Hawaii Book & Music Festival

Think books, music, authors, theater, hula and more books. Book festivals are celebrated in many cities – usually in big hotels or conference centers, often with a high ticket price. Here in Honolulu the two-day 14th Annual Hawaii Book & Music Festival celebration, May 4th and 5th, is outdoors under the trees at Honolulu Hale, city hall, and all totally free – even the parking is free.

At the festival you can enjoy presentations by Pulitzer Prize award-winning authors, hear great Hawaiian music, watch hula - plus savor a multitude of food booths selling everything from burgers to burritos and gelato, plus coffee – with clusters of tables and chairs under the shade trees for a respite between presentations. Food from the international food court includes lumpia, an Istanbul restaurant tent, soft serve, and sugarcane.

By the numbers: in the two full days there are eight venues with 130 programmed events including over 500 participants and presenters. "Something for everyone," is how Roger Jellinek, executive director and creator of the event describes the two day festival. The venue spreads across the entire Honolulu Hale vast lawn plus non-stop events in the Mission Memorial Auditorium on the ewa end of the grounds. As you can imagine, authors

love to be invited to Hawaii vs. a mainland indoor environment.

Of course the entire schedule is on line at hawaiibookandmusicfestival.com to make notes and develop a plan. (Fact: no one has ever been able to see it all but it is fun to try). Program changes do happen, but, once at the Festival it is easy to wander and "map out a plan of attack". Every venue will have a full schedule printed on a poster beside the stage or the tables and tents.

The primary venues include the Mission Memorial Auditorium, the Main Stage, the Authors Pavillion with fourteen solo presentations and panel presentations, the keiki stage and the Kristy Yamaguchi Reading Corner. The Publishers Village is filled with booksellers and local publishers presenting their newest publications. Local author, musician and storytellers will be there for signings, with the longest lines at the Barnes & Noble National Author Signing.

The Mission Memorial Auditorium has non-stop presentations. Cool, air conditioned with seating for a large audience, it is a respite and a spot to savor the authors words. First up and getting the attention of would-be writers is Pulitzer Prizewinner William Finnegan

Since man's existence, human beings have coped with death through rituals to deal with grief while honoring cherished memories of loved ones.

Traditions vary with each culture. Ancient Egyptians practiced mummification to preserve the body and keep its spirit intact in the next life. Similarly, Hawaiian tradition involved washing the body with salt water before preserving it with the grated roots of ti plants and dressing the body in bark cloth before burial.

Today, funerals are often private affairs attended only by close family and friends but feelings of loss can linger for years, with no outlet for sharing one's grief because to do so often makes others feel uncomfortable.

community with Japanese roots, recognizes the need to memorialize and honor the legacy of our loved ones and this has resulted in one of the most breathtaking events of the summer.

The organization will present the 20th Anniversary Shinnyo Lantern Floating Hawaii ceremony on Memorial Day, May 27. During the free sunset event, a stunning display of 7,000 lanterns bearing remembrances and names of loved ones will be set adrift in the ocean at Ala Moana Beach Park. At the end of the evening, the lanterns will be collected for reuse in following years. The messages are also collected and handled in a ceremonial way.

The powerful ceremony is expected to draw more than 50,000 residents and visitors to witness the magical moment when the candle-lighted lanterns cast their red-orange glow over the deep blue ocean.

The sound of conch shells will signal the start of a formal multicultural entertainment program including a taiko performance by Shinnyo Taiko, Hawaiian oli (chant), hula and music, and the recitation of Buddhist sutras. Shinnyo-en head priest, Her Holiness Shinso Ito, will share a message of hope and peace before being joined by four community leaders for the lighting of the Light of Harmony. After the lighting, the ringing of a bell signals the passing of candles from person to person, as people wade in hip- to chest-deep in the water to release their lanterns, altogether representing thousands of souls as they bob silently and gracefully on the water.

The day starts early for those who want to float a lantern. A Lantern Request Tent will open at the park beginning at 10 a.m. the day

of the event. A single lantern will be available per party or family on a first-come, first-served basis until 3 p.m., or until lanterns run out.

There is no cost for the lanterns, but donations are welcome and will be gifted to the City & County of Honolulu for the beautification of Ala Moana Beach Park.

After picking up a lantern, volunteers will be on hand to help individuals to assemble them and provide markers for writing messages.

