BIG WAVES - BIG BUCKS

Heads up, this is it, the perfect wave of excitement is about to crest with the 32nd season of the famed VANS Triple Crown, November 12 through December 20. It is the world's most prestigious professional surfing series with a total prize purse of \$1.4M. The events feature the world's top ranked surfers, masters of the waiting game.

Each of the three Triple Crown events has a twelve day holding period. Checking the surf report on the radio or logging onto the web, around 7:30 a.m. will provide the answer, "go or no go." The hotline number is 808-576-7873. A live webcast on the site allows approximately 15-million viewers to tune in for the Triple Crown - vanstriplecrown.com

The Triple is followed by three more major surfing events. First, the TARGET Maui Pro at Honolua Bay, November 22 to December 6, the final World Championship Tour event for the women's 2014 season, featuring a \$250,000 prize purse. Next, back at Oahu's North Shore for the Women's PIPE Invitational, December 8 to 20; a \$10,000 ASP Women's Specialty event featuring eight select women surfers.

The third event, the Quicksilver in Memory of Eddie Aikau will officially open the winter holding period at Waimea Bay on December 4 and hold until the end of February. The legendary waterman and Hokule'a crew member, Aikau was Waimea Bay's first official lifeguard and with his brother, Clyde, never lost a person on their watch. "The Eddie" is the most prestigious big wave invitational and is the only one that has been sanctioned by the Association of Surfing Professionals. For "the Eddie" to happen conditions must be perfect at Waimea Bay with waves reaching and holding at 25 feet. Since the contest began only a few years have delivered surfable wave heights. Stay tuned and keep those fingers crossed, because when Eddie goes, it's truly something to behold.

TALKING ABOUT THE CROWN

Jodi Wilmott, surfer and surf reporter to the world, describes this 2014 season as "not officially El Nino but still a season of mild weather that means stronger waves." She says this upcoming season looks good with "big storms out in the North West Pacific, maybe 1,000 miles away, hopefully sending large seas directly toward the Hawaiian island chain." Even on a non-contest day the surf is likely to be breathtaking.

Wilmott describes the surf in terms other than how many feet the waves are. She says every location varies on how the waves come in. "They can be mountains or a golf course. In summer, Waimea looks like a lake or a bathtub. It's hard to imagine that in a matter of weeks it will have lifethreatening waves."

The events on the Association of Surfing Professionals (ASP) world surfing tour are staged at surfing's ultimate testing ground – our backyard so to speak – the North Shore of Oahu. In addition to competing against the top ranked surfers in the

Film Fun Find Your Moment at HIFF

The Hawaii International Film Festival has put together a blockbuster 34th season packed with world and U.S. premieres from 45 countries. The Festival opened on October 30 and continues through November 9th at multiple venues across Oahu. The theme, #MyHIFFMoment, is a bid for audiences to catch a film (or 20) and comment on what they love. In addition to being one of the top, and most user friendly, film festivals, the key focus this year is to showcase many films made in Hawaii and many free ones.

The opening night film, "The Vancouver Asahi", is set for Consolidated Ward Theaters and is the US premier of a film that centers on the true story of the Asahi baseball team in Vancouver in the 30s and their rise to popularity and success based on their spirit of 'fair play', and how everything changed that fateful day that Pearl Harbor was attacked. The Centerpiece film, "Imitation Game", a British-American thriller that follows English mathematician and logician, Alan Turing as he helps crack the Enigma code during World War II, will screen at Dole Cannery A on November 5th and 9th. The film recently won the People's Choice Award at Toronto International Film Festival, typically deemed early indicator for the Best Picture Oscar. The closing night film features the world premiere "Visions in the Dark: The Life of Pinky Thompson", about the revered Hawaiian cultural advisor and activist screens at 7 p.m. November 9 at Hawaii Theatre. These are three of the top ten picks for the festival so buy your tickets quickly.

