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Hawaii Food & Wine Festival 2016

It's hard to believe, but the 6th Annual Hawaii Food & Wine Festival is upon us. What started as an idea Hawaii's own James Beard Award winning top chefs, Roy Yamaguchi and Alan Wong came up with six years ago has exploded into

the 2nd best wine-centric festival in the entire country according to readers of *USA Today*. Held on three islands over nearly 3 weeks, this year's fest will again bring a veritable who's who of the culinary industry onto our shores.

Just take a look at the numbers. This year's festival will feature a whopping 115 internationally acclaimed master chefs from here and around the world, 21 mixologists, 8 from here in Hawaii, including last month's interviewee Dave Newman, 4 master sommeliers and 31 winemakers. Each and every one of them here to ensure that a record 17 star-studded gastronomical events, shine brighter than ever before.

The 6th Annual Hawaii Food & Wine Festival will be held from October 14th through the 30th, is a culinary adventure beyond the wildest expectations of your taste buds. For all you foodies out there, the list of chefs flying in like a culinary wet dream. Names like Hubert Keller, Jonathan Waxman, Josiah Citrin, Charles Phan, and Jérôme Bocuse (yes, 'that' Bocuse) to name a few. More of a Food Network kinda foodie? They've got some pretty familiar names on that front as well. Anyone familiar with *MasterChef*, *Iron Chef*, or *Guys Grocery Games* should recognize the names: Richard Blais, Marcel Vigneron, Graham Elliott, Elizabeth Falkner, Jose Garces, Brian Malarkey, Ming Tsai, and Masaharu Morimoto.

The same line of thought applies to the wine-makers and mixologists. Anyone who has ever met Jim Clendenon from Au Bon Climat knows he is a rock star in his own right. Add in Justin Baldwin from JUSTIN Vineyards & Winery; Antoine Jobard from Meursault from Burgundy, France and

Michael Silacci from Opus One and oenophiles worth their tastevin should begin drooling.

It's not just people like us that look forward to the event. The chefs do too. Michael Ginor, from Hudson Valley Foie Gras loves coming to this event. He

says, "As I have been involved with the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival from its inception, I have been fortunate to see it blossom into one of the singularly best culinary festival in the world. Clearly the setting is magnificent however the cultural and social aspects of the event and the exposure to immaculate local product are uniquely Hawaiian. The comradery amongst the visiting chefs, nurtured and fostered by the local chefs under the inspiration of the event's founders Roy and Alan are as warm as the night's tropical breeze. Under such a setting and aloha hospitality, all of us are sure to put together our greatest efforts in producing the best possible food and presentation we possibly can."

Now then, where can you catch your favorite food celeb? Events kick off on Maui on October 14th with Roy's Annual Golf Classic in Kaanapali. The party stays over there until October 16 with several more events over the subsequent days. From there the chefs move to the Big Island for a signature event at the Hilton Waikoloa, and then... it's onto Oahu.

Events kick off on our island on Wednesday, October 26th with an **Urban Lu'au at SALT at Our Kaka'ako**. Ticketholders will be able to compare traditional and contemporary versions of traditional lu'au food when five contemporary chefs will be paired with a local Hawaiian restaurant to create their version of a classic Hawaiian dish. We're talking local Hawaiian faves known by a single name like Haili's. Helena's, Highway Inn, Alicia's and Youngs go up against chefs like Chung Chow from Noreetuh New York;

9th Annual Hallowbaloo Music & Arts Festival

Saturday, October 29, 4:30 p.m. - 2 a.m.

For 9 years Hallowbaloo Music & Arts Festival has turned the Chinatown district into the biggest costume block party this town sees. The festivities will extend from Chinatown to the Hawaii State Art Museum (HiSAM) and surrounding streets. The Street Festival runs from 4:30 p.m until 10 p.m. The main stage and epicenter of the street festival will be located on the HiSAM lawn. Two additional stages will be on Richards Street with food, beverage and vendor tents spread out along both Richards and Hotel Streets (between Richards and Alakea). Families are encouraged to come down to wander the street festival before the crazies come out to play. Offering complimentary trolley service from Nuuanu Avenue to Alakea Street from 8 - 11 p.m. Erykah Badu will be

