Get excited foodies, the 9th Annual Hawaii Food & Wine Festival is heading back to town, with a whopping 23 events on three islands over three weeks. This year's festival will again bring a veritable who's who of the culinary industry onto our shores. For those of us on Oahu, there are a variety of exceptional events planned at differing price points for everyone to enjoy from October 23rd-27th.

The Hawaii Food & Wine Festival was born out of a conversation back in 2009 when Roy and Denise Yamaguchi sat down with Alan Wong to discuss how they could build upon the annual Hawaii Farm Bureau dinner, and started out that next year as a 3-day festival with 30 chefs. Since then it has grown into one of the top food & wine festivals in the country, featuring more than 180 of the world's most renowned chefs, winemakers, sommeliers, and mixologists.

"Hawai'i Food and Wine Festival brings top chefs from around the world for the largest food and wine event in the state," says HFWF

Chief Executive Officer Denise Yamaguchi. "Attendees from the U.S. mainland and abroad develop an appreciation of Hawai'i's unique culinary scene, offerings and traditions, and in return, we get to experience their culture through food and wine.

The fun kicks off on October 23rd with **The Howard Hughes Corporation Presents Brews & BBQ** from 5:30 – 8:30 p.m. at Victoria Ward Park. Not only is this event being held at a new location, it will also be the HFWF first backyard BBQ. Five chefs, including Dean Fearing from Fearing's in Dallas, TX and Timon Balloo from Sugarcane Raw Bar Grill in Miami, FL. Experience barbecue like brisket, ribs or burnt ends done island style with all the fixin's, then wash it all down with local brews and craft favorites. Tickets are \$85.

Next up is **Crazy Rich Cocktails** on October 24th from 6 -9 p.m. After years of being held at The Modern, this event has moved over to the pool deck of the Alohilani Resort Waikiki

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From the koa canoes that race across the Molokai Channel to the milo or koa or Norfolk pine rocking chair on your aunties' porch, wood is, and always has been, a cherished commodity in our islands. If someone in the neighborhood is cutting a tree they will call a member of the local woodcarvers guild. Arriving with pickup trucks and saws, the carvers make sure not a scrap will be left by the end of the day.

The 2019 Hawaii Woodshow, Na La'au o Hawai'i, presented by the Hawaii Forest Industry Association, will open at the historic Chinese Hall at Moanalua Gardens, Sunday, October 20th through October 27th. The hall has rarely been open to the public. If you don't know the gardens, think Hitachi Tree, the symbol used as a logo for the Japanese Hitachi company. That tree is right in the center of the gardens at 2850-A Moanalua Road, with ample parking in the area. The

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Publisher's Letter



October 15, 1999...
a day that changed
the course of my life

In the 90s, the time-share business started to explode in the islands. It was impossible to walk down Front Street without being offered free tickets to activities for listening to their spiel. With limited marketing dollars, a handful of activity companies on Maui decided to form a hui to strengthen their reach and formed the Activity Owners Association. One of their goals was to reach into hotels to sell their tickets to the visitor before they ever left the hotel and got hit up on Front Street, and to do so, they decided to create *The Maui Concierge*. The concept took off and soon thereafter they expanded to Oahu.

Where did I come in? Well, my father ran *Aloha Magazine*, so I grew up deeply involved with both the visitor industry and the magazine world and had been working in it for years. Part of my responsibilities included handling the official publications for the Visitors Bureau, so I was spending a lot of time in Maui those days. A few months after Oahu launched, the AOA was seeking new representation and reached out to me. *Aloha Magazine* had closed its doors earlier that year so I decided to give it a go, against my Dad's wishes (the only bad piece of advice he ever gave me). He said it was too small, but, I actually loved the interaction with the reader. Coming from big magazines and even larger subscriber bases spread across the globe we never really knew who read the publications, so working with a smaller, tight knit audience here locally, was truly a rewarding experience and I fell in love with *The Oahu Concierge*. You would call and ask me questions, and even if I didn't have the answer, I knew enough people to be able to find them for you. I was having fun!