This November Honolulu's arts and cultural scene is all about the theatre. From the small box theatres to one of the grand stages of Honolulu, there is wide array of entertainments for your guests to enjoy when

not sunning at the beach. First up this month is the world premiere of Susan Soon He Stanton's The Underneath at KUMU KAHUA THEATRE. If you guests are interested in learning about the real Hawai'i, this is the place to send them. Next is the musical revue Closer Than Ever at Hawai'i's off-Broadway theatre MANOA VALLEY THEATRE which runs November 13 to 30. This original production received the Outer Critics Award for Best Off-Broadway Musical. The show consists of twenty-four funny, wise and witty songs each a story onto itself about love, aging, mid-life crisis, second marriages, and many more life events that are part of the human condition with lyrics by Richard Maltby, Jr. and music by David Shire. Many of your guests most likely are not familiar with the previous works and writers mentioned in this column but this next production at TAG (THE ACTORS' GROUP) entitled *Defiance* by Pulitzer Prize–winning American playwright John Patrick

Shanley should ring a bell. He wrote the script for the film Moonstruck which won Cher an Academy Award for best actress. In addition, Mr. Shanley wrote the play Doubt which he directed on film with Meryl Streep, Philip Seymour Hoffman, Amy Adams and Viola Davis. His latest play Outside Mullingar, opened on Broadway earlier this year with Debra Messing from TV's Will & Grace and Smash and Brian F. O'Byrne who was in the ABC series Flash Forward. The play Defiance revolves around two marine officers, one black and one white who confront the issue of race and woman as well as doing the right thing on a military base in North Carolina during the 1970s. As your guests experience this show of words, they will see that the social issues of the past still linger in today's society. This month HAWAI'I OPERA THEATRE (HOT) is presenting its adaptation of Gilbert & Sullivan's Pirates of Penzance on November 5 at 7 p.m. at the HAWAII THEATRE. Even though this is only a one-night production, if you have guests who want to experience the best of Honolulu's theatrical scene this is the perfect night for it. In last month's column, I mentioned that opera has been part of island culture for more than a century with King Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma not only being supporters but also performers. Did you know that Queen Lili'uokalani composed her own opera? HOT was established in 1960 and presented its first opera Puccini's Madame Butterfly at McKinley High School auditorium, isn't that crazy? The current general and artistic director is Hawai'i-born Henry G. Akina, who founded and managed The Berlin Chamber Opera in Germany from 1977 to 1996. Many great opera singers from the New York Met to opera houses around the world are brought in for HOT's season each year. Pirates of Penzance is part of HOT's Opera Express program which brings lighter operatic productions to the stage. Most of your guests should be familiar with the names Gilbert & Sullivan and most likely have heard the Major General's Song at one point in their lives. Here's a quick synopsis for those who don't know the story. It surrounds a youth named Frederick who is an apprentice to a group of saphappy pirates. His apprenticeship ends when he turns twenty-one, but unfortunately for him, he was born on February 28 so technically he only has a birthday each leap year which means he won't complete his apprenticeship for sixty-three years which complicates matters since he has fallen in love with Mabel, who is the daughter of Major-General Stanley. There is much fun and frivolity throughout the show and what better way for your guests to experience the majestic Hawai'i Theatre while enjoying the spectacle of a Gilbert & Sullivan operetta for only \$10. 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world, competitors must also endure the challenges presented by days of waiting for perfect waves.

The first event is the REEF Hawaiian Pro, which will be held at Haleiwa Ali'i Beach from November 12-23. The event will be held on the best 4 days of surf during those dates. The ASP men's Prime event offers a \$250,000 prize purse. The defending champion is Michel Bourez, a French-speaking Tahitian that took the meet last year. Close in and close to the reef, this is a hold-your-breath close up kind of contest.

Next up comes the VANS World Cup of Surfing at Sunset Beach from November 24-December 6 (best 4 days of surf during those dates), another ASP men's Prime event with a \$250,000 purse. The defending champion is Ezekiel Lau of Hawaii. The waves can be as tall as palm trees and break 200 yards off-shore.

