The annual World Fireknife Championships return to the Polynesian Cultural Center from May 7 to 15. This festival celebrates Samoan culture through a thrilling

competition where dancers perform traditional Samoan fireknife dance, known as 'ailao afi.' The dance, deeply rooted in Samoan culture, originates from ancient warrior traditions, showcasing

strength, knives.

The competition features participants across various age groups, including 20 Juniors (6–11 years), 36 Intermediate (12– 17 years), and 34 Open Division (18 and older) in the men's division and 12 in the Women's. Dancers are judged on their technique, creativity, and adherence to traditional movements. The festival also includes the "We Are Samoa" High School Arts Festival, where students from Hawaii demonstrate their knowledge of Samoan cultural practices. An essential part of the World Fireknife Festival, We

Are Samoa sells out every year, and this year's event on Saturday, May 10, is no exception. Tickets were sold out at press time.

Historically, the fireknife dance was performed by Samoan warriors before battle, using the nifo oti or "deadly tooth," a hand-held wooden weapon. Over time, this evolved into a captivating performance incorporating elements like

The 27th Annual Shinnyo Lantern Floating Hawai'i is scheduled for Monday, May 26, from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. at Ala Moana Beach in Honolulu. This ceremony invites participants to honor and remember loved ones by floating candle-lit lanterns on the water.



encouraged to join the ceremony led by Her Holiness Shinso Ito of Shinnyo-en at 6 p.m. This highly traditional ceremony begins with the blowing of the conch shell, followed by taiko drums and Hawaiian chants, or oli, before the grand entrance of six large lanterns that carry prayers for all spirits on behalf of everyone. In addition to the main event, local and international musicians will be performing, and special guests will offer words of inspiration. More traditions are presented until Her Holiness rings the bell. The crystal-clear sound of the bell focuses everyone's thoughts and prayers and signifies it is time for everyone to float their lanterns.

Please remember that when we say "float their own lantern," we don't mean lanterns they themselves. made Homemade lanterns are not allowed. If you would like to float a lantern during the ceremony, you may request an Individual Lantern in person on the day of the event at Ala Moana Beach. A limited number of individual lanterns will be available to the public on the day of the event, usually between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. or until the lanterns run out (exact times to be posted on their Facebook and Instagram closer to the date of the event) on a first-come, first-served basis. Only one lantern is offered per family or party. After picking up a lantern, volunteers will be on hand to help individuals assemble them and provide markers for writing messages. Three sides of the lantern are made available for writing remembrances, and pens and a quiet space are available to assemble lantern and write remembrances. Feel free to write, draw, or affix photos or images to the paper provided for the lantern, but please refrain from writing, drawing, or puncturing the foam lantern base. Please do not attach any items to the lantern either. It creates a fire hazard, endangering the safety of the volunteers who retrieve the lanterns after the event.

Remember, at the end of the ceremony, all the lanterns are collected from the ocean and refurbished for next year's ceremony.

There will be several types of lanterns at the event. In addition to the six main ones, there will also be multiple Collective Remembrance Lanterns.

These original wooden-framed lanterns made by Shinnyo practitioners in the event's early years are refurbished each year. Even if you cannot be at Ala Moana Beach during the ceremony, you can still submit an online remembrance for a loved one on the website. All messages received by Sunday, May 25, 11:59 p.m. will be affixed to one of those Collective Remembrance Lanterns and floated from canoes by volunteers during the ceremony on your behalf.

Volunteers play a vital role throughout the event, from preparing and packing transcribing and remembrances onto lanterns retrieving and refurbishing lanterns after the event for future use. They assist in preparing lanterns beginning in the spring, helping with duties on event day, and cleaning and refurbishing lanterns in June. Each step is carefully thought out and taken with reverence for those being remembered and those honoring them. Individuals interested in volunteering for this year's ceremony can register online or submit a volunteer inquiry via email at slfhvolunteer@naleialoha.org for more information. Please keep in mind that those volunteering on the event day do not float a lantern themselves.

Celebrating its 27th year with the theme of Many Rivers, One Ocean, the ceremony is the largest Memorial Day event in the U.S. It hopes to connect the community by offering a physical and emotional space for residents and visitors to experience comfort, connection, and healing. Upwards of 40,000 people attend the event, and seeing thousands of candle-lit lanterns floating at sunset is a magnificent sight. The Lantern Floating ceremony is a unique and hauntingly memorable event that every visitor should see if they are lucky enough to be here for it. There is no cost to participate in the ceremony, and any donations received at the ceremony will be gifted to the City & County of Honolulu for the beautification of Ala Moana Beach Park.

