The annual festival that celebrates the diversity of Asia-Pacific cultures and promotes cultural understanding and ethnic harmony among all people is returning March 6th – 8th at multiple locations throughout Waikiki.

The theme this year is "Making the World a Better Place for Our Future, from the Pacific to the World." and hundreds of performers from throughout the Pacific Rim will showcase of diversity in music, dance, food and art. Participants will be coming from countries as far away as Australia, Japan, the Philippines, China, Taiwan, South Korea, and the mainland to join Hawaiian groups for the festivities.

Hiroyuki "Keith" Kitagawa, who is president of the Honolulu Festival Foundation says, "The Honolulu Festival is a platform for cultural groups of all ages and origins – from remote areas of their countries, to local talent here Hawai'i – to share a part of their heritage through music, dance, and special presentations."

Events kick off on Friday, March 6th, with ticketed or invite-only events such as the school tours, the Governor's Lunch, the Honolulu Hula Formal and the Friendship Gala. For spectators awaiting the fun, free events and cultural performances, those kick

off Saturday morning, March 7th at 10 a.m. at the Hawaii Convention Center when the Craft Fair and Japanese Film Festival open.

The first floor of the Hawai'i Convention Center will be filled with more than 100 vendors showcasing a variety of cultural exhibits from around the world at the Craft Fair. The fair includes the ever-popular Ennichi Corner, filled with games and activities for kids as well as plenty of food options available for purchase.

Once you finish browsing the first floor, head up to the 3rd for the Japanese Film Festival, which features a tribute screening for Kyoto Animation Studio, as well as a pop-up planetarium in partnership with Bishop Museum. Internationally acclaimed movies will run throughout the day, and admission is free. Check the website for film schedule. Both the Craft Fair and the Film Festival are free to attend and will be open until 6 p.m. on Saturday and 3 p.m. on Sunday.

This year, the Japanese rock/jazz fusion duo, "Sukimaswitch," has been appointed as a Special Ambassador of the Festival and will be providing a free performance from 5 – 5:40 p.m. at the Convention Center, right before Continued on page 7.

and a Presidential Medal of Freedom, Carol Burnett is still delighting audiences around the world with her signature sense of humor.

When I posted on Facebook I had the opportunity to ask her a few questions, I was surprised by how many people stated they didn't have any questions for her, they simply wanted to tell her thank you for the years of laughter. As one friend said, "I think I'd rather tell her thank you for being so fabulous and making so many millions of people laugh." To have that kind of response all these years later is a testament itself.

For those of you that would like to thank you, you can at these shows. Audience members can expect an evening of laughter and reflection that includes a special Q&A session with her. As a matter of fact, taking questions from the audience has become a hallmark of the shows she has kept going. When asked why, she replied, "It keeps the old gray matter ticking, you know? You have to be on your toes — you can't be thinking about what you're going to do tomorrow, [or] what you did yesterday. And so it keeps the brain going, really."

During "An Evening of Laughter and Reflection," Burnett will take questions from the audience, show video clips from her shows in a format that harkens back to the legendary openings of *The Carol Burnett Show* where her studio audience had an unfiltered opportunity to engage Carol with questions and receive spontaneous answers. "I love the spontaneity of these evenings," said Carol. "I never know what anyone is going to ask, or say, or do, so it keeps me on my toes!"

Carol says "I've been doing this kind of show for years, it's a great way for me to connect with an audience. I just come out and I do what I did on my show, it's all random, no planted questions. I don't want that."

Allowing audience members to ask questions really does open up a performer to some rather dicey situations, but it seems this part came from the co-producer of The Carol Burnett Show, who suggested Carol did a Q&A at the top of the show way back when. "Honestly, at first, I balked at the idea," Carol said, "What if the audience doesn't have a question?" And he told me, "It's really important that you come out as yourself before you start the show because they're going to see you in all these crazy costumes — fat suits, blacked-out teeth, wigs, a gown with a curtain rod in it. They should see you at first," he said. Carol says she said if she was comfortable after the first two or three shows, they would keep it in, and that became one of the iconic parts of the program that they still do today.