The Billabong Pipe Masters at the Banzai Pipeline, runs December 8-20 (this time, it's the best 3 days of surf during those dates). This is the final World Championship Tour event for the men's 2014 season. The prize purse is \$500,000. The competition should be on their game seeing as Kelly Slater is the defending champion. There will be a one-day, \$100,000 local trial event for the Billabong Pipe Masters to determine wildcards into the main event.

Wilmott says the Pipe is the best place to watch the art and sport of surfing. "When the Pipe is up there is a barrel you could drive a truck through without getting the windows wet! Death defying. Watching is the ultimate Imax experience."

The Vans Triple Crown has been the focus of international surfing attention for more than 30 years and crowns the ASP World Champion each December. Together, these three events offer close to \$1 million in prize money, bringing many thousand of fans to the North Shore. Funds from a variety of events support local grass roots educational and non-profit organizations.

FAIR-HAIRED & FAMOUS



Wilmott talks about Hawaii's fair-haired boy, defending Triple Crown champion John John Florence. In her recent interview with Florence, who has been surfing the Pipe since he was a boy, Florence, now

twenty-two, talks about being comfortable and great at the Pipe. She quotes him as saying: 'growing up in Hawaii, for those three months of the year everyone knows that the whole surfing world comes down for the Triple Crown and everything. Whether you're there for the Triple Crown or not, everyone's there. So growing up and being able to see those guys surf Pipe and seeing the best surfers in the world come and surf my home breaks every day for the whole winter is pretty inspiring. It inspired me to get out there. I ended up having the privilege of going out and watching those guys at Pipe when I was super young and I think all of that came from being out here at a really young age. I was surfing the corner at Pipe. I can't say enough about that wave! I've been surfing Pipe pretty much most of my life but every time you paddle out there it's still so scary because, in fact it's pretty unpredictable. I was raised on this wave." He says he has surfed the

wave in nearly every condition, "from half a foot to as big as it gets, and you can never trust it, never get too comfortable out there, it's a heavy, heavy wave." The Pipe has claimed more lives than any wave in the world, inflicts injuries and breaks boards for a hobby.

Other surfers say that the Triple Crown can send a shiver down the spine of anyone who has ever faced the tricks and the threats of the waves on the North Shore. The Reef Pro is held at Haleiwa's Alii Beach Park on the west side of the boat harbor. The location is considered a real test of a professional surfer's ability to handle a multitude of conditions, all at one surf break. The surfers describe it as a "rippable peak" at two to four feet. At four to six feet it gets more difficult. Surfers look for long barrel waves. Over six foot waves can turn to walls of water, racing down the reef before closing out over the extremely shallow Toilet Bowl section that has been the cause of critical end-ofwave rides and broken boards. The Banzai Pipeline is often referred to as the best wave on the planet. With its top-to-bottom barrels and its closeness to shore it is a surf spectators and photographers dream come true. The Billabong Pipe Masters is called the quintessential event in professional surfing, often called the Holy Grail of waves by which all others are measured. This is one of the longest running events in professional surfing.

Since most folks can't all take off for a month and a half to hang at the North Shore and watch the right waves roll in, fans can log into triplecrownofsurfing.com each morning to find out if the event is on that day. All of the events are

TAKE CARE

On event days the competition runs from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. There are no tickets and no paid seating. The following suggestions may enhance the day:

• Use sunscreen, gallons of it, not just in the sun. U.V. rays are strongest on overcast days. Bring plenty of water. Wear sunglasses. Double all this for kids. Porta potties are plentiful. Take wet wipes.

• Binoculars are good. Bring your camera. Bring a beach chair, towel or mat to sit on. A sandy bottom gets old real quick. Bring a rain jacket and a hoodie. Remember, it's winter in Hawaii.

• Go early, park at Turtle Bay Resort and buy a ticket for the shuttle to the appropriate contest beach. Two 14-passenger vans shuttle four times a day from hotel to beach.