For those unable to attend in person, the ceremony will be broadcast live on KHON2 and streamed online. Go to lanternfloatinghawaii.com for more info.

World title in 1964. His nephew, David Galeai, followed in his footsteps, taking the title in 1999, 2000, and 2003. In 2004, Pulefano's grandson Alex took the crown. Since then, David and Alex's children have continued to lead the charge and regularly land atop the leaderboard. His grand-nephew, Tafili Viceson Galeai, won the men's competition last year and registered to defend his title this year, but after suffering an injury while practicing recently, it's unsure if he'll be able to compete again. His grandfather, Tafili Sr, is Pulefano's older brother. Tafili Sr. has another grandson competing in the Intermediate division - Vincent Galeai (Pulefano's grandnephew), who was the runner-up in the Junior division a few years back, helping continue the family's legacy in the world of fireknife dancing for years to come. It's not just the boys either. Another grandchild, Aliyah Galeai-Ava. took home the title of Women's Champion this past year from her cousin Jeralee Galeai, and her twin sister came in third. Other Galeai's registered to compete this year include Alex Galeai in the men's division.

Over the past three decades, this



popular event has grown from a mere 30 competitors to over 100 performers from around the world traveling to Hawaii for the Championships. This year's group of competitors come from around the world, including Tahiti, New Zealand, Australia, Samoa, Japan, the Cook Islands, Washington, California, Florida and Hawaii.

The Junior and Intermediate division competes on Wednesday, May 7, at 6:30 p.m. in the Pacific Theatre; tickets are \$15. One week later, on Wednesday, May

14, the Women compete, and the Men's qualifying rounds begin at 6:30 p.m. Once again, the fiery rounds take place in the Pacific Theatre, and tickets cost \$15. The Men's Finals occur during the intermission of PCC's "Ha: Breath of Life" night show on Saturday, May 15. Tickets cost \$94.95 for adults and \$75.96 for kids ages 4 to 11.

The winner will be crowned following the show on Saturday at 9 p.m. at a lavish awards ceremony. For more information head to worldfireknife.com.







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MAY DAY IS LEI DAY IN HAWAII

Lei Day was first celebrated in 1927, thanks to Don Blanding, Honolulu newspaper columnist and poet. Blanding employed by the Honolulu Star-Bulletin when he had the idea to set aside select day to celebrate Hawaiian custom of making and wearing leis, a symbol of aloha, love, and hospitality. The Oklahoma native did it right, however, even though he was pretty sure he had a good idea. He got Helen Kawananakoa to bless the idea before movina forward with it. He then shared his idea with fellow columnist Grace Tower Warren, who came up with the slogan "May Day is Lei Day in Hawai'i," which is still used today.

The first celebration occurred on May 1st, 1927, in

downtown Honolulu, at the Bank of Hawaii. People wore leis, schools hosted ceremonies, and music, dancing, and joy were in the air. In 1928, Mayor Charles Arnold crowned the very first Lei Queen, Nina Bowman, and by 1929, the event became so popular that the governor of Hawai i officially proclaimed May 1st as Lei Day, making it a recognized cultural celebration throughout the islands. After a few years, the event moved to City Hall, complete with a lei exhibit and a pageant. The lei of each of the eight major islands became the theme, and a lei queen was chosen, with princesses representing each of the islands wearing lei in their color and flower. As the event grew in popularity, it eventually was relocated to Kapi'olani Park, where it has been held ever since. The program continues to honor the day with a queen and her court and lots of lei contests, celebrating the fragrant garlands that the

Princess Helen Kawananākoa told Blanding, "Indeed, I do approve of the idea. I think it is a beautiful thought and you may count on me for anything you want to help it along. And I know that you will have the loyal support of all the Hawaiians on Othu. They have been discussing it among themselves and are unanimously in favor of it. . . The nicest part of Lei Day is that it brings kamaainas together again. With so many malihinis and malihini customs in Honolulu, the old-timers have rather withdrawn from public events. But Lei Day is so much in the old-time manner that they are planning to revive many 'good old days' courtesies."

day was named after, and these traditions have held on strong for nearly a century. the Hawaiian culture throughout most of Polynesia, the lei is unspoken, outward expression aloha. contestant who best conveys the love for the Hawaiian culture through hula, lei making, and four other categories takes home crown.