Some people who are unable to get a lantern have resorted to bringing homemade ones in recent years as the event continues to grow in popularity. These homemade vessels are not allowed because the official lanterns have been tested for flammability in all weather conditions and were designed for easy recapture to avoid polluting the ocean.

Those who are unable to attend the event can participate by writing a remembrance at a Shinnyo-en temple or submitting it online to lanternfloatinghawaii.com. The event will also be live-streamed on the website and broadcast live on Hawaii News Now KGMB from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.

The first Lantern Floating Hawaii ceremony took place in 1999 at Keeki Lagoon and has grown in response to community interest. For more information about this powerful event, visit lanternfloatinghawaii.com. ~Nadine Kam

Here are my picks for this May's arts and cultural scene in Honolulu. It's all about big hair, big egos and big hearts for mother.

First up let's start with the "big hair" in the form of **"Beehive: The Musical"** at **DIAMOND HEAD THEATRE** opening May 17th and running through June 9th. This show is a powerful look back at what women experienced and accomplished during the 1960s through some of the iconic songs from that period. It's everything from the harmonic "My Boyfriend is Back" and "Be My Baby" to the dissident "Son of a Preacher Man" and "Me and Bobby McGee." The show begins with simple world of the Chiffons, the Shirelles and the Supremes and moves dramatically into the worlds of Aretha Franklin, Janis Joplin and Tina Turner and the evolution of female performers and fashion. The production consists of six characters: Wanda, Jasmine, Laura, Allison, Pattie and Gina who take turns bringing to life such songs as "One Fine Day," "Where the Boys Are," "It's My Party," "Will You Still Love Me Tomorrow," "To Sir With Love," "Piece of My Heart," "Downtown," "You Don't Have to Say You Love Me," "A Natural Woman," "I Sold My Heart to a Junkman," "A Fool in Love," "Proud Mary," "Respect" and many more songs you will remember. Performances are Thursday through Saturday at 7:30 p.m., Saturday matinee at 3 p.m. and Sunday matinee at 4 p.m. Tickets range in price from \$15 to \$50 for each performance. discussing his book on the Art and Craft of Longform Journalism. Since 1984 he has contributed to the *New Yorker*, reporting from Africa, Central America, South Africa and other destinations. He is the author of five books and won the Pulitzer Prize for biography in 2016.

One of the most anticipated authors, Alan Brennert, speaks on Saturday at 2 p.m. His book, "MOLOKA'I," sold 600,000 copies. He wrote "HONOLULU" and now comes to talk about "DAUGHTER OF MOLOKA'I," the sequel story of a Japanese young Moloka'i woman sent to the internment camp during World War II. For those who saw the recent presentation of the Broadway hit, 'Allegiance' by Manoa Valley Theater (presented to standing room only audiences at Hawaii Theatre) this book brings to life what happened to the Japanese living in the U.S. during the war with Japan. As a baby, Ruth Kalama was taken from her mother in Kalaupapa, adopted by a Japanese couple in California. The story recounts her life. In the midst of World War II the adoptive family is taken to Manzanar, a "relocation center" for Japanese living in the U.S. where life was far worse than Kalaupapa.

Also on the Saturday list, Cece Bell, winner of the Nene Award - Hawai'i's Children's Book Award for "EIDefo", voted in by 4,5, and 6th graders.

Sunday is filled with more stars. The renowned Sam Horn, founder of the Maui Writer's Conference and former Kailua resident, now an internationally acclaimed communications strategist, will present her new book, "Someday Is Not A Day in the Week". Her credentials go on for paragraphs and her books have helped some of the world's top entrepreneurs and executives achieve their goals.

Another multiple Pulitzer Prize winner, Gilbert King, will present his book, "Beneath A Ruthless Sun". That will be followed by Privayada Natarajan, author of "Mapping The Heavens: The Radical Scientific Ideas that Reveal The Cosmos". She is a professor of Astronomy and Physics at Yale University. Prepare for answers about Black Holes.