When asked if there had ever been one she just didn't want to answer, Carol replied. "No, but there was one that threw me for a bit. Some lady raised her hand ... and said, 'Carol, if you could be a member of the opposite sex for 24 hours and then pop back into being yourself, who would you be and what would you do?" The audience went, 'Woo!' I'm going, 'Oh, my God!' and I'm thinking... "Would I want to be Cary Grant?" I swear, I said a prayer, and I said, "OK Lord, I'm goanna open my mouth and whatever comes out is gonna be your fault." I swear I didn't know ... it was surreal. I didn't know I was gonna say this until I said it... and when I opened my mouth. I said I'd be Osama bin Laden, and I'd kill myself. The audience went crazy, and I just said, 'Thank you, Lord.' That was [definitely] the weirdest one I ever got!"

At the top of each show, Carol shows an eight-minute clip of her favorite Q&A things that happened from the show, so the theater audience that night knows what we're going to do. If you go to the show, be sure to come full of questions! Shows will be start at 7:30 p.m. at the Blaisdell Concert Hall, and tickets are \$65-\$175. ticketmaster.com.



Hubba Hubba and Aloha. It's March, and that means there are new things to do on the theatre scene.

We only usually talk about

storytellers in the fall, but storytellers are a part of Hawaiian history. Storytelling is a universal means of communicating cultural traditions, values and beliefs. It's a tool used to pass on information about history, science, government and politics. Storytelling in the Hawaiian culture has a number of unique aspects. Storytellers were highly regarded and future storytellers learned their craft at the knee of the elders, studying such specific content as genealogy and storytelling skills. Some stories are new; others have been handed down through the generations. Regardless of the origin of stories, storytelling is unique, a dynamic interaction between the storyteller and the audience.



Lopaka Kapanui is a native Hawaiian storyteller, writer, actor, kumu hula, cultural practitioner, former professional wrestler, husband, father and grandpa. Sometimes known as "The Ghost

Guy," Lopaka makes a business of leading guests into some of the darkest, spookiest places on the island of 'O'ahu sharing tales of between-world spirits and Hawaiian mythology. For more than a decade, he has led after-dark ghost tours around the island of O'ahu. A storyteller for more than twenty years, hundreds of people have come forward to share their own stories with him, making him a repository for some of our islands' spookiest tales. Sharing more than just Hawaiian ghost stories, Lopaka shares his knowledge of the history and legends of O'ahu and Hawai'i. With his theatrical, mesmerizing style, he offers fascinating glimpses into Hawaiian spirituality.

In 1994, Lopaka went on a ghost tour with famed historian and author of *Obake Files* and the *Chicken Skin* ghost story series, Glen Grant. At the time, he had no idea that he was about to meet his future mentor. Lopaka quickly realized that the stories that Glen told were the same tales of legends and history that his own kupuna shared with him. Glen was the original creator of 'O'ahu's first ghost tours, setting the stage for the future of all other ghost tours in Hawai'i. Glen was adamant about researching every story, every

fact and instilled this ethic in Lopaka as well, accepting nothing less than excellence.

After Glen's passing in 2003, Lopaka carried on the business at The Haunt for a short time and then created his own tour business, first as Ghosts of Old Honolulu as a tribute to Glen and then Mysteries of Honolulu. It is through Mysteries of Honolulu that Lopaka followed in the footsteps of his close friend and mentor and honors the man who meant so much to him. If you have never heard him tell a story, then you are simply missing a part of Hawaiian history.

Do you know the story about Morgan's Corner? Most everyone that grew up here has heard one of them. Is it the infamous tale of a teenage couple parked on a dark and lonely road in a car that won't start? Or is it the account of a woman who was robbed and murdered in a single night? No matter what the story may be, it all took place in one location: Morgan's Corner. Some people have said it's all urban legend, and others swear it's true. Whatever the story might be, join Lopaka at **DORIS DUKE THEATRE** on March 13th, as he weaves the story about Morgan's Corner at 7:30 p.m. in Lopaka Kapanui: The Legend of Morgan's Corner as he explores the strange origins behind the most infamous stretch of road on O'ahu. Tickets are \$15 and available at honolulumuseum.org.

