The Hawaii Food & Wine Festival

It's November, and you want to nosh. What to do? The answer is easy. Buy tickets to some of the multitudes of munchable events at the 12th annual Hawaii Food & Wine Festival. This year the festival will take place from October 20th – November 6th. Kicking off on Maui, the festival will move to the Island of Hawaii for a series of events before alighting here on Oahu with seven public events over four days.

The Hawaii Food & Wine Festival (HFWF) is a two-week food frenzy, as some of the best chefs in the world head to the islands to show us some of the most innovative dishes they can create with the bounty the island provides. Showcasing our locally caught, grown, and raised ingredients, HFWF is the only festival that requires participating talent to use local products sourced from Hawai'i's farmers, fishermen, ranchers, and purveyors in their creations. The festival gives the participating chefs and attendees a deep understanding and appreciation of Hawai'i's natural resources. Enjoy interactive dining experiences, cooking demonstrations, and hands-on events that will leave attendees secure in their new food knowledge, educated about the bounty of the Islands, and all their senses satisfied.

Hawaii chefs Alan Wong and Roy Yamaguchi created the recipe for this festival years ago with Roy's wife, Denise Hayashi Yamaguchi, and Dean Okimoto, Director of the Hawaii Agricultural Foundation, when they were looking for a change. Foodies and wine lovers trekked to various mainland destinations to attend food festivals; why wouldn't

they come here? Roy and Alan certainly had friends in all the right places. Would those friends want to cook at a festival in Hawaii? The answer was a resounding yes on both sides, and 12 years later, not only is HFWF continuing to outdo itself year after year, it has become an essential part of our island economy. It has also donated over 3.1 million dollars to community organizations that support sustainability, culinary programs, and agriculture since its inception.

While the last few years might have thrown many for a loop, the brilliant minds behind HFWF didn't miss a beat, finding new and creative ways to keep the festival moving forward. They capitalized on the educational aspects, devised unique ideas to work with the restrictions they were facing at the time, and supported a restaurant industry rocked to its core during the pandemic.

While the restrictions may be gone, the thought and care put into each event are more evident than ever, and there is a full line-up on three islands to show it.

HFWF 22 returns with an all-star line-up of 88 world-renowned chefs, 32 acclaimed winemakers, 30 mixologists, and 4 Master Sommeliers. There are over 150 uber-talented culinary wizards in all, offering everything from multi-course dinners to extraordinary wine tastings to exciting grazing events to making Instagram-worthy cheese and charcuterie boards and everything in between.

Ticket holders will be treated to mouthwatering creations from some of the top chefs and restaurants in the world while clinking glasses with highly acclaimed winemakers and mixologists.

HIFF returns to Oahu this month November 3 - 13

Grab your popcorn and settle into your seats for the 42nd edition of the Hawaii International Film Festival (HIFF) presented by Halekulani. HIFF42 comes to Oahu November 3 -13 with over 200 films from nearly 40 different countries as HIFF continues to explore its mission of advancing understanding and cultural exchange among the peoples of Asia, the Pacific, and North America.

In 1981, HIFF's inaugural year, the program consisted of seven films from six countries and was viewed by an audience of 5,000. Over the years, HIFF has become a premiere cinematic event in the Pacific and attracts more than 50,000 film enthusiasts worldwide annually. It is one of the premier film festivals in the country, and the only festival spread across an archipelago. In 2020, it was forced to celebrate its 40th anniversary through a series of hybrid events, but as they say, out of adversity comes opportunity. While we are thrilled to see HIFF return with a full complement of live events, they are also expanding its online presence making the entire festival available across the state and limited

availability across the country online from November 3 - 27th.

"HIFF is back in a big way!" says HIFF executive director Beckie Stocchetti. "We are incredibly excited to welcome our guests and audiences back to theaters across O'ahu and the state, with screenings at Consolidated Kahala, Ward, and Kapolei, and additional screenings at HoMa's Doris Duke Theater and outdoors on the gorgeous Great Lawn at the Bishop Museum. HIFF42 continues to bring the absolute best films from Festivals such as Cannes and Toronto, with a Panorama section full of awards-vying studio films and critical darlings from major festivals, audience favorites such as Surf Cinema, Eat.Drink.Film, and Indigenous Lens, a spotlight on Hong Kong Cinema called Making Waves, as well as the most anticipated films from Japan, South Korea and the Asia-Pacific region, and an exciting new 'enter at your own risk' HIFF Extreme section. There is truly something for everyone at HIFF42."