Just a few months after I started working on the book I received a phone call on the day my ad list was due. I remember it like it was yesterday. It was a few minutes past ten on October 15th, 1999. My deadlines were always noon on the 15th, so when I heard who it was I instantly started saying I was waiting to hear back from one more advertiser (it was Hy's), but I would be ready in time. "About that..." she started, telling me she had just got out of a meeting and the board had decided to put their money toward creating a website and they were no longer going to publish *The Oahu Concierge*. My heart plummeted. "As of when," I asked. "About 5 minutes ago," she said. And without even thinking about it, I blurted out... "What do you want for it?" By the end of the day I had purchased a magazine that was barely a year old having no idea what to do and somehow came out with my first issue two weeks later. I am now facing two 20th anniversaries. October 15th, the day my impromptu question changed the course of my professional career, and our 20th anniversary issue next month. Wow.. time flies....!

entry fee to the Gardens is the bargain of the century – \$1 for Hawaii residents and military and \$5 for non-residents.

The rules of the show call for the use of wood from Hawaiian-grown tree species. That requirement has encouraged the planting of many more acres of native species in recent years. So, what will you see? Art made from Mango, Kamani, Kiawe, Koa, Milo, Norfolk Pine, and Macadamia Nut woods.

Think adornments, small bowls that can fit in the palm of your hand, large turned vessels as tall as the carver, or elegant inlaid tables and koa rocking chairs. The awards include Best of Show, as many as five first place winners in various categories, a Peoples Choice Award (yes! you get to vote!), plus the Innovation + Imagination Student Challenge.

Who judges this art and who might you meet at the exhibit? This year there are stellar

artists from various facets of Hawaii's art community. First is Tom Klobe, an award-winning professor emeritus and founding director of the University of Hawaii Art Gallery. In the twenty-nine years he organized many international exhibits he won many awards and nurtured the awareness of Hawaii art and artists worldwide. He was named a "living treasure" by the Honpa Hongwanji Mission. He says the operative word is "Living!"

Steve Grimes is a woodworker with forty-five years of crafting guitars. He came from Seattle in 1962 and never left. He will be celebrating the building of his 1,000th guitar. His clients include: Willie Nelson, George Benson, Leo Kottke, Keola Beamer, Steve Miller, Jackson Browne and many more famous strumming wizards.

Also judging is Joshlyn Sand, Director of the Honolulu Botanical Gardens with 650 acres of diverse tree species from around the world. She says the local woodworking community is the best part of her job.

The prized awards are based on Best of Show, Spirit of the Show, the Kent Award presented by Ron and Myra Kent Fund. The awards also include the Hawaii Woodshow Masters, Spirit of the Show, and, here is where the audience comes in, the Peoples Choice Award.

New to the show is the Albizia Challenge. That is the tree that is taking over every island, most recently the island of Oahu. The award is for the best creation that renders the Albizia translucent and removed from its invasive damage to the forests of Hawaii. 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arts with aloha



I watched a telecast of the EMMYS last month at **HAWAII THEATRE CENTER**, the event was hosted by former Miss Universe Brook Lee and KHON's Kamaka Pili, and I was amazed at

how many audience members had never experienced a concert or show before at this historic site. It made realize how important it is for us in the visitor industry to showcase all the aloha this theatre has brought to the Honolulu arts scene for the past 97 years, so I am devoting this month's column to one of my favorite places.