I don't know about all of you, but I think this is the one event I look forward to each year more than any other. I was excited when they first started 6 years ago. The concept was brilliant, and everyone knows I'm a foodie so this was right up my alley, but would they pull it off? As we all know by now, they not only pulled it off, they hit it out of the park and have literally stepped up their game every year since. I am thrilled that the 6th annual Hawaii Food & Wine Festival is coming back this month. And yes, believe it or not... it is bigger and better than ever! This is a fabulous opportunity not only for the people of Hawaii to meet and experience the food of some of the most revered chefs in the world, but also to shine a light on what Hawaii has to offer to the world. In a nationwide survey recently by USA Today, the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival was named the 2nd best wine-centric festival in the country. Amazing. I'm already well into the planning stages of the holiday events, so it's time for a brief reminder about them. When you receive an invitation, please RSVP, even if your desk is unable to attend. The host gives me seat allocations and hotel preferences for every event. Sometimes, that means a hotel I would really like to invite, as would they, ends up on a secondary list. However, as I have "held" seats for your desk, I cannot release them until you let me know. Oftentimes, that means I am chasing people down the day before an event to see if they are coming (and 8 out of 10 times they are but forgot to tell me). But for those that aren't, that gives me very little time to send it out to another hotel, and then even less to see if they are free to attend. Obviously I wish we could invite everyone, from every desk, every time, but cost and space limitations prevent that. However, if a hotel that I saved seats for cannot make it, I of course want to extend those seats to others. So if you could kindly let me know one way or the other it would be appreciated. Also, if you RSVP and need to cancel, please let me know. It doesn't matter why you need to cancel. There's no need to send a lengthy explanation as to why. Perhaps you simply don't feel like it, that's fine. But please communicate that with me as soon as you know (preferably before the event is about to start), although I completely understand that work often gets in the way at that point. Aside from releasing a seat for someone who may be waiting, it is also a courtesy to your host, so they don't prepare food for 100 when only 60 are attending. Things are going to get really busy here for all of us, so let's keep those communication lines open!

Ravi Kapur from San Francisco's Liholiho Yacht Club and Mark Noguchi, more commonly known to most of you as "Gooch." 5 - 7 p.m. Tickets: \$95. At press time, this event was nearing sell out stage, so best buy your tickets now.

Next up is the **Hungry Monkey** on Thursday October 27th. As in year's past, the first signature event always takes place poolside at The Modern Honolulu. Thirteen chefs will whip up delicious delicacies for your tasting pleasure with 8 winemakers and 8 mixologists spread out between two floors to make sure no one gets parched. Iron Chef Morimoto will be joined by such chefs as Ken Oringer from Toro NYC and Hugh Acheson from 5&10 - in Athens, GA. 6 - 9 p.m. Tickets: \$225 - \$500. VIP Entry gets you in the door an hour earlier than the general admission tickets. Throughout the festival this year, you can either buy an early admission ticket to select signature events (for \$325) or simply purchase a general admission ticket using a First Hawaiian Bank MasterCard and automatically get upgraded. This event was also nearing sell out stage at press time, so act quickly.

Another signature event takes place on Friday, October 28th with **A Culinary Flight**, a must go-to event for wine lovers as twenty of the worlds most coveted wines are showcased with food from twenty of the worlds best chefs. Grant MacPherson from Scotch Myst, Melba Wilson from Melbas NYC, Richard Blais, Michael Ginor, Chai, Andrew Le, Mavro and Charles Phan from The Slanted Door in San Francisco join winemakers Jim Clendenon, Richard Betts and others at the Hawaii Convention Center. 6 - 9 p.m. (unless you go VIP). Tickets: \$225 - \$500.

The party's not over after this flight. The traditional after party is quickly becoming the most talked about event this year when seven of the hottest chefs in the ramen world go against each other in **Clash of the Ramen** at the Hyatt Regency Waikiki. 9 p.m. - 1 a.m. Sadly, this event sold out as we were writing the story. If you want to go to any of their events, you best go online ASAP and see what's still available.

