatic singing known as *bel canto* (Italian for beautiful singing.) The style emphasized the beauty of sound, accent, with a highly articulated manner of phrasing rather than dramatic expression or romantic emotion. Chinese theater often used a natural singing method that was no different from *bel canto*. But, that specialized technique for singing in the upper register is an art form that started disappearing in the 1830s. Shen Yun's singers are trained to

utilize this precise traditional and classical technique on the modern stage.

**Costumes.** The vividly colored costumes are true to traditional aesthetics and styles. Their vibrant hues and exquisite detail breathe fresh life into every dance piece and story, painting the present with the splendor of the past. Shen Yun's costumes bring back the styles of China's different dynasties, regions, and ethnic groups.

**Digital.** Behind the performers, there are high-tech backdrops such as Mongolians riding on horseback across grasslands as vast as the sky that make you feel as if you were immersed in the environment.

Even if you have seen the show before, this one will be different. Every single year, Shen Yun creates a brand-new show with entirely new choreography, music, costumes, digital backdrops, and storyline.

Although Shen Yun has since grown to tremendous worldwide success, performing in front of millions of people, ironically, the company has never actually been allowed to perform in China. It seems the Chinese government has banned the performance and the performers and has attempted to cancel Shen Yun performances through political pressure via its foreign embassies and consulates, even going so setting up copycat productions across the street to try to hurt ticket sales. The performers—dancers, musicians, and crew—all live and train in New York. As individuals, they have been banned from traveling to China, having been blacklisted by the Chinese government long ago for their involvement in Shen Yun.

Shen Yun has multiple companies touring simultaneously with hundreds of performers for years, two of which have Hawaii ties: one was a former member of Honolulu Symphony Orchestra, and another is from Mililani.

Performances will occur in the Blaisdell Concert Hall on Saturday, March 26th at 2 p.m. and 7:20 p.m., and again on March 27th at 2 p.m. Tickets can be bought online at [shenyun.com](http://shenyun.com). When purchasing your tickets, you will be given the option to buy directly from Shen Yun or Ticketmaster. The prices are the same on both sites, but the fees differ. It looks to be \$6 per ticket on the presenter's site and \$17.40 per ticket on Ticketmaster. Seat selections are split amongst the two, so if you cannot find the seats you want on one, be sure to check the other one, especially if fees are not a concern. The format has been incredibly successful, and another star-packed season is coming beginning this month.



today as it was then. He has taken home numerous awards throughout the years and recently received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Hawaii Academy of Recording Arts and was inducted into the Hawaiian Music Hall of Fame. Jerry Santos has maintained an influential presence on the Hawaii music scene for over four decades.

This season is called the Hawaii Legends Edition and will feature iconic local musicians that helped shape the music scene that began in the 1970s known as the "Hawaiian Renaissance." Henry will be turning back the clock to a much simpler time in the islands, a ground-breaking movement in Hawaii's cultural history that brought language, music, hula, art, and all aspects of Hawaiian culture back to their central place in the life of the Islands. These concerts are an entertaining and unique way for visitors to hear and learn about some of the best musicians Hawaii offers and a big hit for locals.

He will be kicking off the season with Keola Beamer, The Quintessential Hawaiian Slack-Key Guitar Master." He and his brother Kapono made up the wildly popular 70's duo, The Beamer Brothers. Together they put out seven albums over the next decade, playing a vital part in establishing the style that came to be called "Hawaiian contemporary," rooted in Hawaiian language and tradition but also incorporating outside influences such as rock, pop, Latin, and more. Their 1978 hit Honolulu City Lights is still one of the most popular songs in Hawaii. The brothers disbanded in the '80s, but Keola has continued to perform since then, even earning a Grammy nomination in 2012. Henry will sit down with Beamer on March 15th to kick off this season.

On March 31st, Henry has Jerry Santos join him on stage. As a founding member and lead singer of the legendary group, Olomana, Jerry helped create a unique and easily recognizable musical style, blending Hawaiian music with contemporary rhythms. His hit song "Ku'u Home O Kahalu'u" is as popular

On April 26th, Henry will be joined by The Mākaha Sons. The Mākaha Sons of Niihau first formed back in 1976 with five members, Israel Kamakawiwo'ole being one. The band shortened its name to The Mākaha Sons after Iz quit in 1983. Although the members have changed over the years, founding member Jerome Koko soldiers on and continues to lead the band's legacy to this day. The talented trio sticks to the magic of the classic Sons sound.

The series closes out with renown slack guy guitarist Ledward Kaapana on May 26th. Kaapana's mastery of stringed instruments, particularly the slack key guitar, and his extraordinary baritone and falsetto voices, have made Led a musical legend performing with everyone from Dolly Parton to Chet Atkins.

Arguably one of the busiest and most popular musicians in Hawaii, Henry Kapono continues to perform around town as often as possible. His weekly performances at Duke's on Sunday have become an institution as well as an absolute must for most visitors. Not only did he turn this institution into a song, but his good friend Jimmy Buffet covered it. The Grammy-nominated singer/songwriter and 14-time Hoku Award-winner is equally well known for his generosity and efforts to support the community through music & the arts. He launched the Henry Kapono Foundation in 2018 to provide opportunities for the next generation. He played an active role in getting Hawaii's musicians back to work after the pandemic devastated the live music industry. The Foundation raises money for local charities and educational scholarships to support Hawaii's music industry. ## Chef's Corner

### Maui Brewing Company Chef Chea Hong

Born and raised in Honolulu, Chef Chea is first generation Korean-American. After graduating high school she headed to the mainland. After living on both coasts, she settled in Seattle where her culinary endeavors began. She says she's been fortunate to have moved up in this industry fairly quickly. She started in banquet prep, then was fortunate enough to be intensely mentored by a French trained Chef that worked under Thomas Keller who took the time to teach her many techniques and skills.