Following the theme of old Hawaiian storys, head to KUMU KAHUA THEATRE, for The Conversion of Ka'ahumanu that begins on March 19th. The story goes that when Lucy Thurston and Sybil Bingham arrived on the shores of O'ahu in 1820, a year after Queen Ka'ahumanu overthrew the traditional Kapu system in ancient Hawai'i, they immediately attempted their missionary task. Queen Ka'ahumanu, however, was more interested in their dresses than a new god and has no desire for new religion. Sybil and Lucy persevere, and so begins the slow, gradual process of Ka'ahumanu's conversion. This complex historical drama explores different perspectives on Hawaii's official adoption of Christianity — from the caste system to notions of monogamy. Shows will be on Thursday, Friday & Saturday at 8 p.m., and Sundays at 2 p.m. (expect Easter) through April 19th. Tickets are \$20 and can be found online at kumukahua.org.

Although your first time visitors are only interested in luau's and Pearl Harbor, many of repeat visitors are interested in Hawaiian history and culture. Give them options to go listen to storytellers or watch local Hawaiian theatre, then, they might feel local!

# 3RD ANNUAL NOODLE FEST HAWAII



More than 16,000 people showed up for last year's Noodle Fest at Victoria Ward Park.

Around the world, noodles and civilization go hand-in-hand. The earliest mention of noodles came from third century A.D. in China. These mian pian noodles were not the long strands seen today, but were more like dumplings, pulled from bread dough and tossed into boiling water.

Experimentation over time led to diverse shapes and cooking methods that differed by province. In Northern China, blanket noodles still start as dumplings pulled from dough that is rolled then stretched by hand to achieve their wide blanket shape.

This universally comforting, plentiful form of food became the centerpiece for tables around the globe.

Italy has its fettuccine, linguine, spaghetti and tagliatelle tossed with an array of sauces and savory ingredients, while Japan prefers its popular ramen and soba noodles in soup or served with broth for dipping. And elsewhere in Asia and Southeast Asia, from Thailand to the Philippines, rice, egg and wheat flour noodles are enjoyed wet or dry, in soups or stir-fried.

Even Hawaii has its own form of a wheat noodle-based soup, saimin, which evolved from noodle soups introduced by Chinese laborers in the 19th century.

Multicultural Hawaii has the advantage of enjoying diverse noodle dishes served at restaurants daily, but a variety of noodles from multiple cultures will come together under one roof during the 3rd annual Noodle Fest Hawaii taking place from 3 to 9 p.m. March 28 at Victoria Ward Park. Admission is free for the event that last year brought out more than 16,000 attendees who slurped and chewed their way through an array of noodle specialties.

This year's lineup will include more than 20 restaurant-operated booths that will showcase noodle dishes from Japan, China, Vietnam, Mexico, Thailand, Italy and other countries, for purchase. Those noodles can be paired with drinks, including beer and wine for

purchase. Participating restaurants will includes the like sof Sun Noodle, Hokkaido Ramen Santouka, Hawaiian Honey Cones, and Sweet Creams.

New to 2020, increasing the theme of 'Noodle Dishes around the World' is Kapispa (Kapiolani Spaghetti House) with a Japanese-Italian fusion pasta dish. Also a new entry, Dragon Tea, will feature Taiwanese street food noodle dishes at the festival.

The noodle's importance is often reflected in various cultural traditions, stories and commemorative occasions. In Chinese culture, noodles are a must for the holiday table as a symbol of one of the great blessings for a new year, a promise of longevity.

In Italy, pasta have been created and named for historic events and individuals, such as tripoline and bengasini pastas linked to Italy's war in Africa, in reference to Libya and Benghazi. Mafaldine and Regine pastas were named after Princess Mafalda and the Queen of the House of Savoy.

Other pastas were named after cities or the processes by which they were made, such as the chitarra, which translates as "guitar," because it's cut with a tool featuring a series of parallel wires.

In addition to tasting noodles, Noodle Fest guests will be able to watch a celebrity chef cooking demonstration, a spicy noodle-eating challenge, an udon speed-eating contest, and listen to music performed by local artists.