The historic theatre opened in 1922 as a showplace for vaudeville, silent films, plays, musicals and Hawaiian entertainments. Known for many years as the Price of the Pacific, it slowly evolved into a plush movie palace until it fell on hard times in the 1970s, when Waikiki became the entertainment destination for locals and visitors alike. Almost 40 years ago, concerned citizens banded together around the mission to preserve and restore the Hawaii Theatre and formed the Hawaii Theatre Center, a 501(c)3 no profit that owns and operates the historic theatre today. The theatre showcases the finest in local, national, and international entertainments and hosts approximately 100,000 patrons annually. The Hawaii Theatre is listed on both the State of Hawaii and National Historic Registers. For those of your guests who are interested in both theatre and architecture, you should recommend the one-hour docent-led tour which features not only the history of the structure but also the artwork inside it and its importance to the community. The tours are subject to change/cancellation due to rehearsal & performance schedule, so it is always best to call 528-0506 to confirm tour date and time.

This month offers a variety of entertainments for your guests. The grandest event is happening on October 25 at 7:30 p.m. and it's entitled *Three Maui Divas* which marks the return appearance to the Hawaii Theatre stage of three of Maui's best musical artists -- Greig, Amy Hānaiali'i and Raiatea Helm. Tickets range from \$35 in the balcony to \$45 to \$65 in the orchestra section. *Nāpua Greig* is a Kumu Hula who began her solo recording career with the release of "Pihana" in 2007 which won her the Nā Hōkū Hanohano award for "Best Female Vocalist." In 2010, she released her sophomore album, "Mohalu," which received three Nā Hōkū Hanohano awards. *Amy Hānaiali'i* is one of Hawai'i's top selling female vocalist of all time. She has received multiple Grammy and Nā

Hōkū Hanohano nominations, awards and acknowledgements. She's a dedicated promoter of Hawaiian culture with a commitment that stems from her family's heritage and strongly rooted ancestral responsibility. *Raiatea Helm* is Hawaii's first solo female vocalist to ever receive a Grammy nomination. It was for her album entitled "Sweet and Lovely." She is also a multiple Nā Hōkū Hanohano award winner and is best known for her Leo Ki'eki'e (Hawaiian falsetto) and powerful jazz recordings.

For those of your guests not able to make the concert, there are several other concerts and events happening this month, that will give them an opportunity to experience the theatre. October 12th is the *Miss Chinatown Scholarship Pageant*. Several former Miss Chinatowns have gone on to become Miss Hawaii and compete in the Miss America Pageant over the years. This pageant will give your guests a better understanding and appreciation of Chinese heritage here in Hawaii which began in the late 18th Century. Tickets are \$30.

October 19th welcomes the popular *Moth Podcast and Radio Hour* to the Hawaii Theatre. This group of storytellers celebrates the ability of stories to honor both the diversity and commonality of the human experience. Your guests will either know them or not. Tickets are \$58, \$78 or \$88.

October 25th is all about Las Vegas ventriloquist, impressionist, comedian and singer *Terry Fator* who won America's Got Talent in 2017. He is famous for his singing impressions of Garth Brooks, Etta James, James Taylor and Dean Martin. He has been the opening act for Reba McEntire, Garth Brooks and Styx. Tickets range from \$49 to \$125.

October 26th the theatre is going totally insane with *Animaniacs in Concert*. Your guests who are fans of the beloved Warner Bros. animated series will be able to get up close and personal with the original voice actor, Rob Paulsen and Emmy Award-winning composer Randy Rogel who created many of the memorable songs from the series. Tickets are \$45, \$55, \$65 and \$115.

To purchase tickets to all the above concerts and events, visit hawaiiitheatre.com or call the box office at 528-0506. Please note that there is a \$5 theatre restoration fee and a \$4.50 processing fee for all tickets. Let's make this a stellar October for the Hawaii Theatre Center and start making it the Pride of the Pacific once more.

