

The Sony Open in Hawaii



The beautiful beachfront Waialae Golf Course will be the backdrop for a nationwide audience as the Sony Open returns to the Islands bringing some of the top names in golf for a week golf madness.

And here it is, Tournament Week for the 2014 Sony Open in Hawaii. The open, one of the world's and certainly Hawaii's, premier golf event tees off on Monday, January 6th and runs through 12th, at Waialae Country Club. Returning to defend his title, Russell Henley, who finished with a tournament record-24-under 267 to capture his first PGA Tour victory earlier this year at the 2013 Sony Open. The buzz is on about Japanese golf stars Ryo Ishikawa and Hideki Matsuyama, along with Zack Johnson, Charles Howell III, Adam Scott, John Daly and 15-year old Chinese golf prodigy Guan Tianlang.

Crowds will be thick as ants on chocolate. Shuttle busses ease the traffic for those parking free in the free off-site parking lots at Hunakai Park and Kahala Community Park on Monday through Sunday and Thursday through Sunday on Moa Street.

Enoa Trolley Shuttle Service offers a \$2 each way trip between Waikiki and Waialae Country Club, departing every 30-minutes. Stops include Hilton Hawaiian Village Tapa Tower, Eggs & Things on Saratoga Avenue, Sheraton Waikiki, Duke Kahanamoku statue at Kuhio Beach. Waikiki Beach across from the Honolulu Zoo and the

Daily tournament admission tickets are \$15 per person, online in advance via friendsofhawaii.org or at any First Hawaiian Bank branch on Oahu. Tickets at the gate, \$20 per person daily. Season badges, at \$50, are good for admission throughout the week. Children 12 and under are admitted free when accompanied by an adult ticket holder.

Golf fans can also watch the action up close in air-conditioned comfort inside the new Sweet 16 Chalet presented by LIST Sotheby's International Realty located at the scenic Hole #16. Weekly price is \$500, one day access, \$150. Both include general admission plus complimentary food, beverages, beer and wine Thursday-Sunday. First two beers or wine each day is complimentary; no host bar available.

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

NO SMOKING... OUTSIDE

Better pass the... word. As of January 1st all City and County of Honolulu parks on O'ahu which includes beaches, parks, tennis courts, playgrounds, botanical gardens, swimming pools, athletic fields, beach right-of-ways, park roadways and all recreation areas, are now smoke free by law. Signed into law by Mayor Caldwell last April, be sure to lt your guests know if you get caught smoking in these areas you will be fined. Fines are \$100 for the first offense, \$200 for the second within a year and \$500 for additional violations.

Typically the Capitol District is the first place you send your guests with stops at 'IOLANI PALACE, MISSION HOUSES MUSUEM and if your guests are in the mood for art the HAWAI'I STATE ART MUSEUM, which of course we affectionately refer to as HiSAM. The museum is run by the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Art (HSFCA) and was established by the Hawai'i State Legislature back in 1965. The mission of HSFCA is to promote, perpetuate, preserve and encourage culture and the arts, history and the humanities as central to the quality of life of the people of Hawai'i. There are lots of very cool cultural exhibits and activities happening at the museum every month. The evolution of Hawaiian fashion is currently on display in the exhibition "The Way We Wear" in the Diamond Head Gallery which runs until January 18th. The show spans the centuries of fashion and costume in Hawai'i with a visual retelling of the many cultural threads and textures that are not only part of contemporary fashion in Hawai'i but also reflects our multi-cultural social tapestry. The exhibit showcases how native Hawaiian tapa cloth, missionary clothing, Palaka plantation wear, Paniolo cowboy attire and the Japanese kimono have all influenced the way we dress today. The textile theme continues on January 21st through March 9th with the new exhibit "Mohala Hou Ke Kapa / Kapa Blossoms Anew" which features a select group of 28 kapa practitioners from Hawai'i and California, whose work encompasses both traditional and non-traditional use of materials and techniques in kapa-making. Your guests will learn about the history, tools and botanical resources of this ancient Hawaiian art form.

This next event happening at HiSam may not be of any use for your guests, but perhaps your auntie will enjoy it. Who doesn't have boxes of out-dated calendars, greeting cards, and flash cards from when you were studying hiragana and katakana in Japanese class? Well, now there is something you can do with all of them! On Saturday, January 11th from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. the "Creative Re-use" class will teach you how to cut, fold and collage those old things into your own personal, statement-making eco-stationary. This will be crafters heaven for some you! The class is FREE but of course space is always limited so I suggest you get there early to sign up for the class. For more information, please call 586-9958. The Hawai'i State Art Museum is located at 250 South Hotel Street and flat rate parking is available at Ali'i Place for \$3.