There will also be retail tents featuring various Ward Village merchants and exclusive Noodle Fest Hawaii T-shirts at the VH07V Rooth

Proceeds from the event will benefit Hawaii Foodbank, whose volunteers will be staffing a tent to accept monetary and non-perishable food donations.

We've all heard the mantras, "Buy Local," "Farm-to-Table," and "support local business." Well, back in 2014, the Hawai'i Agricultural Foundation (HAF) took those mantras to an entirely new level and decided to dedicate an entire month to raising awareness about restaurants that are committed to sustaining our local agricultural industry by encouraging people to eat out and eat local. Enter Localicous Hawai'i.

The program kicked off with just over 65 participating restaurants. There are now well over 200 Localicious restaurants creating a special dish in the month of March using a locally grown, caught or raised product and feature it on their menus. Each time a Localicious dish is ordered, the restaurant makes a donation to HAF's agricultural education programs in Hawai'i schools. These programs play an important part in planting seeds of interest in our keiki for an ag-related career, needed to help increase local food production and safeguard the sustainability of our islands.

In 2011, the Foundation established the HAF Ag Park at Kunia. 220 acres of land that have been dedicated to diversified agricultural production by farmers who are

able to sublease the land to grow various crops. Currently, the park farmers are growing diverse crops including taro, many types of greens and lettuces, bananas, eggplant, beans, peppers, tomatoes, daikon, long squash, radish, papaya, and avocado.

The organization also hosts regular workshops on topics ranging from new agricultural practices, to food safety education, business education, and soil and water conservation.

The Foundation is yet another movement that was really first inspired by the Hawai'i Regional Cuisine movement. Twelve Hawai'i chefs established the culinary movement in 1991 to showcase ethnic flavors with local ingredients to promote Hawaii as a food destination, as well as create an agricultural network giving chefs and restaurants greater access to locally grown produce. Culinary luminaries such as Roy Yamaguchi, Alan Wong, Peter Merriman, Philippe Padovani, and George Mavrothalassitis are just a few of the chefs that launched this movement.

Through their efforts, and those that followed behind them, including the ubersuccesful Hawaii Food & Wine Festival, they have all strived towards the same goal. Their

mission is to keep attention on Hawai'i's food and farmers while giving the next generation of chefs a chance to shine in a benefit for local and agricultural culinary programs. Because of their hard work over the years, hundreds of restaurants are now able to support the work of local farmers, ranchers and fishermen, increasing the state's food sufficiency.

In its seventh year, the Localicious campaign continues to grow year after year. So, for the good of the farmers, the agricultural foundation, and your taste buds, try to support a Localicious item every time you dine out in March. The specials will be identified on menus with a Localicious sticker or logo next to the item. This is an excellent reason to try out that new restaurant you've been meaning to get too, or break that New Year's resolution. Here's just a few of the hundreds of items you can choose from.

the annual Aloha Dance Competition kicks off at 6 p.m. One of the biggest dance competition in Hawaii, this event provides a great opportunity for dancers to exchange cultures and challenge their dreams against dancers from all over the globe, in all genres of dance. Although awards are given, it is truly a celebration of the joy of dance. Earlier in the day, there will be a workshop from Mari Koda, a famous dancer from Japan and Hollywood actress, from 10:30 a.m. - noon.

Bishop Museum will host and sponsor a portable planetarium with the screening of Wayfinders, Waves, Wind and Star, The Little Prince & The Star of Wish on both days on the 3rd floor. Doors open at 10:30 a.m. both days, closing at 5:30 p.m on Saturday and 1:30 p.m. on Sunday.

For those of age, there will also be an inaugural Sake & Food Hawai'i Convention Center. The exhibit features a learning experience of how to enjoy Japanese-made alcohol and includes samplings of a variety of sake, shochu and awamori (an alcoholic beverage made in Okinawa).

In addition to the events at the Hawaii Convention Center, there will be multiple stages set up at Ala Moana Center, and Waikiki Beach Walk offering dance, music and traditional arts performed by groups from Hawaii, Japan and other parts of the Pacific region throughout the weekend. Performances will be offered starting at 11 a.m. and 8 p.m. on Saturday and return on Sunday at 10 a.m. Exact performance times at each venue will be available on the website.