This year's festival will offer 111 Hawai'i premieres, 69 world premieres, 14 U.S. premieres, 10 North American, and 7 international premieres. Audiences will also be able to enjoy intimate post-screening conversations with film directors, actors, documentary subjects, and more.

The festival will kick off with not one but two opening night films representing both Hawaiian history and Japanese

cinema, both screening at 7 p.m. Thursday, November 3rd.

The World Premiere of **Yudo: The Way Of The Bath** from the team behind Oscar winner and HIFF 2008 Audience Award winner *Departures* will be screened at Consolidated Ward. Set in a small-town bathhouse inherited by two estranged brothers, the townsfolk see their local bath as a balm for life's woes, while the brothers discover it as a cure for theirs.

At the same time, HIFF will also screen **The Wind And The Reckoning** as part of its opening night celebration. Directed by Big Island-based director David L. Cunningham (*Beyond Paradise, To End All Wars*), the film chronicles the real-life story of Hawaiian cowboy, portrayed by Jason Scott Lee. This film is also the first major feature film that is predominately in the Hawaiian language, 'Ōlelo Hawai'i'. The film's cast includes Henry Ian Cusick (*Lost*), Maui-born Lindsay Watson (*Finding Ohana*), and Ron Yuan (*Mulan*).

HIFF has partnered with Bishop Museum to present two 'Made in Hawai'i' feature films on the museum's Great Lawn as outdoor screening celebrations. The opening night film mentioned above, and Friday the following evening, November 4th, watch **The Story of Everything**, a theater performance written and conceived by Hawai'i Poet Laureate Kealoha, which has been made into a film, illuminating the intersection between science, the environment, the arts, and mindfulness. The movie features the music of Makana, Taimane, and Quadraxonix, so when

Participating chefs include such well-known names as Amanda Freitag, Jose Garces, and Rick Bayless, to name a few. This year's line-up includes 37 local chefs most of you know and love, because the talent our island puts out is just that good. Did you hear the latest James Beard award-winner is none other than Hawaii's own Robbyne Maii of Fête? She'll be there. Hawaii continues to see more and more extraordinary culinary expertise, and it's great to see the HFWF make sure the rest of the world gets to see them as well.

The festival kicks off on Oahu on Thursday, November 3rd, at the Alohilani Resort for a grand tasting celebrating the year of the tiger. **Momo & The Tiger** pays homage to Iron Chef Masaharu Morimoto's nickname, Momo San (*Well that sound familiar! Guess we know why he called his other restaurant Momosan!*)

Morimoto will be joined by an impressive line-up of eleven Asian cuisine chefs and ten master mixologists, all showcasing craft cocktails and innovative dishes that fuse Asian flavors with local ingredients from 6 – 9 p.m. Participating chefs include Rick Bayless from Frontera Grill, Charles Phan of The Slanted Door in S.F., Ming Tsai from Blue Ginger and Andrew Le from the Pig and the Lady, and the mixologists include local faves Dave Newman, Justin Park, and Kyle Reutner. Tickets: \$300, \$400 to enter at 5 p.m. instead of 6 p.m.

On Friday, November 4th, don't miss HFWF's signature wine event, **On Cloud Wine presented by Hawaiian Airlines** at the Hawaii Convention Center from 6 – 9 p.m. This event is a wine lover's dream featuring 20+ wines poured by acclaimed winemakers paired with dishes from 20 world-renowned top chefs. Meet some of the biggest names in wine as you peruse more than 40 stations. Some familiar names at the event include Amanda Freitag of the Food Network, Celestino Drago from Drago Centro, Michael Ginor

Unless you were VIP at the Convention Center, you would have missed Kent Torrey's amazing cheese array from The Cheese Shop in Carmel, California, which festival-goers have gotten used to over the years. On Saturday morning, November 5th, don't miss **Say Cheese: Crafting Charcuterie Boards**. Kent will share all his tips and tricks to assemble Instagram-worthy cheese and charcuterie boards in a hands-on class at the Prince Waikiki, so you can learn how to create your masterpiece. He will teach you how to select the best products to balance shape, texture, taste, and color on your board while tasting and arranging a unique selection of rare cheeses he has prepared while learning the unique origin and history of the cheeses. While you work, sip on wines that best pair with the cheese as Hawaii's newest Master Sommelier Chris Ramelb shares his secrets to wine and cheese pairing. The pros will guide you as you build your platter from start to finish and take it home on a special commemorative Hawaii Food & Wine Festival wooden cheese board. Charcuterie is all the rage these days, don't miss this opportunity to learn from one of the world's best. Tickets: \$200. 10 a.m. – noon.