• Take water and food, lines can be long for the food trucks. Take trash out when you go, and take your neighbor's trash when they walk off without it. Remember, the beach is someone's front yard.

• Very early arrivals may find parking. Check road signs, warnings and driveways to avoid tickets and towing. Don't leave valuables in the car.

• Heed lifeguard warnings. Waves can double in size while you are focused on a great ride. Watch all kids, yours and others. Sitting too close to the waters edge may soak you and all your belongings and can pull a child into the surf in an instant. No smoking on the beach. No pets. Beach umbrellas launch like spears in the wind. Take good care to have a great day and enjoy the surf! ~ L_{ynn} Cook

Modern Hawaiians

There is a buzz from New Zealand to New York about the master and student making waves in the Pacific arts community. Carl F.K. Pao and Kupa'a Hee present the exhibit, Makalua, at The ARTS at Marks Garage in Chinatown from November 4 to 29. Their work is symbiotic indigenous symbolism. Paintings and prints by Pao inspired the sculptures by Kupa'a. In return, his sculptures inspired Pao's paintings.

Pao teaches at Kamehameha Schools. He is a contemporary Hawaiian artist with degrees from UH Manoa and University of Auckland. Kupa'a, trained in Eastern, Western and Pacific traditions, has been Pao's student.

Their work tells the story of the Makahiki, the fall season honoring the god Lono. Gallery director Rich Richardson says it is a time when war is kapu, forbidden, and all labor stopped. "People threw away their cell phones, made offerings and spent time practicing sports, feasting, dancing and having fun."

Pao's paintings are large, allowing the viewer to get lost in color. Kupa'a's sculptures bring the imagery of Pao's work to 3-D. The paintings may have a feeling of deja vou. Pao and artist Solomon Enos created the massive paintings at the entry to Sheraton Waikiki – paintings that feel like you could step off into the ethos.

Hula History

The Hula Preservation Society is offering a window into the history of hula when they present a festival within a festival. HPS works to digitally preserve and share rare moving and still images of culturally historic moments. 


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HAWAII'S MODERN MASTERS RETURNS

Grondin Chef Andrew Pressler

ndrew Pressler was the man tasked to merge the French family history of Jenny Grondin with the cuadorian history of David Segarra, the owners of Grondin French Latin Kitchen in Chinatown. Fogether the three worked together opening the highly popular restaurant Fatty 'Cue in New York. When it was time to open their own place, they called on Andrew to move over and handle it. Taste the results

When did you first decide you wanted to be a chef?

There was no one moment when I decided to become a chef. I kind of fell into it, my first real job was in a gourmet food store/deli on Long Island N.Y. From there it was pizza place, deli, and eventually a brew house where I got my first line gig. It was always comfortable for me in the kitchen, people were as crazy as I was and it was always fun. couple years line cooking later and off to CIA I went. From there to cooking in NYC for 11 years to Honolulu. here I am and people for some reason started calling me "chef" at some point along the way.

What was your first job in the culinary industry? [I worked in a] gourmet food store/deli.

Who's would you consider your mentor and why?

I don't have just one mentor, I'd say Christian Deluevrier, Zak Pelaccio, Gavin Portsmith, and Amy Eubanks probably had the biggest influence on me professionally.

How would you describe your style of cooking?

I'm not sure, I base my cooking on technique and product. No matter what the cuisine, respect for product and application of sound technique seems to work.

What's the most unique or favorite dish you've created? Whatever new thing I'm geeking out over this week.

I am a big fan off curry and find a lot of satisfaction in making a great one. but I don't really have any one favorite dish.

Best ingredient you like to work with and why?


Again no favorites on ingredients, freshest, unique, or rare are always fun to me.

What's your favorite dish to cook at home?

At home? I try to cook as little as possible. A simple roast chicken is nice.

What's always in your fridge? Siracha and mayo.

Who'd you be most excited to see in your restaurant? Everyone.