This craft cocktail-themed event will bring together 14 expert chefs in Asian flavors such as the winners of the Great Food Truck Race Yong & Ted Kim from LA's Seoul Sausage, Belinda Leong from San Francisco b. patisserie, Susur Lee from Lee Restaurant in Ontario, Canada and, of course, Iron Chef Masaharu Morimoto. Expect outrageous cocktail creations and 12 master mixologists including Francesco Lafranceschi from Mr. Coco in Las Vegas, Julie Reiner from New York's Mixtress Consulting and Hawaii's own Justin Park for Bar Leather Apron and Jen Ackrill who just recently joined the Pint n Jigger Team. (Fun fact: Did you know her name and photo graces the bottle of Cocktail Artist Essential Bar Ingredients Triple Sec Syrup? Check it out! It's an orange bottle with her smiling face staring out at you from most Walmart shelves.) Tickets: \$250, \$350 for Priority Access entry at 5 p.m. Use your First Hawaiian Bank Mastercard when purchasing a GA ticket to come in an hour early with the Priority ticket holders at no additional cost.

If you're a wine lover you do not want to miss HFWF's annual wine-centric event. **Swirl at the Hawaii Convention Center.** This year's event is again presented by Hawaiian Airlines and will have wine representatives from some of the top vineyards around the world will keep guests complimentary HFWF etched Riedel glass filled throughout the night as they share their wine knowledge with you. Not a wine drinker? Not a problem. There will be 14 mixologists there as well, including Dominic Venegas, a NYC-based Master of Scotch from New York, award-winning Crafted Cocktail Bartender Mimi Burnham who is Master Certified in over a dozen liquors and some of our own Hawaii-based superstars Dave Newman, Christian Self and Kyle Reutner. Let's not forget about the food! This one is huge, with over 20 world-renowned chefs including Jonathon Waxman from Barbuto in NY; Michael Ginor of Hudson Valley Foie Gras & Lola and Marcel Vigneron from Wolf in LA to name a few. This event is always a sellout so get your tickets early. Tickets are \$250, \$350 for Priority Access and for those seeking reserved seating and access to an exclusive raw bar by Roy Yamaguchi, VIP tickets are

available for \$550.

Keep the party going after the event winds up by heading over to the official after-party, **Fiesta 24/7** at the Hyatt Regency Waikiki Beach Resort and Spa from 9 – 11 p.m. With 6 chefs featuring their Latin American roots such as Ricardo Zarate from Once in Las Vegas, Santa Fe's Mark Kiffin from The Compound Restaurant and Ray Garcia out of LA's Broken Spanish, the food will be complemented by 6 mixologists showcasing cervezas and tequila under the stars on the pool deck. Tickets are \$95. VIP seating available for \$150.

Get some rest and take a deep breath because they're not close to done yet. HFWF will present their mind-blowing wine seminars the following morning at the Halekulani. Although not announced at press-time, they have been phenomenal in the past. Don't sip too much though, as HFWF signature Ko Olina event is that evening, October 26th from 6:30 – 9:30 p.m. **Life's a Beach** will feature 12 renowned chefs and sample world-class wines and sip craft cocktails by master mixologists, as you wander between stations on the beach. Shoes optional of course. Participating chefs include Michelle Bernstein from Miami's Café La Trova, Brenton Lee from New York's TriBeCa Grill and Japan's Yuki Wakiya. Mixologists include Miami's Café La Trova's Julio Cabrera, Ryan Liloia from Brooklyn's Clover Club and our own Dave Power from Southern Glazers. As before the event includes live music and an absolutely amazing fireworks show to wrap up the night. If you have never been, sitting on the sand with the calm lagoon waters lapping at your toes, with a signature cocktail in hand as the night sky explodes directly above you is a one-of-a-kind experience that just can't be replicated anywhere else. Tickets are \$275. Please note the event has been moved over a lagoon to Kohala Lagoon 1 this year. This is FHB Mastercard event, so the \$375 Priority Access is a benefit for those that purchase GA with their FHB card. This event also includes a VIP area with reserved seating and access to 5 more talented chefs, including 2017 Bocuse d'Or winner Mathew Peters at \$600 a pop, but those seats sold out months in advance. This is another event that always sells out, so tell your guests to book right away while seats are still available.