Saturday morning is wine time as Antoine Jobard leads a **Masters of Meursault** tasting with once in a lifetime tastings from the cellars of Domaines Antoine Jobard and Jean-Marc Roulot along with special selections from the illustrious Domaine Coche-Dury from 9:30-11 a.m. Tickets: \$200

Immediately following that will be **The Rarities Tasting** from 11 a.m.-12:30 p.m. An extraordinary tasting of vintage Classified Bordeaux including Angelus, Margaux, Pavie a pair of 1990's greatest Rhone wines: Jaboulet La Chapelle and Chave

Hermitage. Tickets: \$295. Both wine events will be held at the Halekulani and are strictly limited to 50 guests.

While the adults sip on wine Saturday things move over to Ko Olina and the keiki get involved. HMAA presents **Keiki in the Kitchen** where your favorite Eat the Street food trucks set up amongst a "Hawaii Made" marketplace and live entertainment and watch the kids in the Keiki Kitchen Cooking Contest try to impress a celebrity studded panel of judges to win bragging rights and a trip to Disneyland! Hosted by TV's Adam Richman and *MasterChef Junior* champion Josh Resiner, twenty two of the world top chefs will also be on hand. The best part about this event? It's FREE! Tickets still required, so sign up online ASAP while space is still available. Be one of the first 2,000 people to be scanned into the event and one lucky entrant will receive the a dinner for four at Roy's Ko Olina AND the-soon-to-open Eating House 1849 at Kapolei Commons. 10 a.m. - 3 p.m.

There will also be two special **Keiki Cooking Classes** between 10:30 - 1 p.m. that day, but at \$25 a ticket, they went quick, and that event is already completely sold out.

The final event has been at Ko Olina for the past few years and although this year there's more to follow afterwards, **Foodtopia** sound as if it will delight as in years past. Seventeen chefs will line the lagoon including Marcel Vigneron, Bobby Chinn, Brian Malarkey and more. A seated VIP event will include delectable plates from Celestino Drago, Dean Fearing, Ryo Takatsuka, Chris Kajioka and Janice Wong followed by what has been one of the most incredible fireworks displays seen. If you're guests are going to this one, tell them to kick off their shoes. This is a toes in the sand event if there ever was one. However, if you didn't grab tickets already, don't get too excited. It's too late. This event is also totally sold out.

Not to worry, there's till two more events to choose from. Sunday October 30th brings back **Battle of the Brunch (and Bass) Round III**. Same concept, new location. Guests will nosh on six delectable dishes and decide not only the winner of the nettle of the brunch but also the battle of the bass as last years Kani Ka Pila Grille Annual Talent winner, Waimanalo Sunset Band competes against this years champion, Pu'uoloa for another limited contract at Kani Ka Pila Grille. 11 a.m - 1 p.m. Tickets: \$115. As a heads up, this event is also nearing capacity and looks like it will sell out soon.