Salt, fat (oil, butter, or pork fat) and garlic.

What's your favorite thing to do when you're not working? Not working? What's that? No really, I like to take it easy, relax and spend some time outside.

Favorite (or least favorite) food trend?

My least favorite food trend has got to be Molecular Gastronomy. I play with combo ovens and immersion circulators to control temperature for sure but I think a lot of people substitute the textural or presentation value of molecular gastronomy for actual flavors and substance a lot of the time. It always seems like more of an intellectual exercise for the chef than something that really improves the eating experience to me. Though there are some who do it really well and my hat is off to those chefs.

Biggest pet peeve working in the kitchen?

People who don't want to work. This is a tough job, If that's not for you, you should find another line of work. It only gets harder the higher you rise on the totem pole.

How did you find the transition moving to Hawaii from New York?

It was an easy transition. I'm an army brat, have lived overseas and done a lot of traveling so I look at every new place as an opportunity to learn something new. As far as I can tell, as long as you keep an open mind and treat people with respect you won't have to many problems no matter where you go.

What's next for you?

Not sure, I've got a lot of ideas for different concepts. So I guess looking for investment capital should be next huh?

Is there any other information about yourself that you would like to share with our readers?

I'm really not that interesting a person. I work, I eat, I sleep, I try and take a vacation every now and again. pretty normal I think.



Island Mu Ceviche

Ingredients: 3oz Island mu, sliced 3oz Meyer lemon juice 10g Piloncillo simple syrup 20g Red jalapeño, sliced

30g Red onion, sliced 5g culantro, chiffonade 1/4 oz scallion oil 1/4 oz anatto oil Salt to taste

Method:

Mix all ingredients and let stand for 2 hrs, place in a bowl and season with salt to taste. Garnish with culantro and serve with plantain chips. * No this is a not a typo. Culantro is an herb native to South American and is similar to its close relative cilantro, although culantro is stronger.

Who doesn't love a good ramen in this town? Well Keith Endo of VINO falls into that category and after years of Chuck Furuya not letting Chef's inner Asian influences out onto the Italian Tapas menu, they reached a solution. Enter Slurp... Chef Endo's new "pop-up" ramen eatery open for lunch in the VINO location weekdays from 10:30 a.m. - 2:30 p.m. It's a restaurant within a restaurant and the ramen is good. Choose from 5 classic ramens, 4 speciality ramens and daily specials. My favorite thus far has been the Crab Ramen (\$16.95) with truffle oil and cilantro and jalape ños and the Tan Tan with its sesame garlic miso (\$9.95). Don't miss the Pork Belly Hoisin Bun as an appetizer. (\$2.95) and there are some interesting house sodas to choose from made from Mango, Lilikoi, Lychee or Ume. If you're interested, I posted a photo album filled with pics and descriptions on our Facebook page last month. Go check it out. 524-8466. • Staying in the ramen theme, I ended up at Agu **Ramen** trying to stay warm during Hurricane Ana recently. Not sure how I have never seen this place before, but it was good! Located next to Maple Garden across from Isenberg Park I must have driven past it dozens of times. The broth of the Yuzu Jidori Ramen (\$13.75) was very nice with a slightly spicy kick and I'll most likely be what I get next time. 

Climb to a saddle overlooking Makaha Valley, then return via a normally dry stream gully. Watch for key junctions to avoid a longer, steeper hike. Foliage includes coffee, allspice, and macadamia. Spectacular views of Manoa Valley, Palolo Valley, Honolulu and the Ko'olaus. Native Hawaiian plants are common along the this trail, including koa and o'hia lehua. Descend Kolowalu trail to back of Manoa Valley, then hike along the road back to cars parked at Manoa Library.