After a whirlwind three weeks, Sunday October 27th wraps up the 9th annual Hawaii Food & Wine Festival with a day full of events that literally offers something for everyone from all walks of life, ages and income brackets. First up is **HMAA Presents Keiki in the Kitchen Family Sunday.** This free event, and yes, I did say free, will be held at Victoria Ward Park from 10 a.m. – 3 p.m. Watch Celebrity Chefs participate in a Fitness Challenge, keiki cooking classes (already sold out, sorry), watch the finalists in the keiki Localicious Recipe Contest and grab an autograph from

In 2016, the Hawai'i Symphony Orchestra (HSO) partnered with Windborne Music to present The Music of Queen featuring Brody Dolyniuk as HSO worked to expand its audience to include fans of classic rock with their #musicthatROCKS series. It worked like a charm. Most people had never heard of Windborne here locally, and many weren't symphony fans, but they sure knew Queen. The music began, Brody began to sing and that was it. The audience was on their feet within minutes. The impression Windborne and the HSO together made was huge. They have since returned to Hawaii several times to perform the music of Led Zeppelin, Pink Floyd and Journey and their fan base has grown ever since.

Windborne was founded by Brent Havens. A Berklee-trained arranger/conductor who has written music for orchestras, feature films and virtually every kind of television, he ventured into putting together arrangements for classic rock hits and symphony orchestras trying to bridge the gap between classical music and rock. After finding the right lead singers for the groups, he figured out that magic touch, and together with symphonies around the world, Windborne has introduced countless rock fans to the wonder of a symphony experience, and vice versa!

On Friday, October 18 and Saturday, October 19, Brent Havens will bring back Brody and the boys for two nights of The Music at Queen at the Blaisdell Concert Hall. This performance really is #musicthatROCKS. 7:30 p.m. Friday night is almost sold out and Saturday tickets are sure to go quickly. Tickets are \$36-\$95 and can be found online at hawaiisymphonyorchestra.org.

In advance of their upcoming shows, we did a quick Q&A with Arranger/Conductor Brent Havens to find out a bit more about how he first came up with this concept and how Windborne got to where it was today. Read on to learn more. ~ Pam

Q: In 1995, you wrote your first rock symphony with the music of Led Zeppelin. What made you decide to start writing these classic rock shows with symphony orchestras?

A: It was something that evolved from a couple of people that were looking for ways to bring a different audience to see their local

orchestra. We worked through a couple ideas and came up with the Music of Led Zeppelin with a full band and orchestra. It took a while for it to catch on but ended up being the perfect way to bring new audiences into the halls to see their city's orchestras.

Q: Which group came next and how do you go around choosing which group to do?

A: The Music of Pink Floyd followed Zeppelin. We go through a stringent list or what I call our "matrix" of requirements for the music of a particular band needs to have before we would consider it as a choice for orchestras. Things like the size and popularity of their catalog, is there enough music to fill a full show, what are the record sales of the band in the U.S., etc. But first and foremost I have to be comfortable that I can make the show work with an orchestra. So I do a lot of listening to their catalog and make sure that I'm confident that I can make the show work with that type of orchestration.

Q: Zeppelin, Queen, Pink Floyd, Bowie, Journey How many shows do you have?

A: We have a few productions currently in our repertoire. We've added the music of the Rolling Stones recently thanks to their publisher working with us on the show. Also the music of Whitney Houston and recently the music of Aretha Franklin.

Q: How do you put these shows together?

A: Well, as I mentioned earlier, I listen extensively to the material. Once I'm comfortable with my selections of music from their catalog I transcribe each song from the recordings. We try to stay as close to the originals as possible because we know that fans appreciate this music in its original form and we want them to experience it that way and then add the colors of a 50 or 60 piece orchestra to expand on the material. So when someone comes to see a show they know that they are going to get the music that they love and it's going to be mixed with all of this additional aural colors that only an orchestra can provide.