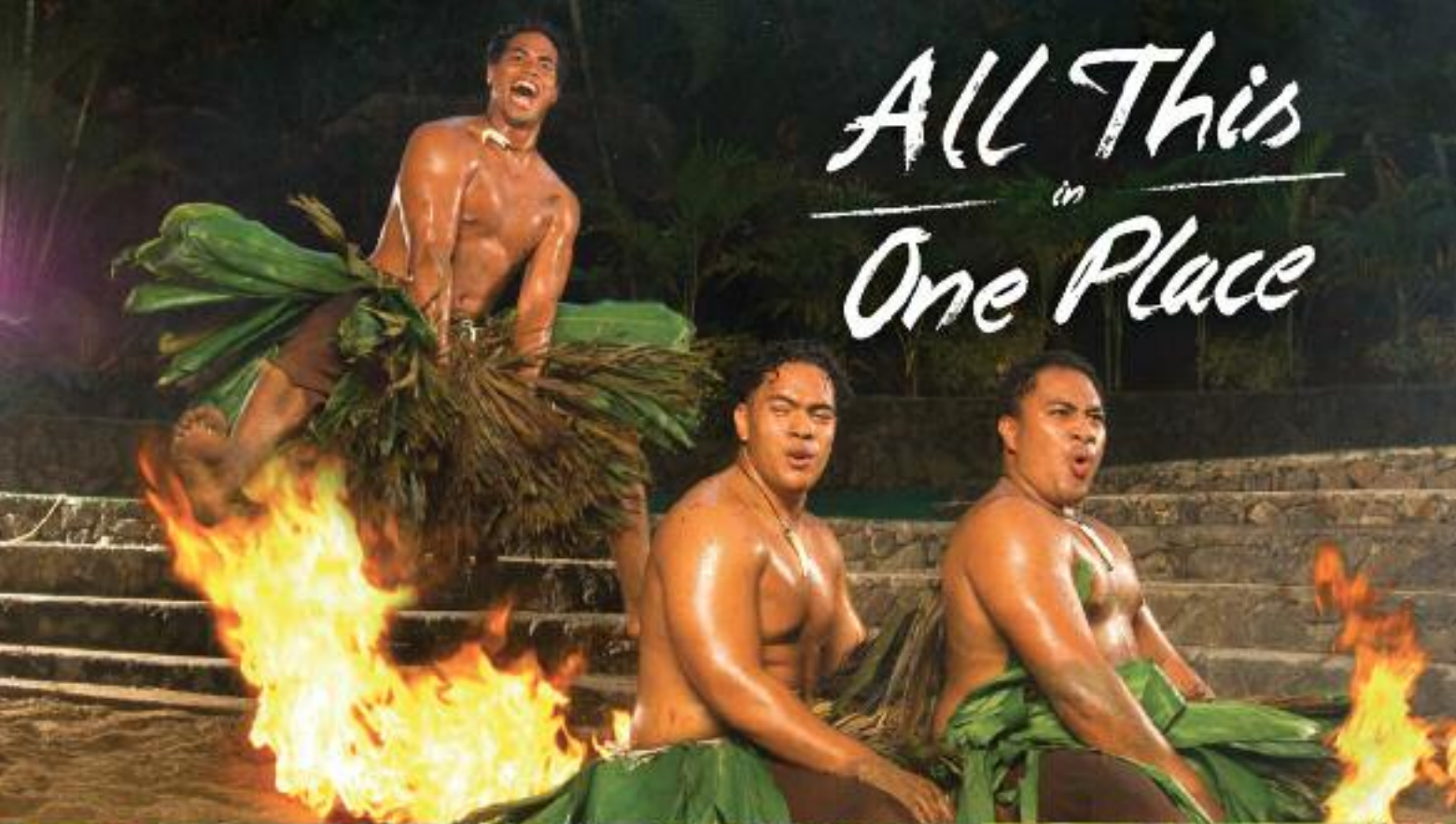


with a soon-to-be-announced major name on December 10th. Many events are free and open to the public.

These 11 days will be filled with events designed to pay tribute to those who lost their lives, the survivors who endured the hardship and pain, and to the thousands who fought in WWII. The last of the survivors of WWII will be here on O'ahu for the 75th Commemoration.

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arts with aloha



This October we can find the Aloha in the arts through the eyes of an old Hawaiian institution and the ears of a much younger civic institution. Your guests will have the chance to discover what makes Rachmaninoff rock, to experience the planets of our solar system in an unexpected way and to learn about the spiritual significance of Papahānaumokuākea, not to mention how to spell it correctly.

Spelling Hawaiian words isn't really that tough, it the diacriticals that get you, but try spelling and even pronouncing a Russian name. Fortunately with auto correct these days no matter how poorly you spell Rachmaninoff, as long as you have the "R", the "mani" and some form up "off" or "ov" your mobile device or computer will fix it. So there's really no excuse for you not to guide your guests to the **HAWAII SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA'S** 2016-2017 Halekulani Masterworks season opener "*Tao Rachs!*" on Saturday, October 1st at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday, October 2nd at 4 p.m. The "Tao" in the title is 22-year-old-sex-god-tinder-swipe-right-pianist Conrad Tao, and "Rachs" stands for Rachmaninoff's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini. Born in 1873, Sergei Rachmaninoff is regarded as one of the major composers of the 20th century. He moved to New York City after the Russian Revolution and eventually settled in Beverly Hills. Had he been born in 1973, he would have had his own reality show. Conrad Yiwen Tao was born in 1994 in Urbana, Illinois and is respected composer and sought after pianist. You can following him on Twitter and Instagram. Conrad will also perform the piano in Brahms Symphony No. 3 under the direction of Conductor Gerald Schwarz. Don't worry you need not have heard Symphony No. 1 or No. 2 to understand the plot in this third installment.