Connected to this award is a special guest

speaker David Kawika Eyre at the Alana Hawaiian Culture Pavillion. Also at the Pavillion, Elmer Omar Bascos Pizo with "Leaving our Shadows Behind Us". From the Philippines, he lost his short-term memory in a crash. His neurologist suggested he try writing as therapy. He was a Poetry Fellow at the 2000 Stillman National Writers Workshop plus many other outlets. He works as a handyman in 'Ewa Beach. Another panel will discuss poetry, stories and essays by Indigenous Micronesian authors in Indigenous Literatures from Micronesia.

Next up, Life of the Land panel discussion with Wanda Adams Connie Hale, Kai Philpotts, George Tanabe, moderated by Bob Segall. On Sunday the Bamboo Ridge authors will present readings from their various publications. Tom Coffman heads up a panel on 'Tadaima! I Am Home', a fifth generation history of migration. Journalist Don Chapman will open a conversation on 'The Godfather: The Life of Larry Meheu (in his own words)'. For bird lovers, Susan Scott presents 'The Wings of Honolulu's Wild Side: Terns, Shearwaters and Golden Plovers'. Back by popular demand - Aloha Shorts brings the writers from Bamboo Ridge to tell their stories. Stu Globerman will talk with Bob Jones and Ambassador Charles Salmon about their witness of the Laos "Secret War."

Hawaiian centric discussions abound. David Kawika Eyre and Carl Franklin Ka'aila'au Pao will discuss "Niuhi Shark: Honoring Kamehameha the Great in Paint and Prose". The Mission Houses Museum & Archive brings Thomas Woods back to Hawaii for a discussion of three new books created for the Bicentennial of the Hawaii Mission. Panels include the five transformations: Introduction of Christianity, Written Language, Polyphonic Music, Constitutional Monarchy, and Western Medicine.

Both days of the festival the Alana Hawaiian Culture Pavillion will host many of Hawai'i's cultural specialists discussing the transformation of the Hawaiian Kingdom, the Mid-Nineteenth-Century Change in Hawaii, Na Kahu: Portraits of Native Hawaiian Pastors, plus the 35th Anniversary Edition of Mary Kawena Pukui's *Olelo No'eau Hawaiian Proverbs* started when Pukui was fifteen years old, and *Ho'oulu Hawai'i: The King Kalakaua Era*. The humanities pavillion includes: "Breaking News" Telling Our Own Stories, Paper to Pixels, Journalism in the Digital Age.

At the Wellness Pavilion presentations will include 'Marijuana/Cannabis, Gateway or Gatekeeper?' from Brian Goldstein of NOA Botanicals, Transforming the Health of Hawaiian Women, and Lt. Governor Josh Green will deliver a report on Homelessness. More discussions on Housing and Healthcare, Death with Dignity, Regenerative Medicine, Vaping, Teenage Depression and Suicide, Nutrition and Cancer, The Caregivers for Dementia fill the days.

The event was always called the Book &

Music Festival, like many on the mainland, but one of the great additions to the festival was the "only in Hawaii" presentation of hula. Amy Hammond, right hand to Roger Jellinek, says that adding what is often called the 'heart of Hawaii' - hula, changed up the entire festival experience. Hammond says, "like storytelling, music and hula add life to the event - being very appropriate for the Hawaii celebration." The first halau invited was Halau Mohala 'Ilima under the direction of kumu hula Mapuana deSilva. De Silva says that the Festival is a perfect venue for the younger dancers, from keiki class to teens, giving them a chance to perform to a large audience. The festival is a place for parents, friends, family and an all new audience to appreciate the commitment of students to hula.



The Saturday lineup for the main stage begins at 10 a.m. with the Royal Hawaiian Band, Mayor Kirk Caldwell, Kawika Kahiapo, Kumu Hula Leimomi Maldonado, the singing State Senator, Brickwood Galuteria, returns to his entertainer roots, Kumu Hula Cynthia Maklapua, and singer Robi Kahakalau. Kimo Kahoano, the voice of almost every Hawaii hula event (including Merrie Monarch Festival), is the master of ceremonies at the stage.

Kumu hula Miki'ala Lidstone and Halau 'o Kaululau'e opens the Main Stage on Sunday, followed by Na Hoku Hanohano Award Winner, Jeff Rasmussen, Kumu Hula Mapuana de Silva with the dancers of her Halau Mohala 'Ilima. At 1 p.m. Ken Makuakane, now Kahu of Kawaiaha'o Church and eleven-time Na Hoku Hanohano Award winner will present just a few of his 1,500 original songs.