Q: Which show is your favorite?

A: I get asked that question a lot and it's actually very difficult to answer. Mainly because there are aspects to each show that I really enjoy so it makes it difficult to say that I like one of the shows better than another show.

Q: This will be the 2nd time you are bringing the Queen show to Hawaii. Is that due to the Bohemian Rhapsody frenzy?

A: I do think that the movie has energized these hits with audiences but honestly, it's been a very popular show with us before the movie. But orchestras have indeed been

asking for the show more since the movie came out and was such a big hit. It's been fun to see audiences' reaction to the show. They truly love this music.

Q: Are you a classic rock fan yourself?

A: I was never really someone who delved deeply into the genre growing up in the 60s and 70s. I was mainly into jazz and fusion and later into soundtracks. But my tastes changed over the years, and when we began this project I found that I had an appreciation for the music and ended up really enjoying most of the music we perform. It's been a cool experience changing my tastes over the years

Q: How many productions are performing around the country at any one time?

A: We can have up to five shows with three groups out at the same time and we do that fairly regularly.

Q: What do you do like to do when you come to Hawaii? Anything plans?

A: What I try to do most is relax. Ha! Our schedules are so hectic that we don't get a lot of time to shut down and simply enjoy our surroundings so that's what I do when we come to Hawaii. I'd love to do a little scuba diving and visit some of the tourist sites one time when we're there. As long as it's relaxing.

Chef's Corner

Celebrity Chef Michelle Bernstein

Michelle Bernstein set out to be a dancer, but an injury cut those aspirations short and she pursued her love of cooking. She has won widespread acclaim as an expert in Latin-style flavors and in 2008, she won the James Beard Award for Best New Chef in the South. She recently opened Cafe La Trova, her latest restaurant in Miami which I was fortunate to visit last month. What a place! When asked what title best describes her, the TV personality, restaurateur, consultant, author and private chef said.. "MOM, that's what I always am"

What is your first childhood food memory?

Picking warm strawberries on a farm in Homestead, Florida, called Knauss Berry Farms; sipping on their amazing strawberry-vanilla swirled shakes and hot melt in your mouth sticky buns that the folks that run the farm make everyday for a never-ending line of rumbling tummies.

You were going to be a dancer before you injured yourself. What made you decide to be a chef?

I shared a passion for dance with my passion for food; It was definitely going to be one or the other! I feel I took the right path; so far so good!

What was your first job after the culinary school?

I worked 3 jobs (at the same time) while in school; I was a pantry (salad) cook at a great restaurant here in Miami, I baked for a friend at a coffee shop every morning at 4 a.m., and assisted the amazing Steven Raichlen on a couple of his cookbooks. Once I graduated my first job was still a line cook, but this time in Washington D.C. at the Watergate.

What did you do after that prior to being named executive chef for Azul at the Mandarin Oriental?

I decided after I graduated I didn't want to take on managing for a while; I wanted to learn. I hung out in the south of France (basically working for my next meal), I worked in as many kitchens around NY, DC and Europe as I could to learn and develop my palate. My first sous chef job was in New York at Alison on Dominick. After a while I eventually came back home, ran a couple of restaurants in Miami Beach until someone at the Mandarin Oriental discovered me and brought me in for a job that really shaped my career from then on.

What made you decide to focus on Latin cuisine?

I never made the decision myself; I truly feel it was made for me. Food Network called in 2001, asked me if I wanted to be on a show called Melting Pot, Nuevo Latino; I jumped at the chance; after all I am Argentine, they needed a Latin woman I filled the spot! Things just started moving in a more Latin direction after that; I mean my palate is definitely

Latin; I grew up on Parillada with chimichurri, empanadas and croquetas; so I guess you can say my road was already paved.

Who would you consider your mentor and why?

Jean Louis Palladin, for kicking my behind, breaking me down then building up my confidence; Mark Millitello for pretty much doing the same thing.