Four blocks down from HISam, is the HAWAI'I THEATRE CENTER. When was the last time you went there for a concert? On Sunday, January 12 at 4 p.m. two-time Grammy® Award winner Sylvia McNair will present her musical autobiography called "Subject to Change" featuring songs by George Gershwin, Richard Rodgers, Leonard Bernstein and Stephen Sondheim. Your guests may not be familiar with the artist but a visit to the historic theatre in the late afternoon for a fun concert is a terrific way to experience what we locals take for granted. Ticket are \$25 to \$50. If song isn't what tickles your guests fancy, perhaps comedy does. Comedian/actor Mike Epps will be doing standup on Saturday, January 25th at 8 p.m. Some of your guests may have seen him in Sony Picture's film "Sparkle" or in "Hangover 3" and later this year can be seen in the thriller "Vipaka" with Forest Whitaker. Tickets start at \$47 and can be purchased at hawaiitheatre.com or by calling 528-0506 Tuesdays through Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. This theatre has been entertaining Hawai'i's audiences for more than 90 years and has been proclaimed at the "Pride of the Pacific."

Another theater who could easily be referred to as the "Pride of Hawai'i" is KUMU KAHUA THEATRE just down the street. This month the theatre presents the popular Hawaiian legends of Umi retold by Jean Charlot in "Moa a Moi, (Chicken Into King)" which recreates several stories about Umi the peasant prince who was born a commoner and became a wise and famous ruler in Hawai'i. The author of this version, Jean Charlot, was born in France and became a renowned muralist in Mexico. In 1949 he moved to Hawai'i as a teacher and artist in residence at the University of Hawai'i Manoa. Running Thursday, Friday & Saturday at 8 p.m., beginning the week of January 23rd it will continue through February 22, 2014 as well as Sundays at 2 p.m., January 26 and February 9, 16, 23. Tickets (\$5-\$20) can be purchased at 536-4441, at KumuKahua.org, or by visiting the box office at 46 Merchant Street (corner of Bethel & Merchant Streets, downtown) between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Even though there's lots happening in the downtown scene this month, I cannot forget to mention MANOA VALLEY THEATRE'S production of "The Odd Couple" by Neil Simon with runs from January 16th to February 2nd. I'm some of you will remember the 1970s television series with Jack Klugman as Oscar Madison, the sloppy sports writer, and Tony Randall as Felix Ungar, his uptight roommate who moves in after their mutual divorces. This version takes a gender twist on the comedy and updates the play to the 1980s with a messy Olive Madison and her neat freak girlfriend Florence Ungar. Even though the main roles are now played by women, the story is still the same, even the best of friends can make the worst of roommates. 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

'Wako' Mimura emerged the winner.



Chef's Corner

Top Chef's Lee Ann Wong

Lee Anne first rose to public prominence as one the final four chefs on the first season of Bravo's Top Chef. She then became the culinary for the show and has been a featured chef in the past few Hawaii Food & Wine festivals. Now she has moved to Hawaii and will be opening her own restaurant later this month.

Why did you drop your fashion career to become a chef? Boredom. I was burnt out by going to school, interning in the fashion industry, and bar tending at night to pay the rent. I have always worked in restaurants since I was 15 so it was natural for me to want to try my hand in the kitchen. It was the year I was living in a 200 sq. ft. studio in Times Square with just a mattress and 13-inch TV on the floor. I got channels 2, 3, 4, 13, and by some miracle, channel 50, The Food Network.

What was your first job in the industry?

I ended up getting a job at Aquavit with Marcus Samuelsson while I was still in culinary school. He actually called me at home the day after I staged to ask me what I wanted to do and if I enjoyed working that first day (I had turned a case of artichokes, among other things, and my hands, still not used to the motions, felt arthritic at the time... I did not tell him this). I ended up staying there for almost 3 years.

Who would you consider your mentor and why?

Marcus and his chef de cuisine Nils Noren, who is now a friend of mine, both pushed me to do homework and write menus. Looking back, I didn't know anything at the time. They Gave me the job of running the cafe upstairs from the dining room and writing the weekly specials which is a huge opportunity for a young cook. My other mentor is André Soltner, of the famed Lutéce, who I worked with at the French Culinary Institute. I spent hours cooking alone with André, and I took every opportunity to ask him questions about cooking, restaurants, and what it was like for him growing up in Alsace. I love that man like a grandfather.

How did the Top Chef opportunity come about?

It was while I was working at FCI as their Executive Chef of Events and Continuing Ed. My manager met the casting director in California and gave him my number. I remember when he first called me and told me Bravo was creating an original culinary competition show called "Top Chef". At the time those two words weren't actually said worldwide, and sounded strange to me as I thought, "What a stupid name for a show." Ha!