Sunday morning kicks off with the 8th annual Honolulu Rainbow EKIDEN relay running race that originated in Japan, where runners hand off a tasuki (a cloth sash the current runner wears) to the next runner when their turn is up. The race kicks off at 8 a.m.,



and there are a variety of categories to sign up for. Register online.

On Sunday, March 8th, the International Marketplace will join into the fray offering free, live music and cultural performances celebrating Queen's Court from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. Stage performances will also continue at Waikiki Beach Walk and Ala Moana Centerstage until 3 p.m. that afternoon, and then the streets start clearing at 3:30 p.m. for the two most highly anticipated events of the festival to wrap things up.

First up, the Waikiki Grand Parade. Starting at 4 p.m., see some of the most whimsical floats you'll see all year parade down Kalakaua Avenue surrounded by hundreds of spirited dancers, and live cultural performances. And, as in years past, the parade will end with the gigantic, dazzling 1.5-ton dragon Daijayama that spits-fire as fireworks spark from the dragon as it goes past in a smoky cloud to draw the parade to a close.

But, as popular as Daijayama is, it isn't actually the finale of the Festival, rather, it's the highly anticipated Nagaoka Fireworks show off Waikiki at 8:30 p.m. They are truly some of the best fireworks of the year, rivaled only by the private Royal Cosmetic show each summer. Be sure to tune into 105 FM KINE for music synced to the incredible show. if you haven't seen these fireworks before, try to.

Towards the end of the month, longtime fixtures in Ala Moana, Mai Tai Bar and Bubba Gump Shrimp Company will be closing their doors after a failed lease negotiation in order make room for our first ever Olive Garden (after decades of watching their commercials, finally!) and after 45 years of teppan tricks, Kobe Japanese Steak House will close their doors in Waikiki on February 29th. The bad news doesn't stop there. Next month both Pint + Jigger and Jimbo Restaurant in McCully will be closing as well to make way for construction on a new Federal Credit Union. The good news is that both restaurants are actively seeking new locations to reopen in. The bad news? They're having problems finding a new location, but fingers crossed they do. In the meantime, you have most of the month to go get a final fix at both. Jimbo will be close on March 26 and Pint + Jigger on the 27th. • It's not all bad news though. For you burger

lovers out there, there's a new diner in town. Betty's Burger Joint has opened in the former Greek Corner location at Puck's Alley, run by their next door neighbors at Study Hall, and the initial reviews are great. They have transformed the old Greek restaurant into a retro diner, filled with surfboards on the wall, old Coca-Cola signs and even a jukebox. # Chef's Corner

### Merriman's Executive Chef Vince McCarthy

Chef Vince grew up working in kitchens in Portland and learned his craft the old fashion way, through trial and error. He took a chance, applied for an entry-level job at Merriman's Fish House on Kauai, and through hard work and determination, worked his way up to the Executive Chef position. Since taking over the helm he has worked on introducing several new events, such as Luau Mondays, Mucho Mahalo Tuesdays and Prime Rib Wednesdays. Expect some more exciting announcements in the near future!

Did you start in culinary as a seafood purveyor? Actually, I worked in several fine dining type

restaurants growing up, working every station. I then decided to switch it up and accepted a job in sales but after two years of that it was clear, I preferred cooking.

What made you decide you wanted to be a chef? I guess cooking with my mom, the kitchen just always felt like home.

So you just up and moved to the islands with no culinary experience at all?

Correction, I have been working in restaurants since I was a teenager back in Portland, Oregon, so I had a lot of experience, I just didn't go to culinary school. My mom was actually the one who had dined at Merriman's Fish House while on vacation and loved it, she came back and said "you should apply there!"

Sorry, I misunderstood. So, what was your first restaurant job?

At age 14 I started as a prep cook for Café Fraiche in Portland, Oregon.

Who would you consider your mentor and why? Chef Neil Murphy, no question. He's taught me so much, mentored me and I wouldn't have this incredible opportunity with out him.

Do you remember a dish early on that failed?

Yes, it was a humbling moment that I learned a lot from. It was a panko crusted Mahi Mahi with coconut and lime that tasted kinda like sun screen, lol. Total fail.