Hawaii Symphony Orchestra (HSO) is a rather new institution to the islands. Founded in 2011, HSO carries on the legacy of the Honolulu Symphony, which began in 1900 and performed for more than a century. Under the guidance of Executive Director Jonathan Parrish, the new orchestra comprises of 84 professional musicians and presents a full season of classical, masterworks and pops performances as well as educational and community outreach programs.

On Sunday, October 30th at 4 p.m. the HSO's Masterworks 2 presents *Gustav Holst's The Planets* under the direction of Conductor Sarah Ioannides. I think she's Greek-Scottish-Aussie. Holst was a British composer and contemporary of Rachmaninoff. The Planets, Op. 32 is his most famous work. It is a seven-movement orchestral suite where each movement is named after a planet. If you're wondering, Earth and Pluto didn't

make the cut. The first complete public performance was in November 1920 in London. The performance will be enhanced by NASA and CGI visuals. He runs several Fort Worth-area restaurants including the historic White Elephant Saloon, Woodshed Smokehouse, Queenie's Steakhouse, Love Shack and Lonesome Dove Western Bistro in the historical Fort Worth Stockyards. He's also the guy that defeated Iron Chef Morimoto in on Food Network's Iron Chef America in 2006, and he's coming to town for the Hawaii Food & Wine Festival.

What is your first childhood food memory?

My mothers "S.O.S." or shit n a shingle. It was dried beef, cream gravy over white toast.

When did you decide you wanted to be a chef?

I took my first kitchen job making salads my freshman year in college and literally fell in love with it right away. I haven't looked back since.

What was your first job in the industry?

I was a salad prep guy at Kotsi's Grill and Spirits

Who would you consider your mentor and why?

I have a lot of people that influence me. My mom has probably made the most impact on me. I've never seen someone work so hard without any complaints. As far as food goes I love what Mario Batali does, Francis Mallman, and all the guys from the southwest like Pyles, Fearing and Del Grande

You're known for urban western cuisine. What is that?

It is a cuisine that celebrates the Western frontier. I use a ton of wild game and my style incorporates all of the cultures that settled the west like, American Indian, Mexican, Southern, German, Chinese, and French. The cuisine represents all the chances these great people took to become great americans

What's your favorite ingredient to work with and why?

I love to work with wild game and simple vegetables. I love to make a simple onion become the best onion it can be. I also love to take an animal that most are afraid to cook with and show its glory

What's the strangest dish you've ever eaten?

Grilled squirrel with my dad camping in the Arbuckle Mountains. He was a terrible cook and the fact that we ate something he had hardly ever prepared... Well you can imagine how that turned out! But I love the memory and I love that he shot it, skinned it and cooked it. I learned a lot that day

What's your biggest pet peeve in the kitchen?

Preparation. If everyone is prepared we all have fun.

Any thoughts on food television and how it's affected your industry?

Food television has been the greatest thing for our industry as far as awareness of quality and causing the general public to demand better food. However it has painted a picture of quick fame and stardom in an industry that is built solely on hard work, determination and real talent.

Yes it is my money and the show is very intense. Joe and I get along really well in real life but on the show we tend to fight a lot. While our opinions seem to align on operations they never seem to align on the deal!

Head down, work hard and NEVER tell anyone the words "I know".

Burnt Carrots

Ingredients:

15 Whole Carrots, Jumbo, Washed	Goat Cheese	5 oz
Peanut oil	Chili Flakes	2 oz
Honey	Salt & Pepper	to taste

Directions:

Wash carrots and trim ends, DO NOT PEEL. Cut into approximately 4 inch lengths. Blanch in boiling water until just tender.

Cool completely.

Over high heat, heat a large skillet. Place peanut oil into skillet and heat until it just starts to smoke. Gently place carrots in pan and season with salt and pepper. Do not shake pan. Allow carrots to char then rotate in pan and char the remaining sides.