role as Prince Phillip in Disney's summer smash "Maleficent", featuring Angelina Jolie. HIFF will conclude with the world premiere of Hawaii-produced "Visions in the Dark: The Life of Pinky Thompson" on November 9 directed by Sundance Alumnus Ty Sanga. Pinky Thompson was one of Hawaii's great identities who fought hard against the stigma of an inferior native Hawaiian. He envisioned an ideal Hawaii that no one else saw and fought for it from the battlefields of Normandy, to the steps of congress, to his humble home in Niu Valley. He championed a health care system, created invaluable educational programs and strengthened the pride of native Hawaiians. Pinky's legacy lives on through his work as a social worker and community leader, including leadership posts at Kamehameha Schools and the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

Robert Lambeth, HIFF Executive Director said "like The Haumana last year, we were excited to find an amazing and worthy film from Hawaii to close this year's festival. Ty has directed a compelling, well-researched documentary that celebrates the life of a great cultural icon that helped shape Hawaii in the 20th century. We are honored to host the world premiere at the historic Hawaii Theatre Center and hope to see this film play in schools around the state in the near future.'

Other films that might grab your attention at this years fest include "Rise of the Wahine," an amazing story of the fire and perseverance that drove underdogs to birth Title IX, the federal civil rights law that prohibits sex discrimination in education, and release untold opportunities to an entire generation. Centered around the University of Hawaii's volleyball team, these women (and men) lit a profound desire for girls to have the same opportunities as men-in education, sports, and careers. Women's roles were about to change from "housewife" to educated-producer and Title IX was the door to get them there. The film screens on November 3rd at 7 p.m. at Hawaii Theatre and on Sunday the 9th at Dole Cannery F at 2:30 p.m.

The darling of the 2014 Sundance Film Festival, "A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night," is cinema's first Iranian vampire western. The debut of director Ana Lily Amirpour, the film basks in the sheer pleasure of pulp. A joyful mash-up of genre, archetype, and iconography, its prolific influences span spaghetti westerns, graphic novels, horror films, and the Iranian New Wave. Amped by a mix of Iranian rock, techno, and Morricone-inspired riffs, its airy, anamorphic, black-and-white aesthetic and artfully drawn-out scenes combine the simmering tension of Sergio Leone with the weird surrealism of David Lynch. Amirpour's tale of love and squalor is quite simply fun. She will be in attendance at the first screening on Saturday, November 1st at 9:15 p.m. for a post-screening Q & A. at Dole Cannery C. The film will also be shown on the 7th at Dole Cannery D at 5:45 p.m.

Halekulani Corporation, HIFF's key presenting sponsor, will again present the Festival's coveted

Halekulani Golden Orchid Awards for Best Narrative Feature and Best Documentary Feature. This year's crop of 10 nominated films consist of exciting new perspectives from emerging filmmakers in the Asia Pacific and award-worthy socially conscious documentaries that have premiered at major film festivals including Sundance, Cannes, Venice and Toronto. There are 5 nominees for each category and a few stand out as "get in line early" must sees, including the aforementioned: "A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night," "Visions in the Dark: The Life of Pinky Thompson" and "Shunned," a no holds barred look into the lives of different transsexuals (male to female), in the Philippines and offers a glimpse into their love life, and transition to become a woman while they struggle to be happy with themselves and to be accepted. The film will be shown on Sunday, November 2nd at Dole Cannery E at 6 p.m. and on the 3rd at 9:15 p.m. in Dole Cannery F. Another highly anticipated film is "Limited Partnership," which follows the true story of Filipino American Richard Adams and Australian, Tony Sullivan, who in 1975, became one of the first same-sex couples in the world to be legally married. After applying for a green card for Tony, the couple received a denial letter stating, 'You have failed to establish that a bona fide marital relationship can exist between two faggots.' Understandable outraged, the couple sued the U.S. government, filing the first federal lawsuit seeking equal treatment for a same-sex marriage in U.S. history. They lost, and then lost their appeals. Adams died in 2012, and in April of this year, 39 years after the couple was first married, Sullivan filed a motion with the same office that denied their previous request four decades ago to reopen and reconsider his late husband's petition for marriage-based green card.