HFWF's wine seminars are always highly coveted, and this year is no exception. They are known for selling out quickly; this year was no exception. So, even though it's too late to get tickets to either of these, we thought you might want to see what excited the wine lovers found so very exciting.

The first seminar, "**Braida**," **The Story of Giacomo Bologna**, features tastings from some of the most outstanding wines of Italy. The discussion tells the story of the unique Barbera grape – a popular northern Italian red grape known for its deep color, full body, low tannins, and high acidity levels. Raffaella Bologna and

Norbert Reinisch, the proprietors of Braida Winery, traveled halfway around the world to join local master sommeliers Roberto Viernes and Chris Ramelb in the Halekulani Ballroom to take participants through this once-in-a-lifetime, vertical tasting of two Barbera exhilarating bottlings: Bricco dell'Uccellone and Ai Suma. Local wine lovers did not miss out on this extraordinary opportunity, and the \$175 tickets disappeared in record time. 11 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Thirty minutes later, the ballroom will be reset for the 2nd seminar, **Champagne: By Those Who Grow It!** Most of us are familiar with well-known houses such as Moët & Chandon and Veuve Clicquot. This event celebrates lesser-known houses. An exciting movement is happening in the Champagne industry where the actual growers of the champagne grapes are producing, bottling, and marketing Champagne under their own label from grapes exclusively sourced from their vineyards instead of selling those grapes to large champagne houses. Featuring ten unique champagnes produced on a small level. Tickets: \$175. 1 – 2:30 p.m.

Make a note -- if your guests are disappointed about missing out on these seminars, make sure they buy tickets to Friday nights **On Cloud Wine** event at the Convention Center. This wine cellar at this event is made for wine lovers, and they won't be disappointed by the wines available and the winemakers available. Pro Tip: Ask where the Opus is as soon as you get there – it almost always makes an appearance, and it never lasts long.

Later that night, HFWF will present a special five-course dinner served in the lo'i of Kakoo Oiwi by the top five finalists of the recipe contest, showcasing kalo. At the end of the evening, guests will have learned where food comes from, recognize the farmers who produce it, and hear how kalo inspired the creation of each chef's dish. As impressive as this sounds, this is a private event that has already sold out, but **Kalo – Nourishing Hawaii and Sharing It with the World** showcases the heart and thought HFWF puts into each event to ensure they not only nourish but educate as well.

Three mixologists join them, including Jen Ackrill from Hau Tree and Bacardi's National LGBTQ+ Ambassador Chris Cabrera. Grab your tickets for the most entertaining Sunday Funday around. \$150. 11 a.m. – 1 p.m.

As always, the festival ends with the annual Halekulani Gala. **The Art of Food & Wine** takes place Sunday night, November 6th. Cocktails begin at 5 p.m., followed by a five-course dinner prepared by five James Beard award-winning or Michelin-starred chefs as they create a feast for your eyes and palate as they turn your plate into a canvas. The first American to stand atop the podium at the Culinary Olympics, Bocuse d'Or Philip Tessier will be there alongside award-winning chefs Aaron Silverman from Pineapple & Pearls and Little Pearl in Washington, D.C, James Syhabou from Oakland's Commis, Erika Chan from Santa Monica's Rustic Canyon and Halekulani's Alexandre Trancher.

Each course will be artfully paired with exquisite wines that make this event a steal at \$1,500 per ticket. Think that's high? Not for an event of this caliber. Chef's Corner

HFWF Chef Peter Cho

From an early age Peter Cho, a native Oregonian, developed an intuitive grasp of cooking from his Korean immigrant mother. He and his wife opened Han Oak, a Korean-American restaurant merging classic Korean flavors with local ingredients and inventive western techniques, which garnered James Beard recognition in its first year. You may have seen Chef & his family on shows like Netflix's Ugly Delicious & Somebody Feed Phil. Taste his innovative take on traditional Korean favorites at the Festival.