Next up, Kumu Hula Pohai Souza, followed by the singer-songwriter competition (directed by Ken Makuakane) - followed by Alan Akaka and the Islanders.

Public Television star, Mr. Steve will host the Keiki Stage with numerous guests including storyteller Jeff Gere, Uncle Wayne & the Howling Dog Band. Kristy Yamaguchi, Olympic Gold Medalist, will again host the Reading Corner with celebrity readers.

The bookseller booths will host the authors and have pens for autographs, including Bess Press, Mutual Publishing and NaMea Native Books. 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

Chef's Corner

Japanese TV Host and Cookbook Author Harumi Kurihara

Japan's most famous cookbook writer is coming to Hawaii to launch a new partnership with Big Island Candies. Often been called the "Martha Stewart of Japan," she's been popular for twenty years, and is known in the US due to her PBS show. She hosts a number of television shows, has a quarterly recipe magazine which has sold 5 million copies, written over 20 bestselling cookbooks and magazines, including three in English, owns a chain of stores, and even has a line of cookware named after her.

What is your first childhood food memory?

It was a delicious sesame miso soup cooked by my mother.

You describe yourself not as a chef, but as a housewife. Where did you learn to cook?

My mother was a good teacher. She had me taste her dishes. That is how I gained a good sense of taste.

Most housewives in the US also work and raise children. What's advice would you give them?

Don't forget to enjoy cooking.

Do you have any culinary mentors?

I admire Yoshiko Tatsumi. I respect the way she lives, her life and how she sees the Japanese minds, their ways and their diets. I often read her books again and again.

How do you come up with your recipes?

Every little thing in my daily life gives me a lot of hints.

How do you deal with those culinary fails?

I cook one dish as many times as possible. Take for example, bread without kneading. One day I had an idea. What if I could make bread without kneading? Then my journey started. It took me 50 times to make a good bread without kneading. Then 100 times till the taste became right. I have baked it 600 times so far.

What made you decide to start writing cookbooks? How many have you written?

A publishing company asked me to write the first book. I have published 91 books so far plus my quarterly magazine. Most of her books are in Japanese, but she has also published a handful of cookbooks in English.

When did your cooking show begin in Japan and is it still going on?

I started with the first cooking show more than 30 years ago. Then I had many shows one after another. Now I have a TV cooking show with NHK, and a show that airs on PBS.

How do you keep it fresh after all these years?

I always take care and am on the lookout for new chances and tastes. In this way I gain the trust of my fans.

What staple ingredients would people always find in your kitchen and or fridge?

You will find many staple ingredients in my kitchen. I have ethnic, western, Chinese, Thai and Vietnamese ingredients. I try many recipes with a variety of ingredients to cook with.

What brings you to Hawaii?

I love Hawaii very much. I can be relaxed and feel at ease mentally and physically in Hawaii. I regularly teach young students Japanese recipes at KCC. I am coming this time to introduce my new Hawaiian salt cookies I made in conjunction with Big Island Candies.

Will there be an chance for fans to meet you?

Yes! I will be doing a book signing on May 10th. I appreciate it when I have an opportunity to meet/talk my fans.

Is there anything you want to do while here?

I really want to meet my friends and spend my time with them. I want to enjoy the nature in Hawaii. I also like to find new things in Hawaii.

Is there anything else you'd like to share?

Yes, my dream is that I could teach Hawaiian people how to cook Japanese dishes.

Fried Chicken with Leek Sauce

Directions: Allow the chicken to reach room temperature before cooking. Pierce the chicken skin in several places with a fork, skin in several places with a fork, cut the chicken in half, and marinate in the soy sauce and sake. 2. Make the leek sauce: Mix the ingredients for the combined seasonings. Pierce the leek with the tip of a knife all over. Then, chop it finely starting from the end. Stir-fry the leek and red chili. Stir constantly and add the combined seasonings. Turn off the heat. 3. Heat the oil to 180° C (356° F) Cover the chicken completely with potato starch. Deep-fry the chicken for 2-3 minutes. Put it on a rack and leave for about 4 minutes while it continues to cook with the residual heat. Then, deep-fry it for 1-2 minutes over high heat again. 4. Drain and cut the chicken into bite-sized pieces. Place on a serving plate and pour the leek sauce over the top.

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