#### What's your favorite childhood food memory?

I was 5 years old in Seoul, Korea, curiously watching my grandmother make fresh mandoo from scratch. How delicate and fast she was at rolling the dough and putting the filling, and how she folded all the corners to make it beautiful and plump. I can still taste my grandmothers mandoo till this day.

#### What did you do before becoming a chef?

I was a night club bartender for over 10 years in Seattle.

#### What made you decide to pursue culinary?

Knowledge of food and diving deep into nutritional foods, traveling the world and exploring different cultural cuisine, tasting different flavors.

#### How would you describe your style of cooking?

Amazing, rustic Italian, aggressive flavor – delicate too.

#### Where did you train?

I trained under amazing world-renowned Chefs who were James Beard Winners

#### Can you remember a dish that didn't work?

I remember I did a tasting at a very upscale hotel. One of three dishes that I made - miso cous cous with saba, rosemary, fried shimeji, shiso oil. It didn't turn out exactly how I wanted.

#### What was your first job in the industry?

Banquet-Prep. Cutting vegetables, proteins, sauces and prepping for large parties. I didn't even know how to hold a knife properly.

#### How did you work your way up to Exec. Chef?

Long hours and wanting to learn more and more about how things were done, techniques, cooked, prepared, asked many questions about everything, assisted everywhere in every station-kitchen I worked in.

#### Who would you consider your mentor?

Every kitchen I step foot in, I always look the person who is training me as my mentor. I see how they communicate with others, their techniques and skills, how they handle food, and their palate.

#### What brought you back to Oahu?

My family and my love for bodyboarding. I moved back in 2015.

#### What's your goal at Maui Brewing Company?

Being the Executive Chef has really humbled me in this industry. Keep doing what I am doing and bond with my team.

#### What's your biggest pet peeve in a kitchen?

Messiness and being unorganized.

#### What's your favorite place to go to?

I have a few... Island Vintage Coffee, Aki-Kaimuki, Rinka, just to name a couple.

#### Is there anything else you would like to add?

I'm grateful for every opportunity I've been given and continue to have a quest for knowledge about food, cultures and different cooking techniques. Try to support your local restaurants and buy local, pick up trash after a surf session, and spread love through food!

### 'Ohana Ceviche (Shrimp & Marlin Ceviche)

*Chef Notes: This is MBC'S take on a Peruvian dish. Peru might seem far away, but it uses raw seafood (which we all love) and coconut! Really easy to make....we use Aji Amarillo in it, which is a Peruvian chile paste, but it can be made without just by charring a few chiles (jalapeño or serrano are great), and blending them into the sauce. Beware of using Hawaiian chiles: a little bit of those will go a LONG way!*



#### Leche de Tigre Ingredients:

2 cups Lemon Juice  
1 cup Lime Juice  
¼ cup Aji Amarillo  
¼ cup Onion, minced  
½ oz Garlic, minced

2 Tb Celery, minced  
1 cup Fresh Cilantro leaves  
1 cup Coconut Milk  
2 Tsp Kosher Salt - add gradually  
½ - 1 Charred and seeded habanero chile (optional)

**Directions:** In a vita-mix blender, add all ingredients and blend until smooth. Note: the habanero is OPTIONAL – only add it if you love spicy! Strain through a fine mesh strainer. Refrigerate until ready to use.

#### Dish Ingredients:

6 oz Marinated Ceviche\*  
5 ea Pickled Red Fresno Chiles

¼ oz Shaved Red Onion  
4 ea Cilantro Springs  
6 ea Crispy Taro Root Chips

**Directions:** Mix the ceviche before plating. Place the ceviche as seen in the photo. Place the chiles as shown. Place the onions over top. Place the cilantro as shown. Garnish the bowl with the crispy taro root chips. Be generous with the ceviche liquid. \*For each portion: 4 oz marlin, 2 oz poached shrimp, 3 oz leche de tigre.

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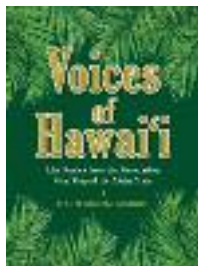

**Life Stories from the Generation that Shaped the Aloha State**  
 by Jane Marshall Goodsell

Accomplished in the art of oral history, Goodsell first began interviewing Island residents who had known her late father, but avocation soon became vocation. As her joy in recording these life stories grew, so too did her pool of subjects: business executives, war veterans and POWs, retired plantation managers, Island entertainers, farmers, ranchers, activists, educators, broadcasters, journalists, judges, and many others. Taken together, their oral histories told a fascinating, behind-the-scenes tale of Hawai'i's journey from the World War II era into the 21st century. 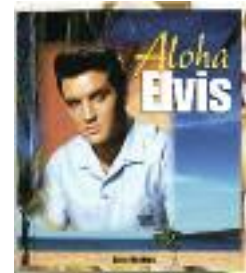