What sparked your interest in cooking?

I always liked to cook as a kid.. always sat around the table when my mom would make dumplings, cooked a little in high school.

Is there one dish your mom makes that a favorite?

My mom makes a chilled kimchi noodle salad that has been my favorite meal since the first time she ever made it for me. If I had to pick a food that represents the love and connection between she and I, this would be it.

Is that what made you decide to pursue cooking?

I moved to New York after college on the promise of free rent from my older brother who was already living in Harlem. It was a community house with 12 people and we would all take turns cooking family dinners on Sunday nights.

So that was what changed everything?

Cooking for more than just myself and a few others was a lot different than what I was used to. It required menu planning, prepping a day or two before. I really got into it.

Did you go to culinary school?

I was about to enroll in culinary school when, on a whim, I was walking by a small corner restaurant in Greenwich Village and decided to ask for a job. Instead of dropping \$35k on a 9-month program, I took a job paying \$300/week.

Who is your mentor?

April Bloomfield. The restaurant I walked into was The Spotted Pig. April took me on, and I worked for her for almost 10 years.

Did you work at the Spotted Pig the whole time?

I worked my way up to sous chef within 3 years, was promoted to be the executive chef of The Breslin in NY's Ace Hotel, and then [at her] other restaurant in NYC, Salvation Taco.

What brought you back to Oregon?

I worked as a chef in New York for about 10 years. I found myself learning and growing a lot but not spending much time to see my family. When we found out that my mom was sick, I was ready to leave. I was ready to come home

and start a family of my own while figuring out how to continue being a chef.

So you opened Han Oak, a restaurant in your home?

This is our restaurant, but it is also our home. [My wife found a space that could be built into a loft-style home with a restaurant attached.] This is where we've raised two rambunctious toddlers, welcomed upwards of 10,000 people through our door, and fed them. With the apartment just a few steps from the kitchen, we could literally parent while we worked.

Is it a Korean restaurant?

Korean food is a rediscovery for me. I grew up eating my mom's cooking, but it wasn't until I opened The Breslin near Koreatown, that I started experiencing really amazing Korean food every night. When we first opened Han Oak, I wanted to focus more on Korean dishes that were not as familiar or recognizable and stay away from what most diners identified as Korean food.

You've since opened a second restaurant?

Toki. It remixes some of the classics from Han Oak and adds a few new dishes to the menu. I tell my chef just make the stuff you want to eat.

Talk about your acclaimed Korean fried chicken?

That thing is indestructible. We've come up with a recipe where it's delicious out of the fryer, it's delicious an hour later, and it's delicious cold in the fridge the next morning.

What would you say to the new generation of chefs that dreams of opening their own restaurants?

If you think you're going to wait until you're ready, you're never going to be ready. And even when it happens, you're still not ready. If you have a good network of people to support you, be there for you, and to help you, then go for it.

Are you excited to come back to HFWF?

It's incredible to have been invited into the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival community! I feel like a part of your family and that's something I am super grateful for.



Soy & Citrus Cured Avocados

Ingredients:

- 1 cup soy sauce
- 1/2 cup rice wine vinegar
- 1/2 cup lemon juice (or any citrus of your choice)
- 1/4 cup mirin (cooking wine)
- 1/4 cup rice syrup or agave syrup (or 1:1 simple syrup)
- 3 cups water
- 3 'almost ripe' avocados
- 1 large non-reactive container for brining

Directions: The best way to preserve that perfect ripeness of an avocado is with a light soy and citrus brine. It keeps in the fridge for over a week and the brine itself can be used for a simple dressing whisked together with some olive oil. Slice avocados in half and remove pits. In a large non-reactive container, combine other ingredients before placing the avocado halves in the brine. Store in refrigerator for seven to ten days

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Made in Hawaii Festival 2022

For visitors lucky enough to be in town for Veterans Day Weekend, ensure they get their credit cards ready. The 28th annual Made in Hawaii Festival offers one of the best opportunities to find authentic local gifts, souvenirs, and memories all year. This two-day market extraordinaire from November 11th – Sunday, November 13th features anything and everything you might want to buy, and it's all made right here in the islands. Entrepreneurs from Oahu, Maui, Kauai, Molokai, and Hawaii package up their goods and will once again make their way to the festival's new home at Ala Moana Center to share the best of local hand-crafted and unique products found in the state.