A new court is selected each year. The Lei Court must be knowledgeable in the art of lei making, hula, and be able to convey the spirit of lei aloha with warmth and dignity. In order to be considered for the title, applicants are evaluated on their lei-making skills, hula performance, poise, personality, public speaking in English and 'Ōlelo Hawai'i. The Lei

Court is selected from one of the four rotating age groups. Last year, the court was chosen from Nā 'Ōpio (the Youth), ages 18-30. This year, it was Nā Mākua (The Adults), those 31-45 years old. Next year, they will choose a court those 46-60 years old, Nā Mākua 'O'o (The Elders in Training) and in 2027, Nā Kūpuna (The Elders) will rule, and the court will be chosen from those 61 years old and over.

Being a Lei Queen does not mean you are Queen for a day; it means you are a Queen for life. Three Queens have taken their lei mission to heart, doing what they can to perpetuate the tradition of leimaking throughout the community. Nā Lei Mau Loa, the forever leis, is comprised of three former Lei Queens who felt it was their kuleana to make it their lei mission to educate others of the importance of our Hawaiian culture and traditions, to teach the different leimaking methods and to create lei

gardens. Natalie Brown Ah Quin, the 93rd Lei Queen, says, "For us, lei is a physical manifestation of aloha, giving, receiving, and making a lei; it's a kind gesture of goodwill. It connects people, builds relationships, and gives you the feeling of aloha. We feel others must learn the true value of a lei, especially in our tourism industry and how it affects our economy. Our vision is to teach others the meaning of lei, understand its value and impact on the economy here in Hawaii, and perpetuate the artistry of lei-making so the traditions and culture can continue for many years to come." Natalie owns Designs by Natalie Ah Quin, specializing in tropical floral arrangements, and is currently the Orchid Lei Company's Lei Ambassador. She holds lei demonstrations and teaches many lei-making classes for the community, various organizations, and companies in the tourist industry.

Natalie has partnered up with Puamana Crabbe, the 66th Lei Queen in 1994, and Puamohala Kaholokula, the 89th Lei Queen in 2017, both of whom were her judges when she competed for Lei Queen in 2022. She says, "After my reign as Lei Queen, we got to work together on one of Puamana's fashion shows, and we connected. It was a sisterhood. We wanted to continue this legacy of the Lei, to have a Lei mission and a vision." Together, they created Nā Lei Mau Loa or the Forever Leis. Puamana Crabbe, Lei Queen 1994 has been busy re-establishing herself in Hawaii's fashion world with her latest designs. The legendary Hawaiian designer is known for creating and perpetuating the art of appliqué Kapa quilt patterns. Through this sewing technique, she hopes to generate Hawai'i Aloha in timeless, wearable works of art that continue through the next generations. Puamohala Kaholokula has

been teaching hula for nearly 40 years. Puamohala has gained a reputation as a noted hula teacher and chanter; she has conducted workshops in Hawai'i and Japan and has partnerships around the US, Europe, and the South Pacific. As a group, they oversee all the community involvement and identify ways of sharing their lei mission. Once set up, they inform their Lei sisters so that anyone available can join in and help perpetuate the craft of lei-making as the ladies strive to pass down their skills to future generations.

While not a state holiday, Lei Day is a profoundly beloved cultural celebration honoring Hawaiian culture and language,

the art of lei making, and the values of aloha, unity, and nature's beauty. Each island has its own lei style, flower, and color, showcasing the diversity and richness of Hawaiian identity, and the scent of flowers is more prevalent in the air than most other days.

Lei Day is celebrated in communities, schools, and parks, with hula, lei-making contests, the crowning of a Court, live Hawaiian music and dance. Everyone is encouraged to wear leis, share aloha, and immerse themselves in the culture. Take a moment on Lei Day and throughout the month of May to immerse yourself in the culture of lei. Lucky we Live Hawaii!

Chef's Corner

Mugen Pastry Chef Jamon Harper

Jamon Harper's Caribbean roots inspires his cooking-from techniques to flavor profiles. He loves to give people an authentic glimpse into a food culture that they would not readily have access to. At Mugen, he creates desserts & bread for dinner service and special events. He's also responsible for breakfast pastries, Afternoon Tea, amenities, and special occasion cakes for the hotel. Harper believes challenging himself daily to create and express himself artistically and being able to share that with others is what drives him. He's committed to ensure the Forbes Five-Star restaurant continues to be one of the best restaurants in the world.