What Cheftestants are you still in contact with?

I am good friends with Stephanie Izard. I see Harold every so often. There are hundreds of us, literally. It's funny because I've met so many cheftestants over the years, I'm pretty friendly with all of them (*I wasn't allowed to be chummy when I worked for the company producing the show*). Now I get to see Sheldon, whom I adore, whenever I go to Maui! We are truly a giant family.

How did the show exposure affect you and your journey?

The fact that the network ended up hiring me at the supervising culinary producer for the series changed my life for sure, but not in the way that it has with other contestants. Working behind the scenes gave me invaluable experience and knowledge, beyond the fact that it became another career alternative for me, as I still get calls to produce food TV.

What was your favorite childhood food memory?

My Chinese grandmother would come stay with us occasionally when she was visiting from the Philippines. When I was around 4 years old, I decided to make cookies. I had seen my mom do it a dozen times. Mixing bowl. Eggs. Peanut butter. Sugar. Oats. Vanilla. (I was close, but not quite.) I diligently spooned the batter onto the little toaster oven tray, climbed on the step stool, put the tray in the toaster oven, then my little finger pressed the button. "Toast!" As I stood on my tiptoes staring intently through the oven glass, my grandmother walks into the kitchen, looks in the toaster oven and starts cracking up laughing and babbling in Chinese. She then proceeded to make a batch of sesame jin dui with me. It was one of the first and only times I have ever gotten to cook side by side with my Chinese grandmother, and the first time I ever made dim sum.

If money were not a factor, what would be on the menu for your most decadent dinner?

Meaning what would I cook or would I just go have a meal at Vintage Cave and let Chris Kajioka hook me up with the chef fantasy menu? The menu would involve the best seafood--- fatty toro, Kona crab, Maine lobster, Japanese Uni, abalone, etc--- plenty of duck and foie gras, game birds like squab and pheasant, Mangalitsa pork, Kobe beef grade AAA, French cheeses, truffle showers, and enough caviar to make your ankles swell for a week. There'll be chocolate, custard, cream, and caramel...and plenty of wine and whiskey. And maybe some heart medication as an after dinner mint.

Name the most interesting food items you've found?

I've been so fortunate to be able to travel the world and discover not only food but people and cultures. I'm obsessed with Japan, I've spent time training in kaiseki restaurants in Kanazawa and Kyoto the past few years. Every ingredient I see at the markets fascinates me. I am particularly fond of freshly made yuba (tofu skin), kinome (the leaf of the sansho pepper plant), and the various and versatile forms of potato like yamaimo and nagaimo. As far as the strangely delicious goes, I spent my 20s traveling annually to and cooking in Mexico... Oaxaca specifically. Chapulines, smoked fried grasshoppers, were a favorite snack of mine. I believe Quinten Frye managed to sneak some on to his menu when he first opened Cocina.

What advice would you give to someone just starting out their culinary career?

Diligence. First off you have to pay your dues. There is no such thing as an instant sous chef. Pay attention, show up on time, and do more listening than talking. Humility. We are all students of the stove. We all have good days and bad days. If the guy next to you is going down in flames, help that person rather than getting on the negativity band wagon. Keep in mind as you grow and develop your own sense of style, there's always more you can learn, especially from your peers. The no "I" in "team" thing is totally true. Inspiration. If you can imagine it, you can make it happen. I get my inspiration through eating, traveling, reading, art, pop culture, and really just observing what's around me. It's okay to think outside of the box.

What's your favorite ingredient to cook with and why

That's like asking a zookeeper if they prefer chimpanzees or tigers. There are so many amazing ingredients. Have to choose one? Salt. I have at least two dozen different varieties of salt in my pantry. I don't have a mattress in my apartment yet, but I have plenty of salt, and a derivative of salt, salted pork products. I am looking forward to making delicious cured meats for the restaurant.

What's your favorite part of your job?

Working with people. Feeding people. I am really looking forward to building my own family for Koko Head Cafe. I always say food is the social fabric of our lives so the ability to give people quality food in a fun and friendly environment is pretty much what any person getting into the restaurant business wants. Kevin and I want Koko Head Cafe to be a great dining option for both locals and tourists but also a place that our employees will enjoy their job and being part of a team.

Koko Head Cafe is scheduled to open in late January in the old 12th Avenue location. Kevin Hanney calls it a Brunch House, with an emphasis on breakfast, some brunch items & lunch. Will be open daily from 7:00 a.m.- 2 p.m. • Phone: 732-5825 • Twitter: @leeannewong