Did life change after the James Beard Award?

Yes, it got harder. I and everyone else expected more from me.

How do you give back to the industry that's given you so much? I teach, I honor, I invest, I donate...

What do you like best about HFWF and how many of these types of events do you do a year?

I do about 4-5 a year, HFWF is amazing in so many ways. My family and I feel so fortunate to get to come to Hawaii to take part, we wait for it all year long. The chefs that partake are awesome, I always meet the most delightful and thankful guests. I swim everyday, my son and husband (he went to HPU by the way) are thrilled. I get to play with incredible ingredients and give back to a community I've fallen in love with. Last but not least, I adore Roy & Alan!

What do you have planned for this years' HFWF?

I'm excited to cook up a dish I've been working on just for the event! Hawaiian ripe plantain arepas with fiery Oxtail stew.

What's on your must-do list while in the Islands?

Eat as much ramen, plate lunch and shave ice as possible, swim at every beach, cook and enjoy!

What's next for you?

I'm creating the menu for an interactive immersive dinner theater/play coming very soon. I'm doing the food and beverage in a hotel opening up by hopefully next year and our 6 month old restaurant Cafe La Trova is awesome!

Is there any other information you'd like to share?

Just thank you to all the beautiful people in Hawaii for allowing us to come share with you all every year.



Baked Alaska Serves 4-6

Passion Fruit Sauce:

- 1/4 cup mango puree
- 1/4 cup passion fruit puree
- 1 banana, diced small

Meringue:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup water

- 1/4 cup blueberries
- 1 mango, pitted, peeled, diced small
- Combine all ingredients together.
- 3 egg whites
- 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar
- Pinch kosher salt

Directions: Combine the sugar and water in a saucepan and cook over medium heat, do not stir. Bring the mixture to a boil and cook until the liquid becomes clear. Reduce the heat, cover the pan and simmer until it reaches 238F. Remove the pan from the heat. Meanwhile, place the egg whites in the bowl of a standing mixer fitted with the whisk attachment. Beat the egg whites until frothy. Add the cream of tartar and salt, beat until stiff peaks form. Slowly begin beating the egg whites on medium speed while pouring in the hot syrup. Beat until stiff peaks form, about 8 minutes. It should be quite stiff. Transfer the meringue to a piping bag fitted with a large star tip. Candied Pistachios, for garnish, if desired. To build the dessert, cut the cake using a 3 inch cutter or round mold. Place a piece of cake on a heatproof plate. Place a rounded scoop of your favorite dulce de leche ice cream directly on the cake. Pipe the meringue around the cake and ice cream in a circle. Be sure to form a complete seal with the meringue and not leave any portion uncovered. Using a torch, brown the outside of the meringue. Serve with passion fruit sauce and candied pistachios.

Q. How long have you been with Hilton Grand?
A. 6.5 years. I started at the Hilton Hawaiian Village working with renters, then to the Embassy Suites HGV desk, back to HHV working with our HGV owners, and now on our Pre-Arrival Owner's Conciierge Team.

Q. What is a "Owners Pre-Arrival Conciierge"?
A. My conciierge responsibilities are the same as when I was physically at the hotel desk servicing our HGV Owners and other guests. The defining difference now is that our team is off property in a call center where we contact the owners prior to their arrival to: confirm their reservation, assist in their vacation planning, reserving their activities, booking their presentation, sending confirmation emails/activity vouchers, etc.

Q. How did you get your start in this industry?
A. When our family moved back home to Hawaii the cost of living was 60% higher from where we had been and my job wasn't paying the bills. In looking for new employment with good pay and benefits, the hospitality industry fit the bill. I chose Hilton Grand Vacations because our family has been a part of the membership for many years and I wanted other people to have the same opportunity!

Q. What's the biggest challenge in your position?
A. Not being face to face with the guests and seeing them on a daily basis during their stay makes me sad sometimes. 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