"Made in Hawaii Festival is looking forward to another year at Ala Moana Center supporting Hawai'i's local businesses," said Lauren Zirbel, president of the Hawaii Food Industry Association, which produces the festival. "We're also excited to offer all-day access passes for those who want to browse the thousands of Hawai'i-made food, crafts, apparel, and more, on their own schedule."

Although the festival has made some significant changes since the pandemic turned everything upside down, one thing that hasn't changed is its vendor count. Nearly 400 exhibitors will showcase thousands of locally made products, including food, books, fashion, handmade crafts, jewelry, and more. Ala Moana Center will transform the area in the Ewa Wing, Level 3, next to T-Mobile, into a shopper's paradise.

The Hawaii Food Industry Association (HFIA) began producing this festival nearly 30 years ago to support these locally produced items, so when you see the special "Made in Hawaii" label on your item, you know you can trust it. In order for a product to receive that label, it must (by state law) be at least fifty-one percent manufactured, assembled, produced, or fabricated of materials made in the state of Hawaii. Living up to the Made in Hawaii promise isn't all that easy. Meeting the criteria is



tough for screen print artists who must buy t-shirts made in China or India or, if they are lucky, from a mainland U.S. factory. For designers, the fabric is also a challenge since fiber plants, like cotton, are not native to Hawaii. The best they can do is order yardage, pay to ship, and print the fabric on the islands. But that criteria does ensure that everything you find at this festival is authentically local. Even more importantly, this also means that purchases at the festival support our islands' businesses and workers, allowing small companies to continue to be the foundation of commerce in the Hawaiian Islands.

One of the best parts of the festival has always been the food. Some of my favorite food finds over the years have been at the Made in Hawaii Festival. I notice none of those are on the list anymore, so here's hoping they survived the past few years, but how exciting is it that there will be so many new vendors to explore and experience? You can find virtually all types of food at the festival, from jars of butter and honey to bags of granola and coffee. Find salts, snacks, cookies, seasonings, jerky, and everything in between. The food booths are usually some of the busiest as guests surround the stalls to sample all the goodies. With any luck, tastings will be back. If they're back at Costco, they should be back here. The samples are another aspect of what makes this event so unique, often introducing visitors to items they may never have tried otherwise.

In addition to all the food vendors, there will be live food demonstrations from some top local chefs, such as Chef Nico Chaize from Nico's Pier 38. There will be several chefs demonstrations onstage each day, followed by, of course, live Hawaiian music.

There will be entertainment from some of Hawaii's favorite artists and Outrigger Resorts' 15th annual Kani Ka Pila Grille Talent Search on Saturday, November 12th. The winner of the contest will receive a month-

long contract to perform at the Kani Ka Pila Grille at the Outrigger Reef Hotel. This competition has a proven track record of discovering future award winners, as the very first winner of the competition, Kupaoa, took home a Na Hoku Hanohano award that same year. Now in its 15th year, the festival has turned out a total of four Hoku award winners, including Kala'e Camarillo, Kamakakehau Fernandez, and Ei Nei. At 1:15 p.m., last year's winner Kekoa Correa will take the stage, followed by Kawika Kahiapo, before he takes his place at the judging table to watch the competition that runs from 3:30 – 6:30 p.m.

Tickets are available online in two-hour, timed entry passes for \$13. All-day passes for in and out access are also available for \$35. HIFF states both screenings will feature Hawaiian music and entertainment before the show, one can assume they might see one of the artists mentioned above appear. Attendees are encouraged to bring lawn chairs and blankets to enjoy these films under the stars. Food trucks will be on-site, offering snacks for sale throughout the movie.