Remove from pan and place in stainless steel mixing bowl. Top carrots with honey, goat cheese and chili flakes. Adjust seasonings to taste with salt and pepper. Serve in your favorite serving vessel.

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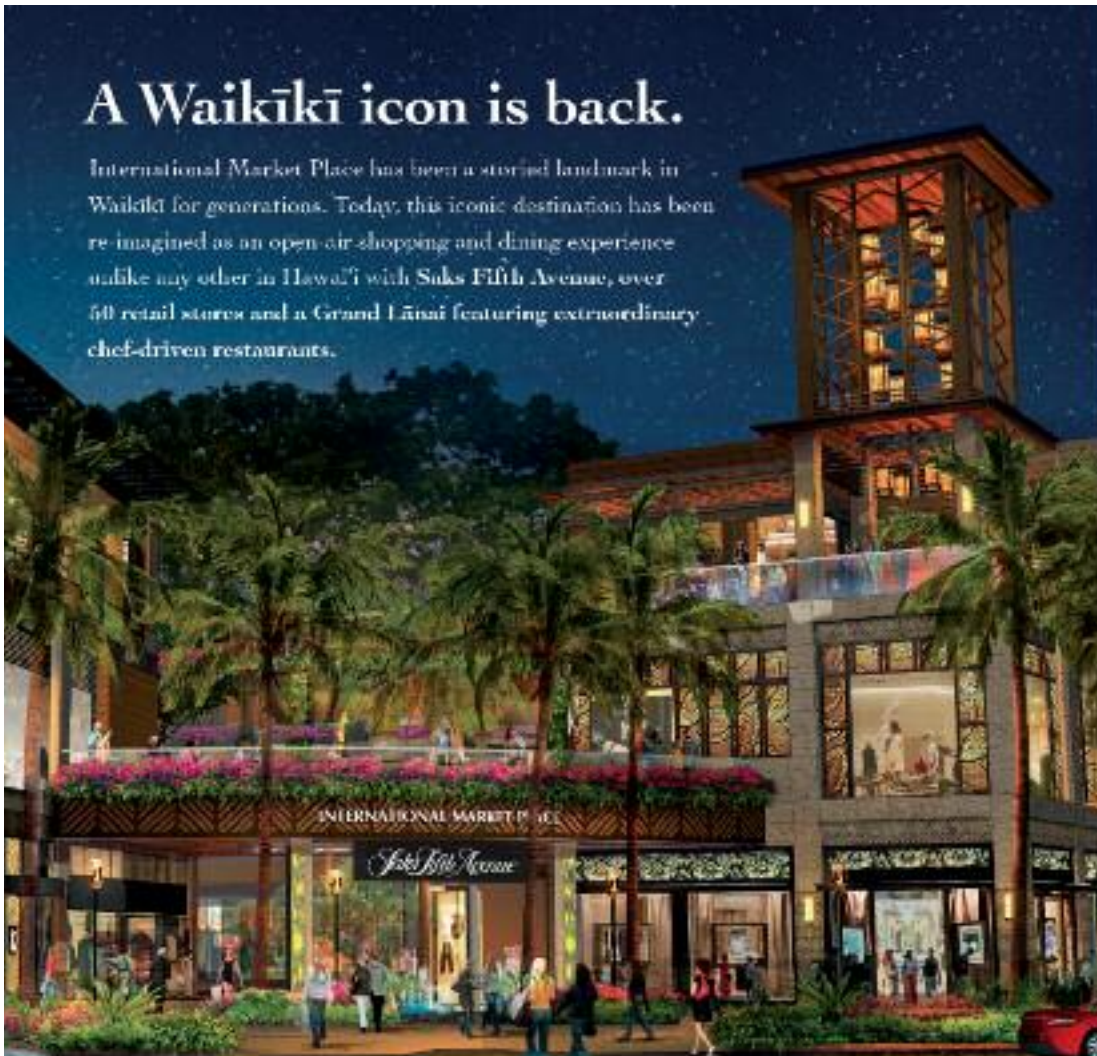