How did you work your way up to Exec. Chef?

When I took the job as a pantry cook at Merriman's in Kauai it was just to get my foot in the door. I put my best into every position they moved me to and was committed to doing the best I could. I was determined. Luckily, I learned a ton from Chef Neil Murphy and before long they offered me the opportunity to move to the Big Island as the Executive Chef.

How would you describe your style of cooking? Bright, clean, fresh cuisine using high-quality local produce.

### Merriman's Wok-Charred 'Ahi with Asian Slaw and Wasabi Dipping Sauce

'Ahi Coating Ingredients:

2 Shallots, minced (about 1/3 cup) 1 pc. of fresh ginger root, peeled & minced (about 2 Tbsp) 2 garlic cloves, minced (about 1 Tbsp) 1 Tbl. fresh thyme leaves, whole 1 Tbl. + 1 tsp. dried marjoram

½ tsp. red pepper flakes

1 tsp. table salt

1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper

1 Tbl. + 1 tsp. freshly squeezed lemon juice

1 ½ cups melted clarified butter

Prepare 'Ahi Coating: Place shallots, ginger, garlic, thyme, marjoram, pepper flakes, salt, pepper, cayenne and lemon juice in a small bowl, mix well. Chill coating for 30 minutes in the refrigerator, so that it thickens slightly, then stir to recombine ingredients.

### **Asian Slaw Ingredients:**

½ head of Napa cabbage, halved and sliced into ½ red onion, cut into ¼-inch slices (about ½ cup) 1/4-inch ribbons (about 2 cups)

<sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup fresh bean sprouts

⅓ cilantro leaves, chopped

Prepare Asian Slaw: Place cabbage, bean sprouts, onion and cilantro in a medium bowl and toss well. Chill until ready to serve.

Wasabi Dipping Sauce Ingredients:

2 Tbl. wasabi powder

2 Tbl. water

1 cup soy sauce

½ cup freshly squeezed lemon juice

½ cup mirin

Prepare Wasabi Dipping Sauce: In a small bowl, mix wasabi and water to make a thick paste. Add soy sauce, lemon juice and mirin. Whisk to combine, making sure the wasabi is completely dissolved into the liquid. To serve, bring to room temperature and divide among individual bowls.

### The Surfjack Hotel & Swim Club



The Surfjack's Instagrammable pool

In 1961, Hawaii hotelier and architect Roy Kelley built the Hokele Suites. In the process of designing the property, he decided to include a pool in the courtyard, which was unheard of back in that day and age. Nearly 60-years later, that groundbreaking pool is now the focal point of the surf-retro, midcentury-modern movement hotel. The whimsical hand-painted message at the bottom of The Surfjack Hotel & Swim Club pool says "Wish You Were Here," and quickly became one of the most Instagrammable images to come out of Waikiki lately.

The hotel reopened in 2016, after a retroinspired renovation brought the aging property back to life. Capitalizing on the midcentury-modern movement style of the hotel, the redesign focused the spirit of beach culture and modern aloha infused with a healthy amount of local artist involvement to create the distinct vintage, '60s surf-chic style that reverberates throughout the hotel, including the large open-air lobby area that sits on one side of the pool to the lounge on the other side. Built for socialization, the open-air layout encourages guest interaction. The lobby's extra long U-shaped couch becomes a place to meet new friends, where guests sit and chat, borrow books and board games to play in the lobby or in your room, and offer nightly live music from 7 - 9 p.m.

Popular farm-to-table restaurant, Mahina & Suns, set between the lobby and the lounge overlooking the cabanas by the pool, has an active bar area, offers daily kamaaina lunch specials and an all-day happy hour menu on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays for all industry employees with a valid liquor card, hotel/restaurant ID or recent paystub.

Since opening, the hotel has raised the standards for sustainable hospitality in Hawaii, dedicated to protecting the environment by aiming to change the daily mindset of guests and employees when it comes to single-use plastic and reef-safe practices.

In addition, there are plenty of activities open to locals and guests alike, including penthouse yoga, poolside pilates, boutique pop-ups, monthly silent disco pool parties and more. Check it out at surfjack.com. ~ Pam