What is your first childhood food memory?

My neighbor raised cows, and we would get fresh milk from him every morning, warm it up, and add it to cornflakes with a little vanilla essence.

When did you know you wanted to be a chef? Cooking with my mom inspired me. On Saturday mornings I'd watch the travel segment with Burt Wolf. That's when I knew I wanted to be a Chef.

What tools did you take from your mother?

My mom had vegetable gardens, fruit trees, and raised chickens. She taught me how to butcher fish and meat, using the freshest ingredients and consistency. We bought fresh seafood from the fishing boats; she taught me how to identify the best and ripest produce and meats from the vendors. My mom taught me how to cook, and at culinary school, I learned the science behind it.

What sparked your passion in a kitchen?

It all goes back to cooking with my mom. As I said, she taught me how to raise chickens, butcher them and cook them. You have a different appreciation for food, and with that exposure, you become part of the transformation of ingredients. That's what I wanted to do: transform how people think about food.

Who would you consider your mentor?

Jacque Torres for his techniques and Anthony Bourdain for his philosophy on food and life. I love his quote, "Good food is very often, even most often, simple food." In terms of a Chef I worked with, that would be Colin Thornton. A master at his craft, he understood people and food, and created great teams without limits.

What drew you to Pastry Arts?

With a background in natural sciences and architectural drafting, pastry was the logical choice. Pastry is a science and an art; I needed to be part of both of those worlds.

What are your favorite desserts to create?

Black Forest and Limoncello. The Limoncello dessert required me to make Limoncello from scratch, which took 2 months to cure. The dessert was bright in color and flavor, and very delicate. Black Forest was a perfect 2"x 2" cube sprayed

with black cocoa butter with a bright red cherry on the side. It fully embraced the flavor profile of traditional black forest, but the presentation was super minimalistic and artful I believe.

What are your favorite flavor combinations?

Popcorn & caramel: there's nothing better than this basic combo. Tamarind & black pepper: the tartness & sweetness combined with muskiness are unmatched. Mango & curry: the worlds of pastry & savory meet here in an unreal symphony.

What excites you most about what you do?

Challenging the norm and creating the unexpected. The ability to show what goes on in my mind on a plate is an unbelievable luxury.

How often do you change the dessert menu?

It changes at least four times a year. New desserts are created for special dinners.

You're responsible for Mugen's Afternoon Tea?

Yes. I aim to take guests on a culinary journey. The menu is a dégustation. I create & execute both savory and pastry dishes and push the boundaries of what Afternoon Tea is, focusing on exceptional service and exceptional food.

How often will you change that menu?

We have a primarily local clientele who return often. We adjust the Tea menu monthly or bimonthly based on the availability of new ingredients. I work with local vendors, so when they have new items, we change out items.

What's new at Mugen?

Our menu format has changed, so instead of a tasting dégustation, you are now able to choose items, including a choice of three desserts.

Anything exciting on the horizon?

Yes! We will be introducing a tea pairing with our Afternoon Tea menu shortly. I'm also working on a collaboration with a 3 Michelin-star restaurant and another with a Napa winery, and I'm finalizing a special tea inspired by me with our Tea Blender.

What do you like to do on your time off?

Anything that is not work related lol, not completely true. My hobby is building Legos, so whenever I'm able, I immerse myself in that.

Coconut Rice Pudding with Mango-Lime Compote



Ingredients:
½ cup white rice,
long grain

4 cups milk, whole 2 cups milk, coconut 1 each vanilla bean, sp ½ cup sugar, granulated ½ cup cream, heavy

1 each vanilla bean, split Pinch salt

Directions: Bring whole milk, coconut milk, sugar, vanilla bean, and salt to a boil. Add rice, reduce to a gentle simmer and cover pot. Cook 45 minutes, or until rice is tender. Transfer to a pan immediately and cover with plastic film. Ensure film is in contact with rice with no air pockets. Refrigerate until cooled. Fold in ½ cup of heavy cream.

Mango Gelée: Bring ½oz. mango nectar, ½ teaspoon agar agar, and 1 tablespoon granulated sugar to a boil. Pour immediately into 1" hemisphere silicon molds. Place in fridge for 30 minutes or until set.

Make a Mango Compote: Grab one ripe mango and a lime. Peel and dice the mango into 1/4- cubes. Zest lime into mango cubes and combine.