The Made In Hawai'i competition lineup has always been a centerpiece of HIFF's annual programming. The program celebrates Hawai'i's dynamic and emerging independent film scene by spotlighting local artists' storytelling and centering Hawai'i-grown talent and film productions with a particular emphasis on Kānaka maoli filmmaking, sharing these talents with global audiences. "HIFF is proud and excited to present this year's Made in Hawai'i program, which will showcase four features and 21 shorts." said Stocchetti. "We are fully committed to expanding opportunities for our local industry and cultivating networks and economic opportunities for creatives living and working in Hawai'i. HIFF has awarded over \$60,000 in cash to Made in Hawai'i filmmakers" Fiction, non-fiction, and short films made by locally-based filmmakers or involving locally-based stories are eligible for one of two Best Made in Hawai'i film awards with cash prizes totaling \$10,000.

In an exciting update, HIFF has been approved by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences as a qualifying festival for the Short Film Awards category. For the first time, the films the jury selects to receive both the HIFF Best Short Film Award and Best Made in Hawai'i Short Film Award will now both be eligible to qualify for the Academy.

This year's two Centerpiece Films will highlight the continually rising Korean Wave and a life-affirming American biopic. Korean superstar Lee Jung-jae, who just won an Emmy for his role in *Squid Game*, makes his directing debut with *Hunt*, a thriller set in the 1980s which world premiered at Cannes. Lee stars with another Korean superstar Jung Woo-sung as a fellow agent also trying to smoke out a mole.

The Inspection is Elegance Bratton's profoundly moving film inspired by his own story as a young, gay Black man. Rejected by his mother and seeing few options for his future, he decides to join the Marine Corps, doing whatever it

takes to succeed in a system that would otherwise cast him aside. Interesting side note, Bratton was stationed at Oahu's Camp Smith.

New this year is HIFF's midnight movie EXTREME category. All films in this category fit under the horror/thriller/splatter/sex films. Films in this category include the Hawaii premiere of *Holy Spider*, a film from Denmark that follows the true story of an Iranian serial killer that murdered sixteen women in the holy city of Mashhad, Iran; as well as the North American premiere of *Safe Word* where a talent scout taps a wannabe idol to learn the ways of the dominatrix and goes down the rabbit hole of the submissive and dominant. This Japanese film is an often comedic yet sincere mockumentary-style film on the power of kink and self-acceptance, arguing for its impressive ability to unleash the inner pervert in all of us.

HIFF42 announces Aotearoa New Zealand-based producer Kerry Warkia as the recipient of The Leanne K. Ferrer Trailblazer Award presented by Pacific Islanders in Communications (PIC). This annual award is given to a creative content luminary of Pacific Islander descent. Kerry has been at the forefront of some of New Zealand's most innovative content for film and television. Some of her works have been presented at HIFF in the past. Her latest feature is what's called a portmanteau. In cinematography, a portmanteau film is when a movie combines two or more distinct films into one, often featuring multiple stories that are usually connected by a theme or common idea. Popular at film festivals, portmanteau films have been around since the 1960s and continue to be made today. Generally, each segment is directed by a different director, giving each piece a different style, which adds to the film's charm. Some unifying device usually

binds together the segments of the movie, like music, similar characters, or perhaps the stories are set in the same place. Warkia's latest endeavor, *KĀINGA*, is a film directed by eight Pan-Asian filmmakers and will have its North American premiere at HIFF42.

The festival will present the latest film from one of the world's greatest directors on closing night. Academy Award-nominated filmmaker Hirokazu Kore-eda (*Shoplifters*) returns with *Broker*, starring Song Kang Ho (*Parasite*). The film follows two brokers who sell orphaned infants, circumventing the bureaucracy of legal adoption, to affluent couples who can't have their own children. Mr. Kore-eda will attend the screening, and receive this year's HIFF42 Vision In Film Award.

Beyond its focus on Asia and the Pacific Rim, HIFF will also be presenting favorites from the Cannes, Venice, and Toronto International film festivals, including some of the most buzz-worthy films of the year that are likely to receive nominations in the upcoming awards season. HIFF42's program will be featuring several international films that are official entries for the Academy Awards® Best International Film category that include Lukas Dhont's Cannes Grand Prize winner *Close* from Belgium, *Last Film Show* from India, Morocco's *The Blue Caftan*, Japan's *Plan 75*, *Eo* from Poland and *Goddamn Asura* from Taiwan ROC.

Don't miss the opportunity to see World, U.S., and Hawaii Premiere movies and mingle with some of the world's best filmmakers. All movies will be shown at the Consolidated Kahala theatre unless otherwise specified. Festival passes and tickets for all films are on sale now.
